A PROCLAMATION

For the Naturalisation of certain Persons.

By HIS EXCELLENCY SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight, Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by "The Naturalization Act, 1862," it is enacted that every person who shall be declared to come within the operation of that Act by any Proclamation, to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor, shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken until the termination of the next Session of the General Assembly, to be and to have been from such specified time, a naturalborn subject of Her Majesty, within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule to that Act annexed: Provided always, that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation, or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation:

of such Proclamation: Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare, that the persons hereinafter mentioned, shall come within the operation of the said Act, from the dates hereinafter specified, viz. :-- JOSEPH SOUSA,

From the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, Native of Portugal, Mariner; Residence—Dunedin, in the Province of Otago.

AUGUST FRIEDRICH,

From the ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, Native of Prussia, Settler; Residence—Rangitikei, in the Province of Wellington.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs the publication of the following Despatch with its enclosure, from Lieutenant-General Cameron, C.B.

ALFBED DOMETT.

LIEUTENANT-GENERAL CAMERON TO THE GOVERNOR.

Head Quarters, Queen's Redoubt, October 28th, 1863.

SIR,—I have the honour to acquaint your Excellency that on the afternoon of the 23rd instant, I received information from Lieut.-Colonel Chapman, commanding at Drury, that Lieutenant Lusk, commanding the outposts at Mauku, had reported to him that a large body of the enemy had approached within a mile of Mauku church, and that he had left the stockade with part of his detachment to endeavour to ascertain their strength. Lieutenant-Colonel Chapman stated that he had sent a reinforcement of 80 men, under Captain St. John, Waikato Militia, to Lieut. Lusk's support.

At about 10 o'clock that night, I received further intelligence that Lieut. Lusk had incautiously engaged the enemy with his small force previous to the arrival of Captain St. John's reinforcement, and being greatly outnumbered and attacked on both flanks, had been compelled to retire with loss.

I immediately ordered Lieut.-Colonel Chapman to despatch a reinforcement of 200 men, 18th and 70th Regiments, under Major Ryan, to Mauku, with orders to attack the natives and drive them from the bush, and requested him to call upon Lieut.-Colonel Nixon to co-operate with part of the Colonial Defence Corps from Papakura. I instructed Captain Rutherford, 70th Regiment, commanding a portion of Lieutenant Colonel Nixon's column, which was encamped at Selby's, to move as rapidly as possible by Tuakau and Cameron to Pura Pura, with the view of intercepting the enemy, who were likely to attempt to recross the river at that point.

Lieutenant-Colonel Nixon and Major Ryan arrived at Mauku early on the morning of the 24th, and found that the natives had decamped from the neighbourhood. Captain Rutherford pushed on to Pura Pura as expeditiously as the difficulty of marching through the bush at night would allow, but was too late to cut off the enemy's retreat.

I herewith enclose Lieutenant Lusk's report of the engagement. The force which this officer had at his disposal was too small to attack so large a body of natives, advantageously posted in the bush, with any prospect of success, but the gallantry which Lieutenant Lusk, and the detachment under his command displayed in extricating themselves from a very critical position, is deserving of the greatest praise. The conduct of the officers and men of the Mauku Volunteers, and Waikato Militia, on this trying occasion was admirable.

I regret to say that two officers, Lieut. Perceval and Lieut. Norman, both of whom greatly distinguished themselves, and six men, were killed, and one man dangerously wounded.

Lieut. Lusk to Lieutenant-Colonel Chapman. Mauku Stockade, 24th October, 1863.

SIR,-I have the honor to report that I started yesterday morning, with a force as per margin,* to attack a body of the enemy who were shooting cattle on Mr. Wheeler's farm at the Ti-ti; an advance party of my force, under Lieutenant Perceival, got close up to the enemy's position under cover of the bush : when discovered, they were hotly pressed by the enemy, and retired skirmish-ing in good order on the main body without I then advanced, having been joined loss. by Lieutenant Norman with eight men. 1 drove the enemy through a strip of fallen. timber on to open ground beyond; but seeing that they wheeled round into the standing forest on my left flank, where they were largely reinforced, I deemed it prudent While re-crossing the fallen to retire. timber, the enemy, numbering from two to three hundred, charged us from the bush on the left; and after about ten minutes very heavy firing at very short range (from ten to twenty yards), where both parties suffered severely, I being outflanked on both sides, retired into the forest on the right. The enemy did not venture to advance on us after we were under cover of the forest. then re-formed my men, and retired leisurely on the Stockade. Our loss was 1 Lieutenant (Perceival), and 5 men killed; 1 man dangerously wounded; 1 Lieutenant (Norman), and 1 private missing. The enemy's loss I believed to be about 16 killed,

and a large number wounded. Sergeant Hill and Private John Wheeler specially distinguished themselves by their determined gallantry under most trying circumstances

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Captain - General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Queensland and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

In pursuance of the authority in me vested, and in accordance with the provisions of the Ist Section of "The Scab Act, 1863," I, the Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit the introduction or importation of sheep into the Colony of Queensland, either by sea or by land, from any of the other Colonies of Australia, Tasmania, or New Zealand, under penalty of seizure and immediate destruction.

Committee Room, Pall Mall, London, August, 1863.

-We do ourselves the honor of calling Sir,your Excellency's attention to the accompanying Resolution of the Shakespeare Committee,* inviting your co-operation in making known to her Majesty's subjects within your Province the intention to celebrate next year the Three Hundredth Birthday of Shakespeare, in a manner worthy of

the poet and of the poet's countrymen. It is felt by the Noblemen and Gentle-men composing the Shakespeare Committee that all her Majesty's subjects who speak the language of Shakespeare must regard with interest the proposal to commemorate his birth, by the erection of a monument in a conspicuous part of London. It may not be possible for many of those who reside in distant parts of the British dominions to assist personally on the 23rd of April, 1864. in laying the Foundation Stone of the pro-posed National Memorial. Nevertheless, as many thousands so circumstanced must desire to contribute towards such an undertaking, it is hoped they may be afforded a suitable opportunity of doing so.

The Committee have therefore instructed us to communicate with the Representatives of the Crown in the various British Colonies, and to request their good offices in making

the object of this application widely known. The people of England have had so many recent and gratifying proofs of the strong sympathy which unites them to their Colonial brethren in all matters of national interest, that we anticipate a hearty and early res-ponse to this invitation on the part of your Council and of the community the administration of whose affairs has been entrusted to your Excellency.

We feel that it would be presumptuous in us to offer any special suggestions as to the most effective mode of bringing the subject before the people of the Colony. The proper authorities there can alone fitly decide such local details. We may, however, state that it is confidently expected that this movement will ere long be honoured by her Majesty's immediate patronage, and by the Presidency of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. When the list of distinguished Vice-Presidents, Officers, and Members of the Committee is completed, we shall have much pleasure in transmitting it. We have further to request that your Excellency will allow your name to be added to the list of the National Shakespeare Committee.

In the meantime, we may state that contributions towards the Shakespeare Memorial should be remitted to Messrs. Coutts & Co., Bankers, London.

We shall also be most happy to pay every attention to any communication with which

SIR,—I am directed by the Postmaster-General to inform you that, on the 1st September next, and thence forward, the Postage upon letters conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hayti, will be increased from Sixpence to One Shilling the single rate (half an ounce), thus assimilating the rates of Postage on Correspondence for Hayti to the rates recently authorised to be levied upon Correspondence for British Colonies and Foreign Possessions in the West Indies, announced to you by my letter of the 19th March last.

In acquainting you with this alteration, I request that you will be good enough to cause credit to be given to this Department, in future, upon all letters for Hayti, transmitted via the United Kingdom, at the rates mentioned in my letter above referred to.
