AT THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE AT AUCKLAND, THE TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY OF JUNE, 1859.

WHEREAS by the "Customs Regulation Act, 1858," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by Order in Council, published in the "New Zealand Gazette," from time to time to suspend during such time as may appear expedient, the ourner such time as may appear expedient, the operation of any provision of the said Act, either throughout the Colony, or in or at any particular district or port to be defined or specified for the purpose; and also to continue in force during such time as may appear expedient, any provisions of any Ordi-nance by the said Act expressed to be repealed.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the Ast day of January, 1859, the operation of Sections 127, 128, and 129 of the said Act, was suspended from the day of the date of the said Order until the 30th day of June, 1859, and by the same Order Section 53 of an Ordinance enacted by the Governor of New Zealand with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, intituled "An Ordinance to repeal within the said Colony of New Zealand an Act of the Governor and Council of New

South Wales passed in the third year of her pre-South Wales passed in the sink per sent Agest South wales passed in the sink per sent Agest of the sevenue of Cus-toms in New South Wales, and to provide for the general regulation thereof; and also, a certain other Act, of the said Governor and Council of New South Wales, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her said present Majesty, Queen Victoria, initialed, "An Act for increasing the duties on Spirits, Wine, and other goods and merchandize imported into the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies ; and which said Acts of the Governor and Council of New South Wales were adopted, and are now in force within the said Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies; and to make provision for the collection of certain duties on goods imported into, and for the general regulation of the Revenue of Customs in the Colony of New

Zealand and its Dependencies." Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, doth by this present Order further suspend the operation of sections 127, 128, and 129 of the said "Customs Regula-tion Act, 1858," until the 1st day of January 1860, and doth continue in force until the same day the operation of Section 53 of the said Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand, F. #### AT THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE AT AUCK-LAND, THE TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY OF JUNE, 1859.

#### PRESENT :

#### His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Richmond, | Mr. Whitaker, Mr. Tancred.

WHEREAS by the Harbour Regulations Ordinance, No. 15, of Session 2, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make all such Regulations respecting Pilots and Pilotage, Quarantine and Harbours, as in the said Ordinance provided.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, doth hereby make the following Regulations for the Ports and Harbours within the Province of Otago.

#### Pilots and Masters of Vessels.

1. No person shall be deemed a Pilot unless he be duly licensed by His Excellency the Governor.

2. All persons so licensed shall be provided with a License according to the form hereto annexed.

3. Every Pilot shall carry his License with him, and shall produce it to the Master of any Ship or Vessel on its being demanded or forfeit a sum not exceeding forty shillings.

feit a sum not exceeding forty shillings. 4. The Master of any Vessel employing other than a duly Licensed Pilot, if such shall have offered his services, shall forfeit double the amount of Pilotage.

5. Pilots are not bound to conduct any Vessel to sea until the payment of Pilotage has been satisfactorily secured.

6. Every Pilot detained on board a Vessel longer than forty-eight hours, whether by stress of weather, quarantine, or otherwise, is to be paid eight shillings per day in addition. So the regular Pilotage.

7. Any Master who shall make a signal for a Pilot to take his vessel to sea, and shall not, within twelve hours after the arrival of the Pilot or board such vessel, proceed to sea, shall forfeit and pay a sum at the rate of One Pound per day for every day such Pilot may be detained on board such vessel in addition to the regular Pilotage, and the Pilot shall not be compellable to take such vessel to sea until such forfeiture and Pilotage shall have been satisfactorily secured. Provided that no penalty or penalties under this regulation shall accumulate to a larger sum than twenty pounds.

8. Pilots refusing or neglecting their duty, are to forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

9. The Master of every Vessel shall anchor or moor where the Harbour Master or Pilot may direct, and he shall not unmoor or quit the anchorage until notice be given in writing at the Harbour Master's Office, and any Master offending against this Regulation shall forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds.

10. All Vessels must have buoys and buoy ropes to their anchors to show their position; and must hoist a conspicuous light at their peak end, and keep the same burning from sunset to sunrise or forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

11. All Vessels moored or at anchor are to have both cables clear, and in readiness to slack away when required, and any Master offending against this Regulation shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

exceeding ten pounds. 12. The rate of Pilotage shall be 3 shillings per foot in harbour, and one shilling per foot in any outer roadstead.

13. The Master of any Vessel neglecting to heave to and take on board the first duly licensed Pilot who shall offer his services, or refusing to accept of his services when offered, shall be liable to the same amount of Pilotage as if the services of such Pilot had been accepted, unless the Master of such Vessel is provided with a certificate of exemption (which may be granted by the Governor of the Colony or by the Superintendent of the Province) and has flown the exemption flag at the main from the time of his approaching within two leagues of any harbour in the Province, such exemption flag to consist of not less than six breadths of white bunting.

14. Any person who shall board any vesset arriving from a foreign port, before such vessel shall have been boarded by some person duly authorised in that behalf, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

#### Gunpowder.

15. The Master of every Vessel arriving with Gunpowder on board, exceeding fifty pounds in weight, shall give immediate notice thereof to the Pilot on his boarding the Vessel and shall land the same at the Powder Magazine before anchoring at the usual anchorage ground, or forfeit a sum not exceeding twentypounds.

16. No Gunpowder is to be either received or issued by the Keeper of the Magazine, er

and five in the afternoon.

17. The Master of every Vessel shall cause all Gunpowder to be conveyed to the Magazine immediately after its being landed, or forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds.

18. All Gunpowder so landed shall be packed in barrels containing not more than one hundredweight each, closely joined and hooped without any iron about the packages, and so secure that no portion of the Gunpowder be in danger of being scattered in the passage, and any person offending against this Regulation, shall incur a penalty of any sum not exceeding ten pounds.

#### Harbours.

19. No rubbish or filth is to be landed on any lands belonging to the Crown, except in such places as the Harbour Master may point out, and any person offending against this Regulation shall incur a penalty of any sum not exceeding five pounds.

20. No timber or any other article shall be

left on any Public Jetty, Wharf, or Landing imposed shall be recoverable in a summary way. Place or the approach thereto, for a longer NOTE.—Provision has been made for the period than six hours, and any person offending application to this Colony of the Passengers' against this Regulation shall incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds: And it shall be lawful for the Harbour Master, when in his opinion the public convenience requires it, at any time, during or after the expiry of such period, to cause such timber or other article immediately to be removed from any such Jetty, Wharf, or Landing Place, or approach thereto, at the expense and risk of the owner or his agent or the person in charge of such timber or other article.

21. No ballast, rubbish, gravel, earth, stone, or filth, is to be thrown overboard from any Vessel or Boat, but is to be landed at any place the Harbour Master may direct, and any per-son offending against this Regulation shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds 22. Any person removing, wilfully injuring

or destroying any Buoy, Beacon, or Sea Mark shall forfeit the sum of twenty pounds. 23. Any person throwing a dead animal into

the Harbour (within the limits of the anchorage), without attaching to it sufficient weight to sink it, or place any dead animal between high and low water marks shall incur a penalty of not more than twenty shillings, and not less than five shillings.

24. Vessels are prohibited from firing guns between the hours of sunset and sunrise, and on the Sabbath (except in case of distress), and any person offending against this Regulation shall incur a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

25. Any person removing shingle, stone, or any part of the soil below high water mark, without permission from the Harbor Master, or in the absence of the Harbor Master a Resident Magistrate, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds. 26. To the Master of every Vessel, or in the

absence of the Master, to the principal Officer on board, a copy of the Harbour Regulations shall be delivered by the Harbour Master, provided, however, that it shall not be necessary in any case to issue a second copy of the Regulations to the Master or Officer in charge of the same Vessel, unless on demand of such Master or Officer, and in such case only on the payment of a fee of two shillings and sixpence, to be accounted for by the Harbour Master.

27. Every Master or other Officer of a Ship or Vessel to whom a copy of the Harbour Regulations shall have been delivered, shall give on demand an acknowledgment thereof, to the Pilot or other Officer delivering the said copy, and any Pilot failing to demand, and any Master of a ship or vessel refusing on demand to give such acknowledgment, shall forfeit and pay a fine of not more than five pounds.

#### Power to Resident Magistrate in certain cases.

29. The Resident Magistrate at any Port for which no Harbour Master is appointed shall have all such powers as are hereinbefore given to Harbour Masters. All penalties hereby

#### QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

1. The Master of every Vessel arriving in the Harbour which shall be deemed by the Harbour Master or Pilot to be liable to quarantine, shall, on being directed so to do by the Harbour Master, cause the same to be anchored in the Quarantine Ground appointed for the Harbour, or in default thereof he shall forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred pounds.

2. The Master of every Vessel so anchored, shall neither himself quit, nor permit any Seaman, Passenger, or other person to quit the same until he shall have been duly admit. ted to pratique; and any Master infringing or permitting to be infringed this regulation, shall forfeit the sum of one hundred pounds.

3. Every Seaman, Passenger, or other person so quitting, shall, for every such offence, forfeit the sum of twenty pounds.

4. Every vessel so anchored is to hoist a yellow flag, of not less than six breadths of bunting, at the Main, by day, and a light by night in a lanthorn, such as is used in Her Majesty's Navy, and to keep the same respectively hoisted until released from Quarantine, or forfeit the sum of twenty pounds. 5. The Master of every Vessel so anchored

is to deliver to the Harbour Master or Pilot, or other authorised person, his Bill of Health, Manifest, Log-book, and Journal, and he is to fill up a Report in the form and manner pointed out in the Schedule A annexed.

6. The Master of every vessel so anchored, who shall suffer any goods, wares, or merchandize, packets, books, letters, or other articles, to be unshipped or landed, and any person or persons who shall be concerned in the unshipping or landing of the same, shall forfeit for each and every article so unshipped or landed, the sum of twenty pounds.

7. Every person or persons who shall knowingly receive any goods, wares, or merchandize, packets, package, baggage, books, or letters, or any other article whatever, from any vessel so anchored, shall forfeit for each and every article the sum of twenty pounds.

8. Any person going within the limits of any Quarantine Station, when any vessel shall be there at anchor, performing quarantine, shall forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

9. If any officer or person entrusted with orders respecting quarantine shall in any way neglect his duty, he shall forfeit for each offence the sum of twenty pounds.

10. The Harbour Master shall, immediately after his having so anchored any vessel, report the same to the Resident Magistrate and Health Officer, or to the person or persons acting, or appointed to act, for those functionaries.

11. The Resident Magistrate and Health Officer, or a Medical Practitioner appointed for that purpose by the Resident Magistrate, shall, upon the receipt of such report, visit the vessel so anchored; and if they shall find that any sickness of an infectious or contagious nature exists on board of her, they shall submit the information to a Board, consisting of the Resident Magistrate and one or mpre Justicer of the Peace, the superior Officer of Customs of the Port, and the Health Officer or Medical Practitioner, as aforesaid, to be convened for that purpose by the Resident Magistrate, which Board, or the majority of them, shall have authority to detain such vessel in quarantine until every symptom of the aforesaid disease has disappeared, when the same Board, or the majority of them, have hereby power to release such vessel from quarantine, and admit

her to pratique. 12. During the period any vessel may be in quarantize, the Resident Magistrate and Health Officer shall visit her alongside from time to time, and institute such Regulations as the nature of the case may demand, and the Master or Commander shall carry such Regulations into effect, or forfeit a sum not exceeding

twenty pounds. 13. All penalties hereby imposed shall be recovered in a summary way.
