PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency WILLIAM HOBSON, Esquire, Captain in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, and Governor and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies.

HEREAS by a certain Ordinance of the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, passed in the 5th Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen VICTORIA, intituled, "An Ordinance "for establishing County Courts of Civil and "Criminal Jurisdiction, and for repealing an "Ordinance for instituting Courts of Requests, "Session 1, No. 6, and for repealing part of an "Ordinance for establishing Courts of Quarter "Sessions, Session 1, No. 4," it is enacted, that from and after the 1st day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, there should be holden within the Colony of New Zealand County Courts of Record, possessing Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction, in manner thereinafter provided.

And whereas it is further enacted by the said in part recited Ordinance, that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, should from time to time appoint a place or places within each County or District, as the case may be, whereat such Courts shall be holden.

And whereas it is further enacted by the said in part recited Ordinance, that in every County or District a Court should be holden, monthly, on the third Tuesday of every month;

NOW, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said in part recited Ordinance, do hereby,

with the advice of the Executive Council, direct and appoint that, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, the said Colony be divided into two Districts, to be called the Northern and Southern Districts, and that the Northern District be that part of the Colony situate to the North of the Parallel of Latitude thirty-eight degrees thirty minutes South, and that the Southern District be that part of the said Colony situate to the South of the aforesaid Parallel of Latitude.

And I do further direct and appoint that the said County Courts of Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction as aforesaid, shall be holden during the present and in each year, at the places hereinafter respectively mentioned; that is to say, in the Northern District at Auckland and Kororarika, and in the Southern District at Wellington.

And I do further, with the advice of the Executive Council, as aforesaid, direct and appoint, that the first sitting of the said County Courts shall be held in the aforesaid Districts on the third Tuesday of the month of April next ensuing.

suance of the advertisement of the 30th ultimo, having been declined, Notice is hereby given that Tenders will be received at this Office until Noon on Monday 14th March, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required during twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st April 1842, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c.

The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the Head of the Department for which they are authorized.

The Supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or Establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service.

If the Board shall decide that the article is not of a proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured in like manner.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of interior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead.

A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the Contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract.

It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period.

The Contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state, to the officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Treasurer, in order that a warrant may be prepared, and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

Forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office; and as adequate security will be required for the due fulfilment of the Contract, no Tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from the parties proposed as such, stating that they are willing to become bound as securities for the Contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within ten days from the day of acceptance of the Tender being notified, failing of

which the contracts will be again advertised, or another Tender accepted.

The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence, at length.

All Tenders to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "Tender for Provisions, &c." Further particulars and information may be

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Harbour Master's Office, Auckland, 5th March, 1842.

Between Mutu Tapu and Waiheke islands, and on either side of Mutu Hea, there is a good passage with deep water; care must, however, be taken not to approach too near to the N. W. end of Mutu Hea, from whence a reef runs out about a quarter of a mile.

In working along the south side of the Island of Rangitoto, the lead should be kept going, and vessels should not shoal less than three and a

half fathoms.

There is no passage between Mutu Korea and the Eastern Head of the Tamaki River, for any

but very small craft.

Along the south side of Waiheke there is a good passage in from four to six fathoms water, the opposite shore is shoal, and in standing towards it the lead should be carefully attended to.

Between the eastern side of the Waiheke, and

Between the eastern side of the Waiheke, and the islands Paroa, Te Roteroa, and Pa Ratu, there is a good passage, with deep water; vessels should keep nearest the Waiheke shore, and not approach the islands under six fathoms, to avoid some rocky patches near them. Care should also be taken to avoid a small sand bank (under water) lying about a mile off the Waiheke shore near the southern entrance of the passage, and almost abreast of a settlement occupied by Mr. Graham.

Between Paroa and Pakia islands there is not a good passage, but small vessels, with a leading wind, may pass through by keeping very close to the Paroa shore in three and four fathoms, to avoid a Gravel Spit, which stretches from the north end of Pakia in a N.N. E. direction nearly

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that, in pursuance of the provisions of an Ordinance of the Governor and Council of New Zealand, intituled "An Ordinance for Reguting the Conveyance and Postage of Letters," (5 Victoria, Sess. II., No. 8) the following uniform rate of Postage will henceforward be charged in lieu of the several rates of Postage heretofore demanded within this Colony, viz:—

Upon all Letters conveyed by sea from any one port post town to any other port post town within the colony: upon all letters received from any country beyond sea, whether deliverable at the port of arrival, or transmitted thence by sea to any other part of the colony; and upon all letters to be transmitted to any country beyond seas, whether put into the Post Office at the port of departure, or to be forwarded thereto by sea from any other part of the Colony:—

and so on after the rate of six-penee for every additional half ounce, or any fractional part thereof.
