WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Lieutenant Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session 8, No. 4, intituled "An Ordinance to provide for the management of Savings Banks," it is enacted that the affairs of every such Bank shall be vested in not less than four or more than thirty-six Trustees, to be nominated by the Governor; and that such Trustees, or any of them, may from time to time be removed from office, and be re-appointed, or others or another appointed in their or his place. And whereas in consequence of the absence from the Colony of several of the persons who have been appointed to be Trustees of the Savings Bank established at Auckland under the said recited Act, it has become impossible to hold a legally constituted meeting of the said Trustees, and it is therefore expedient that all the present Trustees should be removed from office, and that those who are resident in the Province and willing to act should be re-appointed. Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers in me vested, I, Thomas Gore Browne, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby remove from the office of Trustee of the Savings Bank established at Auckland, every person who has been so appointed as aforesaid, and who now holds the said office. And I do hereby nominate and re-appoint each of the persons hereinafter named to be a Trustee of the said Bank, viz :

THE following Rules, framed and established by the Land Claims Commissioner, pursuant to the "Land Claims Settlement Act, 1856," and approved by the Governor in Council, are published for general information.

RULES,

*Framed and established by the undersigned
Land Claims Commissioner, Francis Dillon
Bell, Esquire, in pursuance of the powers
vested in him in that behalf by the "Land
Claims Settlement Act, 1856"*

1. The Court is open daily at Auckland, for the transaction of ordinary business; except when the Commissioner is absent to hold sittings appointed at other places, by notice in the General or Provincial Government Gazettes.
2. Sittings of Assistant Commissioners will be held at such times and places as may be appointed by notice as aforesaid.
3. Proceedings in every claim in respect whereof no Grant has been issued, must be initiated by filing a Notification, printed forms whereof can be obtained on application to the Clerk of the Court. Such Notification must be filed before the 1st day of July, 1858.
4. Claimants under Original Land Claims in respect whereof the Memorial Fee of five pounds

has been heretofore paid, will not be required to pay any fee before their Claims are heard.

5. In the case of Original Land Claims, advertised for hearing by former Commissioners but not heard, and in respect whereof no Grants were recommended by reason of the claimant failing to appear or produce evidence, it will be necessary, before filing any notification, to show that the claimant's right has not lapsed by his wilful default.

6. Where it can be shown that the claimant was unable to pay the fees of Court, or to produce evidence material to his case, or that other reasonable grounds existed for the claim not being prosecuted before former Commissioners, the claim will be admitted for hearing.

7. Original Land Claims in respect whereof no Grants were recommended by the first Commissioners after hearing, but which were subsequently re-opened by Government, and in which Grants or Scrip were awarded but not issued or exercised, will be admitted for investigation in order to a final decision. Claims withdrawn or disallowed after hearing by former Commissioners and not subsequently re-opened by Government, will not be re-admitted for hearing.

8. All unsettled Pre-emptive Claims under the Proclamation of 10th October 1844, will be admitted for final investigation.

9. Claimants will be required to produce the originals of all Native Deeds of Sale, and certified translations of any documents that may be in the Maori language.

10. Claimants who cannot attend personally may appear by agent authorised in writing. Provided that at any time after the day appointed for the hearing, evidence may be taken and the investigation proceeded with in the absence of and without further notice to the claimant.

11. Any claimant, agent, or party interested in a claim may have copies of any evidence or documents in the Court having reference thereto, upon payment of sixpence per folio for copying the same.

12. When any Grant shall have been called in by notice from the Attorney-General, the only proof to be required of such notice shall be the production of the Government Gazette wherein the same was published.

13. When any Grant so called in shall not be produced at the time and place specified in the notice, and the non-production thereof

shall be accounted for to the satisfaction of the Court, an order may be made for the Grant to be delivered up at some future time, and whenever it shall be produced the adjudication thereon may proceed without further notice.

14. An order may at any time be made for the survey of the land comprised in any Grant called in for adjudication, whether such Grant be adjudged void or not.

15. Every survey made by a claimant must, wherever practicable, be connected with some neighbouring survey, and the position thereof fixed with reference to some known point or determinate natural feature: and the plans must in all cases give bearings and distances, show generally the principal features of the country with the Native names thereof, and clearly define the boundaries of the claim by a border in red colour.

16. Every plan must be accompanied by a written description of the boundaries, commencing from and closing upon some defined point, and stating bearings and distances; and also by a certificate from the surveyor that every boundary line shown on the plan has been properly cut on the ground, and that the survey has been completed without disturbance from the Natives.

17. As a general rule claimants will be required to survey the whole external boundary of their claim as the same was originally acquired from the Natives; but this will not be demanded in cases where the extent of the claim greatly exceeds the maximum quantity to be granted. The allowances for surveys will be calculated upon the area actually surveyed, whatever may be the amount awarded in the claim.

18. Where it becomes necessary, after a survey has been made, to run new boundary or other survey-lines in order to carry out any order of the Court, the allowance to be made in land for such additional lines will be calculated with reference to the contract prices at the time for work of a similar description executed for Government.

Charles Baker	Waikare	This was an original Land Claim No. 255, for 1212 acres at Waikare. Commissioners Richmond and Godfrey reported 30th May 1842 in favour of claimant for a grant of 872 acres. Four grants amounting to 872 acres signed by Governor FitzRoy on 29th May 1844, but subsequently cancelled. On the 4th Nov. 1847 and 13th Nov. 1851 the claimant was informed Government would allow maximum of 2560 acres on claims 255, 255a and 255b, upon surveys being made.
Hugh Coolahan	Kororareka	This was a claim of W. D. Brind under an alleged purchase from the Natives in 1839, and was not before the former Commissioners. Notified to Government by W. D. Brind on 25th July 1846, but not heard. Notification now put in by derivative claimant Coolahan under the Act.
Catholic Mission (Right Rev. Bishop Pompallier)	Waihihi	This was part of original Land Claim No. 391c. Commissioner Godfrey reported on the 26th Nov. 1842 in favour of the Catholic Mission for 60 acres at Waihihi and Maiki. Grant for 59 acres at Maiki (part of claim) issued by Governor Gore Browne on the 11th Feb. 1856.
Henry Day	Bay of Islands	This was an original Land Claim No. 295, 295a, and 295b. No grant recommended by Commissioner Godfrey 1st Dec. 1842, claimant not having paid fees. In Sept. 1844 Governor FitzRoy promised an investigation, but the claim was not gazetted for re-hearing. Now admitted under the Act.
Benjamin E. Turner	Kororareka	This was an original Land Claim No. 233. Commissioner Godfrey reported on the 26th Nov. 1842 in favour of claimant for 7 acres under certain reservations. Grant not yet issued.
Jane Clendon	Raurau	This was part of an original Land Claim No. 67 of D. B. Cochrane. Commissioners Richmond and Godfrey reported 24th April 1843 in favour of Cochrane for 1000 acres. Scrip for £800 part of the claim, issued by Governor FitzRoy 6th July 1844. A grant for 200 acres to D. B. Cochrane's daughter prepared but not signed.
William Thomas Fairburn	Keri Keri	This was a Pre-emptive Land Claim under Certificate No. 240. Reported on by Commissioner Matson 19th July, 1848. Disallowed by Governor Grey 25th July 1848.
William Benjamin Moores	Kororareka	This was an original Land Claim of Battersby and Moores, Nos. 313 and 312a to 312d. Commissioner Godfrey recommended no grant 1st Dec. 1842, the claimants not having appeared. The excuse for non-appearance admitted pending evidence at the Bay of Islands.
Church Missionary Society	Te Puna	This was an original Land Claim No. 450. Commissioner Godfrey reported 10th March 1844 in favor of the Society for 80 acres. Further special Report of Commissioners Godfrey and Richmond dated 29th May 1843, on the whole of the Society's claims, not acted on as regards this claim.

Church Missionary Society	Te Puna	This was an original Land Claim No. 450a. Commissioner Godfrey reported 10th March 1844 in favor of the Society for 12 acres. Further special Report as last aforesaid.
Church Missionary Society	Te Puna	This was an original Land Claim No. 450b. Commissioner Godfrey reported 10th March 1844 in favor of the Society for 150 acres. Further special Report as last aforesaid.
Church Missionary Society	On the Keri Keri River	This was an original Land Claim No. 299n & o. Commissioner Richmond reported 14th April 1843 in favor of the Society for the claim, reserving a sufficient space for a township. Further special report as last aforesaid. All the land reserved 11th March 1856 by the Surveyor-General, except about twelve acres. Grant for 12a. 3r. 7p. prepared in August 1856, but not signed.
Walter Brodie	Kororanga	This was part of an original Land Claim No. 260. Commissioners Godfrey and Richmond 29th April 1843 recommended no grant, no proof of a certain transfer from Christopher Holton to B. E. Turner having been produced, and only part of the land alienated. Claim re-opened by Governor Grey in November 1846, and a further hearing before the Resident Magistrate. Grant issued June 1849 for part of the land.
Francis White	Hokianga	This was an original Land Claim No. 242g. of W. and F. White. Commissioners Richmond and Godfrey reported, 30th May 1843 in favour of claimants for 2560 acres. In December 1844 Governor FitzRoy awarded W. White £6099 scrip on his part of the claim, and awarded F. White £1901 scrip, which was not exercised. In March 1848 F. White applied for a grant, when Government decided he was only entitled to 1280 acres.
	Hokianga	This was an original Land Claim No. 449. Commissioner Richmond reported 16th November 1844 in favour of claimant for 2560 acres, with certain exceptions; Report accompanied by a memorandum that grants on 449 and 449b should be reduced to maximum of 2560 acres. No grant yet issued on 449.

Claimant.	Where situated.	Nature of Claim.
James Berghan	Mangonui	This was an Original Land Claim, No. 259 and 259a to 259h. Commissioner Godfrey reported 12th May 1844 in favour of Claimant for 438 acres to be granted at some other place. Governor Fitzroy on the 20th May 1844 awarded Scrip to the amount of £1146, which was not exercised. Grant subsequently ordered to be prepared on survey, but not yet issued.
George Thomas and Thomas Phillips	Mangonui	This was an Original Land Claim, No. 279 and 279a to 279f. Commissioner Godfrey reported 12th May 1844 in favour of Claimants for 279 acres to be granted at some other place. Governor Fitzroy on the 20th May 1844 awarded Scrip to the amount of £757, which was not exercised.
Richard Matthews	Kaitia	This was an Original Land Claim, No. 164. Commissioner Godfrey reported 15th April 1843 in favour of the Claimant for 718 acres; subsequently amended award for 479½ acres. Grant for 479½ acres signed by Governor Fitzroy on 22nd October 1844, but subsequently cancelled and Scrip to the amount of £1500 awarded by Governor Fitzroy 15th July 1845, which was not exercised.
George Stephenson	Mangonui	This is a Claim for Land ceded by Nopera Panakareao in compensation for the destruction of the Claimant's vessel, for which Governor Hobson 2nd November 1842 promised acres. Governor Fitzroy offered 25th December 1844 Scrip for £500 in compensation, which was refused. Pre-emption Certificate No. 245 then issued 6th November 1845 for 999 acres to the Claimant. Commissioner Matson reported 18th July 1848 that plans had not been sent in. Claim disallowed accordingly 25th July 1848. Government on 16th June 1851 promised favourable consideration on payment of 5s. per acre under Governor Grey's Minute of 1847.
Samuel Hayward Ford	On the River Awanui	This was an Original Land Claim, No. 300e. Commissioner Godfrey reported 15th April 1853 in favour of Claimant for 1900 acres; amended award for 1357 acres with certain reservations. Grant signed by Governor Fitzroy 16th July 1844 for 1357 acres, but cancelled in July 1845 when Governor Fitzroy awarded Scrip for £1357 in exchange, which was not exercised.
James Kemp	Wangaroa	This was an Original Land Claim, No. 273c, d, e, and h for 4000 acres. Commissioner Godfrey reported 8th April 1843 in favour of Claimant for 2284 acres; amended award 6th September 1843 not to exceed with other Claims the maximum of 2560 acres. Executive Council on 14th September 1844 authorised Commissioner Fitzgerald to make extended award. Commissioner Fitzgerald 26th September 1844 recommended Grants to Claimant for 2276 acres. Grants ordered to be prepared by Governor Fitzroy accordingly, and issued for 5276 acres; the issue of a Grant for the Wangaroa claim refused by Governor Grey in 1846 and 1847.
Rose Ann Cleghorn	Wairaka, Wangaroa	This was part of an Original Land Claim of W. Powditch in Nos. 196 and 196a to b. Commissioner Godfrey 8th April 1843 recommended no Grant, Claimant not having paid fees. Derivative Claim now admitted under the Act.
