The Reserve No. 304 Ordinance, 1873, Amendment Ordinance, 1874.

July 1, 1874.

<u>Zublished</u> by **Authority**.

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed by the Superintendent and Preamble. Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury in the thirty-ninth Session thereof intituled "The Reserve No. 304 Ordinance, 1873" and whereas an error occurred in the Schedule to the said Ordinance and it is desirable that the same should be amended:

Be it therefore enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof as follows:

- 1. The Schedule to the said Ordinance shall be and the same is Repealing Clause. hereby repealed.
- 2. From and after the passing of this Ordinance the Schedule schedule to this hereunder written shall be read and interpreted as the Schedule to the said Ordinance in the same manner as if the Schedule hereto had been originally appended to the said Ordinance.

Title.

3. This Ordinance shall be intituled and may be cited as "The Reserve No. 304 Ordinance 1873 Amendment Ordinance 1874."

SCHEDULE.

All that piece or parcel of land being part of Reserve No. 304 (in red) containing by admeasurement eighteen acres two roods more or less commencing at the northernmost corner of Reserve No. 314 (in red) thence north-easterly following a line in continuation of the north-western boundary of the latter Reserve to the Reserve for the Rolleston and Southbridge railway thence northeasterly following the last-mentioned Reserve to the north-eastern boundary of Reserve No. 304 aforesaid and from thence returning along the north-eastern north-western and south-western boundaries thereof to the commencing point.

The Railway Tolls and Management Ordinance 1872 Amendment Ordinance 1874.

[July 1, 1874.]

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed by the Superintendent and Preamble. Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury intituled "The Railway Tolls and Management Ordinance 1872" And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Ordinance.

Be it therefore enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury by and with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof as follows:

- 1. That portion of the Schedule referred to in the said Ordinance Portion of Schedule and thereunto annexed which is under the heading of "Warehousing nance abolished. Charges" shall be, and the same is hereby abolished.
- 2. The Schedule hereunto annexed shall henceforth be read and schedule annexed to considered to be a part of the Schedule to the said Ordinance in the part of Schedule of place of the part thereof which is hereby abolished.

SCHEDULE.

WAREHOUSING CHARGES.

On all Goods not otherwise described not removed from the Railway within one hour, and on all Goods awaiting order for delivery, Two Shillings and Sixpence per Ton per week or part of a week.

On Wool not removed from the Railway within one hour, One Shilling per Bale per week or part of a week.

On Bonded Goods for Customs' examination, One Shilling per Ton, and if not removed immediately after being passed by the Customs an additional charge of Two Shillings and Sixpence per Ton per week or part of a week.

On Timber not removed from the Railway within one hour, Twopence per one hundred superficial feet per week or fraction of a week.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend "The Public Seal Ordinance Preamble. Session I. No. 6" be it therefore enacted as follows:

- 1. Clause 5 of "The Public Seal Ordinance Session I. No. 6" is $_{\rm Repealing\ Clause}$. hereby repealed and the following Clause shall stand in lieu thereof.
- 2. The Public Seal shall not be used except in the presence of a Public Seal how to member of the Executive Council and everything sealed therewith shall be used. be signed by the Keeper of the Public Records and by the member of the Executive Council witnessing the sealing thereof Provided always that it shall not be necessary that the sealing with the Public Seal of the Province of warrants appointing members of the Executive Council shall be done in the presence of a member of the Executive Council nor

- that a member of the Executive Council shall sign such warrants as last mentioned as a witness to the sealing thereof.
- 3. The Ordinance shall be intituled and may be cited as "The Public Seal Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1874."

The Racecourse Reserve Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1874.

[Reserved for the signification of the Governor's pleasure thereon, July 1, 1874.]

Published by Anthority.

WHEREAS an Ordinance was passed by the Superintendent and Preamble.
Provincial Council of Canterbury intituled "The Racecourse
Reserve Ordinance Session XI. No. 7" And whereas it is expedient
to amend the said Ordinance:

Be it therefore enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury with the consent and advice of the Provincial Council thereof as follows:

1. That Clause 2 of the said Ordinance be repealed.

Repealing Clause.

2. The lessee of the said course may from time to time fix and Lessee may fix fee receive such fees and payments in respect of admission of persons admission not exhorses and vehicles into any portion of such land as he may think fit ceeding amount specified.

Provided that they shall not exceed for every horse two shillings and sixpence for every two-wheeled vehicle drawn by any horse or other beast ten shillings for every additional horse or other beast drawing such vehicle one shilling for every four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse or more twenty shillings and for every foot passenger one shilling Provided always such fees be expended on the permanent improvement of the said public racecourse or the furtherance of the races to be held thereon.

Title.

3. This Ordinance shall be intituled and may be cited as "The Racecourse Reserve Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1874."

The Lyttelton Harbour Reserve Ordinance, 1874.

[Reserved for the signification of the Governor's pleasure thereon, July 1, 1874.]

Published by Anthority.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand the Preamble. short title of which is "The Lyttelton Harbour Works Loan Act 1872" it was enacted (inter alia) that it should be lawful for the Superintendent meaning by the Superintendent the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury for the time being acting under the advice and consent of his Executive Council to construct Harbour Works in the Harbour of Lyttelton on any land which then was or thereafter might be vested in him whether above or below high water mark or partly above and partly below high water mark and to defray the cost thereof out of any monies to be raised under the provisions of the now recited Act subject however to certain conditions and particularly to a condition that all persons being owners of or having any lesser estate or interest in any land which might be deprived of frontage upon the

waters of Erskine Bay or be injuriously affected by the construction of the said Harbour Works shall be entitled to receive compensation for such deprivation of water frontage or injury the amount whereof should be ascertained in the manner therein mentioned or referred to whereas under and in pursuance of "The Public Reserves Act 1854 a grant under the hand of the Governor and the Public Seal of the said Colony was on the Fourth day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy issued to the Superintendent of Canterbury whereby the lands more particularly described in the first Schedule hereto and being part of the reserve No. 1242 (in red) on the map of the Chief Surveyor of the Province of Canterbury with the rights and appurtenances thereto belonging were (inter alia) granted unto the said Superintendent to hold unto him and his successors in trust as a site for the railway and other works in connection with the railway and the harbour and port of Lyttelton And whereas the said Superintendent acting by and with the advice and consent of his Executive Council has agreed with the owners of sections numbered 332 333 334 335 336 337 338 339 340 341 on the map of the Chief Surveyor of the Province of Canterbury setting out and describing the town of Lyttelton in the manner directed by the said hereinbefore in part recited Act of Assembly for compensation to be rendered to each of the owners on account of such sections being deprived of water frontage and otherwise injuriously affected by the construction of the Lyttelton Harbour Works way of such compensation it has been agreed between the said Superintendent and the owners of the said sections that the said Superintendent should construct or cause to be constructed a roadway fifty links wide beginning at the south-west corner of a quarter-acre section of town land being section numbered 322 on the map of the Chief Surveyor of the Province of Canterbury setting out and describing the town of Lyttelton running thence with a width of fifty links as aforesaid in a south-easterly direction at an angle of 120° 30' in a straight line a distance of seven hundred and thirteen links thence at an angle of 210° in a straight line for a distance of four hundred and sixty links and being distant sixty-five feet from the top edge of the slope of the embankment of the reclaimed ground measured at right angles to the road thence in a line nearly parallel to the top of the slope of the embankment for a distance of five hundred and forty links the road being thirty-three feet in width and thirty-one feet six inches distant at that point which roadway passes along the former high water frontage of the before-mentioned lands is more particularly shown on the plan hereto annexed and therein coloured yellow and shall give or reserve to the said owners their heirs successors or assigns a right of way over such roadway And that the said Superintendent should pay or cause to be paid to such owners all the legal engineering surveying and other expenses which the said owners shall have been put to by reason of or in consequence of such deprivation or injury And whereas owing to

their regular conformation of the said sections it has been found necessary in order to make the said road regular and straight in some parts to make the said road partly upon land of the said owners parts of the above-mentioned sections and above the former high water mark of the And also for the same reason in some places that the inland boundary of the said road is in some places below the former high water mark of the said sections And whereas in consequence of the above recited circumstances the said owners respectively and the said Superintendent have mutually agreed as follows That the owners shall respectively convey to the said Superintendent those lands part⁸ of the above-mentioned sections and being part of the lands required for the said road and being situate above the high water mark of the said sections and also that the said Superintendent should convey and assure to the said owners respectively the lands more particularly described in the Schedule hereto being the lands above referred to as the lands situate between the inland boundary of the said road and the former high water mark of the said sections And whereas it is therefore expedient to empower the said Superintendent to carry out the above recited agreements and in pursuance thereof to empower the said Superintendent to grant as before mentioned a right of way over the said road and also to convey to the said owners the said lands abovementioned:

Be it therefore enacted by the Superintendent of the said Province with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof as follows:

1. It shall and may be lawful for the said Superintendent by Dood intendent to grant under the Public Seal of the said Province to grant unto the owners of owners, &c., of sections 332 to 341 both 1. 2. It shall and may be lawful for the said Superintendent by Deed Superintendent may as aforesaid to convey and assure unto such person or persons and upon all or any pieces of land described in such items and conditions as he may judge reasonable all or any of the schedule. pieces of land described in the Schedule hereto.

3. This Ordinance shall be intituled and may be cited as "The Title. Lyttelton Harbour Reserve Ordinance 1874."

THE SCHEDULE.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section No. 340.

All that parcel of land part of the said Reserve bounded on the north by a straight line 9 links long running South-westerly being in continuation of the northern boundary of section 340 thence at an angle south-easterly along the inland boundary of the said road a distance of twenty-one links thence northerly along the boundary of the said Reserve to the eastern extremity of the line firstly before mentioned.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section 339.

All that parcel of land part of the said reserve bounded on the south by the continuation of the northern boundary of section 340 a distance of nine links on the west by the inland boundary of the said road a distance of ninety-one links on the north by a line twenty links long being a continuation of the most northerly boundary of section No. 339 and on the east or north-east by the boundary of the said reserve.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section 338.

All that parcel of land part of the said reserve bounded on the south by the continuation of the most northerly part of section No. 339 a distance of twenty links on the West by the inland boundary of the said road a distance of ninety-one links on the north by a straight line eight links long being a continuation of the northern boundary of section 338 and on the east or north-east by the boundary of the said reserve.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section 337.

All that parcel of land part of the said reserve bounded on the south by the continuation of the northern boundary of section No. 338 a distance of eight links on the west by the inland boundary of the said road for a distance of forty links from the western extremity of the said line eight links long and bounded on the north and east by boundary of the said reserve.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section 333.

All that parcel of land part of the said reserve commencing at the most westerly extremity of the northern boundary of section 334 thence along the boundary line of the said reserve to the most westerly extremity of the northern boundary of section 333 thence in a straight line south-westerly a distance of twelve links in continuation of the said northern boundary thence south-easterly along the inland boundary of the said road a distance of eighty-eight links to the commencing point.

Land to be Conveyed to Owner of Section 332.

All that parcel of land part of the said reserve bounded on the south by the continuation of the northern boundary of section 333 a distance of twelve links on the west by the inland boundary of the said road for a distance of twenty links from the most northwesterly extremity of the said line twelve links long and on the north and east by the boundary line of the said reserve.

BE IT ENACTED by the Superintendent of the Province of Canter. Preamble. bury with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof as follows:

- 1. The "Appropriation Ordinance, 1873-74," shall be, and the same Repealing Clause. is hereby repealed as from the 30th June, 1874.
- 2. Out of the public revenues of the said Province there may be Appropriation. issued and applied for the public service of the Province, and for defraying the charge of the Government thereof for the period commencing on the First day of July One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and ending on the Thirty-first day of March One thousand eight hundred and seventy-five in manner set forth in Schedules A B and C

to this Ordinance any sum or sums of money not exceeding the sums in such Schedules specified amounting in the whole to the sum of One Million and three hundred and sixteen thousand nine hundred and twenty-two pounds fourteen shillings and seven pence.

3. The Provincial Treasurer shall issue and pay from time to time Superinten- any sum or sums of money not exceeding in the whole the sum above the specified to such persons and in such proportions as the Superintendent shall by warrant under his hand directed to the Provincial Treasurer and certified by the Provincial Auditor in terms of the "Provincial Audit Act 1866" and the "Provincial Audit Act Amendment Act 1868" direct and such Treasurer shall be allowed credit for all sums paid by him in pursuance of such warrants.

4. This Ordinance shall be intituled and may be cited as "The Appropriation Ordinance, 1874-75."

PROVINCE OF CANTERBURY, NEW ZEALAND.

SESSION XLI.

FRIDAY, MAY 29, 1874.

The Council met pursuant to Proclamation of His Honor the Superintendent, bearing date 13th May, 1874.

Members present—All, except Messrs. Bluett, Buckley, Enys, Healey, Mallock, Ormsby, Turnbull, T. S. Tancred, Williams.

Election of Speaker.—Motion was proposed and granted unanimously—"That Henry John Tancred, Esq., be elected Speaker."

Messrs. Jollie and Montgomery then accompanied the Speaker, and obtained the approbation of His Honor the Superintendent to the election.

The Speaker in the chair.

Opening Address of His Honor the Superintendent.—His Honor the Superintendent entered the Council Chamber and delivered the following Address:—

- "MR, SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN,-
- "In accordance with what I believed would be your wish, I have taken the earliest opportunity, after the termination of the recent elections, to summon the Council of the Province for the dispatch of business.
- "The late Council expressed their desire that in future the financial period should terminate in the autumn, instead of in the spring of the year, and I believe that by this arrangement the public advantage will be best consulted, having in view the convenience of those who are members of both the Colonial and Provincial Legislatures, and the uncertainty which exists as to the time when the General Assembly of the Colony may conclude its deliberations; and, also, considering that at this time of the year private business will be less interfered with than at any other by your attendance on your public duties.

- "I shall, accordingly, ask you to grant supplies for the public service for the period ending the 31st of March, 1875.
 - "It is our privilege to meet under circumstances of peculiar prosperity.
- "Since the first meeting of the last Council, not quite four years ago, the population of the Province has increased from about 45,000 to more than 59,000.
- "The area of cultivation has been nearly doubled in the same period, and the value of the exports of the Province has reached a sum during the past year of more than one million sterling.
- "The great increase in the value of our exports, combined with the influx of population and capital, have had a most marked effect upon the sales of waste lands, which have greatly exceeded the amount anticipated. The receipts under this head were estimated for the year ending September 30, 1871, at £34,875, and the actual receipts for that year were £36,225 15s. 6d. The estimated receipts for the year to end 30th September, 1874, were £262,800, but the amount actually obtained to the 27th of this month, that is, in a period of eight months, is £453,308 2s. 9d., or £190,508 2s. 9d. in excess of the sum estimated for the whole year; and during this period more than 117,671 acres have been surveyed.
- "The large increase of traffic on the railways is another evidence of the prosperity of the Province. The total receipts for the year ending 30th September last amounted to £75,647 19s. 11d., while the receipts for the seven months ending 30th April last are £61,747 4s. 3d.
- "As the traffic returns show a considerable amount of income in excess of expenditure, I have thought it expedient to reduce the rates of carriage and fares on the different lines, a course which I confidently anticipate will induce traffic, and promote the public convenience.
 - "This reduction will take effect in a few days.
- "The lines of railway from Rakaia to Ashburton, from Rolleston to Malvern, and from Rangiora to Cust, will be open for traffic shortly; and the branch line to Southbridge will probably be open in a few months.
- "You will learn from returns which will be laid before you, that every effort is being made to promote the diffusion and settlement of the large number of immigrants arriving in the Province.
- "Depôts are being established at Waimate, Akaroa, Rangiora, Ashburton, and Oxford. In accordance with the resolution of the last Council, cottages have been erected, or are in course of erection, for the reception of immigrants in various districts of the Province. It is of such importance that the immigrants forwarded to this Province should be of a character suited to its requirements, that I trust you will see fit to continue, in England, the services of an agent having accurate local knowledge of the wants and resources of this portion of the Colony.

- "I regard with considerable satisfaction the fact that the working classes in England are taking practical steps to make themselves acquainted with the field which is here open to industry, and have no doubt that a better knowledge of the advantages which are offered will lead to a considerable influx of population. As a matter of primary importance, you will be asked to make liberal appropriations to the Road Boards, especially in those districts where lines of road are not already formed.
- "From information which has been received, I learn that an engineer may shortly be expected from England to report upon the construction of harbour works at Timaru. I shall recommend you to set aside a liberal sum to give effect to any proposals which may be made by him.
- "I shall shortly be in a position to call for tenders for a portion of the work authorised by you to provide a water supply on the Waimakariri Plains. I shall ask you to make a further appropriation for the same purpose in the district between the Rivers Ashburton and Rakaia.
- "The time has, I think, come when active steps should be taken to ascertain the cost of permanently lowering Lake Ellesmere, so that a large tract of land may be made available for cultivation, and with this object in view, I shall ask you to appropriate a sufficient sum to obtain an opinion from a competent engineer as to the best method to be adopted, and as to the expense which may be involved, together with an estimate of the amount of land which would be rendered available.
- "The system of education established in this Province is producing most important results.
 - "The number of children attending the public schools is steadily increasing.
- "The actual numbers in attendance for the quarter ending 31st December last, according to the published returns, being 8229, as against 6265 in the same quarter of the previous year.
 - "New district are being formed, and new school buildings are being erected.
- "In order to meet the increasing educational requirements of the Province, and to maintain the system in a state of efficiency, and also to prevent the necessity for increased taxation in the future, I am of opinion that further endowments in land are desirable. The question of the expediency of extending similar provision to hospitals and other institutions deserves your careful attention.
- "I shall recommend you to make further grants to public libraries, so as to extend the usefulness of these institutions.
- "I am of opinion that it would be advisable to permanently endow the municipalities of the Province with certain fees and taxes raised within their respective boundaries. I propose, therefore, to transmit to you a Bill to give effect to this proposition.

"Bills will be submitted to you for amending 'The Executive Council Ordinance,' for amending 'The Railway Tolls and Management Ordinance, 1872," for granting to the Municipal Corporations within the Province certain fees and taxes, as part of their ordinary revenue.

"I now declare this Council open for the dispatch of business.

Reply to the Opening Address of His Honor the Superintendent.—The following reply to the Address of His Honor the Superintendent was proposed:—

"The Provincial Council thank your Honor for the Address with which you opened the first Session of this Council.

"The Council concur with you Honor that this Session has been summoned under circumstances of peculiar prosperity, and they are gratified to learn that with other evidence of that prosperity the receipts from the railways are so large and increasing as to justify you in reducing the rates of carriage and fares.

"The Council are glad to learn that prompt steps have been taken to provide for the reception and accommodation of the large number of immigrants which are arriving in the Province, and they agree with your Honor that is of great importance that the selection of immigrants in England should be such as will ensure the arrival in the Province of those only who are suited to its requirements.

"The Council cordially concur with your Honor that liberal appropriations to the Road Boards are of primary importance.

"Any recommendation of your Honor to set aside a liberal sum to carry out the proposals which may be made by the engineer who is shortly expected in the Province to report upon the construction of harbour works at Timaru will be carefully considered by the Council.

"The Council learn with satisfaction that your Honor will shortly be able to call for tenders for supplying the Waimakariri Plains with water, and will give their best consideration to any proposal for appropriating a sum of money for the supply of water to the district lying between the rivers Rakaia and Ashburton.

"The Council will give their best attention to any proposals which may be submitted to them for the permanent lowering of Lake Ellesmere.

"The Council coincide with your Honor that the system of education established in the Province is producing important results, and that the great increase in the number of children attending public schools is most gratifying.

"The Council will be prepared to give their attentive consideration to any proposals for maintaining the efficiency of the schools by endowments in land or otherwise.

"Your Honor's recommendation to make further grants to public libraries to extend the usefulness of these institutions will receive our best attention.

"The Council will give their best attention to the Bill which your Honor proposes to submit to their consideration providing for the permanent endowment of the municipalities of the Province, and also to the Bills amending the Executive Council Ordinance, and amending the Railway Tolls and Management Ordinance, 1872."

Amendment was proposed—"That all the words after 'prosperity and they' be struck out for the purpose of inserting the words, 'and will give their best attention to any measures which may be proposed for the reduction of the rates of carriage and fares." Leave was given to withdraw the amendment. The word "so" was ordered not to stand part of the question.

All the words after "increasing" were ordered not to stand part of the question.

The clause passed as amended.

The Reply was adopted as amended.

Mandeville and Rangiora Drainage District.—Motion was granted—"That all papers and correspondence in the hands of the Provincial Government relative to the formation of the Mandeville and Rangiora Drainage District be laid on the table of the Council."

AUDITOR'S REPORT.

Provincial Auditor's Office, Christchurch, Canterbury, New Zealand, 3rd June, 1874.

TO H. J. TANCRED, ESQ., SPEAKER OF THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL.

SIR,—I have the honour to enclose a Comparative Statement of the Provincial Account, showing the amounts voted by the Provincial Council during the last Session, and the Expenditure for the period of eight months ending the 31st May, and the amount unappropriated.

Assuming that the Appropriation Ordinance for the year ending 30th September, 1874, had to run its course, I will proceed to comment upon some of the items for which a further supply would have been needed.

The item of Police Contingencies would have been insufficient; the expenditure in this department is largely in excess of the vote.

The average of the last eight months shows that at least £1000 would have been required to carry on to the end of the financial year, in excess of the balance at present unappropriated.

So also in the department of Charitable Aid, the expenditure would also have required a further supply to the extent also of £1000.

In most of the other departments the votes of the Council would have been sufficient, except in the Railway Department, and here the vote, even including the whole amount for contingencies, would have been largely exceeded. In this department there has been a considerable addition to the staff in excess of the appropriation, partly to be accounted for perhaps by the large increase to the traffic.

I have audited the accounts of the Railway Department to the 30th April, and have annexed to this Report a Balance Sheet made up to that date.

I have also enclosed a return showing the receipts and expenditure of the various Road Boards made up to the 31st December last. Reference to this return will show that there was a balance to the credit of the various Boards at that date amounting to the sum of £84,000 and upwards; and only in five cases had the expenditure been in excess of the income.

The accounts of the Waimakariri Board of Conservators, and those of the Trustees of the Museum, as well as the Curator's Account, have also been audited, and are in every way satisfactory.

In auditing the accounts of the Administrator of Charitable Aid, who is also Receiver of the monies due by immigrants, I have had occasion to report to His Honor the Superintendent that the receipts in this department continue far below the expense incurred in their collection; during the last four months only £53 has been collected, while the expense of the department has exceeded £150.

As regards the vote for Educational purposes, I have again to invite the attention of the Provincial Council to the remarks which I felt it my duty to make in my last report; and in continuation thereof, I have to ask the attention of the Council to the extremely unsatisfactory abstract of account showing the receipts and expenditure of the District School Committees, and which accompanies this report.

The grant for Maintenance of Schools, which amounts this year to £15,000, passes almost wholly to the Chairmen of the District Schools, chiefly in the nature of imprest monies for salaries and other purposes, to be accounted for in the usual way, and the Education Ordinance provides that these accounts are to be audited by two auditors elected in each district; but while this has been done, it has not been done in accordance with the Ordinance.

In proceeding to audit the accounts of the Board of Education in accordance with the 71st Clause of the Ordinance, the accounts so audited by the District Auditors were handed to me, as part of the accounts of the Board, and on examining them I found they were wrongly constructed.

In place of returning these accounts to the Board of Education, I agreed, after a conference with the Board, to return them to the districts concerned, explaining where and how they were imperfect, and requesting they might be revised and returned to me.

Out of 68 School Districts, 41 only have complied with the Ordinance, the remaining 27, as will be seen by my return, have failed to pay any heed to my request, and some of the Committees altogether repudiate any liability to account further, inasmuch as the Ordinance has been, as they think; complied with in submitting their accounts to the District Auditors; and as new Chairmen and new Committees are now in office, they owe no responsibility in the matter. As the Ordinance is at present constructed, I have no authority to enforce the rendering of an accurate account. Practically, therefore, the Board of Education, so far as its grants to District Schools is concerned, stands in the position of irresponsibility, and their accounts are not and cannot be audited.

This is a matter of serious consequence, and one which I apprehend the Provincial Council will hasten to remedy; for I cannot imagine any more dangerous precedent to be on record than the non-accountability of any Board, receiving as this does, grants to so large an amount.

No improper application of the public money can be supposed in this particular case, but the Council will see that where an imperfect audit prevails, followed as in this case by indifference as to the result—not only is there evidence of laxity, but the door is open for a possible misapplication of the public funds, which is not unfrequently the consequence.

The Chairmen of the District Schools are in the position of receivers of public money, and should be accountable for its application to the public Auditor—(Vide the first section of the Schedule to the "Provincial Audit Act, 1866")—but the fact of the Education Ordinance appointing District Auditors to a certain extent alters this position.

I respectfully submit that the Ordinance should be amended by repealing the appointment of District Auditors and requiring the accounts to be submitted to the Provincial Auditor; and in order to enable the Auditor to visit these districts, a slight alteration in one or two clauses of the Ordinance would be necessary, as for example—the year of office should terminate in the month of April in each year instead of October, and the accounts should be made up to the previous 31st December—(as in the Road Board Ordinance)—the Provincial Auditor could then without any material additional expense, audit the accounts of the District School Committees while he is engaged in the audit of the Road Board Accounts; it would only occasion the trouble of making suitable centres to which the accounts could be forwarded for the Auditor's convenience as well as for the economy of time.

This audit should be required to be completed, as is the Road Board audit, on or before the 1st of April; hence the accounts would be made up to a comparatively recent period, in readiness to be submitted to the Provincial Council at its April session.

Since I have held the office of Provincial Auditor, I have endeavoured, in the public interest, and successfully hitherto, to insist upon a full and perfect system of accounting in every case where Boards or individuals are in the receipt of the public funds; and I feel assured that it is only necessary for me to bring under the notice of the Provincial Council a case in which there is found to be a difficulty in this most important matter for it to be amended.

The Petition of the undersigned Members of the Halswell and Spreydon Road Boards, Architects, Builders

That the roads leading to and from the Cashmere, Hoon Hay, and Halswell Quarries, are in such a bad and dangerous state that when the weather is wet it is impossible to take a laden dray over them.

That the above-mentioned Road Boards have not the means of putting the roads in question in repair.

That the progress of all Public Works and Buildings in the City of Christchurch and its vicinity is greatly impeded, and the cost of the same materially increased thereby.

That on a recent occasion, when the Christehurch City Council invited tenders for stone kerbing for the footpaths in the City not one single tender was given in.

That the only remedy for the present deplorable state of things is to reform and metal that portion of the roads leading to the said Quarries from those spots which are impassable in wet weather.

That this remedy is in the power of your Honorable Council alone.

That it has been calculated that the sum of £1000 sterling would suffice to put the roads leading to the said Quarries in good and substantial repair, and to insure at all seasons of the year the transit of full loads of stone from the Quarries to the Plains.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable Council will cause, during the present Session, a respectful address to be presented to His Honor the Superintendent, requesting him to place upon the Estimates the sum of £1000 sterling, with a view to relieve your petitioners from the evils under which ey are labouring. REPORT.

THE SECRETARY FOR PUBLIC WORKS.

Christchurch, 15th June, 1874.

SIR,—I have the honour to report that, in pursuance of instructions contained in a letter from the Chief Surveyor (84.73), I commenced a tour of inspection of the improvements on the Pre-emptive rights in the province on the 1st May, 1873, and finished all the country between the rivers Waitaki and Hurunui, and extending from the sea westward as far as the hills, by February, 1874. My reports were furnished to the Chief Surveyor in the form of a copy of a diary of my proceedings as each set of tracings was completed, and from this diary I have now the honour to condense a statement shewing the nature and condition of the improvements for which Pre-emptive Rights are held. This statement is contained in three columns, the first giving the number of the run in the order in which it was inspected, the second gives the nature of the improvements, and the third the condition of the improvement at the time of nspection. With respect to the last column, all improvements are to be considered in good condition except those specially marked bad.
