For the Naturalization of certain Persons.

By His Excellency Sir George Grey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by "The Naturalization Act, 1864," it is enacted that every person who shall be declared to come within the operation of that Act by any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken until the termination of the next Session of the General Assembly, to be, and to have been from such specified time, a natural-born subject of Her Majesty, within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule to that Act annexed: always that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation, or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation.

Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the persons hereinafter mentioned shall come within the operation of the said Act from the dates hereinafter specified, viz. :-

from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, native of Prussia, baker; residence, Timaru, in the Province of Canterbury.

WILLIAM LUKS,

from the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, native of Germany, settler; residence, Waikouaiti, in the Province of Otago.

EMIL WALDEMAR THOMSEN,

from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, native of Denmark, carpenter; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Marine Board Act, 1863,"
it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations as may be found necessary respecting the anchoring and mooring of vessels in any port; the packing, landing, deposit, and removal of gunpowder; the erection of magazines for the safe keeping thereof; the watering and ballasting and discharging of ballast of or from vessels, and all other matters relating to the safe and commodious navigation of any Port, Harbour, or River, and the order and management of vessels resorting thereto; and for the purpose of giving effect to such regulations to authorise the levying of Harbour Masters' Fees, not arroading the rate precified in the Schodule to the exceeding the rate specified in the Schedule to the said Act; and to impose any penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds for any one offence against any provisions thereof.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the above recited power and authority, doth hereby make the following regulations for the Port of Lyttelton, within

the Province of Canterbury.

And doth order that the same shall come into operation and take effect from and after the 24th day of April, 1865.

Port Regulations.

1. The regulations published in the *Provincial Government Gazette* of October 11, 1864, under the title of "Watermen's Regulations," are hereby repealed, and the following regulations shall be in force in the Port of Lyttelton on and after the 26th day of October, 1864.

2. All Carters, Porters, and Watermen engaged upon the public wharfs shall be under the control of the Port Officer.

3. Every Waterman shall, upon payment of One Pound sterling in respect of every boat to be plied by him, receive a license, to be renewed on the 1st July in each year.

4. Any Boatman carrying passengers for hire without a license shall be liable to a fine not exceeding

Five Pounds.

5. No boat shall be allowed to remain at any landing-place after discharging her cargo and passengers, or to make fast to any steps or handrails belonging thereto, without some person in charge ready to remove the said boat when required to do so by the Port Officer or person deputed by him.

6. A Board, exhibiting the charges authorised to be made between sunrise and sunset, shall be placed near the landing-place. After sunset, and when the near the landing-place. blue flag shall be hoisted half-mast by the Harbour Master or person deputed by him, denoting bad weather, double fares can be demanded by watermen,

7. Any Boatman resisting, impeding, or obstructing the Harbour Master, Pilot, or other person deputed by either of them in the execution of his duty, or using threatening or abusive language to them, or any of them, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

8. The number of passengers allowed to be carried in any boat shall be specified in the license, and shall be legibly painted on some conspicuous part of the

be legibly painted on some conspicuous part of the boat in respect of which such license is issued; and any Boatman conveying a larger number of passengers, or a greater quantity of luggage, than is allowed in his license, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five Pounds.

9. The authorised fares shall be as follows-From any wharf or jetty to the steamers, single fare to or from 1 6 From any wharf or jetty to any place, or to any vessel other than steamers, lying within a space bounded on the East by a line drawn from Stoddart's to Sticking Point, and on the West by a line drawn from Naval Point to the Eastern portion of Church Bay From any wharf or jetty to Church Bay From any wharf or jetty to Gollan's Bay From any wharf or jetty to Rhodes' Bay: One passenger 0 Two or more, each From any wharf or jetty to Quarantine Station: One passenger - 20 0 Two or more, each
To the Heads, or Head of the Bay, as - 10 per agreement. Return fares will be allowed at the same rate in each case.

10. Each boat shall carry, if required, 8ths. weight of luggage with every passenger, without additional charge; and any passenger detaining a boat for a period exceeding 20 minutes shall be liable to an extra charge at the rate of 4s. per hour.

11. All ballast lighters, cargo and water-tank boats plying for hire, shall be measured, marked, and registered; and upon payment of three shillings per ton register, shall receive a license, to be renewed on

the 1st July in each year.

12. Any person holding a license for a cargo boat who shall load the same, in excess of the quantity allowed to be carried in accordance with his license, shall forfeit his license, and be liable to a penalty of Five Pounds.

13. Any Boatman charging more than the authorised rates or fares, or refusing to employ his boat when required to do so, shall be liable to forfeit his license, and to pay a penalty of Five Pounds.

Regulations under "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

Whereas it is provided by "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," that all regulations and appointments made by the Superintendeut of any Province in pursuance of any power delegated to him under the power of delegation hereinafter contained, shall be published in the Government Gazette of such Province and all such regulations being so published shall have the force of law. And whereas by warrant under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the 14th day of September, 1864, the Governor did, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegate to the Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki the several powers vested in the Governor by the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 10th sections of the said Act, subject as in the said warrant is provided. And whereas by two Proclamations under the hand of the Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki, bearing date respectively the 11th and 12th days of January instant, certain districts in the Province of Taranaki were declared to be infected within the meaning of the said Act, and it is expedient to provide penalties for persons driving Cattle from such prohibited districts across the boundaries defined in such Proclamations.

For a third offence, any sum not exceeding £100 for each head of Cattle driven or removed from an infected district.

And I do further proclaim and declare that the Provinces of Otago and Southland in the Colony of New Zealand, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act, and that no Cattle shall be allowed to be imported from the said Provinces.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

TABLE BAY NEW LIGHTS AND FALSE BAY BEACON.

Robben Island Light.

A Lighthouse has been erected on the Southernmost (and highest) hill of Robben Island, Minto Hill, at an elevation of 154 feet above the sea, a light from which will be exhibited on the 1st of January, 1865.

January, 1865.

The Lighthouse is in latitude 33° 48' 52" S., longitude 18° 22' 33" E.

The building is a cylindrical shaft, 60 feet high, painted in horizontal *Red and White bands*, exhibiting a *White* fixed light of the 1st order, dioptric. It is visible all round the horizon, and can be seen from a ship in clear weather 19 or 20 miles.

Changes in the Green and Mouille Point Lights.

The two fixed lights in the Green Point square tower will be abandoned on the above date, and a White light of the 3rd order dioptrip, flashing at intervals of 10 seconds, substituted. It is 65 feet above the sea, and can be seen in clear weather from a ship 13 miles.

Mouille Light.

The old pyramidal building which carried this light will be demolished, and replaced by a cylindrical shaft, 30 feet high, painted in alternate Black and White bands, and carrying a Red light of the 4th order dioptric. It stands at an elevation of 44 feet above the sea, and can be seen about 10 miles in clear weather.

Sailing Directions.

Ships bound for Table Bay from the southward should not shut in the Cape Point light with the land at Slangkop Point until the Robben Island light—which will be seen before the one on Green Point—bears N.E. \(\frac{1}{3} \) E, when they may steer for it; and when the Green Point light bears east, an E. N.E. course may be followed until the red light on Mouille Point comes open to the northward of Green Point light, bearing S.E. by S. This course will lead clear of the Vulcan Rock and the reefs that lie to the northward of it. The course may now be altered to S.E. by E. \(\frac{1}{2} \) E., which will carry them one mile outside Mouille Point, and within this distance no stranger should round the point at night. When the Mouille light bears S.S.W., a S. by E. course for the anchorage may be shaped, anchoring as soon as the Green Point light is shut in with the hillocks near Mouille Point, or with Mouille Point light bearing N.W. about one mile off, in from 6 to 8 fathoms. Small vessels may steer S. by E. \(\frac{1}{2} \) E. for the anchorage in 4 or 5 fathoms, and anchor with the Mouille light bearing about N.W. by N.

Ships bound for Table Bay from the northward must not take too great liberty with Robben Island on account of its light, for the island is low, and the dangerous Whale Rock lies S. 17 W., only 1 4-10ths mile from the lighthouse, and 9-10ths of a mile from the nearest point of the island.

Having sighted the Robben Island light, a ship should haul to the S.W., if the light bear anything to the westward of south, until the fiashing light on Green Point bears S. by E. or S.S.E., when she may steer for it until Robben Island light bears N.E., when she may steer S.E. by E.; and when Mouille light bears S.S.W. steer, as before directed, for the anchorage.

With the light upon Robben Island and the Green Point or Mouille Point light, a vessel may readily determine her position by cross bearings; but the safest and easiest plan to adopt is, whilst the Green and Mouille lights are open of each other, to tack when the Robben Island bears N. by W. ½ W., and when they approach each other and become in line to tack when the Robben Island light bears N. by W. This will prevent accidents from the lowness of the Blaauwberg beach and its deceptive appearance at night. Little, if anything, can be lost in thus beating in by giving up the smooth water near the shore, as the constant northerly current that sets out between Robben Island and the main land more than destroys the seeming advantage; added to which, the wind blows with greater violence from the S.E. on the east side of the bay than it does more to

the westward, though not in such sudden and violent

A beacon has been erected on a large flat-topped rock near Oatlands Point, which will, in conjunction with the beacon that now stands on the shoulder of the hill beneath Simon's Berg, point out the position of the Whittle Rock. The rock on which the beacon stands lies a few yards from the shore, and 0.85 miles from the Shoulder Beacon. When on the Whittle Rock the two beacons will be in a line, and also in line with a large patch of whitewashed rocks on the hill northward of Simon's Tower, bearing N.N.W. The shoulder beacon is white, with a staff ll. The Oatlands Port beacon is triangular, and ball. 35 feet high, and painted white with a red band in

The advantage of this beacon is that it points out to ships from the westward that they are clear of the White Rock, whilst it is kept open to the eastward of the Shoulder Beacon. This was somewhat difficult with the patch of whitewashed rocks behind Simon's Town for a mark, as vessels were obliged to run far to the eastward before the patch opened out clear of

the shoulder of Simon's Berg hill.

Vessels from the eastward will still find the white patch of rocks serviceable for pointing out the position of the Whittle Rock.
