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ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Embodying Alterations in and Additions to the Regulations under the "Land Registry Amendment Act, 1861."

At the Government House at Auckland, the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three.

Present:—

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the "Land Registry Amendment Act, 1861," it was enacted that certain Regulations contained in the Schedule thereto should be the Regulations according to which the practice and procedure under the "Land Registry Act, 1860," should be regulated and conducted; and it was further provided that it should be lawful for the Registrar-General of Land from time to time to rescind, add to, amend, or alter all or any of such Regulations which related to matters respecting which, by the said Act, he was empowered to make Regulations; and it was further provided that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council to rescind, add to, amend, or alter, all or any of the said Regulations, which related to matters other than those respecting which the Registrar-General of Land was empowered to make Regulations. Now I, the said Sir George Grey, the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, by virtue of the power so vested in me as aforesaid, do hereby rescind, add to, amend, and alter the said Regulations in manner following, that is to say—

The following Regulations are hereby rescinded:—

Nos. 21, 22, 23, 25, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 47, 55, 56, 57, 58, 60, 61, 62, 67, 68, 69, 78, 80, 82, 86, 98, 99, 100, 104, 105, 106, 107, 108, 109, 110, 112, and 114.

The following Regulations are hereby added to the said Regulations, and are respectively numbered as hereinafter mentioned; that is to say—

9A. Pending the construction of Registration Maps, Maps on original Crown Grants may be referred to as and for the purposes of Registration Maps, and the same need not be signed by the Registrar General.

14A. Maps or Plans attached to applications may, in the discretion of the District Registrar, be referred to as and for the purposes of sub-divisional Registration Maps.

53A. In the case of every application to Register Title for the first time, no person shall be registered as proprietor without the approval of the Registrar General, or of such other Barrister or Solicitor as may from time to time be designated by him in that behalf, with the approval of the Governor.

68. Subjoined or attached to every Certificate of Charge shall be a Memorandum of the Inhibition affecting such Charge, referring to their respective registered numbers.

73A. No transfer of Proprietorship of Land or Charge shall be registered without delivery up of the existing Certificate, except in case of the Supreme Court.

75A. A proprietor intending to subdivide

his land by consecutive transactions may deposit with the District Registrar his Land Certificate pending such Transactions, and may by writing request that such Land Certificate may be retained pending such transactions, and the same shall be retained accordingly. In every such case as each subdivision takes place the District Registrar shall indicate such subdivision upon the Register of Proprietors by proper references. The original proprietor may at any time require the District Registrar to issue a Certificate of his Title to the Land remaining undisposed of, and thereupon the District Registrar may make the necessary entry on the Register, and issue a Certificate accordingly.

75B. If Land be transferred or devised to more persons than one as Tenants in Common or in Coparcenery, each Tenant in Common or Coparcener, as the case may be, shall be registered as proprietor in respect of his or her undivided share, and all the regulations applicable to the Registration of the Title to Land shall be applicable to the registration of Title to undivided shares of Land.

75C. Charges can only be transferred in their entirety.

76A. Before registering a Title, on the death of a deceased Proprietor, the District Registrar shall fix a time for hearing objections thereto, and he shall notify the same by advertisement, and shall hear such objections, and otherwise proceed in reference thereto in such manner as in the case of an original application to Register Title *mutatis mutandis*.

104. Sequestrations under the "Debtors' and Creditors' Act, 1862" may be registered as Inhibitions.

116A. Every application to register a Charge, Notice of Lease or Inhibition, with the Instruments attached, shall be filed as soon as deposited, and shall be marked forthwith with a number indicating the order of deposit, and which shall be the Register Number.

116B. The mode of registering Instruments under the said Act shall be by the District Registrar writing, or causing to be written, or stamped across the Application or Instrument or both, a word or minute indicating the fact of Registration and the Register number, and by his signing such word or minute, and causing his seal of office to be affixed or impressed on the Registered Application or Instrument, and all Applications and Instruments so signed and sealed shall be deemed to be duly registered, and shall have priority according to the order of their respective register numbers.

The Regulations hereinafter mentioned are hereby altered and added to in the following particulars.

Regulation 9 is altered by omitting the word "consecutively" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "as the Registrar General shall direct."

Regulation 13 is altered by omitting the words "District Registrar shall" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "District Registrar may."

Regulation 15 is altered by omitting the words "and signed by him and may be used as Registration Maps."

Regulation 17 is altered by omitting the words "in respect of each register."

Regulation 20 is added to by inserting at the end thereof the words "and the numbers of the respective allotments shall be entered therein and against each number shall be entered the number of every entry of proprietorship relating to such Allotment."

Regulation 27 is altered by omitting the words "the following Books—

"1. A Minute Book for making rough entries of daily proceedings.

"2. A Journal for entering fairly a Record from which entries on the Registers and orders for discharging or cancelling entries may be transcribed."

Regulation 40 is altered by omitting the words "a plan made to the satisfaction of the District Registrar and agreeably to the Regulations," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "an accurate plan," and by adding at the end of the Regulation the words "if required by the District Registrar."

Regulation 41 is altered by omitting all the words after the word "Application" in the second line.

Regulation 43 is altered by inserting after the words "the District Registrar shall," the words "if required."

Regulation 44 is altered by omitting the words "by the earliest convenient opportunity."

Regulation 48 is altered by omitting the words "a short description of the Land, specifying the estimated contents, the section, parish, district, county, &c., where situate" and in lieu thereof inserting the words "a short description sufficiently identifying the Land."

Regulation 53 is altered by omitting the words "in linen and canvas bags."

Regulation 59 is altered by omitting the words "annexed is a plan of the Land charged," and inserting in lieu thereof "a plan of the Land charged is" and by adding at the end thereof the words "or otherwise sufficiently identifying the same."

Regulation 63 is altered by inserting after the words "the District Registrar shall" the words "if required," and by omitting all the words prescribing the form of Receipt.

Regulation 66 is altered by inserting after the words "he may refuse to register the same absolutely" the words "or may suspend such Registration" and after the words "he shall register the same provisionally" by inserting the words "subject to further consideration or."

Regulation 70 is altered by inserting after the words "against a charge the" the word "Register," and also after the words "at the foot of the Register" the words "of such Charge."

Regulation 73 is altered by omitting the words "entry in the Register" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Registered Instrument."

Regulations 74 and 75 are respectively altered by omitting the words "original entry" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Register."

Regulation 77 is altered by omitting the words "whether he left his estate free from or subject to debts" and the words "and in case he died leaving his estate subject to debts, then who are his creditors."

Regulation 97 is altered by inserting after the words "annexed thereto" the words "or without a reference to the Register of Proprietorship."

Regulation 103 is added to by inserting at the end thereof the words "and the land affected thereby shall be accurately defined."

Regulation 116 is altered by inserting at the beginning before the word "Inhibitions" the words "Charges, Notices of Lease, and" and by omitting the words "across the same" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "across the respective Instruments" and by omitting the words at the end "affected by the Inhibition and in the Indices."

Regulation 118 is added to by inserting after the words "for every examination of Title to Land" the words "in ordinary cases not exceeding 21s., in special cases not exceeding Five Guineas."

Regulation 120 is altered by omitting the words "or charge."

Delegation to the Superintendent of Hawke's Bay, under the "Waste Lands Act, 1858."

WHEREAS by the "Waste Lands Act, 1858," the Governor is empowered from time to time to delegate to the Superintendent of any Province, or to such other person as he may think fit all or any of the powers vested in him by sections Three, Four, and Five, and also by section Fourteen of the said Act, subject or not to any limitations or restrictions as the Governor may think fit.

Now, therefore, I, Sir GEORGE GREY, the Governor of New Zealand in pursuance of the said power and authority do hereby delegate to

DONALD MCLEAN, Esquire,

so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Hawke's Bay in the said Colony, all such powers as are vested in me by section Five of the said Act, to

exercise within the limits of the said Province without any limitation or restriction.

Your Excellency will feel equal pleasure with myself in learning that the Militia and Volunteers, as well as the small detachment of the 18th Royal Irish, under the command of Major Lyon, behaved with so much steadiness and gallantry.

SIR,—I have the honor to report for the information of the Major-General Commanding Colonial Forces, that about 10 o'clock this morning Maoris opened fire at the stockade from the bush in rear of Mr. Nicholl's house, having first shot at a son of his, 9 years of age, the bullet passed through his cap without injuring him.

Fire was returned from the stockade and from our redoubt.

I advanced with 25 men to the assistance of the settlers on two different occasions, viz., at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m., after which all was quiet.

The men of the 18th Royal Irish, Militia Volunteers, Auckland Rifle Volunteers, and Wairoa Rifles behaved most steadily.

It was impossible to ascertain the number of Maories in the vicinity, as they did not come into the open.

Ensign Johnson, Wairoa Rifles, was slightly wounded in the arm.

During my absence I left Captain Clark, A.R.V., in command of the redoubt, an officer

in whom I place every confidence.

SIR,—I have the honor to report for the information of the Major-General Commanding Colonial Forces, that firing was heard in the bush on the other side of the river, at different intervals in the course of the day.

About 4 p.m. a settler came to the redoubt stating that two men were exchanging shots with some natives in the act of pillaging a house.

Lieutenant Steele, Wairoa Rifles, started immediately with 20 men, and I followed with 30: on arriving at the place two bundles were found. I followed the track, passed through a chain and a half of bush, and came out on rising ground; I could see the Maoris in a line, with loads on their backs.

The men under my command were in skirmishing order, and fired into them. I then gave chase; many of them dropped their loads, making for Otau.

Two Maoris were killed. I did not deem it advisable to advance farther, from the number of shots proceeding from the bush and bank of the river, the natives must have been in strong force: it was also getting dark.

On our return I was met by Lieut. Russell, 18th Royal Irish, with a party of 16 men, coming to our assistance, and Captain Clark, Auckland Rifle Volunteers, thinking we might require support.

This morning I started at 4 o'clock, with 50 men from the redoubt, and 20 from the Wairoa Rifles, under the command of Mr. Johnson.

We took the same direction, and arrived within 300 yards of the Maori whares at daybreak.

The river was so swollen with the late rains it was impossible to cross it. The Maoris were plainly visible, and many rounds were fired at them; they returned the fire, but without any effect, the men being well under cover.

I sounded the "cease firing," and proceeded to bury the body of one of the Maoris killed yesterday; he had been shot through the heart; the other we could not find.

It appears that the firing heard in the bush was for the purpose of diverting our attention whilst the natives were ransacking the houses.

The men of the different detachments

behaved, on both occasions, with great coolness.

SIR,—I have the honor to report for the information of the Lieut.-General Commanding, that I sent Lieut. Russell, 2nd Battalion 18th Royal Irish, with 20 men, to the spot I had occupied in the morning, with instructions to fire upon the whares at Otau. I proceeded myself, with 75 men of the different detachments, to come upon the enemy in the rear, crossing the bridge just opposite the Redoubt, and passing through portions of the bush, I arrived at the settlement. It was deserted, but it was evident that the Maoris must have sustained severe loss from the concentrated fire poured into them in the morning. The whares were riddled with shot, blood in profusion both inside and out. Two Maori mats, covered with blood, and a bullet hole through it, was also picked up. They were unmistakably taken by surprise this morning. Two guns, several tomahawks, other weapons, and a variety of articles were taken.

A quantity of plunder taken from the settlers' houses was recovered on this side of the river, showing that the rebels had been hardly pressed by our skirmishers yesterday evening.

A settler, named Crawford, residing near Otau, has lost several head of cattle. It is supposed they have been driven off by the Natives.

I have the honor to bring under the notice of the Lieut.-General commanding the names of Lieutenant Russell, 2nd Batt. 18th Royal Irish; Lieutenant Jones, Militia Volunteers; Ensign Tole, Auckland Rifle Volunteers; and Mr. McDonald, Native Interpreter; who rendered me great assistance. The exemplary conduct and soldier-like bearing of the Non-Commissioned Officers and men of the different detachments who have been with me on these several occasions, cannot be too highly commended; and more especially that of

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit for the favorable consideration of the Lieut.-General Commanding, the accompanying report from Captain Russell, 57th Regiment, Commanding the detachment at Poutoko.

Captain Russell's report describes so simply and accurately what occurred on the morning of the 15th instant, that I feel I have only to add that nothing could exceed the coolness and perseverance with which Captain Russell carried out his plan, and the steadiness with which the Officers, non-commissioned Officers, and men behaved under circumstances of no ordinary difficulty.

The steadiness and good conduct of the non-commissioned Officers and men, enabled Captain Russell to way-lay and surprise a considerable body of Natives (nine of whom are known to have been killed or mortally

wounded) and also to withdraw his party with great regularity in the face of a very large number of rebel Natives, who, on seeing their people engaged flocked, to the number of 200 or 300 to the scene of action, from their several positions on the Tataraimaka Ranges.

I have much satisfaction in stating than no casualties occurred on our side.

SIR,—I have the honor to report for your information, that in compliance with instructions received from you, I started at 3 a.m. this day with a party, strength as per margin,* to plant an ambuscade in the vicinity of the Wairau stream.—I left 2 Sergeants and 24 rank and file to occupy the Oakura Redoubt and cover the crossing of the river, and then advanced with the remainder of my party over the stream to a spot, some 500 yards up the Wairau road, where a light bush composed of Toe-toe and Koromiko afforded excellent cover. I divided my men into three sections and posted them, each in charge of an Officer, on the left hand side of the road at a few yards distance from one another: after waiting upwards of two hours, natives were heard coming down the road, and their advanced Guard, consisting of eight men, approached to within three yards of the ambuscade to the left, which was in charge of Lieut. Manners, 57 Regiment; they then, unfortunately, detected a foot print carelessly left by one of my party, and calling out to alarm their main body, attempted to escape: on this the men immediately fired, and three natives fell, one apparently a chief of some note, as he carried a very handsome "Taiaha," which we took possession of; the other two natives, who were evidently mortally wounded, staggered into the bush—three other natives were also hit, but as they ran afterwards, I am unable to say if they were wounded or not. I was immediately engaged with the main body of the natives, about thirty, who took cover in the neighbouring fern and bush, and we drove them back to a swamp. A very large number of natives being seen coming down from Ahuahu, and hearing the Maories also advancing from Kitaki, I got my men together and marched them on the open ground: whilst crossing the Oakura river I found the natives making an attempt to occupy the high ground, on which the redoubt is built, and thus cut off my party, but they desisted on

finding themselves opened upon by the reserve, who then showed themselves, and by some of the men who had already crossed, and they therefore contented themselves with attempting to annoy the remainder of the party in crossing, but were soon driven further back. I cannot say what loss the natives sustained in this second skirmish, but two of them were seen to be shot, and one of them fell over the cliff: on the whole of my party occupying the high ground they were soon forced to retire out of sight. As there was no hope of their showing themselves as long as I held the redoubt I returned to camp. Being aware how difficult it is to correctly estimate the enemy's loss in affairs of this description, I have only detailed such of their casualties as fell under my personal observation, or that of the other Officers who were with me, and therefore believe that you will find them much heavier than has been reported.

I beg to be allowed to bring to your favourable notice the very steady conduct of every Non-Commissioned Officer and man engaged, and also the names of the Officers who were with me on this duty, viz:—Lieut. Manners and Ensign Powys, 57th Regiment, and Staff Assistant Surgeon Tomlinson; my thanks are also due to Mr. W. Carrington, of the Native Department, who is stationed at this outpost, for the valuable advice he gave regarding the planting of this ambuscade.

The chief from whom the "Taiaha" was taken is killed.
