REFERENCE of an elivertacement which appeared in the Government Genetic for this Province, dated October 9th, 1847, No. 4: His Exercise of the Lieutenant Governmen directs it to be notified for general information, that from representations which have been made to him, His Excellency deems it necessary to warn persons against depasturing Stock or other wise farming locations centrary to the provisions of the "Native Land Purchase Ordinance," Session 7, No. 19, at any part on the line of coast between Walkanae and Wangaihu, or inland between the same limits; as the Government will immediately enforce the terms of the said Ordinance against persons so offending.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency George Grey, Esquire, Governor-in-Chief, in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS the undermentioned Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, was passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria: viz. :-

No. 10. "An Ordinance for establishing Standard Weights and Measures, and for the prevention of the use of such as are false and deficient." (26th October, 1846.)

Which Ordinance having been by the Right Honorable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, laid before the Queen, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

Now therefore I, the Governor-in-Chief, do hereby proclaim and make known to all to whom it may concern, that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the before-mentioned Ordinance: and further to allow that the provisions thereof should equally apply to the Weights and Measures used by the Customs, and others Her Majesty's Revenue Officers within the Colony.

Having heard through the Harbour Master, that there is a Rock off Jerningham Point, on which several vessels have been on shore, I have the honour to inform your Excellency that I have placed a temporary Buoy thereon, and beg leave to enclose directions for avoiding it.

"There is a Rock with seven feet water on it, low water, spring tides, on which several vessels have struck, seventy fathoms NNW. of Jerningham Point, (the point which forms the boundary between Evans' Bay and Lambton Harbour.) By

keeping a remarkable red brick house with six windows in front, three above and three below, with a white balcony between them, to the right of a wooden house on the beach with two garret windows on each side of the roof, the first house on the beach to the right of the windmill buildings, this danger will be cleared. The soundings which are deep to, will give no indication of this pinnacle rock."
