SIR,—I am directed by the Postmaster-General to acquaint you that a new Postal Convention has been concluded between the United Kingdom and the Netherlands, under the terms of which a reduction of postage has taken place in the postage of Letters for the Netherlands, *via Southampton*, and I am to request that, in future, you will be good enough to account on Letters sent from your Office through this Country addressed to the Netherlands at the reduced rate of 0s. 2d. (twopence) for a letter not exceeding half-an-ounce, adding one additional rate for each additional half-ounce or fraction of half-an-ounce. This rate will cover the whole postage, British and Netherland, to the place of destination.

New Zealand General Government Eight per cent Debentures.

BY ACT of the General Assembly of New Zealand, the Colonial Treasurer is authorised to raise TEMPORARY LOANS on Debentures (to be repaid out of money to be borrowed under the New Zealand Loan Act, 1863), with a currency of from One to Three years, bearing interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, payable half-yearly, on the 1st day of January, and the 1st day of July in every year.
