PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel Thomas Gore Browne, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly intituled "The Gold Fields' Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time by Proclamation to constitute and appoint any portion of the Colony to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the said Act, and the limits of such Gold Field from time to time to alter as occasion may require:

And whereas by a Proclamation duly made and issued, dated the fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, I did, in pursuance of the said power and authority, establish and appoint all that territory therein described to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the said Act, and by a further Proclamation duly made and issued, dated the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, did alter the limits thereof so as to exclude from the said limits and from the operation of the said Act the district known as the "Town of Collingwood": And whereas it is expedient further to alter the limits of the said Gold Field, in manner hereinafter set forth and declared,—

Now, therefore, I, Thomas Gore Browne, the Governor, as aforesaid, of the said Colony, do hereby in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, alter the limits of the said Gold Field, and do constitute and appoint all the territory hereinafter described to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—All that territory whereof the boundary commences at Rangihaeata Head at the mouth of the river Takaka, thence up the Western bank of that river to its junction with the Anatoke river, thence up the Eastern bank of that river to the Western angle of Section numbered 136 of Square numbered 11 on the Map of the Province of Nelson, thence following the Western boundary of the surveyed lands in the districts of Takaka and of Upper Takaka respectively to the South-western angle of Section numbered 14 of Square numbered 8 on the said Map, thence along the Southern boundary of Sections numbered 14 and 3 of the said Square numbered 8 on the said Map to the Takaka river, thence up the said river to its junction with the Waituhi stream, thence up the said stream to its source near Mount Campbell, thence along the watershed of Blind Bay and of the valley of the river Takaka to the source of that river at Mount Arthur, thence in a straight line to the source of the Karamea or Mackay river, thence down that river to its junction with the sea, thence along the sea coast to the North head of the Whakapohai or Heaphy river, thence along the Wha. kamarama range to the summit of Mount Burnett, thence by a line to the mouth of the

Ruataniwha river, thence by the sea coast to Land Regulations: And Whereas it is expethe mouth of the Aorere river, thence following dient to make such angmentation in the price the seaward boundaries of the Sections numbered 237 and 238 of the Suburbs of Collingwood to the North-west angle of the Township of Collingwood, thence following the inland boundary of that Township and of the Native Reserve called "Papakowhai" to the sea, thence by the sea coast to the commencing point at the mouth of the Takaka river.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Waste Lands Act, 1858," it is enacted that if at any time the Superintendent and Provincial Council of any Province shall recommend to the Governor that an augmentation should be made in the price at which

the Waste Lands of the Crown within such Province shall be offered for sale, either by selection or by auction, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, if he think fit, to fix such price accordingly: And Whereas on the 18th day of July, 1860, it was resolved by the Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, in session assembled, that the said Council do recommend the Governor to augment from ten shillings to one pound the price at which Rural Waste Land of the Crown within the said Province shall be offered for sale by selection or auction, whenever such land shall be applied for by more than one applicant on the same day, as provided for by the 11th clause of the Waste Land Regulations of the said Province, mentioned in the schedule to the said Act: And Whereas by a writing under the hand of James Macandrew, Esquire, the Superintendent of the said Province, bearing date the said 18th day of July, it is witnessed that he the said Superintendent did concur in the above recited resolution of the said Provincial Council, and did recommend the Governor to augment from ten shillings to one pound, the price at which Rural Waste Land of the Crown within the said Province shall be offered for sale by selection or by auction, whenever such land shall be applied for by more than one applicant on the same day, as provided for by the said 11th clause of the said Waste

dient to make such angmentation in the price at which the said Waste Lands of the Crown within the said Province of Otago shall be offered for sale,

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, doth hereby order and fix that the price per acre at which Rural Waste Land of the Crown within the said Province of Otago shall be offered for sale by selection or by auction whenever such land shall be applied for by more than one applicant on the same day, as provided for by the 11th clause of the Waste Land Regulations of the said Province mentioned in the schedule to the said Act, shall be the sum of one pound.

And doth declare that this Order shall come into operation and take effect on the First day of November next.

THEREAS by the "Post Office Act, 1858," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to make Rules and Regulations for the managing of the several Post Offices, for the receiving, despatching, conveying, and delivering of letters (including the imposition of fees for private boxes and deliveries,) for the detaining, opening, and return or other disposal of irregularly posted, unclaimed, or refused letters, or such as from any

cause whatever cannot be delivered or forwarded, and the contents thereof respectively, and for the publication of the lists of the same, for the making, custody, and sale of postage labels, for the receiving and paying of money in con-nection with the said Postal service, and for the conduct of post officers, and any such Rules and Regulations at any time in force to alter, vary, or revoke: And whereas, in pursuance and exercise of the said recited power and authority, His Excellency the Governor in Council did, by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, make certain Rules and Regulations for the management of the Post Offices, and for the guidance of the officers therein employed; and further, by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-fifth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, did make certain additional Rules and Regulations for the purpose aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Gover-nor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth, by this present Order, in pursuance and further exercise of the said recited power and authority, make the following additional Rules and Regulations:-

9. Every packet intended to be transmitted as a book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover, open at the ends or sides, and the full postage thereof must be prepaid.

10. The packet may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum (to the exclusion, however, of letters, whether sealed or open), and the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c., may be either written, printed, or plain, or any mixture of the three. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, &c., or of a portion thereof, will be allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, and in short whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto.

11. The packet must not contain any letter, closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor must there be any letter, or any communication of the nature of a letter, written or printed in any

such packet or on its cover.

12. No book packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length or one foot in width or depth.

13. Any packet which shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall have any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter written or printed in it or upon its cover, is charged with letter postage.

14. No Postmaster shall be required to accept for transmission by any overland mail a book packet, which from its weight or for any other reason, may appear calculated to retard the carrier or otherwise to cause inconvenience.

SIR,—I transmit for your information, the copy of a Letter from the Secretary to the General Post Office, notifying the change in the days of making up the Mails to and from Australia viâ Ceylon.

I have, &c., NEWCASTLE.

Governor Gore Browne, C.B., &c., &c.,

> General Post Office, London, 11th June, 1860.

SIR,-I am directed by the Postmaster General to acquaint you, that the Mails for the Australian Colonies and New Zealand, intended to be forwarded from this country via Southampton, will in future be made up in London on the morning of the 20th of each month, instead of on the 12th, and the Mails to be forwarded viâ Marseilles will be made up on the evening of the 26th, instead of on the 18th of the month.

On those occasions when the 20th of the month falls on Sunday, the Mails for Australia will be made up on the previous evening, and when the 26th of the month falls on Sunday, the Mails will be made up on the following evening.

In consequence of this alteration, Mails for Ceylon will no longer be despatched on the

12th and 18th of the month.

Commencing with the month of July, the homeward Mails will henceforth be despatched from Melbourne on the 26th of each month, and ought to arrive with the Mails from Calcutta and China, due at Marseilles on the 10th, and at Southampton on the 18th, of every month.
