JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS IN THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF THE ISLANDS OF NEW ZEALAND.

WELLINGTON, THURSDAY, MAY 29, 1851.

Present—

His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, K.C.B.,
Governor-in-Chief.

His Excellency EDWARD JOHN EYRE, Lieu-
tenant-Governor of New Munster.

And the Members as on Monday the 19th
instant.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment.
The Minutes of the last meeting read and
confirmed.

His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief laid
on the table "A Bill to authorize the Go-
vernor to apply a portion of the Land Fund
arising within a Municipal District at the
instance of the Corporation thereof."

"A Bill for taking the Census of the Is-
lands of New Zealand."

The Attorney-General, agreeable to no-
tice, moved the first reading of Debtors Bill.

Motion seconded by the Colonial Treasur-
er, adopted, and bill read a first time ac-
cordingly.

Mr. Hickson moved, agreeable to notice,
seconded by Captain Smith, the first read-
ing of Customs Bill.

Motion adopted, and bill read a first time
accordingly.

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary,
seconded by the Attorney-General, "Natu-
ralization Bill" read a first time.

On the motion of the Colonial Treasurer,
seconded by the Colonial Secretary "Mar-
riage Amendment Ordinance Bill" read a
first time.

Col. M'Cleverty gave notice that at the
next meeting of Council he should move the
first reading of "Land Fund Appropriation
Bill."

Captain Smith gave notice that at the
next meeting of Council, he should move
the first reading of "New Zealand Com-
pany's Land Claimants Bill."

The Colonial Secretary gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he should move the first reading of "Census Bill," and also the second reading of "Naturalization Bill."

Mr. Hickson gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he should move the second reading of "Customs Bill."

The Attorney-General gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he should move the second reading of "Debtors Bill."

The Colonial Treasurer gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he should move the second reading of "Marriage Amendment Ordinance Bill."

His Excellency then adjourned the Council at a quarter to three o'clock, p. m., until to-morrow at two o'clock.

FRIDAY, MAY 30, 1851.

Present—

His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and the Members as on yesterday.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment.

The Rev. Robert Cole, M. A., Colonial Chaplain, read prayers.

The Minutes of the last meeting read and confirmed.

His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief laid on the table "A Draft of the Rules and Regulations for Depasturing Cattle," which, on the motion of the Colonial Secretary, was ordered to be printed.

Col. M'Cleverty, agreeable to notice, moved, seconded by the Attorney-General, that the "Land Fund Appropriation Bill" be read a first time.

Motion agreed to, and bill read a first time accordingly.

On the motion of Captain Smith, seconded by Mr. Carkeek, "New Zealand Company's Land Claimants Bill" read a first time.

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary, seconded by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, "Census Bill" read a first time.

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Colonial Treasurer, "Naturalization Bill" read a second time.

On the motion of Mr. Hickson, seconded by the Colonial Treasurer, "Customs Bill" read a second time.

On the motion of the Attorney-General, seconded by Col. M'Cleverty, "Debtors Bill" read a second time.

The Colonial Treasurer moved, seconded by Mr. Hickson, the second reading of "Marriage Amendment Bill."

Debate ensued, when

The Colonial Treasurer consented to withdraw this motion until arrival of absent members.

His Excellency laid on the table "a Bill for regulating Fencing within the Valley of the Hutt River."

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary, —Council in Committee on "Naturalization Bill."

Title—Preamble—Clauses 1 and 2—read, amended, and agreed to.

Consideration of Schedule deferred.

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary Council resumed.

Mr. Hickson gave notice that at the next meeting of Council, he should move that Council do go into Committee on "Customs Bill."

Col. M'Cleverty gave notice that at the next meeting of Council, he should move the second reading of "Land Fund Appropriation Bill."

The Colonial Treasurer gave notice that at the next meeting of Council, he should move the first reading of the "Hutt Fencing Bill."

The Attorney-General gave notice that on Tuesday next, he should move that Council do go into Committee on "Debtors Bill."

The Colonial Secretary gave notice that on Tuesday next, he should move the second reading of "Census Bill."

Captain Smith gave notice that on Tuesday next, he should move the second reading of "New Zealand Company's Land Claimants Bill."

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary, Council adjourned at half-past three o'clock, p. m., to Tuesday next, the 3rd day of June, at two o'clock.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, a Knight Commander of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation issued by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, bearing date the 21st day of November, 1850, the provisions of an Ordinance of the Legislative Council of New Zealand, No. 5 of Session 8, intitled "The Slaughter House Ordinance," were declared to be in force within that tract of country which lies "between the sea, the Northern boundary line of the Porirua block, and the Turakirai Range, (or the Eastern boundary line of the Port Nicholson block.)"

And whereas it has been found expedient to alter the limits within which the aforesaid Ordinance shall be in operation :

Now therefore, I, the Governor of the Province of New Munster, in pursuance of the powers by the aforesaid Ordinance in me vested, do hereby declare that so much of the Proclamation hereinbefore mentioned as relates to the extension of the provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance to the vallies of the Upper and Lower Hutt is hereby revoked.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of New Munster, in the Is- (L.S.) lands of New Zealand, at Government House, at Wellington, this fifth day of June, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

The amounts in Shelly's and Tuawaiki's Estates (£350) are in Government Debentures of £50 each, recovered from David Scott, who was a debtor to these Estates. The Debentures are held to be sold and their amount applied in payment of claims proved on Shelly's Estate, and to the representatives of Tuawaiki, which will close these Estates. Part of the fund in Perry's Estate is in the hands of the Deputy Registrar at Nelson, and part of it is necessary to the recovery of outstanding debts due to the Estate under process of Court. The amount in Chevitt's, Rowand's, Harrison's and Craig's and part of Abbott's are in the hands of the Deputy Registrar (Mr. Strode) at Otago, who has charge of these Estates there, and are taken from his last return. The amount in Wylie's Estate has been considerably reduced by a payment under an award in a question in which the Estate was involved since the Schedule was made out. In some instances funds are necessary to carry on the business of the Estates, to keep the receiver free of advances which he is obliged to make.

I, ROBERT RODGER STRANG, Registrar of the Supreme Court of New Zealand and Receiver of Intestate Estates for the Middle District of New Zealand, do solemnly and sincerely declare that the above is a true and faithful account of all monies belonging to Intestate Estates received and paid by me, and of all balances paid by me into the hands of the Treasurer of the Province of New Munster, from the first day of January, to the 31st day of March, 1851, both days inclusive.
