PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel ROBERT HENRY WYNYARD, Companion of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Officer Admin-istering the Government and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Islands of New Zealand, &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is expedient that so much of the Province of Nelson, as is included within the boundaries hereinafter particularly set forth, should be divided into Hundreds. Now. therefore, I the Officer administering the Government, do hereby proclaim and declare that the same be divided into eleven several Hundreds, to be called respectively the Hundred of "Wakapuaka," the Hundred of "Nelson," the Hundred of "Wai-Hundred of "Nelson," the Hundred of "Wai-iti," the Hundred of "Wai-iti," the Hundred of "Wainea West," the Hundred of "Motueka," the Hundred of "Motueka," the Hundred of "Sandy Bay," the Hundred of "Motupipi," and the Hundred of "Aorere;" and the boundaries whereaf versactively, are hereinefter daries whereof respectively are hereinafter described and particularly set forth in a map or plan deposited in the Office of the Commissioner of Crown Lands at Nelson.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Wakapuaka.

On the north by a line running from the north-west corner of Section No. 36, Wakapuaka, along the Native boundary line to Section No. 39, and thence in the same direction for three miles. On the east thence by a of the Hundreds of Waimea East and Waim

line running south-west for six miles. On the south thence by a line to the dividing line between Sections Nos. 1 and 4, Wakapuaka, and thence in the same direction to the Boulder Bank. And on the west thence by a line along high water mark to where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Nelson.

On the north by the southern boundary of the Hundred of Wakapuaka. On the east thence by a line running south-west for seven miles. On the south thence by a line to the south-east corner of Section No. 72, Waimea East, and thence along the southern bound of Sections No. 19, 99, 76, 75, and 77, mea East to high water mark. And or west thence by a line along high water mark to where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Waimea East.

On the north by the Mud Flat in Waimea East, and by the southern boundary of the Hundred of Nelson. On the east thence by a line running south-west for seven miles. On the south thence by a line running north-west for three and a quarter miles to the Wairoa river, and thence by the Wairoa river to its junction with the Wai-iti. And on the west by the Waimea river to its mouth, where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Wai-iti.

On the north by the southern boundaries

West. On the east thence by a line running | south-west for thirteen miles. On the south thence by a line running north-west for five miles to the Wai-iti river, and thence by the Wai-iti river to Section No. 13, Waimea South. And on the west thence by a line to the south-west corner of Section No. 189, Moutere, where the northern boundary com-

Boundaries of the Hundred of Waimea West On the north by the Waimea West Mud On the east by the Waimea river from the north-east corner of Section No. 2, Waimea West, to Section No. 126, Waimea West, and thence by the Wai-iti river to Section No. 113, Waimea South. On the south thence by the northern boundary of the Hundred of Wai-iti, from the Wai-iti river to Section No. 189, Moutere. And on the west thence by a line for three and a half miles to the south-west side of Section No. 97, Moutere, and thence by the road through Sections Nos. 97, 191, and 192, and along the Mud Flat to where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Montere,

On the north by a line along high water mark from Section No. 204, Moutere, to Section No. 20, Moutere. On the east thence by a line to Section No. 192, Moutere, and thence by the western boundary of the Hundred of Waimea West. On the south thence by a line from the south-west corner of Section No. 189, Moutere, to the south-east corner of Section No. 22, Moutere, and thence to the south-west corner of Section No. 60, Moutere. And on the west thence by a line to Section No. 44, Moutere, and thence by a road to the Moutere river at Section No. 5, and thence by the Moutere to where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Motueka On the north by a line running along high water mark from the mouth of the Motueka river to the mouth of the Moutere river, On the east and south thence by a line to Section No. 172, Motueka, and thence by the western boundary of the Hundred of Moutere. And on the west thence by a line along the west side of Section No. 60, to the Motueka river, and thence by the Motueka river to where the northern boundary commences..

Boundaries of the Hundred of Riwaka. On the north by a line from the south-west corner of Section No. 28, Riwaka, to the Riwaka river in Section No. 27, and thence by the Riwaka to its mouth. On the east and south thence by a line along high water mark to the mouth of the Motueka river, and thence by the Motueka river to the north-west corner of Section No. 60. And on the west thence by a line for eleven and a half miles to Section No. 28, Riwaka, where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Sandy Bay. On the north-east and east by a line along high water mark from the north point of Torrent Basin to the mouth of the Riwaka. On

the Hundred of Riwaka: And on the west and north-west thence by a line from the south-west corner of Section No. 28, Riwaka, to the north-west corner of Section No. 124. Sandy Bay, and thence to the north point of Torrent Basin, where the northern boundary commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Motupipi. On the north by a line along high water mark from the end of the road through Section No. 77, to the north east corner of Section No 151. On the east thence by a line to the south-east corner of Section No. 153, and thence to the Takaka river at the south-east corner of Section No. 184. On the South thence by a line due west for two miles. And on the west thence by a line due north for nine and a half miles to a road at the south-

west corner of Section No. 74, and thence by

the said road to where the northern boundary

commences.

Boundaries of the Hundred of Aorere. On the north by the Aorere river from Section No. 3 to its mouth, and thence by a line along high water mark to the western boundary of the Hundred of Motupipi. On the east thence by the western boundary of the Hundred of Motupipi to the south-east corner of Section No. 82. On the south thence by a line due west for nine miles to the Aorere river. And on the west thence by the Aorere river to Section No 3, where the northern boundary commences

I have received Governor Sir George Grey's Despatch, No. 121 of the 22nd of December last, forwarding two Letters with their enclosures, addressed to my predecessor by

Having transmitted for the report of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, the south thence by the northern boundary of copies of the Despatch and accompanying

papers, which relate principally to by-gone transactions and especially to the refusal of the Government to confirm Mr. Busby in the possession of large tracts of land acquired from (20th June, 1854.) the Natives by himself while holding the position of British resident in New Zealand, I enclose for your information a copy of their reply.

You will acquaint Mr. Busby that I find nothing in his representation to call for interference, and it will be desirable that you should make it known that Her Majesty's Government are not prepared to encourage the practice on the part of individual members of the Legislatures of making direct appeals to the Secretary of State on matters which the Law has now remitted to the control of the authorities upon the spot.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

H.M.S. Pandora, October 28th, 1854.

I have the honour to make known the existence of the undermentioned rocks between Wanga Point and Mahurangi, some of them, being occasionally above water, will be known to coasters, but as I do not find them in the present chart, I send their positions and a tracing from the survey of them.

A rocky patch \(\frac{1}{2}\) a mile W.N.W off Wanga Point, dries 4 feet at low water springs, extends \(\frac{1}{2}\) of a mile east and west and the same distance

of a mile east and west and the same distance north and south, has a channel of 3½ fathoms between it and the Wanga shore.

A sunken rock with 9 feet at low water, with a depth of from 7 to 10 fathoms round it, about 2 cables north of the above patch. From it the high water of Wanga Point bears S., 64°E. Inner Wanga Point, S. 47°W.

And Rocky Islet, north of Tiri Tiri, N. 83°E.

This rock must be avoided by vessels beating between Wanga Point and Tiri Tiri and is in the line of passage from Auckland to Mahura-

ngi.

The low water of Wanga Point extends
N.E. b N. 1/3 of a mile from the high water.

One and a-quarter miles south of Mahurangi
Harbour there is a rocky patch dries at half-tide,
tho outer part half a mile from the nearest point

of land, there is a channel of 3 fathoms between it and the shore.

From the outer rock-Kiahou bears N. 12° W. South end of Whora Is-N. 25 ° E. lands Bastion Rock of the Hot

Springs S. 15 ° W. All bearings magnetic, and soundings for low water spring tides.
