PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency, Sir GEORGE GREY, K. C. B., Governor-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, the undermentioned Ordinances enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, were passed in the eleventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, viz :

No. 4.—“An Ordinance to provide for the Management of a Savings' Bank, in the Colony of New Zealand.” 21st September, 1847.

And No 12.—“An Ordinance to provide for the Protection of Footpaths, in the Colony of New Zealand.” 14th October, 1847.

Which Ordinances having been by the Right Honorable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, laid before the Queen, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

Now, therefore, I the Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and make known, to all whom it may concern, that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the before mentioned Ordinances.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, K. C. B., Governor-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Province of New Ulster, and New Munster, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation, bearing date the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty eight, the boundaries of the Hundreds of Howick and Panmure were particularly set forth and described ; and whereas for the purposes of the Regulations for the depasturing of Cattle within the limits of a Hundred, it is expedient that lots, numbers four, eight, thirteen, seventeen, seventeen<sup>(a)</sup>, twenty-four, twenty-eight, twenty-nine and thirty, on the East Bank of the Tamaki, comprised within the limits of the Hundred of Panmure, should for such purposes

aforesaid, be deemed and taken to be within the Hundred of Howick ;

Now, therefore, I, the said Governor, do hereby proclaim and declare that for the purpose of such regulations as aforesaid, the said lots be deemed and taken to be within the limits of the Hundred of Howick.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, K.C.B., Governor-in-Chief, in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, Session 8, No. 11, intituled "An Ordinance to secure the payment of certain Government Debentures out of the General Revenue of the Colony," it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, out of the surplus Revenue of the said Colony, or out of any other funds at his disposal in that behalf, to pay off and discharge the said Debentures." And whereas it is desirable that all unfunded Debentures for sums of One Pound and Five Pounds shall be paid, together with the interest due thereon, in the terms of the said Ordinance :

Now therefore I, the Governor-in-Chief, do hereby proclaim that all such Debentures of One Pound and Five Pounds each, at present outstanding within the said Colony of New Zealand, will, with the interest thereupon accruing, for any complete year or years, be paid off on being presented for that purpose at the respective Treasuries or Sub-Treasuries throughout the Colony aforesaid, upon any day after the 1st day of March next, and that such Debentures will not bear interest from and after the 30th day of June, 1849.

This Proclamation shall take effect from and after the 1st day of March next.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, K. C. B., Governor-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance enacted by the Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session 9, No. 2, intituled "An Ordinance for regulating the Conveyance and Postage of Letters," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Chief from time to time, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, to abolish, alter, and fix any Colonial Postage payable for the transmission by Post of letters and other papers within the said colony, and to alter, repeal or abolish any Colonial Postage so altered or fixed as aforesaid, and to make or establish any new or other postage in lieu thereof.

And whereas, in the table of Rates of Postage attached to the Post Office Regulations at present in force within the colony it is declared that—

In addition, all the above letters and newspapers, if conveyed by Post from the Port of arrival to any other Port of the colony, are liable to an additional inland Postage of fourpence on letters, and one-penny on newspapers.

And whereas it is expedient that the foregoing Regulation be rescinded ;

Now, therefore I, the said Governor-in-Chief, do hereby proclaim and declare, that the said Regulation is rescinded from the aforesaid table of Rates,

And that, in lieu thereof, there shall be substituted the following :—

"In addition, all letters, if conveyed by Post from the port of arrival to any other port of the Colony, are liable to an additional Postage of one penny.

And I declare that the rates on such letters as aforesaid shall be charged and are payable accordingly.

This Proclamation to take effect from and after the day on which it may be received at the several Post Offices in the colony of New Zealand.

SIR,

With reference to my despatch No. 51, of the 7th instant, I transmit herewith additional instructions, which the Queen has been pleased to issue under Her Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, for repealing the sixth section of the fourteenth Chapter of Her Majesty's instructions to yourself, respecting the Aborigines of New Zealand.

Additional Instructions to Our Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand, or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor-in-Chief for the time being; To Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Province of New Ulster, or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being; To Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Province of New Munster, or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being; Or to Our Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Ulster, or to the Officer exercising the said Office of Lieutenant-Governor for the time being; Or to Our Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Munster, or to the Officer exercising the said Office for the time being. Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this fourteenth day of July, 1848, in the Twelfth Year of Our Reign.

**W**HEREAS, in pursuance of an Act of Parliament made and enacted in the ninth and tenth years of Our Reign, entitled "An Act to make further provision for the Government of the New Zealand Islands," We did by certain Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, bearing date at Westminster, the twenty-third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the Tenth Year of Our Reign, execute certain of the powers in Us, by the said Act vested; And Whereas, in further pursuance of the said Act, and in exercise of the powers thereby in Us vested, and in exercise of all and every other the powers in Us in that behalf vested, We did further issue certain Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet approved in Our Privy Council, being the Instructions accompanying or referred to in such Letters Patent, as relation being had unto the said Letters Patent and Instructions will more fully and at large appear; And Whereas it is directed by the Sixth Section of the Fourteenth Chapter of the said Instructions, being the chapter entitled "Respecting the Aborigines of New Zealand," that "in cases arising between the aboriginal inhabitants of New Zealand alone, beyond the limits of the said aboriginal districts, and in whatever relates to the relations to, and the dealing of such aboriginal inhabitants with each other beyond the same limits—the Courts and Magistrates of the entire Province, or of the district in which such cases may arise, shall enforce such native laws, customs, and usages as aforesaid;" And Whereas by the said recited Act it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Us from time to time to amend, and for that purpose to add to, or if necessary to repeal any such Instruc-

tions as aforesaid ; And Whereas it hath appeared to Us expedient to repeal the Sixth Section of the Fourteenth Chapter of the Instructions aforesaid. — Now, therefore, by virtue of the power in Us by the said Act vested, We do hereby repeal the said Sixth Section of the said Fourteenth Chapter of Our said Instructions, and the same is hereby repealed accordingly.

Sir,

I have received your despatch No. 7. of the 9th March last, transmitting a petition addressed to the Queen, by various inhabitants of Auckland and its vicinity, including the Bishop, the Chief Justice, and various public officers, praying that Her Majesty would be pleased to revoke the instructions of the Secretary of State, that relate to the appropriation of any lands claimed by or in possession of the Natives, by other means than that of simple purchase as provided by the Treaty of Waitangi, and that Her Majesty would be pleased to direct that the utmost publicity be given to a renewed assurance to the native Chiefs, that Her Majesty never did contemplate, and never will permit the solemn engagements entered into between them and Her Majesty's representatives, to be evaded or set aside ; but that the spirit as well as the letter of the provisions of the Treaty of Waitangi, affecting the lands of the aborigines, should be most religiously maintained. You will acquaint the petitioners that I have laid their petition before the Queen, who was pleased to receive it very graciously : and in answer to the prayer of it, I am commanded to refer to the repeated assurances which you have already received from Her Majesty's Government, that no intention has existed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, to interfere with any rights secured to the Natives of New Zealand by the Treaty of Waitangi.
