### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS
GORE BROWNE, Companion of
the most Honorable Order of the
Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's
Colony of New Zealand, and
Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

HEREAS, by an Act passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, instituted "The Counties Act, 1856," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor on the recommendation of the Superintendent of any Province of the said Colony from time to time by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette of the Colony to Constitute any portion of such Province a County, Hundred, or Parish, and that all such Counties, Hundreds and Parishes shall have such designation and limits as in and by the Proclamation constituting the same shall be prescribed.

New, therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, on the recommendation of the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do proclaim and declare, and I do hereby condition that portion of the Province of Otago bounded on the North by a line running due East and West (true bearing) in transit with New River, South Point. On the South by the Ocean. On the West by the Ocean. On the East by a line running North and South (true bearing) in transit with the East point of Long Rush, as the same is delineated on the map hereunto annexed to be the Hundred of Campbell Town.

That portion of the said Province bounded on the North by the Makerewa. On the South, by a line running East and West (true bearing) in transit with New River South point. On the West by the New River. On the East by a line running from the mouth of Tussack Creek on the Makerewa to the East point of Long Bush; thence due South (true bearing) to Campbell Town Hundred, as the same is delineated on the map hereunto annexed to be the HUNDRED OF INVERCARGILL.

That portion of the said Province bounded on the North by a line running due East and West in transit with the top of Forrest Hill. In the South by the New River and the Ocean. On the East by the New River, Makerewa and Tussack Creek. On the West by the Waimatuck, as the same is delineated on the map hereunto annexed, to be the HUNDRED OF NEW RIVER.

That portion of the said Province bounded on the North by a line running due East and West (true bearing) in transit with the top of Forrest Hill from the Omut Creek to Jacob's River. On the Eastward and part North by the Southern edge of the Waimatuck Moss, and thence by the Waimatuck Creek to the Ocean. On the South by the Ocean. On the West by a line running due South (true bearing) from the Sea Beach to the Omut Creek, a point where it bends South Eastward, thence the Omut Creek to the Northern boundary, and by Jacob's River to the Yellow Bluff at the Southern side of the Waimatuck Moss, as the same is delineated on the map hereunte annexed to be the Hundred Off Jacob's River; and

That portion of the said Province bounded on the North by a line running due East and West (true bearing) from the Mataura to the Long Bush in transit with the South boundary of Licensed Run 97. On the East by the Mataura. On the South by the Sea, and on the West by a line running due North and South (true bearing) from the Sea to the Long Bush in transit with the East end of Long Bush, as the same is delineated on the map hereunto annexed, to be the Hundred Of Otheramanical

Downing Street, 4th June, 1857.

SIR,—You are aware that it was provided by the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854, that from and after the 1st of May, 1855, an official number would be appropriated to every British ship, and that such number would be permanently marked upon her beam-end, and entered upon her certificate of registry.

By that means the identity of every British vessel is established throughout the world.

But in order to realize that advantage fully, it was necesary to enable ships to communicate by signals their distinctive numbers to other ships at sea, as well as to Signal Stations on shore; and the enormous extent of the British mercantile navy made it impracticable to devise the means under any of the existing codes of signals, to signify or telegraph the special

numbers of vessels readily.

That difficulty led the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade to appoint a Committee of experienced officers to consider the whole subject of telegraphic communication at sea, and that Committee have recommended, and Her Majesty's Government have adopted, a new code of signs or signals which are repre-sented, with slight variations, by the flags now employed in Marryatt's Code, so far as these are applicable.

Of that new code I now transmit to you six copies, which you will deposit in the hands of the resident functionaries at the Stations of Auckland, Wellington, Nelson, Plymouth, Canterbury, and Otago. whose business it is

to attend to the signals of ships.

The object and character of that code, and the advantages which it posesses over all other codes now in use, are sufficiently explained in the report of the Committee, and in the remarks

which preface the book.

In truth, no British vessel should be without that code, and I carnestly recommend to you to impress upon the mercantile interests of New Zealand, the great advantages which they cannot fail to secure by taking care that their vessels are provided with copies of the book, which is published by Mr. Mitchell, 54, Gracechurch Street, at the price of 7s.

I further transmit to you six copies of the Mercantile Navy List, which contains the name and official number of every British registered vessel, as well as her distinctive code signal as represented by four letters and their

corresponding flags.

This List will be found very useful for purposes of reference, and may afford the means of detecting fraud in cases where a ship's name has been illegally assumed or altered for

OBJECT AND CHARACTER OF THE "COMMERCIAL CODE OF SIGNALS," "MERCANTILE NAVY LIST,"

Published by the authority of the Board of Trade.

"The Commercial Code of Signals for the Use of all Nations," founded on the Report of a Committee of Officers of the Royal Navy and Merchant Service, has at length been published, by authority of the Board of Trade.

The contents, so far as regards the words and sentences, are necessarily much the same as in other signal books; they have been carefully selected, and are concisely expressed. The arrangement of the subjects, and the mode of communicating, is different from that of other Codes hitherto in use.

### Numeral system rejected.

A great improvement is effected by rejecting the numeral system, with its perplexing concomitants of repeating and divisional flags. and substituting a system which will give to every subject of communication, whatever its nature, its own separate signal. For this porpose, 18 flags are used, and are designated by letters, being the 18 consonants of the English alphabet from B to W. The permutations of these 18 letters, never taking more than four together, amount to nearly 80,000 in number, and the Code will therefore admit of nearly 80,000 separate signals. The flags employed are in design generally the same as those now in use in merchant vessels. The Code may be adapted to any sets of flags by simply inserting plates or tables showing the different flags and the signs, and pointing out how they are intended respectively to corres-pond. This facility is important, with a view to international communication, in cases where foreign flags or alphabets differ from our own.

Arrangement of Code for international purposes.

Next, the alphabetical arrangement on which all existing signal Codes are formed, is abandoned, and the important communications are classed under subjects. This will give an easy means of translation, which under alphabetical arrangement is impracticable, as words of the same meaning have not the same initial letters in different languages.

In translating the Code the substance of each signal may be set forth in any language, in the words, and after the manner best calculated to express it; but as all signals will be denoted by the same or corresponding symbols, they will always be recognized as being the

same in meaning.

No signal composed of more than four flags, No one of the 78,000 signals in this Code, from first to last, is made with less than two or more than four flags, in a row. Each signal is made complete in one hoist, and in one place.

The most urgent or important signals are made with two flags, the next important with three, and the remainder with four flags.

Mode of distinguishing ship's names by signal.

One of the most important elements in the w code is the opportunity and ded of distinguishing every vessel, by a separate signal exclusively appropriated to itself, and always composed of four symbols—the uppermost

symbol being always a square flag.

Hitherto it has been found very difficult to make known the identity of passing ships to each other, or to signal stations, in order that they may be reported in the Shipping Lists, for the information of those concerned not only because many vessels, even those belonging to the same port, bear the same name (there are upwards of two hundred "Mary's" for instance), but because ships are continually changing their character with change of ownership; and it has always been necessary to follow up the signal denoting a vessel's name, with some further particulars, such as port of registry, name of master, destined port, &c. This of course necessitated the exhibition of two or three successive signals, of perhaps five flags in a row, the lower one often obscured or unintelligible. Henceforth every British unintelligible. Registered ship may make her number by one display of four flags, in the following manner.

Signals for ships numer Under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, every vessel has an appropriated special number, which, together with her original name, remains invariable, through all

changes of port or of ownership.

These official numbers are placed in order in the shipping lists, against the vessels to which they belong together with their four signal letters corresponding with four of the code flags, the numbers being successively, and the signal letters alphabetically arranged, after the manner of a dictionary. Any number, or the letters appropriated to it, can be easily found; and there is besides an alphabetical list of vessels, with their official numbers, for reference

Mercantile Navy List.

This voluminous shipping list, which enumerates upwards of thirty thousand British vessels, and is intended to include foreign vessels also, will be annually revised, so as to keep it correct, by adding new vessels and striking out those which cease to exist. For this reason it is published apart from the Signal Book, being, in fact, its necessary yearly appendage under the title of "The Mercantile Navy List." And in order that new vessels proceeding on voyages between the periods of annual publications may have the benefit of the new system at once, monthly supplements will be issued, the contents of each preceding supplement being

for international purposes are brought within included in the subsequent supplement, and the whole incorporated in the annual book at the end of the year. Another practical use of this regulation for identifying individual ships by four letters, will be the means it affords of reporting this information correctly, concisely, and cheaply, by electric telegraph-a consideration of no small importance.
