

## Session VIII.

MONDAY, JANUARY 18TH, 1864.

THE Speaker took the Chair at 3 o'clock.

Present, all the members but Mr. Ormond.

The Council met pursuant to a Proclamation issued by His Honor the Superintendent, bearing date the 14th day of December, 1863, which was read by the Clerk.

The Speaker then read prayers.

The Speaker informed the Council of the election of O. L. W. Bousfield, Esq., to a seat in the Provincial Council for the Napier Country District, and Thomas Edwards, Esq., for the Town of Napier.

The Speaker laid upon the table the Auditor's Report on the accounts of the Province, for the quarters ending June 30th and September 30th, 1863.

The Speaker ruled that the Notice of Motion of Mr. Fitzgerald's of last session, in reference to salaried officers, lapsed.

His Honor the Superintendent then addressed the Council as annexed.

Mr. Curling moved that the Superintendent's address be printed.

Mr. Smith seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to, and address ordered to be printed accordingly.

Mr. M'Lean moved that all the Standing Rules and Orders be suspended.

Mr. Russell seconded the motion.

Mr. Colenso on Jan. 19, 1864, to move—That it is the opinion of this Council, that (in order the more effectually to support and strengthen the Provincial Government, and also to satisfy a large body of the electors) His Honor the Superintendent be respectfully requested to consider the reconstruction of the Executive Council, so that the principal interests of the Province may be fairly represented therein; and also that Mr. Speaker do forward a copy of this opinion of the Provincial Council to His Honor the Superintendent forthwith.

Mr. Fitzgerald to move on 19th January (to-morrow)— That every officer appointed by the Superintendent and paid out of Provincial funds be disqualified from holding a seat in this Council.

Mr. Fitzgerald to move on Tuesday, January 19—That it is expedient the management of the Waste Lands of the Province shall be vested in a Board to consist of not less than three and not more than five members.

Mr. M'Lean to move on to-morrow, Tuesday, 19th January—For leave to bring in an Amended Loan Bill.

Mr. Russell moved—That the Council do adjourn until to-morrow, Tuesday, January 19th, at 11 o'clock.

#### TUESDAY, JANUARY 19TH, 1864.

THE Speaker took the Chair at 11 o'clock.

Present, all the members but Mr. Ormond.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Tiffen on Jan. 20—To ask the Superintendent what steps (if any) have been taken by the Government for purchasing the 70-mile bush.

Mr. Tiffen on Jan. 20—To ask the Superintendent whether any attempt has been made to purchase the land in dispute at Puketitiri adjoining the Native Reserve of 500 acres.

Mr. Tiffen on Jan. 21, to move—That the Government be requested to prepare and get ready, previous to the next sitting of Council, an "Amended Fencing Ordinance" adapted to this Province.

Mr. Tiffen on Jan. 21, to move—That the Superintendent be requested to proclaim the Impounding Ordinance to be in operation over that portion of the Province lying South of the river Esk.

Mr. Tiffen to move on Jan. 22—That the Government be requested to prepare

prepare and get ready a Roads Act, previous to the next sitting of this Council.

Mr. Colenso on Jan. 20—To ask His Honor the Superintendent why the usual Quarterly Provincial Abstracts of Receipts and Expenditure, now extending over three quarters, have not been published in conformity with the resolution of the Provincial Council.

Mr. Colenso on Jan. 20—To ask His Honor the Superintendent, why the accounts of the Province, being only for six months, have been prepared by the Provincial Auditor and now laid on the table.

Mr. Colenso on Jan. 20, to move—That His Honor the Superintendent be requested to lay on the table forthwith, the letter from the Deputy Superintendent, containing his resignation of that office.

Mr. Dolbel on Jan. 20—To ask the Superintendent why a certain number of the Colonial Defence Force were not stationed at Mohaka during the time hostilities were anticipated there, and whether it is the intention of the Government for the future to station a certain number in that District.

Mr. Fitzgerald on Jan. 20, to move—That a dipping trough with the necessary requirements be erected at the Spit, for the purpose of dipping all sheep introduced into the Province by vessel—the cost of such work to be defrayed out of the £4000 voted in the loan for harbour improvements.

Mr. Colenso, in pursuance of notice, asked His Honor the Superintendent if the Government have, during the past year, been able to effect anything towards securing a portion of the Ahuriri Plains for the use of agricultural settlers.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that he had been in negotiation with the natives in reference to the Plains, but from the disturbed state of the Province, did not think it advisable to proceed further in the matter, as it might place the natives in an antagonistic position towards each other, and might consequently lead to an outbreak in the Province.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, moved—That copies of all correspondence with Inspectors and Managers of Banks, and with Loan or Money Agents (if any) respecting the Provincial Loan, be laid on the table forthwith.

Mr. Tiffen seconded the motion.

His Honor the Superintendent having laid the correspondence moved for on the table, the motion was withdrawn.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, moved—That this Council resolves that His Honor the Superintendent be requested to use every possible fair exertion—both positive and negative—to reserve and obtain so much of that portion of the Ahuriri Plains, bounded by the Ngaruroro and Tutae-kuri rivers, and by the sea and the first hills, as may not be required by the Maori proprietors for their own use, for the location and use of agricultural settlers.

Mr. Tiffen seconded the motion.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, asked His Honor the Superintendent whether the necessary powers have been delegated to him by His Excellency the Governor to instruct the officer appointed under the Native Land Purchase Ordinance to lay information against breakers of that Ordinance, or whether

that officer has power to lay such information ab initio.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that the power of laying information under the Ordinance had in the commencement been delegated only to a few. Mr. T. H. FitzGerald, when Superintendent, had received that delegation; but proceeding to exercise the powers granted to him in a recent case, he (Mr. FitzGerald) had been directed by the Hon. Colonial Secretary to withhold prosecutions under it, and in only one instance, as far as he was aware, had the proceedings been exercised, and that was in the case of Mr. Colenso. No powers had been delegated to him, and in his opinion the Act was not in force, as another Act had been passed by the General Assembly sanctioning the purchase of land from the natives, and which Act had received the sanction of Her Majesty.

Mr. Colenso, in pursuance of notice, moved—That it is the opinion of this Council that (in order the more effectually to support and strengthen the Provincial Government, and also to satisfy a large body of the electors) His Honor the Superintendent be respectfully requested to consider the reconstruction of his Executive Council, so that the principal interests of the Province may be fairly represented therein; and also that Mr. Speaker do forward a copy of this opinion of the Council to His Honor the Superintendent forthwith.

### WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 20th, 1864.

THE Speaker took the Chair at 11 o'clock.

Present, all the members.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Tiffen on the 21st inst.—To ask the Superintendent whether it is the intention of the Government to prepare a Meanee Drainage Act previous to the next sitting of the Council.

Mr. Tiffen to move on 21st inst.—That the Government be requested to prepare and get ready a Roads Act previous to the next sitting of this Council.

Mr. Colenso to move on 21st inst.—That this Council be informed (as far as is consistent with military movements) why a portion of the Colonial Defence Force was removed to Te Waipukurau? and particularly why two stockades have been erected so near each other.

Mr. Colenso to move on 21st inst.—That so much of the public correspondence between His Honor the Superintendent of this Province and the General Government (printed in papers A No. 2 and B No. 5 of the General Assembly) as relates to Hawke's Bay and to this Provincial Council, be taken into consideration.

Mr. Colenso to move on 21st inst.—That in order that members may clearly know what is called "wandering from the subject," and also to prevent any future unpleasant interference and unseemly disputation, this Conncil do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council, to consider and determine what matter should be held to be so extraneous to a member's speech as to empower the Speaker to interrupt him at pleasure while addressing the Council.

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, asked the Superintendent what steps (if any) have been taken by the Government for purchasing the 70-mile bush.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that he had been in communication for the purchase of the land in question, but it was impossible for him to attempt to complete it, as the chief owner of the bush was engaged at Rangatiki in some native feud, and until it was at an end he could not see his way clear to again enter into communication in reference to the purchase of it.

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, asked the Superintendent whether any attempt has been made to purchase the land in dispute at Puketitiri adjoining the Native reserve of 500 acres.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that he had been in communication with the chief owner and proposals had been made but had not yet received an answer whether they were disposed to sell or not; the Council might be assured he would take advantage of purchasing if the land in question was offered for sale.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, asked His Honor the Superintendent why the usual Quarterly Provincial Abstracts of Receipts and Expenditure, now extending over three quarters, have not been published in conformity with the resolution of the Provincial Council.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that all he could say was, that it was simply an inadvertence on his part. When his attention had been called

called to it by the Provincial Treasurer, he immediately gave instructions to have the account prepared.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, asked His Honor the Superintendent why the accounts of the Province, being only for six months, have been prepared by the Provincial Auditor, and now laid on the table.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that he could only say as he said before, that it was an inadvertence on his part; but the Council might be quite certain that the accounts would in future be published quarterly.

Mr. Colenso withdrew his notice in reference to the production of the letter from the Deputy Superintendent, resigning his office.

Mr. Dolbel, pursuant to notice, asked the Superintendent why a certain number of the Colonial Defence Force were not stationed at Mohaka during the time hostilities were anticipated there; and whether it is the intention of the Government for the future to station a certain number in that District.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that he had spoken to the officer in command of the Colonial Defence Force, but that officer was unwilling to detach his men in small parties, particularly as they had not been drilled; however, he would do all in his power in the matter, as the settlers of Mohaka wished it.

Mr. Fitzgerald's notice in reference to a dipping trough, in the absence of the mover, lapsed.

Mr. M'Lean moved—That No. 27 of Standing Rules and Orders be suspended.

Mr. Tiffen seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. M'Lean moved—For leave to bring in an Amendment of Loan Act, Session 6, No. 1.

Mr. Ormond seconded the motion.

Leave granted.

Mr. M'Lean moved—That No. 37 and 39 of Standing Rules and Orders be suspended.

Mr. M'Lean moved-That the Amendment of Loan Act be read a first time.

Mr. M'Lean to move on 21st inst.—That the Amendment of Loan Act be read a second time.

Mr. Ormond to move on to-morrow—That in No. 113 of the Standing Rules and Orders, that in the third line the word "eleven" be struck out and the word "eight" be substituted.

Mr. M'Lean moved—That this Council do adjourn until to-morrow, Thursday, 21st inst., at 11 o'clock.

### THURSDAY, JANUARY 21st, 1864.

THE Speaker took the Chair at 11 o'clock.

Present, all the members.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Colenso brought forward a question of privilege in reference to words used by Mr. Ormond during the sitting of Council yesterday; Mr. Tuke during the discussion made use of the following expression, which at the request of Mr. Colenso, was ordered to be taken down,-"I heartily concur in Mr. Ormond's expression that the real motives were that it was a factious opposition," but on an explanation being given, Mr. Tuke withdrew his words and the matter then lapsed.

Mr. Ormond brought forward as a question of privilege that Mr. Colenso's seat as a member of this Council is vacant; but the Speaker ruled that it was a matter for the law to decide, and Mr. Colenso, if occupying a seat in the Council unlawfully, did so at his own risk.

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, moved—That the Government be requested to prepare and get ready, previous to the next sitting of the Council, an "Amended Fencing Ordinance," adapted to the requirements of this Province.

Mr. Tuke seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, asked the Superintendent whether it is the intention of the Government to prepare a "Meanee Drainage Act" previous to the next sitting of Council?

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that it was the intention of the Government to prepare a "Meanee Drainage Act."

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, moved—That the Government be requested to prepare and get ready a "Roads Act" previous to the next sitting of this Council.

Mr. Colenso seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, moved-That this Council be informed (as far as is consistent with military movements) why a portion of the Colonial Defence Force was removed to Te Waipukurau; and particularly why two stockades have been erected there so near each other?

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that it was a matter in which the Provincial Government in reality had no authority. powers which, were the Governor of the colony (the highest authority) to interfere with, the Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in New Zealand might object to it. A map had been prepared by the officer in command of the civil forces in conjunction with Major Douglas, he believed, of a general plan of defence. However, all the stockades were to be paid for by the General Government. A stockade had been erected at Mohaka, one ready for erection at Petane, and one on the Northern frontier was in course of erection.

Mr. Tiffen, pursuant to notice, moved-That the Superintendent be requested to proclaim the "Impounding Ordinance" to be in operation over that portion of the Province lying south of the River Esk.

Mr. Curling seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Colenso, pursuant to notice, moved-That so much of the public correspondence between His Honor the Superintendent of this Province and the General Government (printed in Papers A No. 2 and B No. 5 of the General Assembly) as relates to Hawke's Bay and to this Provincial Council, be taken into consideration.

Mr. Tiffen seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Fitzgerald moved-That the Council do adjourn until 3 o'clock.

Mr. Tiffen moved—That No. 27 of Standing Rules and Orders be suspended.

Mr. Ormond seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Tiffen moved—That doubts having arisen as to the right of Donald M'Lean, Esq., to sit in this Council as member for the Napier Country District, His Honor the Superintendent shall, without delay, obtain the opinion of the Attorney-General as to the validity of the said member's seat.

Mr. Tuke seconded the motion.

On an explanation being given by His Honor the Superintendent to the effect that he had resigned all emoluments attached to any office under the General Government on the 17th February, 1863, Mr. Tiffen withdrew his motion.

Mr. M'Lean pursuant to notice, moved—That the Amendment of Loan Act be read a third time.

Mr. Curling seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

The Speaker then put the question that this Bill do now pass. Bill passed accordingly.

Mr. M'Lean laid letters on the table in reference to Mr. Colenso's assistance to the Postmaster as interpreter.

Mr. Ormond moved that they be read.

Mr. Curling seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to, and letters read accordingly.

Mr. Rhodes, pursuant to notice, moved—That doubts having arisen as to the right of Mr. Colenso to sit in this Council, it is the opinion of this Council that His Honor the Superintendent shall, without delay, obtain all the evidence that can be procured as to the disqualification of the said member.

Should the evidence be conclusive, it is the opinion of this Council that a new writ should be issued in accordance with clause 12 of the Constitution Act and the provisions of the Disqualification Act, 1858, of the General Assembly of New Zealand.

Mr. Kennedy seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Ormond moved—That No. 27 of Standing Rules and Orders be suspended.

Mr. Tiffen seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to.

His Honor the Superintendent laid correspondence on the table in reference to the leasing of the Ahuriri Plains from the Natives.

Mr. Fitzgerald moved that the Council do adjourn until next sitting day, at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Dolbel seconded the motion.

Motion agreed to, and Council adjourned accordingly.

His Honor the Superintendent, in reply, stated that the question of Education was one of great importance—he might say the greatest—as it not only affected the present generation but also the future; and the moral welfare of the Province depended in a great measure upon a proper system of education being established in it. The Government had this measure under their consideration; but after examining the Act now in force, they had come to the conclusion that it was perfectly sufficient for the present requirements of the Province. It was not the passing of Acts that would assist education; the people themselves must take more interest in the matter, otherwise all the Government could do would be insufficient to forward so admirable a measure as the present one. He was very glad to say that he should have to ask the Council for a much larger amount as grants in aid for Educational purposes than had been voted on a former occasion, as there were four more schools which he would be called on to assist.

"Adjoining owner, and for the purpose of this clause, the applicant shall be considered an adjoining owner, their or any of their heirs or assigns for ever thereafter from time to time as it may become necessary to give notice in writing to any adjoining owner calling upon him or them to contribute towards the clearing out and otherwise maintaining the said drains in a proper state of efficiency, and if the said adjoining owner or owners neglect or refuse within a period of 14 days to contribute towards the clearing out and maintaining the said drains, it shall be lawful for the person or persons giving such notice to enter upon the lands in which such drains shall lie for the purpose of clearing out and maintaining the said drains, and to recover such proportion of the expenses incurred on that account as to the Court hereinafter mentioned shall seem reasonable. If the amount shall not exceed £20 the same shall be recoverable in a summary way; but if it exceed £20 the same shall be recoverable in the Supreme Court."

Agreed to.

# ADDRESS

OF

### HIS HONOR THE SUPERINTENDENT,

#### ON OPENING THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL,

Monday, January 18, 1864.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the convenient to attend at this season of the PROVINCIAL COUNCIL,-

In compliance with the requirements of the Constitution Act—that a session of the Provincial Council should be held in every year, I have considered it essential to call you together on the present occa-

The more immediate object for doing so has been explained to you in my circular letter of the 14th of December last.

The "Loan Act" which was passed during the last session of the Council, and which has received the assent of His Excellency the Governor, has enabled me to conclude arrangements with the Union Bank of Australia for negociating the loan in England. The correspondence with the different banks relating to the subject will be laid before you.

It has been found, on reference to persons acquainted with monetary transactions in the London market that the loan could be effected to greater advantage if the interest on the debentures were made payable in London instead of at the Provincial The Amendment of Loan Act, together with the form of Debentures and Coupon, now laid before you, has been prepared with the view of facilitating this object.

It is not my intention to bring any other business forward during this session, as many of the members must find it in-

I congratulate the Council and the inhabitants generally on the tranquillity that has prevailed in this Province during a period of considerable danger, arising from a state of war with the native tribes in the Provinces of Taranaki and Auckland.

The defenceless position of the Province when the war commenced—the absence of any organized force excepting the military detachment stationed at Napier, called for strenuous exertions on the part of the Government to provide greater security for the inhabitants.

The establishment of one hundred of the Defence Force; the training and arming of the Militia and Volunteers; the prospect of obtaining a considerable influx of military settlers,-while it inspires confidence, also affords the strongest hope that the disasters of war may be averted from this Province.

I have to express my strong sense of the readiness with which the General Government responded to the appeals made for assistance in furtherance of these measures, which, although still inadequate to the requirements of the Province, without the assistance of additional military support, have had the effect of inducing the natives to yield readier submission to our rule, by referring several disputed cases to our courts of justice for settlement.

The co-operation afforded at all times

by Major Douglas, Commanding the Garrison; and the zeal and energy displayed by Major Whitmore, Commanding the Civil Forces, deserve my best thanks. Nor do I fail to recognise with pleasure the genuine feelings of loyalty evinced by all classes of our community when called upon during an important crisis to make preparations for defence.

The spirit of insurrection, originating in jealousy of British authority which has existed among some of the New Zealand tribes, is not yet suppressed; but I feel assured that I am only expressing your sentiments when I recognise the noble efforts made by the Imperial Government


to establish Her Majesty's authority in this colony.

The firmness and ability displayed by His Excellency's government in carrying out a decided policy requires no comment from me, and I am sure you will join with me in according to General Cameron and the Forces under his command, the highest praise for the gallantry displayed by them in the service in which they are engaged.

AN ACT to amend an Act of the Provincial Council of the Province of Hawke's Title. Bay, Session 6, No. 1, intituled "An Act to authorise the Superintendent to raise a Loan for the purchase of Native Land, for promoting Immigration to the Province and for other purposes.

[Assented to February 11, 1864.]

WHEREAS by an Act of the Provincial Council of the Province of Hawke's Bay, Session 6, No. 1, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent, by and with the advice of his Executive Council, to borrow on Debentures, under the Public Seal of the Province, any sum or sums not exceeding in the whole the sum of Sixty Thousand Pounds for the purposes in the said Act specified: whereas in the second Schedule to the said Act is set forth the Form in which the said Debentures shall be issued: And whereas it is expedient to repeal the fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh clauses of the said Act, including the second Schedule thereto, and to enact other clauses in lieu thereof.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Superintendent of the Province of Hawke's Bay, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, as follows:—

I. The Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh Clauses of the said se Act and the Second Schedule annexed thereto are hereby repealed.

II. The repayment of all sum and sums to be raised by virtue Repayment of all sums raised

under this Act to be charged upon the Public Revenue of the Province.

III. The Debentures to be issued under and by virtue of the

Debentures to be for sums of £100 in form put forth in Sche-dule, &c.

III. The Debentures to be issued under and by virtue of the said Act and of this Act shall be issued for One Hundred Pounds each and shall be in the form or to the effect set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed with Coupons attached: also in the Form in the said Schedule set forth and shall be signed by the Superintendent and Treasurer of the Province and shall bear the seal of the said Province.

Debentures payable at 15 years in London

IV. The Debentures shall be made payable at a period of fifteen years from the date thereof respectively and shall be paid on demand to bearer at the office in London of the Union Bank of Australia.

Interest on Debentures pay-able half-yearly in London.

V. The interest on the said Debentures shall be paid half yearly at the Union Bank of Australia in London.

### **ADDRESS**

OF

### HIS HONOR THE SUPERINTENDENT,

### ON OPENING THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL,

Tuesday, June 28, 1864.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Pro-Vincial Council.—

The requirements of the Provincial service render it necessary that I should call you together for the despatch of public business.

It must be a source of great satisfaction to us all to know that this Province has been steadily advancing in material prosperity, notwithstanding threatened dangers and the difficulties inseparable from a state of war which has been raging in other parts of the Island.

During the period that has elapsed since I assumed the duties of the office to which you have elected me, this Island has undergone one of the severest ordeals to which it has ever been subjected

The various eventful changes that have taken place are sufficiently recent to render any particular notice of them at present unnecessary.

The war since the renewal of hostilities had assumed such wide dimensions that it was impossible to foresee how far it might spread.

The proximity of our northern frontier to the disturbed districts, and the danger of fugitives from the seat of war retreating within our borders, together with the large numbers of natives on the East Coast, rendered the position of the out-settlers at times very precarious. I therefore considered it my duty to use every effort to induce the General Government to afford this Province additional protection.

The present state of the natives within the Province contrasts very favorably with their conduct 15 months ago, when the local journals had frequent occasion to record acts of aggression such as the stopping of road improvements, carriage of mails, breaking open a lock-up, and other violations of the law, which they are becoming aware cannot now be repeated with impunity.

A combination of causes which it may be unnecessary to enumerate, and the timely precautions which have been adopted, together with the friendly disposition of most of the resident chiefs, which it has been my constant effort to promote, have enabled us to avert the calamities of war, to which all the other Provinces in this Island have been more or less exposed.

The various interests—agricultural, pastoral, and commercial—indicate a wholesome state of prosperity, and reflect much credit on the energy and enterprise of the inhabitants.

The Provincial share of the Customs Revenue has very nearly doubled the estimated receipts of the past year, and the exports may be computed to have increased in a similar ratio.

The Provincial Treasurer has prepared a Financial statement, which will be laid before you, and I am glad to observe that, although various unexpected requirements have been met, the expenditure has always been kept within our income.

I regret that the question of the apportionment of the debt between this Province and that of Wellington has not yet been adjusted—the Commissioners appointed by you to settle this question having failed in doing so. The correspondence on the subject will be laid before you, and it will be for you to determine what further steps should be taken in the matter.

From the late address of His Honor the Superintendent of Wellington to his Council, it appears that the General Government have given to the Executive Government of that Province the administration of its share of the Three-million Loan, and I shall invite your assistance in obtaining the same advantages for this Province, and in projecting a scheme for its appropriation.

It is matter of congratulation to the Province that the facilities of steam communication have been so much increased as to enable us to have regular and speedy communication with all parts of New Zealand.

When the war first broke out you are aware that our communication with Auckland was confined to monthly visits by the Inter Colonial Royal mail Company's Steam boats. The necesity for early information during such a critical time was so urgent, that, acting on the advice of my Executive, we found it necessary to incur an expenditure for a fortnightly Steam Service, which you will be asked to sanction.

Pursuant to a resolution of the Council which made provision for the repair of the "Huntress" Steamer, I have arranged with the firm of Messrs. Vickery and Masefield to make the necessary repairs, and I am in hopes that, in the course of two months, this boat will be ready to perform the service for which she is intended.

The system of assisted Immigration to the Province is likely to be attended with success. Already advices of 115 immigrants having left England have been received; and 100 more are shortly expected to follow. A well regulated and steady stream of Immigration may by this means be kept up, which, taken in connection with the immigrants proposed to be brought out under the General Government scheme of military Settlement, will be sufficient to meet the requirements of the place.

It is my desire to avail of the valuable assistance of Miss Rye—a lady to whose disinterested efforts in the cause of immigration the colonies

are very much indebted—in bringing out female immigrants, a class which you must admit are much required in this Province. The addition to the adult population from all sources during the past year will after the arrival of the Rangoon be upwards of 700.

Papers will be laid before you from His Honor the Superintendent of Canterbury respecting the Panama Steam Service, upon which I must be guided by your opinion as to the action this Province should take in the matter.

In reference to the progress made in the formation and improvement of roads,—the Provincial Engineer informs me that the main Trunk line from Napier to Eparaima, a distance of 65 miles, is now open for horse drays and traffic, and is metalled, with the exception of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Havelock to Waipawa; so that mails will now be carried by horse conveyance as far as Waipawa.

Several new lines have been opened up during the last year, the most important of which is the Taupo Road, leading from Pekapeka to Patoka, and the military settlement at Pukititiri.

Also a line of road between Hampden and the Northern portion of the Rua Taniwha to Aorangi, shortening the distance to Napier from the Rua Taniwha Plains by ten (10) miles.

Another road has been made along the banks of the Tutaekuri, from the Meanee flats to the Taupo Road at Puketapu, to avoid cuttings on the original line, which were too steep for horse drays, and which enables the settlers at Tutaekuri to reach town without crossing that river, except at the Bridge.

Several minor roads have been made in the Mohaka and in the Tautane Districts, and also a line connecting Petane with the main Taupo Road at Pekapeka, to facilitate communication with the military settlements in the event of heavy winter floods,

These works have been carried on by Mr. Weber with his usual energy and skill.

The importance of a tramway is becoming more and more evident, and while I do not wish to embark in any undertaking involving a heavy outlay, I feel that this is a subject which deserves to be kept under your notice, with the view to future action in this direction. At present we are importing large quantities of Timber from Australia and adjacent Provinces, while abun-

dance of the finest description of White Pine, Totara, and Rimu, is actually within our reach, if only the necessary exertion is used to render it available.

I am in hopes that you will not allow the New Zealand Exhibition of 1865 to pass over without making an effort to have some of the various productions of this Province sent for exhibition to Otago.

I have considered the subject of a General Road Act and a Thistle Act, both of which were mooted in the last session of the Council. Before bringing in these Acts, I am of opinion that the former in particular should be referred to a Committee of this Council. There are great difficulties in the successful working of any Road Act, owing to the peculiar circumstances of this Province. The subject of Tolls, which is involved in the Road Bill, is quite a new one as far as this Province is concerned. The fact of a large portion of the Trunk Roads of this District passing through native land increases the difficulties. The same difficulties present themselves in an Act for the Eradication of Thistles.

The Drainage Act, if urgently required, may possibly be rendered applicable to such Districts only as are numerously populated and where a majority of the landed proprietors apply for its being brought into operation.

I invite the earnest consideration of the Council to these questions before any action is taken.

Whether regard be had to the present satisfactory state of the relations existing between the European and Native race in this Province—to the efforts that have been made to preserve its tranquillity—to its present state of increased prosperity—or to its prospects for the future,—I can only add that if the result of the exertions that have been used by my Executive and myself have fallen short of possible expectations, it has been our constant endeavour to carry out to the best of our ability, with due consideration for all interests involved, what we conceive to be most beneficial to the welfare of the community at large.

## RESOLUTION

OF THE

## PROVINCIAL COUNCIL OF HAWKE'S BAY,

IN RESPECT OF THE

ALLOCATION OF THEIR SHARE OF THE £3,000,000 LOAN.

THE Provincial Council of Hawke's Bay, in responding to the desire expressed by the Superintendent in the speech with which he opened the business of this session—that their co-operation and assistance should be given in pressing upon the consideration of the General Government the importance of taking immediate steps to secure to the Province and to the Northern Island generally the very great advantages that would accrue from the expenditure of that part of the Three Million Loan which has been allocated by the General Assembly for purposes of colonization and settlement in Hawke's Bay—beg to assure His Honor of their desire to afford him the most earnest support in their power, and with this view the following Memorandum or Resolution is agreed to as a statement of its opinions upon this question, and the Superintendent is hereby requested to urge upon the General Government the desirability of attending to the views contained therein.

The Council, before proceeding to shew the interests that will be promoted by the carrying out the scheme of colonization and settlement in Hawke's Bay, desire to refer to statements contained in the speech of the Superintendent of Wellington (Dr. Featherston). That gentleman therein informs the Provincial Council of that Province, that he had proposed to the General Government a plan under which the share of the Loan allocated to Wellington should be expended under the administration of the Provincial Authorities. That he had received authority in place of carrying out the scheme of colonization by military settlements as proposed in the Government scheme that Immigrants should be introduced from the Home Country who should obtain grants of land in districts indicated by him, which should be paid for at a future time, and that these Immigrants should be employed in forming Main Trunk lines of Roads connecting different districts and provinces with each other. He especially pointed out the importance of connecting the Districts of Wairarapa and Manawatu in the Wellington Province with the District of Ruataniwha in the Province of Hawke's Bay; and shewed that with the exception of some 50 miles, lines of road had already been made by the respective Provinces, and that the formation of a road of about 50 miles in length, chiefly through forest land, would complete a connected Trunk line of Road of some 200 miles in length, through the interior of that part of the Island leading from the chief town of the one Province to that of the other.

His Honor also informed the Council that the General Government had replied to the proposal made by him, and had expressed their willingness to allow the scheme of colonization he had proposed to be carried out under the direction of the Provincial Authorities, and had authorized him to commence the various important public works he had proposed to them.

The Council have drawn at such length from the statements made by the Superintendent of Wellington, as they embody to a very great extent their own opinions, and they have the satisfaction of knowing that, as assent has been given by the General Government to the proposals therein mentioned in the case of the Wellington Province, they are not likely to be refused to Hawke's Bay.

The Council will now point out the different public works in the Province of Hawke's Bay which are in its opinion fair charges upon the £90,000 which is allocated to the Province for purposes of settlement. The Council believe that the object of the Assembly in devoting such large sums to this purpose in the various provinces in the Northern Island was to open up the country by means of military roads, as well as for, or rather in connection with, the settlement of the country by a European population.

The two great works of this nature which are called for in this Province are the construction of the great Trunk line of Road connecting Hawke's Bay with the Taupo District, and thence by the Waikato Military Settlement to Auckland, and the completion of the Main Trunk line South by the formation of our share of the 50 miles of road through the forest known as the Tamaki Bush, and which has been already referred to in the quotation from the speech of the Superintendent of Wellington. The importance of the works indicated, the Council feel need not be dwelt upon. Ministers must be thoroughly alive to the immense military advantages which would be derived from them, and the necessity which exists for their construction before any successful efforts can be made for the civilization of the natives in the interior, and the making them amenable to the law.

Before leaving this subject the Council would desire to point out that the Province has already from Provincial funds during past years done a great deal towards forming those parts of the Trunk lines indicated which lie within the Province. That a good road exists for a distance of miles on the great South Trunk line, and that the great Northern Road has had large sums spent upon it and is for a distance of miles a good summer road for drays, and at all times open for horse traffic. The completion of that portion of the South Road which lies between the Wairarapa open country and the Ruataniwha Plains, would form a continuous line of road of 200 miles in length, fit for any kind of traffic, and connecting the ports of Wellington and Napier with each other.

The extension of the Great Northern Road would open up for settlement the large districts in the centre of the island, and enable the stockowners of Hawke's Bay to supply the Military Settlements on the Waikato, and the Province of Auckland, with live stock, to the material benefit of both.

The Council, having indicated the Public Works which they recommend should be constructed in the Province with the funds allocated by the Parliament of New Zealand for that purpose, will now proceed to express their views as to the most beneficial mode of appropriating the sum of £30,000 devoted to purposes of colonisation. The Council desire to express their strong opinion that little permanent benefit would accrue to the Colony or the Province by the introduction of a large body of what are termed Military Settlers. In place thereof they would suggest that the real object the Colony has in view would be more successfully met by introducing from the home country a class of settlers accustomed to agricultural pursuits, who, bringing with them their wives and families, would become permanent settlers, and, by peopling the country, would effect the result aimed at in a more certain and prosperous manuer.

The Council would therefore suggest that the immigration for this purpose should be conducted under the charge of an officer, who might be nominated by the Province and approved by His Excellency's Government, and who, by judicious selection in the United Kingdom, might send out and people the Province with a class of valuable settlers. The Council think that it would not be requisite to offer a free grant of land to intending immigrants, and agree with the Superintendent of Wellington in thinking that a good class of men could be found eager to avail themselves of the chance of settlement in the Colony afforded by a free passage being found them, and that it would be better to give them their land subject to the payment of a certain price for it at a future period. As this course has been approved in the case

of the Province of Wellington, the Council hope a similar deviation may be permitted in the General Government scheme in the case of their own Province.

It is unnecessary perhaps to state that the Council concludes that the public works which they have recommended should be carried out would be formed by the Immigrants, who should in their opinion be located in the districts in which those works are to be prosecuted, and in all cases that allow of it upon the actual lines of road. The men should in the opinion of the Council be allowed to work upon the roads at the usual daily rate of pay current in the Province on such days as they may desire and be able to spare from the occupations necessarily attendant upon their settlement in a new country. The pay they would receive for the time they could devote to road making would it is believed be sufficient to keep them and their families during the period that must necessarily elapse before their settlement can become self-supporting.

The Council have expressed their opinion upon the very important interests that appear to them connected with the outlay of the large sum allocated to the Province of Hawke's Bay by the General Assembly for purposes of colonization and settlement; and although they have freely offered their advice as to the manner in which the scheme should be conducted, they have done so in the hope of assisting rather than of obstructing the plans of the General Government.

The Council has only, in addition, to add that they feel assured the Superintendent will place their views before the Government in such manner as will prove most conducive to the attainment of the ends they have proposed, and which they believe to be of incalculable advantage to the future interests and progress of the Province.


THE Select Committee appointed "to draw up a Resolution to the General Go"vernment, to be transmitted through His Honor the Superintendent,
"recommending their taking immediate steps to put a stop to illegal squatting on
"the Ahuriri Plains," beg to submit the following Resolution for the consideration
of the Provincial Council:—

That the correspondence between His Honor the Superintendent and the General Government on the subject of "leasing the Ahuriri Plains for depasturing purposes," (dated as per margin), gives the Council great satisfaction, as it is an earnest that His Excellency's responsible advisers are determined not to sanction such illegal occupation; nevertheless the Council sees, with growing serious apprehension, that permanent occupation is really intended—as fencing and stockyard-building are being vigorously proceeded with.

These Plains—having an area of about 80,000 acres, in close proximity to Napier Harbour—are absolutely needful to the future permanent welfare of the Province, being the only places well adapted for an agricultural community; they are at present mostly leased for terms of from 14 to 21 years to about 15 persons, who, from their being among the early settlers, are looked upon by the natives as some of the most influential persons in the Province; and who, it is greatly feared, by their so illegally acting, are the means (unknowingly, it is hoped,) of raising in the native mind contempt for the laws, which spirit all classes of Her Majesty's subjects have seen the absolute necessity of repressing and putting down.

The Council are also strongly of opinion that, if the present illegal occupation were put a stop to, a considerable portion of these Plains would ere long be acquired for agricultural purposes, either by direct sales to the Crown, or through the operation of the Native Lands Bill.

Members: - Messrs. Colenso, Richardson, Dolbel, Edwards, and the Mover.

YOUR COMMITTEE having taken the motion—"To enquire into the practice of officers of the Survey Department executing private work, the information for which is derived from the maps of the Province placed in charge, and to report upon the desirability of its being put a stop to as injurious to the public, as well as unfair to professional men not holding office under Government."—With power to call for persons and papers.

And having examined such witnesses as attended their respective summonses, and read carefully several letters, &c., are of opinion—

1st. That private work of any kind should not be allowed to be executed, or even mentioned by any Officer of the Survey Department during office hours or at the Survey office.

2nd. That, if possible, private work should not at all be performed by any Officer of the Survey Department, such being at least unfair to professional men, from the fact of such Officer necessarily having so very much valuable and useful public information in his own private possession; at the same time your Committee see a difficulty which they believe the Executive Government should surmount, namely, that of seeming to interfere with the private time of any Government Officer.

# REPORT OF AUDIT COMMITTEE.

Members: -- Messrs. Edwards, Richardson, Tiffen, Kennedy, and the Mover.

YOUR COMMITTEE, after careful examination of the accounts of the Province for the period extending from 1st April, 1863, to 31st March, 1864, find the same to be mainly correct, and the balance in the hands of the Provincial Treasurer to be £2,292 1s. 8d.

Your Committee must, however, in the performance of their duty, call the attention of this Council to certain irregularities, of a more or less important nature, which are to be found in those accounts, and which are more particularly set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

Your Committee are also strongly of opinion that, for the future, the following should be closely and regularly attended to :--

- 1. That, as far as possible, every Public Work or article for Public Service, should be only done or supplied by contract, and that all vouchers should shew on their face that such were in accordance with contract, which contract should also be shewn or referred to for easy reference.
  - 2. That all accepted Tenders should be published in the Provincial Gazette.
- 3. That all sums paid under the head of "Grants in aid of Roads," or of "Road Contingencies," should shew on their respective vouchers the road for which such sum or sums were paid, as well as the amount (if any) paid by the party receiving such "Grant in Aid."
- 4. That the Monthly Balance Sheet of the Provincial Treasurer should be declared to in the usual way before the expiration of the following month.

5. That large "unexpended balances" in the hands of officers should not be allowed to stand over at the end of a quarter, more particularly at the end of a financial year.

Your Committee also desire to call the attention of the Government to what they believe to be (at least) an overstepping of the intention and spirit of the "Hawke's Bay Education Act," in the quarterly school returns from the Presbyterian School, Napier. The names of a large number of the children of respectable and wealthy parents are inserted as being educated wholly or in part at the public expense. This, your Committee are of opinion, should be immediately put a stop to.

# REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE

(Appointed July 15, 1864, on the Motion of Mr. Dolbel),

"To inquire into and report upon the state of the Province as regards Timber for

"Building and other purposes, and whether it would not be advisable that im-

" mediate steps should be taken to improve the Road between the Pohui Bush and Petane Bridge, and to devise some plans by which the Working Classes might

"be located there under a Bush License; such Committee to consist of

" Messrs. Colenso,

Richardson, Curling,

Rhodes,

Edwards, and

The Mover."

THE Committee met on Friday, July 29; present, all the Members; when the following Report was unanimously agreed on:—

Your Committee, having considered the matter entrusted to them, beg to report as follows:—

- 1. That there is ample evidence of very large and almost inexhaustible quantities of superior building timbers in this Province; which, in several forests, grow to an unusual size, and are very valuable; although, at present, from want of a road, difficult if not impossible to bring to market.
- 2. That, seeing there is, and will be such a great demand for all such timber, it is very advisable that some means should be either planned or encouraged by the Government, through which some of those valuable timbers could be brought into the market as early as possible.
- 3. That the large forest of heavy timber known as "the Pohui Bush," being one of the nearest to Port, and still (mainly) in the hands of the Crown, it is deemed proper to recommend the improvement of the present road leading to it (particularly from or about Kaiwaka on the Petane River), so as to admit of timber being brought from the said "Bush" to the said River; down which, your Committee believes, timber could very easily be brought to Napier.
  - 4. That it is also believed, that a sum of £300 will fully effect this; but your

Committee would even recommend an outlay by the Government of £500 (if required) for this purpose, under the direction of the Provincial Eugineer, and consequent on his favorable report of the said road from the bush to the river.

- 5. That your Committee is further of opinion, that such outlay by the Government should be recovered through a slight increase on the upset price per acre of the said valuable bush; and that some of the Sections in the same as (per Government Map) should be cut up into smaller lots to suit the working-class engaged in the occupation of sawing and splitting Timber.
- 6. That, inasmuch as the Report of a recent Select Committee—touching on Bush Licenses—has been already adopted by the Council, your Committee refrain from entering again on that subject.

### PROROGUING THE PROVINCIAL COUNCIL,

17TH AUGUST, 1864.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Provincial Council,-

After an unusually long Session, I am happy to be able to release you from your duties.

I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks for the care, time, and attention which you have devoted to the consideration of the various subjects brought before

The following Bills will be transmitted for His Excellency the Governor's assent :-

- 1. Highways
- 2. Sheep and Scab
- 3. Police
- 4. Loan Appropriation
- 5. Drainage
- 6. Contractors7. Fencing
- 8. Impounding
- 9. Wellington Acts Repeal
- 10. Diversion of Roads
- 11. Hampden School-house Reserve.
- 12. Reserves Administration
- 13. Appropriation
- 14. Mechanics' Institute Reserve
- 15. Boarding-house Licences

Those Bills will supply a want in local legislation which has been much felt.

While desirous of avoiding, as much as possible, the introduction of any new laws beyond what is really necessary, I believe that those now referred to will be found essentially applicable to the growing requirements of the community. The Bill for the administration of the reserves in different parts of the country for educational purposes, will, I trust, produce additional revenues for this important object, and, taken in connection with the introduction of trained teachers, greater advantages to the rising generation may be reasonably expected.

The resolution passed by you respecting the claims of this Province to its share of the £3,000,000 Loan, indicating the various objects for which you desire that it should be apportioned, will be forwarded in due course to His Excellency's Government. From the all but unanimous manner in which this resolution has been adopted, I have every reason to expect that it will meet with that consideration which the important nature of the subject entitles it to on general as well as Provincial grounds.

The recent accounts from Tauranga induce the hope that peace will be established in that part of the island; and, while all must appreciate the advantages of a peace concluded upon a just and reliable basis, it is nevertheless a positive duty to further the adoption of such measures, by the introduction of population and otherwise, as shall effectually prevent the possibility of such calamities within our borders as have befallen other Provinces in this Island. It is gratifying to acknowledge the very disinterested co-operation and assistance afforded by my Executive and the Council generally, by which I have been enabled during periods of considerable difficulty to administer this Government without the support in Council of gentlemen holding offices of emolument in the Provincial service.

This feature alone gives the best possible proof of the independence and public spirit which characterises the representatives of the people of Hawke's Bay.

I have also to acknowledge the liberal manner in which the necessary supplies have been voted, and it will be my endeavour to see that the various sums for public purposes are expended with every regard to economy.

It is satisfactory to be able to notice that most of the native tribes in this Province have been led to refrain from any direct participation in the insurrectionary and fanatical acts of which various tribes in other parts of this Island have been guilty.

1 trust the state of tranquillity at present enjoyed may continue.

I am in hopes that, before the Council is again called together, the position of native affairs may be so far improved as to enable me to effect certain purchases of land, the acquisition of which would open up a field for such an enlarged scheme of immigration as must tend not only to the greater stability, but also to the fuller development of the resources of the Province.
