AT THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE AT AUCKLAND, THE SEVENTH DAY OF MAY, 1860.

Present :---

His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Whitaker. Mr. Tancred.

W HEREAS by the Harbor Regulations Ordinance, No. 15, of Session 2, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make all such Regulations respecting the placing of Vessels in Quarantine, and the performance of such Quarantine as may seem meet, and to appoint all such Officers, as may be accessary for the purpose of carrying such Regulations into effect.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of His Executive Council, doth hereby make the following Quarantine Regulations for the several Ports and Harbours in the Colony of New Zealand; and doth declare that the same shall be in force from and after the 1st day of Jnne next.

QUARANTINE REGULATIONS.

1. The Master of every Vessel arriving at any Harbor, which shall be deemed by the Harbour Master, to be liable to Quarantine, shall, on being directed so to do by the Harbour Master, cause the same to be anchored in the Quarantine Ground appointed for the Harbor, or forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of One Handred Pounds.

2. The Master of every Vessel so anchored, shall neither himself quit, nor permit any Seaman, Passenger, or other person to quit the same, until he shall have been duly admitted to pratique, or forfeit the sum of One Hundred Pounds.

3. Every Seaman, Passenger, or other Person so quitting, shall for every such offence forfeit the sum of Twenty Pounds.

4. Every Vessel so anchored is to hoist a yellow flag, of not less than six breadths of bunting at the main by day, and a light by night in a lanthorn, such as is used in Her Majesty's Navy; and to keep the same respectively hoisted uutil released from Quarantine, or forfeit the sum of Twenty Pounds.

5. The Master of every Vesssl so anchored is to deliver to the Harbour Master, or other authorised person, his Bill of Health, Manifest, Log Book, and Journal, and he is to fill up a Report in the manner pointed out in the Schedule A annexed.

6. The Master of every Vessel so anchored who shall suffer any Goods, Wares or Merchandise, Packets, Books, Letters or other Articles, to be unshipped or landed, and any person or persons who shall be concerned in the unshipping or landing of the same, shall forfeit for each and every Article so unshipped or landed, the sum of Twenty Pounds.

7. Every person or persons who shall knowingly receive any Goods, Wares, or Merchandise, Packets, Package, Baggage, Books, or Letters, or any other Article whatever, from any Vessel so anchored, shall forfeit for each and every article the sum of Twenty Pounds.

8. Any person going within the limits of any Quarantine Station when any Vessels shall be there at anchor, performing Quarantine, shall forfeit any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

9. If any Officer or Person entrusted with Orders respecting Quarantine, shall in any way neglect his duty he shall forfeit for such offence the sum of Twenty Pounds.

10. The Harbour Master shall, immediately after his having so anchored any Vessel, report the same to the Resident Magistrate and Health Officer or to the Person or Persons acting or appointed to act for those functionaries.

11. The Resident Magistrate and Health Officer or Medical Practitioner to be appointed from time to time for that purpose by the Resident Magistrate shall, upon the receipt of such Report, visit the Vessel so anchored, and if they shall find that any sickness of an infectious or contagious nature exists or shall have then recently existed on board of her, they shall submit the information to a Board consisting of the Resident Magistrate, one or more Justices of the Peace, the Superior Officer of the Customs of the Port, the Health Officer or Medical Practitioner as aforesaid, and one or more legally qualified Medical Practitioners nominated for this purpose by the Resident Magistrate, such Board to be convened by the Resident Magistrate, which Board, or the majority of them, sha'l have authority to detain such Vessel in Quarantine until every symptom of the aforesaid disease shall have disappeared, and until sufficient time to prevent the spread of such disease shall, in the opinion of the Board, have elapsed since the last case disappeared, when the same Board or the Majority of them have hereby power to release such vessel from Quarantine and admit

her to pratique. 12. During the period any vessel may be in Quarantine, the Resident Magistrate and Health Officer shall visit her alongside from time to time and institute such Regulations as the nature of the case may demand, and the Master or Commander shall carry such Regulations into effect, or forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

Power to Resident Magistrate's in certain cases.

The Resident Magistrate, at any Port for which no Harbour Master is appointed, shall have all such powers as are hereinbefore given to Harbour Masters. All penalties hereby im-posed, shall be recoverable in a summary way.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR. MR. WHITAKER.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, initialed "The Militia Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make, vary, and abolish Regulations under which the services of Volunteers shall be accepted in any Militia District. Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, and in exercise of the powers in this behalf vested in him by the said recited Act, doth hereby make and ordain the following Regulations, under which the services of Volunteers shall be accepted in the District of Auckland.

1. The term of service for each Volunteer | vary the month appointed for the preparation to be one year from the day his services are or in the case of Volunteers already enrolled, were accepted : Provided always that if any Volunteer shall go to reside out of the District, he shall, if he desires, be discharged from further service as a Volunteer.

2. Every Volunteer shall attend to be trained and exercised at such times as shall be appointed by the Governor, or by such person or persons as he may from time to time authorise in that behalf: Provided always that no Volunteer shall be compelled to attend more than one hundred and sixty-eight hours in any one year.

3. Every Volunteer who shall absent himself during any part of the time appointed for training or exercise, and shall not account for such absence to the satisfaction of the Senior Officer of his Company, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one pound for every day on which he shall so be absent, to be recovered in a summary way.

4. All Commissioned Officers of Companies will be appointed by the Governor, and names for that purpose are to be submitted to him for his approval by the Company to which they are proposed to be appointed.

5. All Sergeants and Corporals must be examined and passed as competent by the Senior Officer of the Company before they are appointed by the Commanding Officer.

6. All orders and communications from the Governor, or Government of the Colony, shall be transmitted through, and given out by, the the Commanding Officer.

7. If any arms, accoutrements, or other Government property shall be injured or destroyed by being used except on service, a fine, not exceeding the value of the arms, accoutrements, or other property, shall be paid by the Volunteer in whose charge they were ; such fine to be fixed by the Adjutant and the Captain of the Company, upon consideration of the circumstances, and if not paid to the Adjutant on demand, may be recovered by him on behalf of the Government in any Resident Magistrate's Court in the Colony.

8. Volunteers enrolled under these Regulations shall be subject to the provisions contained in the following sections of the "Militia Act, 1858," namely, sections, 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 18, 19, 20, 21 (except the Proviso thereto), 22, 23, and 24.

And whereas certain aboriginal natives of the colony of New Zealand are in arms against the Queen's soveriegn authority, and it is therefore expedient that the exportation of warlike stores to such colony be prohibited : Now, therefore, I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power vested in me in that be-half by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit, the ex-portation from any port or place in Victoria aforesaid of Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, or any articles which may be converted to a military or naval purpose, except in manner and subject to the conditions

hereinafter mentioned or referred to, that is to say :--From and after the date hereof, Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, or other warlike stores shall and may be exported only under license, in writing, first obtained for that purpose under the hand of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, for the time being, and only at the place, in the manner, and subject to the conditions (if any) specified in such license : Provided always that nothing in this proelamation shall be construed to apply to the exportation of supplies for the use of Her Maiesty's land and sea forces.

LEADING LIGHT AT WARRNAMBOOL.

WIFH reference to a Notice to Mariners issued from this Office, dated the 28th May, 1859, respecting the second light at Warrnambool :-

Notice is hereby given that on and after the 25th instant, between sunset and sunrise, a fixed red light will be exhibited from a tower situated on the beach, just above high water mark, in a line with the two white obelisks, and bearing from the Middle Island Lighthouse N. 37° 30' E.

The Leading Light will, in ordinary weather, be seen three miles to seaward; it is masked in the direction of the outer reefs, and visible from S. 1.° 30' E. to S. 20 ° 30' E., thus only illuminating an arc of nineteen degrees. Bearings magnetic.

date of this Notice, will be seized accordingly. Provided that, if in any case it shall be shewn, to the satisfaction of the Governor, that the shipment of such stores was ordered pre-viously to the publication of this Notice, and that there was no opportunity of countermand-ing such shipment, License may be granted to export the same.

Persons desirous of importing Arms, Gunpowder, and other Warlike Stores, must, in future, make application for License to import such stores previously to ordering the shipment thereof to the Colony.

This notice is not to apply to Arms and Ammunition imported in reasonable quantities for the personal use of the Importer, as to which it will be sufficient to apply for a License after the arrival of the importing ship. C. W. RICHMOND.
