*Appointment of certain Persons to consider objections made against the issue of a Patent to John Probert.*

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS John Probert, of Auckland, has applied for Letters Patent under the "Patents Act, 1860," for an invention for making Flax from the Phormium Tenax, and has delivered the descriptions, specifications, drawings and other things, and given the notices in manner required by the said Act; And whereas George Cole, of Papakura, within the

time and in manner set forth in the said recited Act, has objected to the issue of such Letters Patent to the said John Probert on the grounds following, that is to say:—

First,—“That for years he (Mr. Cole) has been making flax on the same principles.”

Secondly,—“That Mr. Augustus Bell is now making it on the same principles.”

Thirdly,—“That the principle of Mr. Probert's machine is the same as his (Mr. Cole's) in the formation of the revolving wheel armed with iron called beaters, or scrapers, or knives.”

Fourthly,—“That his (Mr. Cole's) invention is the same as he claims in the action of the armed wheels against wooden or iron blocks.”

Fifthly,—“That his (Mr. Cole's) invention is the same as he claims in the action of the feed rollers pushing the leaf of flax between the armed wheels and wooden block.”

Sixthly,—“That his (Mr. Cole's) invention is the same as he claims in the use of the endless band for conveying away the prepared fibre from the machine.”

And the said George Cole has deposited the sum of Ten pounds as required by the said Act; Now therefore I, Thomas Gore Browne, the Governor of the said Colony, do hereby appoint

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

##### *Dangerous Rock off the mouth of the River Glenely.*

In May last, Mr. Walsh, master of the s. steamer "Ruby," reported, that on his passage from this port to Port Macdonnell he had discovered a rock about four feet above water.

Notice is hereby given that the Harbor Master of Portland Bay has fixed the position of this danger, by triangulation from the shore, to be in lat.  $38^{\circ} 6' 45''$  S. and long.  $140^{\circ} 51' E.$ , about three miles off shore, and about twelve (12) miles to the Eastward of Cape Northumberland.

Commanders of vessels and others in possession of charts of the coast between Cape Bridgewater and Cape Nelson are recommended to mark this danger on their charts as the "Ruby" rock.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

"Pelorus" at Sea,

Lat.  $18^{\circ} 40'$  South, Long.  $172^{\circ} 53'$  East,  
26th July, 1861.

SIR,—I have the honor to acquaint your Excellency that at 9.15 a.m. on the 12th instant, while on her passage from New Zealand

to the Fiji's, Pylstant Island in sight, bearing  $N. 23^{\circ} E.$  (true), 37 miles, Her Majesty's Ship under my command passed within 650 yards of a reef not laid down in any chart in our possession.

2. It is about a quarter of a mile in length from East to West. There does not appear to be more than one or two fathoms water on the Western end, at the extremity of which breakers were visible, it lies in Latitude  $22^{\circ} 55' 15'' S.$ , and Longitude  $176^{\circ} 27' 50'' W.$ , and being situated directly in the track of vessels bound from New Zealand to the windward Islands of the Fiji group, is very dangerous to the navigation of these seas.

3. I have further to acquaint you that after dark on the evening of the 12th instant, while steering N.W. under reduced sail, the leadman in the fore chains reported soundings in 7 fathoms, followed by two casts of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms and 6 fathoms respectively. The ship was immediately brought to the wind and tacked but no soundings having afterwards been obtained either with the hand lead or the deep sea line with 63 fathoms out, she was brought to her former course. This bank, if it exist, is situated in Latitude  $21^{\circ} 43' 00'' S.$ , Longitude  $176^{\circ} 42' 00'' W.$

4. On my arrival at Ovalau I was informed by H.B.M. Consul for the Fiji's that the Natives of the Tonga Islands, who maintain much intercourse with the Fiji group, by means of their large canoes, are aware of the existence of many shoals between Tongatabu and the Ono Islands, but are unable to define their position. The only bank of which any reliable information could be procured was one of some extent having 22 fathoms of water on it which was discovered in August, 1860, by three American Whalers cruising in company, and which by the mean of their observations lies in Latitude  $22^{\circ} 43' 00'' S.$ , Longitude  $176^{\circ} 11' 0'' W.$
