# PROCLAMATION.

Disallowing the Otago Criminals Ordinance, 1862.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight, Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

&c., &c., &c.

W HEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent as in the said Act provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him to declare by Proclamation his disallowance of such Bill, and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same from and after the day of the date of such Proclamation, or any subsequent day to be named therein:

And whereas the Ordinance hereinafter specified has been enacted by the Superintendent of Otago, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, and the

said Ordinance was received by the Governor on the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinance should be disallowed,

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, viz.:—

"The Criminals' Ordinance, 1862."

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Crown Lands Act, 1862," it is enacted that the said Act shall come into operation in each Province of New Zealand on and from a day to be fixed by the Governor in Council, to be notified in the Government Gazette of the Colony, and also of the Province to which such notification shall apply:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth

hereby order that the "Crown Lands Act, 1862," shall come into operation within each of the aftermentioned Provinces of New Zealand, namely, the Provinces of Auckland, Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Taranaki, Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago, and Southland, on and from the sixth day of April next.

SIR,—I have the honour to transmit to you, at the request of the Civil Service Commissioners, the enclosed Regulations for an Examination of Candidates for the Civil Service of India, to be held in London in the month of June or July, 1863.

# EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

# Regulations.

1. In June or July 1863, an Examination of candinates will be held in London. Not candidates will be selected, less than if so many shall be found duly qualified. Of these, will be selected for the Presidency of Bengal, for that of Madras, and for that of Bombay.\*—Notice will hereafter be given of the days and place of examination.

2. Any natural-born subject of Her Majesty, who shall be desirous of entering the Civil Service of Iudia, will be entitled to be examined at such Examination, provided he shall, on or before the 1st May 1863, have transmitted to the Civil Service Commissioners, Dean's Yard, London, S.W,

(a) A certificate of his birth, showing that his age on the 1st May 1863 will be above eighteen and under twenty-two years;

(b) A certificate, signed by a physician or surgeon, of his having no disease, constitu-tional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him for the Civil Service of India;

(c) Satisfactory proof of good moral

character;

(d) A statement of those of the branches of knowledge herein-after enumerated in which he desires to be examined.

3. In any case in which a doubt may arise as to the eligibility of a candidate in respect of age, health, or character, such inquiries as may be necessary will be instituted by the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. The Examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge\*:

NOTE .- It should be understood that candidates are at liberty to name at their pleasure any or all of these branches of knowledge (subject only to the restriction above mentioned as to natural science) and that no subjects are obligatory.

English Language and Literature.-Composition **50**0 English Literature and History, including that of the Laws and 1,000 Constitution 1,500 Language, Literature, and History of Greece - -750

Marks.

\*\_\* No candidate will be allowed to be examined in more than three of the branches of knowledge included under this head, and the total (500 marks) may be obtained by adequate proficiency in any three.

7,375 5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of Examination unless he shall be considered to possess a competent

knowledge of that subject.

7. The Examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by viva voce Examination as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India. They shall be permitted to chose, according to the order in which they stand, as long as a choice remains, the Presidency to which they shall be appointed

9. In June or July 1864, a further Examina. tion of the selected candidates will take place

in the following subjects:-

Marks.

Sanskirt -500 Vernacular Languages of India 350 (each) -

\* \*\* Each candidate may name one or two languages. If he name one only, he must name either Sanskrit or a vernacular language current in the Presidency which he has selected.

2. The History and Geography of 500

3. The General Principles of Jurisprudence and the elements of Hindu and Mohammedan Law 1,000

4. Political Economy 500

In this, as in the preceding Examination, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. The Examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by viva voce Examination, as may be deemed necessary.

10. No candidate will be permitted to proceed to India until he shall have passed the Further Examination, or after he shall have at-

tained the age of twenty four years.

11. The selected candidates who at the Further Examination shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, shall be adjudged to have passed, and to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India.

12. The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates shall be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the Further

Examination.

13. No person will, even after passing the Further Examination, be allowed to proceed to India unless he shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for the Civil Service of India, and shall be of sound bodily health and good moral character. - The Civil Service Commissioners will require such further evidence on these points as they may deem necessary before granting their Certificate of Qualification.

14. Applications from persons desirous to be admitted as candidates are to be addressed to the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, Dean's Yard, London, S.W.

Note.—(1.) All persons appointed to the Civil Service will be required to attend at the India Office, to make the necessary arrangements for entering into covenant, and for giving a bond for 1,000l., jointly with two sureties, for the due fulfilment of the same. The stamps payable by civilians on their appointment amount to 3l. 10s.

(2.) The Secretary of State for India in Council has authorised the Civil Service Commissioners to state that, with the view of meeting the expenses to be incurred by selected candidates during the interval which must elapse before they can proceed to India, it is his intention to allow the sum of 100l. to each selected Candidate who shall have passed the Further Examination in 1864 to the satisfaction of the Commissioners, and shall have complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates.

(3.) Candidates are at liberty to send in their names and evidence of are as soon as they think fit to do so; but evidence of health and character must bear date not earlier than the 1st March

(4.) Candidates rejected at the Further Examination of 1864 will in no case be allowed to present themselves for reexamination in 1865.

Sir,—I have to inform you that new Postal Conventions have been concluded between this Country and Prussia, Bremen, and Hamburg, which will come into operation on the 1st January next; and that thenceforward the following will be the rates of postage (British and Foreign combined) to be collected on Letters posted in New Zealand sent through the United Kingdom to Germany and to certain Countries, the correspondence of which passes through Germany:—

Letters addressed to any of the Countries enumerated above may be registered, if the writers desire it; but upon all such Letters the postage must be paid in advance. In addition to the postage due to this Office and to half the fee chargeable for registration between and the United Kingdom, a Foreign registration fee of sixpence must be accounted for to this Office. And upon Registered Letters for Russia and Poland, a further registration fee of fourpence per half-ounce, in addition, must be collected and accounted for to this Office.

The rates set forth in the above Table are to be accounted for to this Office, and must be levied independently of any Colonial rate to which the Newspapers and other Printed Papers referred to are liable. Under the term "Printed Papers," are comprehended Books or other Publications, Photographs, Prints, or Maps, printed, engraved, or lithographed, and whether on paper, parchment, or vellum. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a Book, Publications, &c., or of a portion thereof, will be allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached; as also Rollers, in the case of Prints or Maps, Markers (whether of paper or otherwise), in the case of Books, and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but no patterns or book of patterns (unless these consist merely of paper) can be allowed.

The regulations, with respect to the transmission of Printed Papers, will be as follows:

Every Packet must be sent without a cover, or with a cover open at the ends or sides.
 There must be no enclosure, except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

2. There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers, or Printed Papers, than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent; nor anything upon the Cover but such name and address, the printed title of the Papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4. No Packet must exceed two feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.
