PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, K.C.B., Governor-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS the undermentioned Ordinance, enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, was passed in the eleventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, viz.—“An Ordinance to authorize the establishment of a Colonial Bank of Issue by the Government of New Zealand, to make and issue a Paper Currency, and to prohibit the making and issuing of Paper Money by private individuals,” Sess. 8, which Ordinance having by the Right Honorable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, been laid before the Queen, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the same.

Now, therefore I, the Governor-in-Chief of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and make known to all whom it may concern, that Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confirm and allow the before mentioned Ordinance.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, K. C. B., Governor-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, and Governor of the Provinces of New Ulster and New Munster, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session 8, No. 16, intituled “An Ordinance to authorize the establishment of a Colonial Bank of Issue by the Government of New Zealand, to make and issue a Paper Currency, and to prohibit the making and issuing of Paper Money by private individuals,” it is amongst other things enacted, that the business of and relating to the issue of the Notes of the said Bank shall be conducted and carried on in offices to be established for that purpose at Auckland and Wellington, and at such other places as the Governor shall direct, and that every such office shall be open for business on such days and at such hours as the Governor for the time being shall in that behalf by Proclamation appoint: and whereas, Offices of the Colonial Bank of Issue have

been established at Auckland and Wellington. Now, I, the Governor do hereby proclaim and appoint that the said Offices will be opened on the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and that such offices will open for business on all days but Saturday and Sunday, from ten o'clock until three o'clock, and on Saturday from ten o'clock until two o'clock.

MEETING OF THE WARDENS OF THE HUNDRED OF HOWICK.

Howick, March 16, 1850.

Having read the Crown Lands' Ordinance, Session 10, No. 1; the Return of persons holding Depasturing Licenses and the land occupied by them; the Return of Crown Lands in Hundred and description of boundaries of Hundred; the Memorandum of Commissioner of Crown Lands on the duties of Wardens; and the rules of the Wardens for 1849—

It was estimated that the Crown Lands in the Hundred amounting to 1055 acres are capable of depasturing 838 head of great cattle, five head of small cattle being considered equal to one of great cattle.

Having taken into consideration the amount of money paid by the holders of Licenses into the Treasury, and the amounts expended in improvements, it was resolved that the following be the apportionment of cattle for the current year, viz:—

Otahuhu, April 10, 1850.

At a Meeting of the Wardens of the hundred of Otahuhu, held this day, Present, J. A. Hickson, and John McAnulty, it was agreed that the Waste Lands of the Crown in this hundred, containing 4,500 acres, is capable of depasturing 400 head of great cattle, and 800 head of small cattle, to be apportioned to the holders of Licenses for the current year, as follows, viz. :—

RULES or Regulations made the date hereunto affixed by the Wardens of Onehunga whose signatures are attached, for regulating the depasturing of Stock within the Hundred of Onehunga, under the provisions of the Crown Lands Ordinance, No. 1, Session 10, August 23, 1849. To Wit :—

1.—That all persons lawfully holding a depasturing license for the current year, for the hundred of Onehunga, may depasture on the Crown Waste Lands, of the northern portion of said hundred, any number of dairy stock, and also any number of Steers or Heifers under (2) two years old, and also any Great Cattle used by them or him for the purposes of draught or saddle, such stock being the bona fide property of such licensed persons respectively, and for which the assessment or assessments made, or at any time to be made by the Wardens of said hundred shall have been paid, and of which said stock the brands and other distinguishing marks as required under notice issued, or to be issued, by the said Wardens shall have been conformably registered.

2.—Licensed persons hiring dairy stock, or oxen, or horses, for the purposes of draught, the same being so used by them, or him, and duly registered as such with the Wardens of the hundred aforesaid, may depasture such stock on the Crown Waste Lands aforesaid, providing such stock be liable to such notices, rules, and assessments as such similar stock the bona fide property of licensed persons are liable to.

3.—All great cattle, except as before excepted, or not duly registered, or on which the assessment or assessments have not been paid, and small cattle the property of persons holding a depasturing license for the hundred of Onehunga, found depasturing on the Waste lands of the northern portion aforesaid shall be impounded.

4.—That the Northern portion of the Hundred of Onehunga be held to be as displayed by the map, and contained within the lands lying to the North or East of the Manukau or Onehunga water—and that the Southern portion be that described also by a map as being the lands known under the name of Mangarie, and lying South of the said water of Onehunga.

5.—Any Stock the property of licensed persons of the Hundred of Onehunga, which shall have been duly registered, and for which the assessment or assessments shall have been duly paid, may be depastured on the Crown Waste Lands on the Southern or Mangarie portion of the Hundred.

6.—That on all great cattle intended to be depastured on the South or Mangarie portion,

an assessment be payable to the Wardens of the Hundred, at the time of registering the brands thereof, of one penny per head, and on all small cattle to be depastured in like manner an assessment of sixpence per score.

7.—That the stock of unlicensed persons found depasturing on any part of the Waste lands aforesaid, or on any unenclosed lands of the Hundred, thrown in by private persons into the Hundred, shall be impounded and pay the usual pound fees and charges of such pound wherein they are impounded, together with such other fine as they are liable to according to the clause 37, of the Crown Lands' Ordinance, No. 1, Session 10, dated August 23, 1849.

8.—Any person lawfully holding a depasturing license, and who shall have complied with the notices, rules, and regulations made, or to be made, from time to time by the Wardens of the Hundred of Onehunga, may impound any unauthorised Stock found by him or them unlawfully on any part of the Waste lands aforesaid.
