ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS.

NEW ZEALAND.

Additional Instructions to Our Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor-in-Chief for the time being; To Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Province of New Ulster or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being; To Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Province of New Munster or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being; Or to Our Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Ulster or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Lieutenant-Governor for the time being; Or to Our Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, Or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Lieutenant-Governor for the time being. Given at Our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this twenty-second day of December, 1847, in the Eleventh Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of an Act of Parliament made and enacted in the ninth and tenth years of our Reign, intituled "An act to make further provision for the Government of the New Zealand Islands," We did by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, bearing date at Westminster, the twenty-third day of December, One thousand eight hundred and forty six, in the Tenth Year of Our Reign, execute certain of the powers in Us by the said Act vested; And Whereas, in further pursuance of the said Act, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Us vested, and in exercise of all and every other the powers in Us in that behalf vested, We did further issue certain Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, approved in Our Privy Council, being the Instructions accompanying or referred to in such Letters Patent, as relation being had unto the said Letters patent and Instructions will more fully and at large appear; And Whereas it is directed by the thirtieth Section of the thirteenth chapter of the said Instructions, being the chapter entitled "on the settlement of the Waste Lands of the Crown," that it shall be competent to the Governor or Lieutenant-Governor of any of the Provinces of any of the said New Zealand Islands to demise for any term of years not exceeding twenty-one, any Rural Allotments supposed to contain any valuable minerals, reserving to Us Our Heirs and Successors a Royalty of not less than fifteen per centum on the minerals to be raised upon and from any such lands; And Whereas by the said recited Act it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Us from time to time to amend, and for that purpose to add to, or if necessary to repeal any such Instructions as aforesaid; And Whereas it hath appeared to Us expedient to amend Our said Instructions, so far as they relate to the amount of the Royalty thereby directed to be reserved, to Us, Our Heirs and Successors, on Minerals to be raised upon and from lands so demised as aforesaid.— Now, therefore, by virtue of the power in Us by the said Act vested, We do hereby repeal so much of our said Instructions, but no further, as directs that a Royalty of not less than Fifteen per centum, be reserved for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, on Minerals to be raised from such Rural Allotments, as shall be demised by the Governor, or Lieutenant Governor of any of the Provinces of the said New Zealand Islands, as aforesaid; and the same is hereby repealed accordingly. And We do hereby declare Our Will and Pleasure that the Royalty so to be reserved, to Us, Our Heirs and Successors, on Minerals to be raised upon and from any rural allotments, hereafter to be demised by the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of any of the Provinces of the said New Zealand Islands, as aforesaid, shall be one Fifteenth of the said Minerals.

CAP. LIV.

An Act to amend the Acts for rendering effective the service of the CHELSEA and GREENWICH Out-Pensioners. [25th June, 1847.]

WHEREAS the Provisions of the several Acts now in force for the Payment and Enrolment of the *Chelsea* and *Greenwich* Out-Pensioners have been found beneficial, and it is expedient to extend them to Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the seas: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the Provisions of an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty, intituled *An Act to Amend the Laws relating to the Payment of Out-Pensioners of Chelsea Hospital*, shall extend to all Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the Seas, and the Provisions of an Act of the Seventh Year of the Reign of Her Majesty, intituled *An Act for rendering more effective the Services of such Out-Pensioners of Chelsea Hospital as shall be called out to assist in preserving the Public Peace*, and of Two Acts passed in the last Session of Parliament, severally intituled *An Act for amending the Act for rendering effective the Services of the Chelsea Out-Pensioners, and extending it to the Out-Pensioners of Greenwich Hospital*, and *An Act for regulating the Payment of the Out-Pensioners of Greenwich and Chelsea Hospitals*, and of this Act, shall apply to all Out-Pensioners of *Chelsea* and *Greenwich* Hospitals, now residing or who may hereafter reside in any of Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the Seas in which any Officers shall have been or may be appointed pursuant to the said Act of the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty, for the Payment and Superintendence of the said Out-Pensioners: Provided always, that only such of the *Greenwich* Pensioners as may have served in the Royal Marines, shall be liable to serve as enrolled Pensioners; and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time, by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual, to fix the Number of Men to be enrolled in every such Colony and Possession, as a local Force for the Preservation of the Peace in such Colony or Possession, or in any District thereof, and to cause them to be armed

and equipped, and called out for Inspection or Exercise, on such Number of Days, not exceeding Twelve in each Year, as the Governor or Person administering the Government of such Colony or Possession for the time being shall direct, under the same Penalties for Non-attendance and other Offences as are provided by the said Acts or any of them; and the Number of Men enrolled in any such Colony or Possession shall not be counted in the Number of Men authorized to be enrolled in the United Kingdom of *Great Britain and Ireland* under the said Acts or any of them.

Persons registered for prospective Pensions liable to be enrolled, whether residing in the United Kingdom or the Colonies.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons whose claims for prospective or deferred Pension shall have been registered in Virtue of any Warrant or Warrants made or to be made by Her Majesty, or by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, shall be liable to be enrolled with and as part of the local Force for the Preservation of the Peace under the Authority of the Acts before recited, whether resident in the United Kingdom or in any of Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the Seas.

Secretary of State, &c., empowered to issue Warrants calling out Pensioners or Persons enrolled, &c., for a limited Period.

III. And whereas by the Act herein-before secondly-recited it is provided, that One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, or, in case of Emergency, any Person or Persons bearing the Warrant of the Secretary of State for that Purpose, may call out the said enrolled Pensioners in aid of the Civil Power, for Preservation of the public Peace, as by the said Act is directed, and by the Act herein-before thirdly recited similar Powers were conferred on the Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland* as regards the enrolled Pensioners in that Country; but such Warrant, if applied for and issued after the Emergency has arisen, cannot in many cases be obtained in time to meet such Emergency, and it is therefore expedient to give further Facilities on that behalf; be it enacted that it shall be lawful for One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, or in *Ireland* for the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor of *Ireland*, and in Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the Seas for the Governor or other Person administering the Government of such Colony or Possession, to issue his Warrant to the Lord Lieutenant of any County, or the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate of any Town or District, wherein such Pensioners and Persons having Claims to prospective or deferred Pensions are enrolled, authorizing him, in case of Emergency, or anticipated Emergency, whereby the Public Peace may be endangered, or on the Requisition of any Officer commanding Her Majesty's Forces within such Town or District, to call out the whole or such Part of the Persons so enrolled as he may consider necessary, for any Term not exceeding Twelve Days, during which Time they shall be liable to the Provisions of the Mutiny Act and Articles of War, in the same Manner in all respects as is provided in the first-mentioned Act; but no such enrolled Person who shall be called out only by the Authority of any such Lord Lieutenant of a County, Mayor, or Magistrate,

Enrolled persons called out only by Authority of a Magistrate, &c., to be employed for Twelve Days only, unless in certain Cases.

for the Preservation of the Public Peace, shall be employed on such Duty for more than Twelve Days, unless by a Warrant from One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, or in *Ireland* from the Lord Lieutenant or Chief Governor of *Ireland*, or in any of Her Majesty's Colonies and Possessions beyond the Seas, from the Governor or Person administering the Government, in case of their being employed in aid of the Civil Power, or by Warrant of Her Majesty in case of their volunteering to serve in any of Her Majesty's Forts, Towns, and Garrisons, as provided in the said Act.

IV. And be it enacted, That in case of actual or apprehended Invasion or Riot it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by any Proclamation to direct that the said enrolled Pensioners, or such of them as Her Majesty shall think fit, may be sent, in aid of the Defence of the Realm, or for the Suppression of Riot and Preservation of the Peace, to any part of the United Kingdom of *Great Britain and Ireland* where their Services may be required and during the time for which their services shall be so required they shall be subject to all the Provisions of any Act then in force for the punishment of Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

In case of actual Invasion or Riot, Pensioners may be sent to any Part of the United Kingdom.

V. And be it enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed in this Session of Parliament.

SIR,—In compliance with instructions from his Excellency the Governor-in-Chief to be furnished with information relative to the schools under the management of the Nelson School Society, I called upon the committee to draw out a statement of the origin, progress, and other matters connected with the establishment, and have now the honor to forward copies of the documents which have been handed to me, —in doing so, I beg to call attention to the amount of usefulness they exhibit, it appearing that from so small a commencement as a few children meeting together in a private house, the increase has been so rapid in the short

space of six years, that there are now seven schools under the society, at which 422 children are receiving education. The enclosed statement speaks for itself; but in addition, I have pleasure from personal knowledge, in testifying to the orderly and correct manner in which the schools are conducted, and the success that has attended the exertions of Mr. William Campbell, and the Committee, in the proficiency to which the children have attained; this however, it would appear, by reference to the accompanying account, has not been effected without considerable sacrifice, there being at present a debt of £150, independent of the sum required for the enlargement of the Town School house, which they contemplate. Any assistance, therefore, it is in his Excellency's power to give in furtherance of so useful an establishment, will I am persuaded be duly appreciated, not only by the society, but by the community at large.

Nelson, April 8th, 1848.

SIR,—In accordance with your Honor's request, I have the honour to forward for your information, a short account of the commencement and progress of the Nelson School Society.

The first school in this settlement was commenced in a private house on the 27th March, 1842, by a number of Christians, who on their arrival at Nelson, united in the erection of a chapel or school-room in Tasman street, which was opened on the 4th of October, 1842, attended by 120 children, under the superintendence of Mr. Campbell. In the course of a few months, the proprietors removing into the suburban districts, let the building to the superintendent, but in consequence of the high rent, and the unfinished state in which it remained, it was deemed expedient either to purchase, and put in repair, or to proceed with the erection of a new school; accordingly, a reasonable offer was made to the proprietors, which they declined. A Committee of management was then formed: a Treasurer and Secretary appointed, and application made to the Board appointed by the Government for the appropriation of public reserves, for a grant of land, on which to erect a Sunday and Day School, "for the education of children of all classes and denominations." Five Trustees were appointed and the grant made by the board, and confirmed by his

Excellency Governor FitzRoy. The deed of grant signed and executed by his Excellency the present Governor, was received in March, 1847.

On the 14th February, 1843, the foundation stone was laid by William Fox, Esq., the subscriptions received up to that date amounted to £6 2s. 6d. On Easter Sunday following, (April 7th, 1843) the new school was opened, and an address delivered by Mr. Fox; the number of Sunday scholars being about 150 and the number of day scholars about 70. A library for the use of the teachers and children, was also established, of books presented for the purpose by various gentlemen. The expenses of the building and appurtenances amounted to £176 9s. 5d., the additional receipts amounting to £63. In the month of July, 1847, the establishment of an Infant school at Nelson, formed an additional department to the Institution, attended by about 50 children, between the ages of eighteen months and six years.

The first branch school at Wakefield, in the district of Waimea south, twenty miles distant from Nelson, was opened on the 8th of October, 1843, the number of children being about 30, which in the course of two or three months, increased to 65. The destruction subsequently made by the winter floods, caused many of the inhabitants to leave, and consequently the number of the scholars decreased to 30.

The second branch connected with the Society was Spring Grove School, in the Waimea south district, fourteen miles distant from Town, which was opened on the 18th of May, 1845, with about 40 scholars, which number has since increased to 65. In October, 1847, a day school was opened in connection therewith, under the management of a sub-committee. The number of day scholars at Spring Grove is about 30.

The third branch school was opened at Stoke, on the Waimea plain, four miles from Nelson, on the 28th December, 1845. Twenty-six children attended as scholars, which number still continues about the same. The expense of the building amounted to £17 2s.—the amount of subscriptions received, £6 14s. 7d.

The fourth branch school at The Village, Waimea west, thirteen miles from Nelson, was opened on the 1st January, 1846, by the Hon. C. A. Dillon, the number of children which attended were 40; since increased to 50. The expense of the building amounted to £10 3s.,—subscriptions received, £8 10s.

The fifth branch school was opened at Richmond, on the 16th February, 1848, the building being composed of part of the old Nelson immigration barracks, presented on behalf of the New Zealand Company, by Mr. Fox. The number of scholars attending the Sunday school is about 35, and the number attending the day school is about 35. The expense attending the removal and reconstruction of the building amounts to £12 6s.

The sixth branch school, in the district of Waimea east, twelve miles distant from Nelson, was opened on the 22nd March, 1848, the

number of children who attended being about 40. The expense attending this building (which is the remaining portion of the Immigration barracks) amounts to £7 14s.

In consequence of the increasing number of scholars at Nelson, the present school is found inefficient for our purposes; it is therefore resolved to erect a new building of larger dimensions for the Sunday and Infant Schools, at an expense of about £300, retaining the use of the present building for the Day School and Library.

The committee trust, that with the promised assistance of his Excellency the Governor, they will be enabled to extend their usefulness, until every child in the settlement of Nelson, may be provided with an education, under the open and liberal system which they have established.

An account of the number of children at present receiving instruction in the several schools, will be forwarded herewith.
