#### **PROCLAMATION**

Under "The New Zealand Natives Reserves Act, 1856," and "The Native Reserves Amendment Act, 1862.

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

Reserves Act, 1856," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony at any time and from time to time by Letters Patent under the public seal of the Colony, to appoint persons to be Commissioners for carrying this Act into effect, who shall be styled "Commissioners of Native Reserves," and such Commissioners from time to time to remove; and whereas by "The Native Reserves Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that from and after a day to be fixed by the Governor by Proclamation to be inserted in the Government Gazette of the Colony and also of each of the Provinces of New Zealand, all the powers and authorities which by the "Native Reserves Act, 1856" are given to or vested in or which may be exercised by Commissioners appointed or to be appointed under that Act, shall vest in and may be exercised by the Governor; and whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, all the said powers were from and after the first day of September then next ensuing declared to vest in the Governor of the said Colony; and whereas by the second recited Act it is further enacted that the Governor may by Order in Council from time to time delegate all or any of the powers competent to the Commissioners under the said Act, unto any person or persons, for any period and subject to such regulations and restrictions or stipulations as may be specified in such Order, and every

such delegation may from time to time in like manner be altered or revoked; and whereas, I Sir George Grey, the Governor of the said Colony, did by Order in Council bearing date the twelfth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixtythree, delegate to GEORGE FREDERICK SWAINSON, of Wellington, in the Province of Wellington, Esquire, all the powers competent to Commissioners under the said first recited Act without any restrictions or stipulations whatever until the same shall be revoked; And whereas by the first recited Act it is further enacted that all moneys which shall come to the hands of the Commissioners under the provisions of this Act except in respect of special endowments, shall be applied by such Commissioners for the benefit of the aboriginal inhabitants for whose benefit such lands may have been set apart, in such manner as the Governor of the said Colony may from time to time direct: Now therefore, I, the said Sir George Grey, the Governor as aforesaid, in exercise of the said power and authority, do hereby Order the said George Frederick Swainson, as such Commissioner as aforesaid, to pay over such sum or sums of money, being the produce of Native Reserves, as have or shall from time to time come into his hands under the provisions of the first recited Act, to such person or persons as the Honorable the Minister for Native Affairs for the time being shall from time to time direct, for the erection, fencing, furnishing, &c., of the Native House about to be built in Molesworth-street, in Wellington aforesaid, or for such other purposes as the said Minister shall approve on behalf of the Natives of the said Province of Wellington.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c.,&c.,&c.

WHEREAS Her Majesty has been pleased to assent to "The Native Lands Act, 1862," and by Proclamation of the Governor, dated the twenty-ninth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the operation of that Act has been extended over the whole Colony of New Zealand;

And whereas the operation of this law renders unnecessary the continuance of the Native Land Purchase Department by which, prior to its enactment, the cession of Native Lands to the Crown has

heretofore been conducted;

And whereas other provisions will from time to time be made for any future cessions of land to Her Majesty which the Governor may permit to be made under clause thirty-two of the said Native Land Act, 1862:

Now therefore I, the Governor, do hereby revoke all commissions authorizing the purchase of lands on behalf of the Crown from the aboriginal inhabitants of the Colony of New Zealand, and do proclaim that the Native Land Purchase Department will from and after the date hereof be done away with and cease to exist.

#### PROCLAMATION

Appointing certain Districts under "The Marriage Act."

By His Excellency Sir George Grey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by "The Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time by Proclamation in the New Zealand Gazette, to divide the Colony of New Zealand for the purposes of the said Act into such and so many Districts as he may think fit, and that every such District shall be called by a distinct name and shall be a Registrar's District, and it is provided that the Governor may at any time revoke the whole or any part of such Proclamation and issue a new Proclamation dividing the Colony or any part of it anew into Districts, or increasing the number, or altering the boundaries of Districts as from time to time he may think requisite;

And whereas by a Proclamation duly made and issued bearing date the sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the Governor in pursuance of the said recited power and authority did amongst others constitute a District for the purposes of the said Act called the "Aorere District," the boundaries whereof were therein set forth, which said Proclamation came into operation and took effect on the first day of October, one thousand eight

hundred and fifty-nine;

And whereas it is expedient to revoke so much of

the said Proclamation as relates to the said District and to divide anew the territory formerly comprised within such District:

Now therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation so far as relates to the Aorere District, and do proclaim and declare that the territory formerly comprised within such District shall be and is hereby divided for the purposes of the said Act into Three Districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

AORERE DISTRICT.

From Wakapoai Point to Point Pillar, thence along the sea coast to Rangiaieta, thence along the watershed summit to Slate River Peak, Lead Hill, and Mount Olympus; thence to summit of Snowden and Mount Domett, and thence to Wakapoai Point.

BULLER DISTRICT.

From Wakapoai Point to Mount Domett, thence to the summit of Mount Snowdon, thence along the watershed to Mount Arthur, thence in a straight line to the junction of the Buller and Gowan, thence along that line to the mouth of the Gowan, thence up the Gowan to the southern extremity of Lake Howick, thence in a straight line to Mount Franklin, and from Mount Franklin in a straight line to the junction of the Waituhu with the Thackeray River, thence in a straight line to Mount Faraday, and from thence down the Tikopihi to the sea coast.

RIVER GREY DISTRICT.

Commencing at the mouth of the Tikopihi on the sea coast, and by that stream to Mount Faraday; thence in a straight line to the junction of the Waituhu with the Thackeray River, thence in a straight line to Mount Franklin, thence by the watershed of the Spenser Mountains to Mount Hochstetter, thence by a straight line to the saddle between the sources of the Hurunui and Taramakau Rivers, thence to the source of the Courtenay River, thence by the western boundaries of the Christchurch and Ashburton Districts respectively, and thence from the source of the Rangitata in a straight line to Abut Head.

And I do declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

#### PROCLAMATION

Appointing certain Districts under "The Registration Act."

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commanderin-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by "The Registration Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time, by Proclamation in the New Zealand Gazette, to divide the Colony of New Zealand for the purposes of the said Act into such and so many Districts as he may think fit, and that every such district shall be called by a distinct name, and

shall be a Registrar's District, and it is provided that the Governor may at any time revoke the whole or any part of such proclamation and issue a new proclamation dividing the Colony or any part of it anew into districts, or increasing the number or altering the boundaries of districts as from time to time

he may think requisite;

And whereas by a Proclamation duly made and issued, bearing date the sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the Governor, in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, did, amongst others constitute a district for the purposes of the said Act, called the "Aorere District," the boundaries whereof were therein set forth, which said Proclamation came into operation and took effect on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine;

And whereas it is expedient to revoke so much of

the said Proclamation as relates to the said District, and to divide anew the territory formerly comprised

within such District:

Now therefore, I, Sir George Grex, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby revoke the said proclamation so far as relates to the "Aorere District," and do proclaim and declare that the territory formerly comprised within such district shall be and is hereby divided for the purposes of the said Act into three Districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

AORERE DISTRICT.

From Wakapoai Point to Point Pillar, thence along the sea coast to Rangiaieta, thence along the Watershed summit to Slate River Peak, Lead Hill, and Mount Olympus; thence to summit of Snowdon and Mount Domett, and thence to Wakapoai Point.

BULLER DISTRICT.

From Wakapoai Point to Mount Domett, thence to the summit of Mount Snowdon; thence along the watershed to Mount Arthur, thence in a straight line to the junction of the Buller and Gowan, thence along that line to the mouth of the Gowan, thence up the Gowan to the southern extremity of Lake Howick, thence in a straight line to Mount Franklin, and from Mount Franklin in a straight line to the junction of the Waituku with the Thackeray River, thence in a straight line to Mount Faraday, and from thence down the Tikopihi to the sea coast.

RIVER GREY DISTRICT.

Commencing at the mouth of the Tikopihi on the sea coast, and by that stream to Mount Faraday; thence in a straight line to the junction of the Waituhu with the Thackeray River, thence in a straight line to Mount Franklin, thence by the watershed of the Spenser Mountains to Mount Hochstetter, thence by a straight line to the saddle between the sources of the Hurunui and Taramakau Rivers, thence to the source of the Courtenay River, thence by the western boundaries of the Christchurch and Ashburton Districts respectively, and thence from the source of the Rangitata in a straight line to Abut Head.

And I do declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Proclaiming certain Lands under "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863."

G. GREY, Governor.

At the Government House, at Auckland, the sixteenth day of May, 1865.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," that whenever the Governor in Council shall be satisfied that any Native Tribe or Section of a Tribe or any considerable number thereof has, since the first day of January, 1863, been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty authority, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to declare that the District within which any land being the property or in the possession of such tribe or section or considerable number thereof shall be situate, shall be a District within the provisions of the said Act:

And whereas the Governor in Council is satisfied that the Native Tribes or considerable numbers thereof owning or possessing the tract of territory hereafter described have, since the period above mentioned, been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty's

authority:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, doth hereby declare that the territory within the boundaries hereafter set forth shall be a District within the provisions of the said Act, that is to say :-

SCHEDULE. Central Waikato.

Bounded on the North by a line commencing at Pukorokoro on the Frith of the Thames and extending in a straight line to the Esk Redoubt, thence by a straight line to Tuahu or the Surrey Redobut, thence by a line bearing South 43° West to the Southern margin of the Mangatawhiri Swamp, thence by the Southern boundary of the Mangatawhiri Swamp to the Waikato River, thence by the Waikato River to the sea; on the West by the sea coast from the Waikato Heads to the Harbor of Whaingaroa, and by the Harbor of Whaingaroa to the Waitetuna River, thence by the Waitetuna River to its source, thence by a straight line to the summit of the Pirongia Range; on the South-East by a straight line from the summit of the Pirongia Range to the summit of the Kapamaunga Range, and thence by the summit of the Kapamaunga and Hakarimata the summit of the Kapamaunga and Hakarimata Ranges to a line running East to the junction of the Waipa and Horotiu Rivers, thence by that line to the said junction and by a line extending East from such junction to the North-Eastern angle of the Military Settlements Land, constituted a District under the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," on the 29th December, 1864; and on the East by a straight line extending from the North-Eastern angle of the said Military Settlements Land to the most Easterly source of the Matahuru River, thence by a straight line extending to the summit of the by a straight line extending to the summit of the Rataroa Range, and by the summit of the Rataroa Range to the Maungakawa summit, and thence in a straight line to Pukorokoro aforesaid.

### ORDER IN COUNCIL

Proclaiming certain Lands under "New Zealand Settle-ments Act, 1863."

G. GREY, Governor.

At the Government House, at Auckland, this sixteenth day of May, 1865.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," that whenever the Governor in Council shall be satisfied that any Native Tribe, or section of a Tribe, or any considerable number thereof, has, since the first day of January, 1863, been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty's authority, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to declare that the District within which any land, being the property or in the possession of such tribe or section or considerable number thereof, shall be situate, shall be a District within the provisions of the said Act, and the boundaries of such District in like manner to define and vary as he shall think fit: And it is further enacted that it shall be think fit: lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to set apart within any such District eligible sites for settlements for colonization and the boundaries of such settlements to define and vary, and that for the purposes of such settlements the Governor in Council may, from time to time, reserve or take any land within such District, and such land shall be deemed to be Crown Land, freed and discharged from all title, interest, or claim of any person whomsoever, as soon as the Governor in Council shall have declared that such land is required for the purposes of this Act, and is subject to the provisions thereof:
And that by an Order in Council made the sixteenth

And that by an Order in Council made the sixteenth day of May instant a tract of country, called in the said Order the Central Waikato Block, was constituted and declared to be a District within the pro-

visions of the said Act:

And whereas it is expedient to set apart the pieces of land hereafter defined, parcel of the said Central Waikato Block, as sites for settlement for colonization:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the authority for this purpose conferred upon him by the said recited Act, doth hereby order that the pieces of land hereafter defined in each of the five schedules to this order shall be set apart as sites for settlement for colonization, and for the purposes of such settlement doth hereby reserve and take the said lands, and doth declare that the said lands are required for the purposes of the said Act, and are subject to the provisions thereof, that is to say:

#### SCHEDULE I.

All that land called the Onewhero Block, bounded towards the North and East by the Waikato River; towards the West and South by the boundary of the lands of the Ngatitipa tribe from near Ihutaroa, on the Waikato, to the point of the nearest approach of such boundary to the Waikato River to the southward, and thence in a straight line, running due east, to the Waikato River, excluding lands granted by the Crown.

SCHEDULE II.

All that land estimated to contain 19,400 acres, and known as the Wangape Block, bounded on the North by a line commencing one mile below the junction of the Wangape Lake outlet and the Waikato River, and extending on a bearing of south 41° west (magnetic) to the watershed summit between the Opuatia River and the Wangape Lake and its tributaries, and thence following such watershed summit to the westward; on the West by the road from Puketotara towards the west coast westward to a bend of the said road, 86 chains south-west of the Mangapiko River crossing-place; thence on the East by the Waikato River and the Wangape outlet; on the South-East by the Wangape Lake, and by a line running from the Wangape Lake to the summit of

Puketotara on a bearing of south 79° west (magnetic); on the South by a road from Puketotara Hill running to the west coast as far as a bend of said road, 86 chains south-west of the Mangapiko crossing-place; and thence on the West by a line bearing north 32° west to the Awatikotiko River, and thence by another line bearing north 27° east (magnetic) to the summit of the watershed first mentioned.

#### SCHEDULE III.

All that land known as the Kupa Kupa Block, and estimated to contain three thousand five hundred (3,500) acres; bounded on the East by the Waikato River; on the North by a line running from the junction of the Wahi Lake outlet and the River Waikato, west by compass three miles; thence on the West by a line running south by compass to the Awa o te Atua River, and thence on the South by the Awa o te Atua River.

SCHEDULE IV.

Rangiriri Block.

All that land called the Rangoriri Block, bounded on the North by a line extending from the northern boundary of the Waikari Lake west (magnetic) to the Waikato River; on the West by the Waikato River, on the East by the Waikari Lake, and on the South by a line extending west (magnetic) from the southern boundary of the Waikari Lake to the Waikato River, excepting land granted to the late Mr. Armitage at Rawhitu.

SCHEDULE V.

Mangawhara Block.

All that land called the Mangawhara Block, bounded on the North by the Mangawhara River, on the West by the Waikato River, on the South by a line from the junction of the Waipa and Horotiu Rivers running east three miles, and thence on the East by a line running north to the Mangawhara River aforesaid, excepting the Church of England school grant at Hopuhopu.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL

Relating to the Disposal of Land under the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863."

G. GREY, Governor.

At the Government House, at Auckland, the sixteenth day of May, 1865.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," that on part of the land subject to the provisions of the said Act the Governor shall cause to be laid out a sufficient number of towns and farms around or as near as conveniently may be to the same, to give full effect to the provisions of the several contracts entered into, or to be entered into, by or on behalf of the Government of New Zealand, with certain persons, for the granting of land to them respectively, in return for military services, on the terms in and subject to the conditions of, the said contracts respectively expressed; and the several persons who shall have been enrolled under the said contracts respectively shall be entitled to such Town and Farm sections, in conformity with the provisions of the said contracts:

Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the consent in writing of any person entitled under such contracts, to vary the conditions thereof as regards such persons as the Governor in Council may think fit: And it is further enacted, that, after setting apart sufficient land for all the persons who shall be entitled thereto under the said

contracts, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to cause Towns to be surveyed and laid out, and also Suburban and Rural Allotments; and that all such Town, Suburban, and Rural Land shall be let, sold, occupied and disposed of for such prices, in such manner, and for such purposes, upon such terms and subject to such regulations, as the Governor in Council shall from time to time prescribe for that purpose

And whereas Towns and Farms, and Suburban and Rural Allotments, have been laid out on parts of the land taken under the provisions of the said Act, and other Towns and Farms will be hereafter so laid out,

for the purposes aforesaid:

And whereas certain persons, who are or may be found to be entitled to compensation under the provisions of the said Act, may prefer that such compensation should be made to them in land rather than in money; and it is expedient to make regulations to enable the Government to carry into effect arrangements that may be made in their behalf, and also regulations for the letting, selling, occupying, and disposing of, such Towns, Farms, Suburban and Rural Allotments:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, by virtue and in pursuance of the said authority, and of all other authorities, doth hereby Order, that the following shall be the Regulations for the purposes aforesaid:

Sufficient Land shall be set apart for-

 Roads and public purposes.
 For the location of Military and other Settlers introduced by the Government, to be devoted to their use according to the tenure of their several contracts.

3. For compensation to persons entitled to, and in lieu of, money compensation as hereafter mentioned.

The remaining Land shall be divided into lots for sale, and shall be sold by public auction: Provided that any Land may be sold to the Superintendent of the Province in which it is situate by private contract.

For any of the purposes aforesaid, the Land may be divided into Town, Suburban, and Rural Lands.

Plans of all such Lands as aforesaid shall be kept on record, and open to public inspection.

No Land shall be sold by auction until at least one month's notice shall have been published in the Gazette of the Province in which the Land is

The upset price shall not be less than Ten Shillings per acre, and shall be set by the Chief Surveyor, or other officer to be duly appointed for that pur-

The purchase-money for Land shall be paid as follows: Twenty-five (25) per cent. on the day of sale, and the remainder within one month. If either of the payments is not made, the sale will be annulled. If the former is made and the latter is not duly made, the amount paid will be forfeited, and the sale annulled. In either case, the Land may be sold

Any Agent of the Government, duly authorised, may agree with any person who may be entitled to compensation under the provisions of the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," that such person shall receive such portion of the said Suburban and Rural Land, in lieu of money compensation, as may be agreed upon between such person and agent.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL,

Proclaiming certain Lands under New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863."

At the Government House, at Auckiand, the sixteenth day of May, 1865.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," it was enacted amongst other things that whenever the Governor in Council should be satisfied that any Native Tribe or section of a Tribe, or any considerable number thereof have since the first day of January, 1863, been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty's authority, it should be lawful for the Governor in Council to declare that the district within which any land being the property or in the possession of such Tribe or section or considerable number thereof should be situate, should be a District within the provisions of the said Act, and the boundaries of such District in like manner to define and vary as he should think fit:

And whereas the Governor in Council is satisfied that certain Native Tribes or sections of Tribes having respectively as their property or in their possession the lands hereunder described, have been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty's

authority:

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the power vested in him by the said recited Act, doth hereby with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, declare that from the date hereof, the land described in each of the four schedules to this Proclamation shall be a District within the provisions of the "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," and shall be designated by the name mentioned in such schedule, and doth declare that the said lands are required for the purposes of the said Act, and are subject to the provisions thereof, and doth order that the said lands shall be and the same are hereby set apart and reserved as sites for settlement and colonisation agreeably to the provisions of the said Act.

#### SCHEDULES REFERRED TO. Mangare Block.

All that land known as the Mangare Block, bounded on the North by the Manukau Harbor, on the West by lots No. 86 and 85 in the parish of Manurewa, on the South by lots No. 84, 83, 50 and 49, all in the parish of Manurewa, and by the Ararata Creek to the Manukau Harbor.

#### Pukaki Blocks.

All that land known as the Pukaki Blocks, and which are bounded on the North by lots No. 73, 72, 57, 52, 53 and 43, all in the parish of Manurewa; on the East by Clendon's grant and the Otaimako Creek, on the South by Manukau Harbor, by Pukaki Creek, and by the western branch of Pukaki Creek to lot No. 73 in the parish of Manurewa first above mentioned.

# Ihumatau Block.

All that land known as the Ihumatau Block, bounded on the North by the Waitamokia Creek, on the West by Manukau Harbor, on the East by lots No. 89 and 90 in the parish of Manurewa, and on the South by the Manukau Harbor.

Keri Keri, or Pukekiwiriki Block.

All that piece of land known as the Keri Keri Block, near Papakura, containing about 2730 acres, and bounded on the North by the Wairoa Road, and by lot No. 3 parish of Opaheke, and by lots No. 27, 28, 29 and 30, parish of Hunua; on the East by a Government reserve and by lots No. 33 and 34 of the parish of Hunua, and by a road; on the South by a road, and by lot No. 52 parish of Opaheke, and by allotment No. 143 parish of Hunua; and on the West by a road and by lot No. 18 parish of Opaheke, by the Great South Road, and by a Church of England school reserve.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL,

Varying Boundaries of East Wairoa Block.

G. GREY, Governor.

At the Government House, at Auckland, the sixteenth day of May, 1865.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," it was enacted, amongst other things, that whenever the Governor in Council should be satisfied that any Native Tribe, or section of a Tribe, or any considerable number thereof, had since the first day of January, 1863, been engaged in rebellion against Her Majesty's authority, it should be lawful for the Governor in Council, to declare that the Districts within which any land, being the property or in the possession of such tribe, or section or considerable number thereof should be situate, should be a District within the provisions of the said Act; and the boundaries of such District in like manner to define and vary as he should think fit. And it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor, in Council, from time to time, to set apart within any such District, eligible sites for settlements for colonization, and the boundaries of such settlements to define and vary.

And whereas by an Order in Council, made on the 30th day of January, 1865, a block of land called the East Wairoa Block was, amongst other land, constituted a district within the provisions of the said Act, and was to be designated by the name of the East Wairoa Block, and was declared by the said Order to be required for the purposes of the said Act, and to be subject to the provisions thereof, and the said block of land was set apart and reserved as a site for settlement and colonization, agreeably to the pro-

visions of the said Act.

And whereas it is expedient to vary the boundaries

of the said block of land:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, in exercise of the power for this purpose conferred upon him by the said Act, doth hereby order and declare that the boundaries of the said East Wairoa Block shall be as follows:—

East Wairoa Block.

Bounded on the north by a line commencing at the south-west angle of M'Nicol's grant, on the Eastern bank of the Wairoa River, and extending on a bearing of north 93° east to the summit of the Western Wharekawa Range.

On the east by the summit of that portion of the Wharekawa Range that leads in the most direct line

to Tuahu or the Surrey Redoubt.

On the south by a straight line from the Surrey Redoubt, on a bearing of south 43° west, to the southern margin of the Mangatawhiri Swamp.

On the west by a line from the southern margin of the Mangatawhiri Swamp, extending on a bearing of north 36° west to the Hunua purchase, thence by the south-eastern boundary of the Hunua purchase, and by the Wairoa River to the south-west angle of M'Nicol's grant aforesaid.

Suspending the operation of certain provisions of "The Arms Act, 1860."

WHEREAS by "The Arms Act Continuance Act, 1861," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor by an Order in Council, to be published in the Government Gazette, from time to time to suspend or relax the operation of the provisions of the said Act or any part of any such provisions, and either for a limited time or without any limit of time, and either as regards the whole Colony or any District thereof to be defined in any such Order in Council, and either generally or in favour of any person or persons, and specifically or any class of persons, and subject to any regulations or conditions which may be in any such Order in Council expressed, but so far only as such provisions may prevent or interfere with the sale or purchase of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, lead, caps, or shot, for mining, sporting, or any useful or harmless purpose, and no further or otherwise, anything in this Act contained to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided also that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by any further Order in Council, to be published as aforesaid, from time to time to rescind any such Order:

Now, therefore, His Excellency Sir George Grey, K.C.B., the Governor of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby order and declare that the provisions relative to the sale and disposal of ammunition for sporting purposes, and no further or otherwise in the said in part recited Act contained, shall be and the same are hereby suspended in the case of any aboriginal inhabitants of New Zealand residing within the Provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, or Wellington, who shall possess a license authorising the purchase of such ammunition as aforesaid, signed by the Minister for Native affairs

for the time being.

Report of a skirmish with the Rebels.

Wanganui, May 16th, 1865.
SIR,—I have the honor to report for the information of the New Zealand Government, that on the 13th instant I had an engagement with rebel Maoris, encamped on the Patea River, four miles north of

Kakaramea.

On the 9th of May I had sent out two parties of my detachment at Kakaramea to scout along the right and left bank of the Patea River. One party under my command found a track leading along the right bank of the river, it descended a steep cliff, furnished with ladders of poles and supplejack; it had many of the intervening streams bridged. I concluded therefore that considerable importance was attached by the Maoris to this track, and decided upon exploring its course for some distance. Having dogs with me that day I could not expect to surprise

the natives, and not wishing to leave my tracks too far | on the road I returned, resolved to use it on the

following night.

The second party, under Captain George and Ensign Whitfield, were fired upon by natives; shots were exchanged, and our men chased the natives for some distance, till they disappeared. It appeared therefore that the natives were to be found after all on the left bank; so that night at 1 a.m. I started with my whole detachment, crossed the river, and was before dawn opposite to the native encampment, but the river intervened, and we had to content ourselves with listening to the Pai Mairiri morning hymns and watching the smoke of their copa Maoris. Dense bush prevented us from seeing a single Maori, and prudence forbade any attempt of an attack from our side of the river.

We returned early on the 10th, with the intention of following the track on the right bank the coming night; but three scouts made their appearance at dusk, coming evidently from that track, where our footprints of the 9th must have revealed our intentions, and making a surprise that night anything but

feasible.

On the 11th ten scouts on foot and one on horseback were seen coming from the same direction as the first three; so that that night also was passed over as unpropitious, particularly as the continued smoke of the Maori encampment proved their de-

termination of stopping where they were.
On the night of Friday to Saturday at 1 a.m., I started with a force of forty-eight Forest Rangers and sixteen Waikato Militia, officered by Captain George, Lieut. Westrup, Ensigns Whitfield and Irwin, leaving Lieut. Malone with twenty additional Waikato Militia to guard the pass over the cliff, as ten determined men could have prevented there the return of hundreds. We got over two-thirds of our return of hundreds. way without accident, though the road was of the most difficult nature, and the time was night. Arrived at an extensive clearing, however, we lost the track. Two different tracks we ran down bootlesslyended in a precipice and eel-weir—the other in a place for steeping corn, at the bottom of a deep gorge. With infinite labour, through a dense forest, we found at last the right track and hurried along it. We came upon a row of large whares on the top of a commanding hill, but daylight was dawning already. On investigation the whares proved to be deserted, though the ashes of recent fires were still warm. While pondering over the probability of the natives having deserted the neighbourhood, large volumes of smoke ascending from a neighbouring hill below us settled that question completely.

A deep wooded ravine separated the native encampment from the hill we were on—beyond the encampment was the river. There seemed to me no chance of a surprise now; but having brought a new detachment face to face with the enemy for the first time, I deemed it necessary to attack, even at some We rapidly descended the ravine and ascended the hill; a sudden turn in our road on the top brought us to a slip-panel gate, and there, in the centre, or nearly so, of a large clearing, was the native encampment. We could see the Maori sentry and other Maoris walking about. I extended the men along the clearing, but found that the edge of the clearing was barricaded. It was necessary to break through this barricading; the noise caused thereby and the distance to the huts gave the Maoris time to grasp their arms and receive our charge with a heavy volley. We drove them, however, from the huts into the bush, Ensign Whitfield and Captain George conspicuous in their gallantry; but this was the time when we suffered the most loss, as Ensign Whitfield was hit by two shots, one breaking

his arm and one entering his side; private Macbean of No. 1 Co., F.R., was hit in the head while close to the bush. We took what cover we could get in front of the bush within twenty yards of it. A heavy fire continued now for some time. The Maoris sang Pai Mairiri hymns and danced the war dance behind their barricading, and had harangues for the purpose of inducing a charge; once or twice we heard them advance a little, but stop short at the first fire at any

visible member of their party.

I sent Lieut. Westrup to outflank them in the bush, but it was soon found that their flanks were protected by gullies. A front charge on our part would have been quite as great a piece of folly as on their part. I had enough, even with two men hors de combat, to convey them back to camp over the frightful road we had before us. As the Maoris before us were evidently calling in all directions for assistance, and, moreover, as I heard their calls answered, I deemed it at last necessary to draw off the men before some reinforcement took us at a disadvantage. I sent Lieut. Westrup to take possession of the gate once more, forwarded the wounded, and gradually drew off my men in small parties, without the Maoris perceiving our retreat. At half-past nine I left my position in front of the bush with the last five men, and left the clearing which we had entered precisely at half-past six. Six or eight Maoris were hors de combat at that time. We purposed finding an easier route for the transport of the wounded. For about a mile we cut through a dense bush in a gully till a precipice of 150 feet closed our retreat in that direction. We returned towards our old track, but found that a party of Maoris had taken possession of the big whares on the top of the hill. As we had approached the whares carefully, my advanced guard, under Sergeant Ross, shot three incautious Maoris who were peeping round the corners of the whares.

To force our way past these wheres would have added considerably to our wounded, whatever other advantage might be gained; the day was advancing fast, so I sent another exploring party under Capt. George to look after the possibility of heading the gully, while I kept watch on the Maoris in the whares. The gully was at last reported passable; we drew off gradually once more, and entered the bush unmolested. Three distinct forest gullies had to be traversed, and a road cut through them for the transport of the wounded, till we reached the fern ridges and our camp at 4 p.m., having been on our legs for fifteen hours without rest, food, or drink.

I have to bring to your special notice the conspicuous gallantry of Ensign Whitfield, who I grieve to say, died of his wounds at Patea, the 13th, at 11:30 p.m.; also the gallantry of Capt. George in leading his men across the clearing, getting several bullets through his clothing and the tip of his thumb blown The soldierly management of Lieut. Westrup was beyond all praise, as well as the usefulness of Ensign Irwin and Lieutenant Malone, the latter in command of the reserve at the cliff.

Above all, however, I must mention the unflinching conduct of all my non-commissioned officers and men,

who performed their arduous duties on that long day without a murmur, and with courageous alacrity. Private Macbean died on the road home, was buried there temporarily, and conveyed to camp on the following day. On that day Lieut. Westrup went out with a party of volunteers to look for a man of his company who had lost his way in the bush. That

man (private Best, No. 1 Co., F.R.,) was not found on the 15th instant

I have, &c., G. F. Von Tempsky, Major Forest Rangers. P.S.—The party under Lieut. Westrup who went

on the 14th to look for private Best, reported that no smoke could be seen at the native encampment, also no new tracks; in all probability, therefore, the natives have left that part of the river.

The object of the expedition of the 13th was a twofold one—the first to put as many natives as possible hors de comoat, and the second and most important one, to prove to the natives that we can find them wherever they may hide and that their securest fastnesses will prove no obstacle to their being attacked.
