HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL,
WHEREAS by the Harbour Regulations Ordinance, No. 15, of Session II., it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make all such Regulations respecting Pilots and Pilotage, Quarantine and Harbours, as in the said Ordinance provided: And whereas by an Order in Council made on the Twenty-third day of February last the Governor in Council did make certain Regulations for the Port and Harbour of Auckland, and it is expedient to amend the same in manner hereafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor in Council doth hereby make the following additional Regulation for the said Port and Harbour.

Any person landing Cattle from any vessel or boat in the Suburbs of Auckland between the hours of eight (8) in the morning and eight (8) in the evening, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds for every such offence.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled the "Militia Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to constitute throughout the Colony, or in any part thereof, Militia Districts, and such Districts from time to time to abolish, and the boundaries thereof to vary, and to designate the Militia of any such District by the name of a Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Company as he shall think fit.

And whereas at an Executive Council held at the Government House at Auckland aforesaid on the Twenty-seventh day of February last His Excellency the Governor did constitute (amongst other Militia Districts) a Militia District to be called and known by the name of the

WAIARAPA MILITIA DISTRICT,
and did define the boundaries of such District

to be the circumference of a circle whereof the radius extends thirty miles from the Police Office in Grey Town.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council in exercise of the above recited power, doth by the present order vary the boundaries of the said District of Wairarapa and doth order that such District shall be the District comprised within the circumference of a circle whereof the radius extends Thirty miles from the Post Office in Grey Town.

WHEREAS by the "Post Office Act, 1858," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make rules and regulations for the managing of the several Post Offices for the receiving, despatching, conveying, and delivering of letters (including the imposition of fees for private boxes and deliveries) for the detaining, opening, and return or other disposal of irregularly posted, unclaimed, and refused letters, or such as from any cause whatever cannot be delivered or forwarded, and the contents thereof respectively, and for the publication of the lists of the same, for the making, custody, and sale of Postage Labels, for the receiving and paying of money in connection with the said postal service, and for the conduct of Post Officers, and any such Rules and Regulations at any time in force to alter, vary, or revoke: And whereas in pursuance and exercise of the said recited power and authority, His Excellency the Governor in Council, did by a Proclamation bearing date the 13th day of January, 1859, make certain Rules and Regulations for the management of the Post Offices, and for the guidance of the Officers therein employed:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, doth by this present Order, in pursuance and further exercise of the said recited power and authority, make the following additional Rule and Regulation.

No Postmaster shall be required to Register any letter tendered to him for that purpose, unless the same shall have been presented to him for Registration at least one hour before the time advertised for the closing of the Mail by which the said letter is desired to be forwarded.

SIR—I transmit to you herewith copies of new Regulations which have been issued by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, affecting Candidates for Naval Cadetships. These Regulations will come into operation on 1st April next.

NAVAL CADETS.

(The following Regulations will come into operation in regard to persons nominated to Naval Cadetships on or after the 1st of April, 1860.)

I. No Person will be nominated to a Cadetship in the Royal Navy, who shall be under 12 or above 14 years of age at the time of his first Examination.*

II. Every Candidate, on obtaining a nomination, will be required to pass an Examination at the Royal Naval College at Portsmouth, within three months of nomination. In the special cases of nominations granted to the sons of natives of Her Majesty's Colonies, a Candidate will be allowed to pass a preliminary examination on board the Flag or Senior Officer's Ship on the Station; but such examination must be passed in strict accordance with these regulations, and should the Candidate be found qualified, it will still be necessary that he should be sent to England, to be entered on board a Training Ship where he will be subject to the same regulations as other Cadets.

III. The Candidate must produce a Certificate of Birth, or Declaration thereof made before a Magistrate.

IV. The Candidate must be in good health and fit for the Service, that is, free from impe-

diment of speech, defect of vision, rupture, or other physical inefficiency.

Candidates will be required—

1. To write English correctly from dictation, and in a legible hand.
2. To read, translate, and parse any easy passage from Latin or from some Foreign Living Language.

N.B.—The aid of a Dictionary will be allowed for these Translations.

And to have a satisfactory knowledge of—

3. The leading facts of Scripture and English History.
4. Modern Geography, in so far as relates to a knowledge of the principal Countries, Capitals, Mountains, and Rivers. To be able to point out the position of a place on a Map when its Latitude and Longitude is given.
5. Arithmetic, including Proportion and a fair knowledge of Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.
6. A knowledge of the Definitions and Axioms of the first Book of Euclid.

As Drawing will prove a most useful qualification for Naval Officers, it is recommended that Candidates for the Service should be instructed therein.

V. If the Candidate be found unqualified at his first Examination, he will be allowed a second trial at the next Quarterly Examination. Should he not pass this second Examination, he will be finally rejected.

VI. If the Candidate succeeds in passing the required Examination, he will be at once appointed to a Training Ship for the purpose of instruction, Rigging of Ships, Seamanship, the use of Nautical Instruments, &c.

- Sextant.
- Case of Mathematical Instruments, containing a good Protractor.
- Spy Glass.
- French Grammar and a Dictionary containing Sea Terms.
- A Book on Navigation.
- Euclid's Elements.
- Book of Geography. (Sullivan's 2s. Ed.)
- Book on use of Mathematical and Nautical Instruments.
- A Book on the Steam Engine.
- Colenso's Arithmetic and Algebra.
- Jean's Trigonometry.
- Boyd's Naval Cadet's Manual.

The Ship's Library will contain Books of Instruction.

* These Examinations will take place on the first Wednesdays, in the Months of March, June, September, and December.

THE following Report of an analysis of a sample of Coal procured from the Grey District, on the West Coast of the Province of Nelson, is published for general information.

SIR,—In accordance with your request, I have examined the Coals from the West Coast which you forwarded to me for analysis, I now beg to communicate the result. I may here state that the opinion which I gave you on the 10th instant, from my first cursory test, is now verified by my more recent investigation, which has been carefully conducted under various methods, the results of three of these I submit, with comparisons in accordance with the respective *modus operandi* :—

The West Coast Coals burn with a clear flame and run together in one mass when thoroughly heated, and produce very little residue. The accompanying parcels are Cinder, Coke, and Ash.

I cannot help congratulating you and my fellow settlers on this occasion upon having at your command a commodity that is applicable for steam purposes, an article so essentially necessary for our domestic comforts, for our manufactures as the Colony advances, and for exportation.

I only trust that sufficient quantities may be found of a similar quality (although the samples are from the surface) and it will inevitably at no remote period find its way to our market, and be a source of incalculable good to our community.
