**PROCLAMATION.**

By His Excellency EDWARD JOHN EYRE,  
Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor of the  
Province of New Munster, in the  
Islands of New Zealand, &c., &c. &c.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom bearing date the 23rd day of December, 1846, full power and authority is granted to the respective Governors of the Provinces of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the respective Executive Councils thereof, to issue proclamations appointing the limits of Counties, Hundreds, Towns, &c., within the said Provinces: And it is further declared that the Lieutenant-Governor for the time being of each of the said Provinces shall exercise all powers and privileges thereto and otherwise lawfully vested in the Governor for the time being of any such Province:

And whereas by an Ordinance enacted by the Government of New Zealand, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 3, No. 17, intituled, "An Ordinance for imposing a Tax upon Raupo Houses," it is provided, that it shall be lawful for his Excellency the Governor from time to time by Proclamation to declare the

provisions therein contained "to be in force in any Town, or part of any Town, the boundaries whereof respectively shall be defined by such Proclamations," and further, that "on a day to be named in such Proclamation, not being less than six calendar months from the date thereof, there shall be levied in respect of any building constructed wholly or in part of Raupo, Whar, To-rai, Kahaka, or any other of any description, and situate within the boundaries so defined, the sum of Twenty Shillings."

And whereas a certain other Ordinance was enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 7, No. 17, intituled, "An Ordinance to repeal the Cattle Trespass Ordinance, and the Cattle Trespass Amendment Ordinance, and to provide for the summary recovery of compensation for damage done by Cattle trespassing," by the 6th clause whereof it is declared, that "if any Cattle shall be found wandering at large in any street or public place within the limits of any town or village which shall be proclaimed by the Governor to come within the operation of this present provision, the owners thereof shall forfeit and pay for every head of Cattle so wandering any sum not exceeding five shillings, to be recovered in a summary way:

And whereas by a certain other Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 1, No. 9, intituled, "An Ordinance to increase the efficiency of the Constabulary Force, after provision made for the introduction of the Ordinance into the Town of Wellington, it is enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation, "to specify any further or other limits of towns within which any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced, upon a requisition to that effect from a majority of the Magistrates of the district in which such Town is situate:"

And whereas by a certain other Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 1, No. 11, intituled, "An Ordinance to abate the Dog Nuisance," it is provided that, "upon the requisition of the majority of the Magistrates of any district the Lieutenant-Governor may proclaim the said Ordinance to be in operation:"

And whereas with respect to the two Ordinances last aforesaid, such Requisitions have been made by the majority of the Magistrates of the district of Otago:

And whereas by another Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 1, No. 5, intituled, "An Ordinance to confer upon the Lieutenant-Governor of New Munster within the Province, the same powers in certain cases as are conferred upon the officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time being," it is provided that all such powers as are conferred by the Ordinances enumerated in the schedule thereto appended "upon the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time being, shall be and are thereby within the Province of New Munster conferred on the Lieutenant-Governor hereof."

And whereas the Ordinances aforesaid are included in the said schedule:

Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of New Munster aforesaid, in pursuance of the authority by the said in part recited Letters Patent and Ordinances in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare,

That the limits of the Towns of Dunedin and Port Chalmers, in the district of Otago, shall be such respectively as are described and delineated in the New Zealand Company's authorized plans of the said towns:

And I hereby further proclaim and declare that the provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance for imposing a tax upon Raupo Houses, shall from and after the 1st of January, 1851, be in force within the said

Towns of Dunedin and Port Chalmers, so limited as aforesaid;

And that the said Towns, within the limits aforesaid, shall, from and after the 1st day of April, 1850, come within the operation of the hereinbefore recited Ordinance of the said Ordinance to repeal the Cattle Trespas Ordinance, &c.

And I further proclaim and declare that the hereinbefore in part recited Ordinance to abate the Dog Nuisance, shall, from and after the 1st day of April, 1850, be in operation within the said district of Otago, the limits whereof are particularly described and defined in a certain proclamation under my hand, bearing date the fourth day of May, 1849.

And I further proclaim and declare, that the provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance to increase the efficiency of the Constabulary Force shall, from and after the 1st of April, 1850, be enforced within the Towns of Dunedin and Port Chalmers so limited as aforesaid, within the district of Otago aforesaid.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of New Munster, in the Islands of New Zealand, at Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-eighth day of January, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

THE following Report on the Colonial Hospital is published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

Colonial Hospital, Jan. 4, 1850.

SIR,—I have the honor to forward to you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, a return showing the progress of the Hospital under my charge since it was first opened. This return will show the progressive increase of Native Patients each year as the Hospital became known and its benefits appreciated.

During the last year, 1849, there were admitted one hundred and sixty-seven in-door Native patients, all fresh cases, and eighteen Europeans, making a total of one hundred and eighty-five in-door cases; out of this number one hundred and forty-one were discharged cured, six died, seven were

relieved, and the remaining fourteen are still in hospital, all likely to recover except one native. There were also one hundred and eighty-seven out-door cases treated during the same period.

You will perceive that there has been an increase over last year of one hundred and twenty-four Native Patients, a fact which proves the increasing influence of this establishment over the native race, and their appreciation of the benefits conferred on them by the Government in establishing an institution of this nature so urgently required for the alleviation of their sufferings.

I have also to remark that some of the most influential chiefs from the coast have been admitted as patients during the last year, and have been cured: a few years ago no one would believe that Native Chiefs of great consequence would (breaking through their strong prejudices) leave their friends and "pas" and come long distances for the purpose of submitting themselves entirely and without reserve to the treatment and attendance of Europeans; such a fact proves incontestibly the amount of benefit conferred by the Government on the natives, and the influence which may be gained in time over the native mind by such institutions, which are so well calculated to break through all their most deeply rooted prejudices.

The object in establishing Hospitals for the benefit of the natives in the centre of large European districts, in order that the natives from the coast might be brought in contact with European civilization, has been fully attained so far as this Hospital is concerned, for Native Chiefs and their people have been brought long distances to this establishment, and I have known many instances of patients who have been some time in the Hospital unwilling to return to their "pas," and most anxious to procure employment from the Europeans.

The Native Patients also have always been most anxious before their departure to procure my consent to their immediate return in case of any sickness, and seldom fail to enquire and carry with them the rules of dietary, &c.

I have also known instances of some old chiefs who, from being most prejudiced and opposed to medical treatment, have become most zealous believers in the remedial powers of the medical art, in consequence of the cure of some friend or relation whom they supposed could not recover.

In conclusion, I have only to remark, that at the time the Hospital was first opened many persons well acquainted with the native character doubted the practicability of getting the natives to forego their deeply rooted prejudices and take advantage of the benefits of an Hospital, so strong and peculiar were their ideas in this respect; there can now no longer any doubt remain on this

point, and I am clearly convinced that the natives in all matters tending to their improvement and welfare, are not only fully alive to appreciate and second any efforts made in their behalf, but are fast progressing in civilization.
