PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Naturalization Act, 1858," it is enacted that every person who shall be declared to come within the operation of this Act by any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor, shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken, until the termination of the next Session of the General Assembly, to be and to have been, from such specified time, a natural-born subject of Her Majesty within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule hereunto annexed. Provided always, that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation, or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the person hereinafter mentioned, shall come within the operation of the said Act, from the date hereinafter specified, viz.:

SIMON ARONSON,

From the first day of January, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, Native of Holland, Watchmaker, residence Napier, Province of Hawke's Bay.

Know ye, that we have assigned you, and each and every of you, jointly and severally, to be our Justices of the Peace in the Province of Marlborough, in Our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, to keep and cause to be kept all Laws, Ordinances, and Statutes in force within the said Province, for the punishing of offenders, the preservation of the peace, and for the quiet rule, welfare, and good government of Our People in the said Province; and to have, exercise, and discharge all the powers, authorities, and duties belonging or pertaining to the office of a Justice of the Peace in the said Province.

And therefore We command you and each and every of you that to keep the Peace and all Laws, Ordinances, and Statutes, and all and singular other the Premises you diligently apply yourselves, and that, at certain days and places duly appointed or to be appointed for these purposes, into the Premises to make enquiry, and all and singular the Premises hear and determine and perform and fulfil them, doing therein what to justice appertains, according to the law and custom of England and of the said Province.

And we command all Our Sheriffs in the said Province at certain days and places appointed or to be appointed, to be aiding by all lawful means in the performance and due execution of the Premises.

In testimony whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of Our Colony to be hereunto affixed.

Witness Our Trusty and Well Beloved THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Esquire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of New Zealand, and its Dependencies, at Government House, at Auckland, in New Zealand aforesaid, this first day of November, in the Twenty-third year of Our reign, and in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.
