PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, a Knight Commander of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor & Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance passed by the Governor-in-Chief of the New Zealand Islands, by and with the consent of the Legislative Council thereof, intituled "An Ordinance for the Naturalization of certain persons in the Islands of New Zealand," Session xi. No. 9, it is enacted that all and singular the persons who shall be declared to comewithin the operation of such Ordinance by any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governorin-Chief, shall be deemed and taken, until the next Session of the General Legislature within the Islands of New Zealand, to be natural born subjects of Her Majesty.

Now therefore, I, the Governor-in-Chief, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said in part recited Ordinance, do hereby proclaim and declare that the person whose name is underwritten, shall be deemed and taken to be a natural born subject of Her Majesty from the date set opposite his name, until the next Session of the General Legislature of the Islands of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule annexed to the said Ordinance.

SIR,—I herewith transmit, for your information and guidance, the Copy of a Letter from the Board of Trade respecting the payment to that Department of certain of the Penalties levied under the Mercantile Marine Act, 13 and 14 Victoria, cap. 93. I also enclose the Copy of a Letter on this subject, which I caused to be addressed to the Board of Treasury with an extract from a letter received from the Lords Commissioners in reply.

I have to instruct you to take the necessary steps for causing the penalties in question, to be paid into the Commissariat Chest as suggested by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and the Certificates of such payments to be from time to time forwarded to this Department for transmission to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade.

SIR.—I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade to call the attention of Earl Grey to the following statement:

By 7 & 8 Victoria, c. 112, s. 62, certain penalties, recoverable under that Act, were made payable to the Seamen's Hospital Society; and by the Mercantile Marine Act, 13 & 14 Victoria, c. 93, sec. 111, such penalties, if inflicted after the 1st of January last, are made payable to the Board of Trade, or as it may direct. As the former Act extends to ships registered in the United Kingdom, in whatever part of the empire they may be, and also in certain cases to other British ships, many penalties are inflicted under it in Colonial Ports which ought, in future, to be paid to the Board of Trade. My Lords are, therefore, desirous that such instructions should be given to the Clerks of the Justices, or other officers receiving such penalties in the Seaports in the Colonies, as may insure their due payment to the Board of Trade; and I am to request you to move Earl Grey to take such steps as he may consider expedient for that purpose.

SIR.—I am directed by Earl Grey to transmit to you the enclosed Letter addressed to me by the Secretary to the Board of Trade and Plantations, and to request that you will lay the same before the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and move them to inform his Lordship, whether the most convenient course will be to instruct the Governors of the Colonies to cause the sums referred to, to be paid into the Commissariat Chest, and for their Lordships to pay over the amount to the Board of Trade; or whether any other arrangement appears preferable.

Extract from a Letter from Sir C. E. Trevelyan, to Herman Merivale, Esq. dated Treasury Chambers, 8th May, 1851.

"I am commanded by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to acquaint you for the information of Earl Grey, in reply to your Letter dated 23rd Ultimo, that the Commissariat Officers in the Colonies are required by their Instructions to receive into the Commissariat Chest, all Monies tendered to them by a Colonial Government for remittance to England on the Public Service, and to grant Certificates of the sums so received, and upon those Certificates being transmitted to this Board, the Paymaster General is authorized to issue like sums to the parties in whose favor they are granted.

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My Lords therefore would suggest that the Governors of the Colonies be instructed, not only to cause the sums referred to in Mr. Booth's Letter dated 3rd Ultimo, to be paid into the Commissariat Chest, as proposed by Lord Grey, but also to cause the Certificates of such payments to be forwarded to the proper Officer of the Board of Trade, for transmission to this Board in support of the claim to reimbursement of the amount."

SIR,—It has been suggested to me by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, that it would be very desirable, in submitting for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government, the claims of Civil Officers serving in the Colonies to retired allowances, that such recommendation should be accompanied by a statement, shewing at what period the Officers so recommended are expected to retire from active service, whether on forwarding their application after reduction, or after having passed a Medical Board, or whether on the receipt of the authority for the required superannuation, or at whatever other time, as the case may be.

The inconvenience of applications from distant Colonies, for a subsequent consideration of the intermediate term of service between the Governor's recommendation and the confirmation by Her Majesty's Government will be thereby avoided, and the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury will be enabled to fix the date at which the respective allowances will be chargeable in the accounts to be rendered to the Commissioners of Audit, or to make the requisite provision for payment in those cases in which the retired allowances are to be defrayed by this Country.

I take this opportunity of transmitting to you a Printed Form, shewing the particulars required by the Act 4 & 5 William IV, c. 24, and the Treasury Minute, dated the 21st June, 1831, to be furnished in reference to each Person recommended for a Superannuation Allowance; and it will be very desirable that the same Form should be used in submitting any such recommendation in favor of any Officer serving under your Government.

H. M. Surveying vessel Pandora, Auckland, 11th December, 1851.

SIR,—I hasten to report, for the interest of navigation, the existence of a dangerous Bank in the direct course of vessels bound to the West Coast of this Island, round Cape Maria Van Dieman, on which Her Majesty's Surveying vessel under my command, had a favorable opportunity of anchoring and sounding.

The magnetic bearings from Cape Maria Van Dieman, are from S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., to S. S. W., to outer edge 8 miles, and from Motu Pea, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., to E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., to the outer edge 10 miles; has from 5 to 7 fathoms on it, coarse sandy bottom.

This bank covers three square miles, and has hitherto been considered only as a tide-race, but would be dangerous at most seasons from the heavy westerly swell prevailing on the West Coast.

SIR,—As vessels from New Zealand frequently pass amongst the Islands in this neighbourhood, many of which (particularly of the Paumotu Group) appear to be very incorrectly laid down on the Charts:

Le fond est de corail, tel qu' on chasse ou qu' on perd ses ancres. On n'y est nullement à l'abri : les goëlettes peuvent être convenablement mouillées prés de terre. Il y a des pilotes et il ne serait pas prudent de s'en passer.

Ces renseignements intéressant vivement la navigation, j'ai l' honneur de les porter immédiatement à votre connaissance, en vous informant que je les fais egalement parvenir en France, et à tous nos Consuls dans ces mers.

Comme ces iles bordent un passage tres fréquenté par les navires qui viennent à Tahiti par le nord, comme de plus, on ne les aperçoit que lorsque on est pour ainsi dire dessus, je crois utile de porter à la connaissance des navigateurs, leurs positions exactes.


