PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency WILLIAM HOBSON, Esq.,
Captain in Her Majesty's Royal Navy,
Governor and Commander-in-chief in and
over Her Majesty's colony of New Zea-
land and its dependencies, and Vice Ad-
miral of the same.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Court of Buckingham Palace,
the 8th of May, 1841,

Present, the Queen's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed
in the Session of Parliament, held in the
third and fourth years of the Reign of his late
Majesty KING WILLIAM THE FOURTH, intitled
"An Act to regulate the Trade of the British Pos-
sessions abroad," it was amongst other things
enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty,
by and with the advice of his Privy Council, by
any Order or Orders in Council, to be issued from
time to time, to give such directions, and make
such regulations touching the Trade and Com-
merce of, to, or from any British possession on or
near the continent of Europe, or within the Medi-
teranean Sea, or in Africa, or within the limits of
the East India Company's Charter, except the pos-
sessions of the said Company as to His Majesty in
Council, should appear most expedient and
salutary.

Now therefore, Her Majesty by and with the
advice of Her Privy Council, doth, in pursuance
and in exercise of the power and authority in her
vested by the Act above stated Order, and it is
hereby ordered that from and after the time when

this order shall be made known in the Colonies
hereinafter mentioned, by Proclamations of the
Governors of the said Colonies respectively, the
duties now levied at the Cape of Good Hope,
Ceylon, New South Wales, Van Diemen's Land,
Western Australia, South Australia, and New
Zealand, upon articles to produce and manufac-
ture of the British possessions in India, shall be
reduced or altered to the same rates as are now
imposed upon similar articles, the produce or
manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of other
British possessions.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commis-
sioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Right
Honorable Lord John Russell, one of Her
Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to
give the necessary directions herein, as to them
may respectively appertain.

Now therefore I the Governor do hereby Pro-
claim and Declare the said order in Council, and
give notice that from and after the date hereof
the Duties heretofore leviable within this Colony
upon Articles the produce and manufacture of the
British Possessions in India will be reduced or al-
tered in compliance with the said Order in Council.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct that the attention of the Heads of the various Departments of the Government of this colony, and of the public in general, be drawn to the following Regulations on the subject of Accounts, which will be in force from and after the 1st day of January, 1842

SALARIES.

The Abstracts of Salaries of the Officers holding situations under the Government are directed to be sent in to the Office of the Colonial Treasurer on the 2nd day of the month succeeding that for which they are due, when, if on examination they are found to be correct, the salaries will be paid on the 8th.

WAGES.

The abstracts for mechanics and labourers employed in the departments, must be transmitted to the Colonial Treasury by the head of the department for whose services they are engaged, on the 6th day of each month succeeding that for which the wages are due, and if they prove correct in every respect they will be paid on the 12th.

ACCOUNTS FOR SUPPLIES, &c.

Parties furnishing Supplies to the various departments for the Public Service, Contractors and others, are required to send in the Bills of particulars, on the proper forms, to the head of each department by the 2nd day of the month succeeding that on which the Supplies were furnished. These documents, certified by the officer who received the Supplies, are to be transmitted by the head of the department, enclosed in the usual abstracts, to the Office of the Colonial Treasurer, on the 8th, when, if found correct, and supported by the proper authorities and vouchers, they will be paid on the 14th.

All Accounts, together with the Vouchers and Sub-Vouchers to the same, will in future be required in Duplicate only.

The heads of departments are particularly enjoined to use their utmost exertions to give effect to these arrangements, as well in pointing out to persons having claims on Government, the nature of the accounts to be given in, as in expediting their transmission to the Treasury when furnished
