PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir George Grey,
K. C. B., Governor-in Chief in and
l. s. over the Islands of New Zealand,
and Governor of the Provinces of
New Ulster and New Munster, and
Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS the undermentioned Ordinance, enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, was passed in the eleventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, viz.—“An Ordinance to authorize the establishment

of a Colonial Bank of Issue by the Government of New Zealand, to make and issue a Paper Currency, and to prohibit the making and issuing of Paper Money by private individuals,” Sess. 8, which Ordinance having by the Right Honorable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, been laid before the Queen, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

Now, therefore I, the Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and make known to all whom it may concern, that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the before mentioned Ordinance.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, K. C. B., Governor-in-Chief
I. s. in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session 8, No. 16, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize the establishment of a Colonial Bank of Issue by the Government of New Zealand, to make and Issue a Paper Currency, and to prohibit the making and issuing of Paper Money by private individuals," it is amongst other things enacted, that the business of and relating to the issue of the Notes of the said Bank shall be conducted and carried on in offices to be established for that purpose at Auckland and Wellington, and at such other places as the Governor shall direct, and that every such office shall be open for business on such days and at such hours as the Governor for the time being shall in that behalf by Proclamation appoint: and whereas, Offices of the Colonial Bank of Issue have been established at Auckland and Wellington. Now, I, the Governor do hereby proclaim and appoint that the said office will be opened on the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and that such offices will open for business on all days but Saturday and Sunday, from ten o'clock until three o'clock, and on Saturday from ten o'clock until two o'clock.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Edward John Eyre, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, in the Islands of New Zealand, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance passed by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session 1, No. 10, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize the Levying and collection of Tolls on Roads, and Rates on Land, in the Province of New Munster," it is enacted that, "whenever a majority of the Justices of the

“Peace residing within the district, shall Memorialize His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, stating their desire that the said Ordinance or any part thereof, should be brought into operation within such district, or any portion thereof, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the consent of the Executive Council may proclaim the district, or portion thereof so indicated by the said Justices to be within the operation of the said Ordinance, or such part thereof accordingly:”

And whereas, a majority of the Justices of the District of Wellington, have memorialized His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to the effect, that the 14th clause of the aforesaid Ordinance, should be brought into operation within such portions of the said District, as are hereinafter described.

Now, therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that the 14th clause of the Ordinance aforesaid, shall be brought into operation within the District of Wellington aforesaid, as far as regards that part of the Wairarapa Road which extends from Wellington to the Silver Stream in the Upper Valley of the Hutt, and that part of the North-Western Road which extends from Wellington to the Sea Beach at Pakakariki.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Edward John Eyre, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, in the Islands of New Zealand, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session VII, No. 7, intituled “An Ordinance for the Regulation of Prisons,” it is enacted that, “it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor from time to time, as to him shall seem meet, by Pro-

clamation, to declare any House, Building, Enclosure, or Place, to be a Public Gaol; and from and after the publication of any such Proclamation, such House, Building, Enclosure, or Place, shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Gaol.”

And Whereas, by another Ordinance, enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council thereof, Session I, No. 5, intituled “An Ordinance to confer upon the Lieutenant-Governor of New Munster within the Province, the same powers in certain cases, as are conferred upon the Officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time-being,” it is provided that all such powers as are conferred by the Ordinances enumerated in the schedule thereto appended, “upon the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Officer Administering the Government of the Colony for the time being, shall be, and are thereby within the Province of New Munster, conferred on the Lieutenant Governor thereof.” And Whereas, the Ordinance aforesaid is included in the said schedule: And Whereas, it is desirable that the Building now used as a Lockup in the Town of Dunedin, in the District of Otago, in the Province of New Munster, should be proclaimed to be a Public Gaol of the Colony. Now, therefore, I, the said Lieutenant-Governor of the said Province of New Munster, do hereby proclaim and declare that the Building aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken to be one of the Public Gaols of the Colony of New Zealand.
