Constituting a certain Public Gaol in the Province of Otago.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS power is vested in the Governor of New Zealand by Proclamation to declare any House, Building, Enclosure, or Place to be a Public Gaol :

Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor as aforesaid, do hereby declare and Proclaim that all those Stone, Wood, and Iron Buildings fronting Stuart-street, and situate on Reserve No. 3, in the City of Dunedin, shall be and be used as a Public Gaol.

Disallowing certain Otago Provincial Ordinances.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight, Commander of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament, holden in the Fifteenth and Sixteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent, as in the said Act provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him, to declare by Proclamation his disallowance of such Bill, and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same from and after the day of the date of such Proclamation, or any subsequent date to be named therein:

And whereas the Ordinances hereinafter specified have been enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice

and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, and the said Ordinances were received by the Governor on the Second day of February, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinances should be disallowed:

Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Ordinances passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, viz.:—

“The Executive Council Ordinance, 1862,”

“Sunday Observance Ordinance, 1862,”

“The Dunedin Municipal Estate Ordinance, 1862.”

A PROCLAMATION

For the Naturalization of certain Persons.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by “The Naturalization Act, 1862,” it is enacted that every person who shall be declared to come within the operation of that Act by any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor, shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken until the termination of the next Session of the General Assembly, to be, and to have been from such specified time, a natural-born subject of Her Majesty, within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule to that Act annexed. Provided always that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation:

Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the persons hereinafter mentioned shall come within the operation of the said Act from the dates hereinafter specified, viz.:—

MARTIN WAGNER,

From the Twenty-eighth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, Native of Germany, Storekeeper, residence Kaiapoi, in the Province of Canterbury.

JOSEPH FOSBINDER,

From the First day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two Native of Germany, Groom, residence Invercargill, in the Province of Southland.

HEINRICH DALLWIG,

From the Twenty-fifth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, Native of Germany, Carpenter, residence Invercargill, in the Province of Southland.

ORDER IN COUNCIL

Authorising further issue of Treasury Bills.

At the Government House at Auckland, the 17th day of January, 1863.

Present:—

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the “Loan Act, 1862,” power is given to raise in Great Britain a Loan of £500,000 for the Public Service of the Colony, and it is enacted that until the aforesaid sum of Five Hundred Thousand Pounds shall be raised in Great Britain, it shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer, if thereunto authorised by an

Order of the Governor in Council, from time to time to borrow and take up at interest at a rate not exceeding Six pounds per centum per annum, payable out of the Ordinary Revenue, any sums of money not exceeding in the whole One hundred thousand pounds, on the security of Treasury Bills payable at the expiration of a term not exceeding twelve months from the date thereof. And whereas the sum of £25,000 has already been raised in manner above prescribed, in virtue of an Order in Council dated 21st November 1862, and it has become necessary to borrow a further sum of £30,000 in anticipation of the said Loan :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby authorise the Honorable Reader Gilson Wood, Colonial Treasurer of New Zealand, to borrow and take up a further sum or sums not exceeding in the whole the sum of Thirty thousand pounds sterling, and to issue Treasury Bills therefor on the terms and subject to the conditions before recited.

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTIONS

TO OFFICERS IN THE

BRITISH POSSESSIONS ABROAD.

Merchant Shipping Acts, &c. Amendment Act, 1862.

25 & 26 Vict. c. 63.

The attention of Officers in H.M. Possessions abroad is directed to the following provisions of the above Act, a copy of which is sent with this Circular.

Section 19. Provides that Seaman's wages paid abroad shall if possible be paid in money, and not by bill. It also gives facilities for recovering on bills drawn for payment of wages. Special care should be taken that such an endorsement as is required by Section 209 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, is made upon the bill by the Officer duly appointed in that behalf.

Section 20. Provides that the wages and effects of Seamen who have belonged to a British ship within six months of the time of their death shall, if their death happens abroad, be treated in the same manner as the wages and effects of Seamen dying on board.

This would not, however, apply to the case of a Seaman dying in the Colony or Possession to which he belongs, or in which his relations reside.

Section 21. Affords facilities for the recovery of wages due to men who are lost with their ship.

Section 22. Enacts that the claim of Seamen to be relieved abroad or sent home in pursuance of Sections 211 and 212 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, shall be subject to such regulations and dependent on such conditions as the Board of Trade may from time to time make or impose.

Section 23. Gives to Courts of Inquiry duly instituted in any British Possession to investigate the cause of wreck or the conduct of Masters, Mates, and Engineers in the British Merchant Service, the power (hitherto exclusively exercised by the Board of Trade) of cancelling or suspending certificates of competency or service; and

Section 24. Gives such Courts the power, which they did not previously possess, of demanding the delivery to them of a certificate pending the trial of the offender.

My Lords desire *particularly* to impress upon all Officers and Functionaries in the Colonies and Possessions abroad concerned in the conduct of the inquiries above referred to the necessity of a *rigid compliance* with the requirements in

paragraph 6 of the 23d section above referred to, and to point out that unless it is in future shown upon the face of the report of a Court of Inquiry that these requirements have been *strictly observed*, it will not be in the power of this Board to withhold a certificate that may have been cancelled or suspended abroad, and the intention of the Act will be frustrated, as incompetent Officers may escape just punishment if there be any *informality* in the proceedings of such Courts.

Referring to the proviso in Section 242 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854 (para. 5), it is important that in every case the report of a Court of Inquiry *should be confirmed* by the Governor or person administering the Government of the Colony or Possession in which the Inquiry is held.

Reports and evidence should in future, if possible, be sent in original, or if copies, they must be *certified*.
