HENRY MATSON, a Commissioner appointed for examining and reporting on all Claims to Compensation preferred according to the provisions of an Ordinance, Session 7, No. 22, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize Compensation in Colonial Debentures to be made to certain Claimants to Land in the Colony of New Zealand," do hereby notify that I will investigate the under-mentioned Claims at the Council Chamber, on Tuesday, the 9th day of November, 1847, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

300 acres, Three hundred acres, situated on the Island of Pounui, near Waiheke; bounded on one side by a sandy bay, named Whairua; on another by a place named Whareongaonga; on another by a place named Oturoa; and on the other by land belonging to the chief Nostai.
