ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Second Sittings of the Court of Appeal of New Zealand.

At the Government House, at Auckland, the 19th day of August, 1863.

WHEREAS by the "Court of Appeal Act, 1862," it is enacted that the Court shall hold its sittings at such times and places as shall be from time to time fixed by the Governor in Council and proclaimed in the *Government Gazette*, sixty days at least before the times so fixed respectively.

ALFRED DOMETT.

Head Quarters, Queen's Redoubt,
15th August, 1863.

SIR,—I have the honor to inform your Excellency that the 2nd Battalion 14th Regiment, under Lieutenant-Colonel Austen, moved forward yesterday morning, and encamped near the mouth of the Whangamarino.

The Natives are collected in considerable force on the right bank of the Waikato, near Meri-meri, about two miles above the Whangamarino, and occupy a commanding position, which they have strengthened by lines of rifle pits.

It is reported that they have two guns in position on the bank of the Waikato.

AT the request of the Lieut.-General Commanding, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Despatch from Lieut. Steele, of the Wairoa Rifle Volunteers.

ALFRED DOMETT.

Stockade, Wairoa,

11th August, 1863.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that I took a portion of the men stationed here into the Hunua ranges yesterday, with the view of ascertaining whether there were any Maories prowling about, and if there were any supplies being carried up there from the Wairoa river. The party consisted of Lieutenant, Ensign, two sergeants, and — men of the Wairoa Rifle Volunteers, and Lieut. Yates, and — men of the 4th Company of the Auckland Militia, who volunteered to accompany me.

We started at 4.30 a.m., and reached Mr. Crichton's farm at the edge of the wooded range, about sunrise. We searched the bush through a distance of about five miles, till we reached a tract of open fern land, known as "Buckland's Opening." We examined it, and found that Mr. Hill's house there had been burnt, and various articles lying about smashed and hacked. Resumed the march on the road to Drury; after a short interval of bush, coming to another fern opening in which we found a Maori encampment consisting of thirty-one whares, ranging from 20 to 80 feet in length, and capable, I think, of containing about 1500 persons. This encampment was placed in the open, where the bush road from Drury emerges from the forest. These whares I ordered to be burnt. On the road, and about a mile nearer Drury, we found a few small whares; and again, about three-quarters of a mile further on, some more, which appear to have been used as advanced posts. Still nearer to Drury, and adjoining the road, is Capt. Clare's house, which they have gutted. On account of the recent rains we were unable to distinguish the track of

the Natives; but they certainly have not taken to the bush north of the line of road, which runs westward. I have great pleasure in bearing testimony to the cheerful endurance of the men in this long and heavy march, and to the steadiness and gallantry they showed at the moment when it was uncertain whether the Natives were gone, or still in the whares. In regard to the Militia, I was particularly struck by their resolute bearing, fresh from town, and some of them quite new to the peculiarities of a New Zealand bush road. On arriving at Drury, the Militia went to the Camp there, to sleep; and the Wairoa men returned to the Stockade, which they reached about 9 p.m. I understand that many cattle have been on the run in the country traversed by us; and as we did not see one, I conclude that the Natives have carried them off.

THE Rules relative to Pay and Allowances to Militia and Volunteers are published for general information.

PAY AND ALLOWANCES TO OFFICERS.

Pay to officers will be issued at the same rates as allowed in Her Majesty's service, excepting to those holding appointments under the General Government, who will be only entitled to half the pay of their respective ranks.

Pay to commence from the day on which the battalion was called out for training or actual service; and those officers who have been appointed since that period, provided that they have been available and done duty, will be entitled to pay from the dates of their respective commissions.

No pay will be issued to officers absent from their battalions, either with or without leave, unless under special authority.

Allowances.

Command and forage allowance will be allowed to all officers that would be entitled to the same in Her Majesty's army.

Officers when not called away from the locality to which their battalion belongs will be allowed, in addition to their regular pay, 2s. 6d. a day for the days they are on guard, escort, or picquet.

Officers when called upon to leave their homes and proceed on detachment will receive an allowance of 2s. 6d. a day for every day they may be so situated, and a commissariat ration in addition will be issued to them free of charge.

Adjutants to get 3s. 6d. per diem, in addition to captain's pay.

PAY AND ALLOWANCES TO MEN.

Staff Sergeants 6s. per diem.

Sergeants 3s. "

Corporals 2s. 6d. "

Drummers 2s. "

Privates 2s. "

Pay to non-commissioned officers will be issued consecutively from the date of their promotions.

No pay will be issued to men absent from their respective battalions.

Men going into Hospital will receive their pay without any allowances.

The pay of men confined for a military offence will be stopped for the days they are in confinement; if on detachment they will be provided with a commissariat ration, and when not on detachment an allowance of 1s. a day will be given to them to provide for themselves.

Allowances.

When men are not called away from the locality to which their battalion belongs, they will receive pay only for the days they attend drills and parades, but if required for guards, escorts, or picquets, an allowance of 1s. 6d. a day for the days they perform such duties will be admitted, in addition to their daily pay.

When men leave their homes and proceed on detachment, they will receive pay for every day they may be so situated, a ration will be issued to them free of charge, and an allowance of 6d. (sixpence) a day in addition.
