HENRY MATSON, a Commissioner on all Claims to Compensation preferred according to the provisions of an Ordinance, Session 7, No. 22, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize Compensation in Colonial Debentures to be made to certain Claimants to Land in the Colony of New Zealand," do hereby notify that I will investigate the undermentioned Claims at the Council Chamber, on Monday, the 5th day of July, 1847, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Case No. 17. Pre-emption Certificate No. 109.

-WILLIAM HART, of Epsom, settler.

86 acres, Eighty-six acres, situated at Ep-

so acres, Eighty-six acres, situated at Epsem; bounded on the north by the land of Mr. George Hart; on the south by the land of Mr. Henry; on the west by the Epsom road; and on the east by native land.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chief E Kati.

Consideration, sixty pounds in cash, two coats, two waistcoats, two pair trowsers, two pair shoes, four shirts.

Case No. 20. Pre emption certificate, No. 113.—Thomas Henry, of Auckland, store-keeper.

800 acres. Eight hundred acres, situated on the south side of One Tree Hill, called Waikaraku, bounded on the north by native land, on the east by Mr. Lorrigan's property, and native land, on the south by the waters of the Manukau, and on the west by Mr. Jackson's property, and native land.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Kawau, Te Hira, Te Keene, and others.

Consideration-£300.

Case No. 21. Pre-emption certificate, No. 117. Thomas Power, of Auckland, settler.

60 acres, Sixty acres, situated between Epsom and the Manukau river, bounded on one side by a government line, on another, by land belonging to the native chief Kati. on another by land purchased by Mr. Beveridge, on another side by land purchased by

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Kawau, Te Keene, and

Case No. 22. Pre-emption certificate, No. 136. HASTINGS ATKINS, of Hokianga, settler.

980 acres. Nine hundred and eighty acres, situated on the near side of the Manukau, the boundary on the one side of Onehunga, is the Powrewa, it goes to the Puke Karora, to Onepoto to Waikoui to the Tanarou, to Mutenghi-rahi, to the Unahi, to the Tuhi Karapara to Owai Kahu, which is boundary on the side of Karangahapi.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs To Kawau, To Hira, Te

Keene, and E Nihi.

Consideration.—Ninery two pounds, seven shillings, and six-pence, in goods and

Case No. 23. Pre-emption Certificate No. 138--HENRY R. CRETNAY, of Auckland, store-

250 acres. Two hundred and fifty acres, sitnated between the road leading to the Tamaki and One Tree Hills and extending lowerds the lake below Mr. Kempthorne's.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Hoterene, and Te Hake. Consideration, about fifty pounds in money, and thirty pounds in goods, consisting of blankets, prints, trowsers, &c.

Case No. 24. Presemption Certificate No. 83. -Edward Forey, of Auckland, butcher.

500 acres, Five hundred acres, situated on the Awaroa river, bounded on the front or west by the Awaroa creek, and extending about half a mile along the same; on the north by land claimed by Mr. Hamlin on behalf of Mr. Stack, and extending back about a mile and a half; on the east, by other land of Katipa; and on the south, by a small creek called Waikowiere Keitioni.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chief Katipa.

Consideration, one hundred and fifty pounds.

Case Nov. 23. Becamption certification J. H. WATT, of Auckland, watch-maker,

400 acres. Four hundred acres, situated to the east or north-east of One Tree Hill, and east of the blocks lately bought by T. Henry, by which it is bounded on the west, and on the north and south is bounded to a certain extent by other blocks sold to Europeans.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chief Wanganui alias Tauteri.

Consideration—One silver watch, one gold ring, one rifle gun, I box, one waistcoat, one pair trowsers, one pair boots, two silk-handkerchiefs, one sheet, two gowns, two cartouch boxes. Amounting in value, to £17 5s. sterling.

Case 26. Pre-emption certificate, No. 63 .-PATRICK DONOVAN, of Epsom, settler.

111 acres 1 rood 10 perches. One hundred and eleven acres, one rood, and ten perches, situated near the Three Kings, and known by the parisoners of Pareter bounded on the north by crown land, on the east by land purchased from the natives by Daniel Donohoe, and J. O. Keefe, on the west by land purchased by Mr. Donovan, over which the pre-emption has been waived, and on the south by land the property of the natives.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Rawau, Te Keene, Te

Hira, and others. Consideration _ £20.

Case No. 27. Pre-emption certificate No.142. PATRICK DONOVAN, of Epsom, settler.

150 acres, One hundred and fifty acres, situated near Mount Smart, on the Manukau rives, Waikaraka by name, bounded on two sides by land belonging to the chiefs Te Kawau and Te Keene, on another side by Mr. Jackson, and on the other by the river Manukau.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Kawau, Te Keene, Te Hira, and others.

Gonsideration - £30: Case 28. Pre-emption certificate, No. 143.-

PATRICE DONOVAN, of Epsom, settler.

400 games. Four hundred acres, stranged between the Three Kings and Manakau, bounded on one side by land belonging to Mesers. Donovan and Donoughue, on another side by land belonging to Mr. Hart, on another side, by Mr. Ring, and native land, and on the other side by Messrs, Kennedy and Ring.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Te Kawau, Te Keene, Te

Hira, and others. Consideration-£20.

Case No. 29. Pre-emption certificate, No. 106 -PATRICK LUNDUN, of Anckland, settler.

100 acres. One hundred acres, simuted near One Tree Hill, bounded on the north by native lands belonging to Kawau and his tribe. on the south by land sold to Daniel Lorrigan, on the west by land sold to Thomas Henry, and on the east by native land belonging to Kawau and his tribe.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Kewen, Krone, and Pamipi. - Consideration - £10.

Case No. 30. Pre-emption certificate, No. 162 -PATRICK LUNDUN, of Auckland, settler.

28 acres. Twenty three acres, situated near One Tree Hill, being in addition to the 100 acres contained in the boundaries stated in certificate No. 106.

Alleged to have been purchased from the native chiefs Kawau, Keene, and Pumipi. Consideration, -the same as in Case No. 29.

Case No. 31. Pre-emption Certificate, No. 68. -James Beveridge, of Epsom, settler.

240 acres, Two hundred and forty acres situated at Manukau, the boundary as marked is a stake at the north west point of the swamp at the road which passes Deuchar's farm, runs due south until about the middle of the course of the creek, or outlet of the swamp, which is crossed there and where there is a stake, then to the mouth of the creek, keeping the same as the koundary to the west, upon the north by a government road which passes Deuchar's farm, commencing at the above north west boundary and going to a flax bush beyond where Deuchar's fence projects, upon the east from the said flax bush, following a line of stakes until it reaches the mouth of the said creek.
