A PROCLAMATION

Appointing certain Districts under "The Marriage Act."

WHEREAS by "The Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time, by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to divide the Colony of New Zealand, for the purposes of the said Act, into such and so many districts as he may think fit, and that every such district shall be called by a distinct name, and shall be a Registrar's District, and it is provided that the Governor may at any time revoke the whole or any part of such Proclamation, and issue a new Proclamation, dividing the Colony or any part of it anew into districts, or increasing the number or altering the boundaries of districts, as from time to time he may think requisite.

And whereas, by Proclamations duly made and issued, the Governor in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, did, amongst others, constitute districts in the Province of Otago for the purposes of the said Act, the boundaries whereof were therein set forth.

And whereas it is expedient to revoke so much of the said Proclamations as relates to the said districts, and to divide anew the territory formerly comprised within such districts.

Now therefore I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby revoke the said Proclamations, so far as relates to the said districts, and do proclaim and declare that the territory formerly comprised within such districts shall be and is hereby divided for the purposes of the said Act into districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:—

DUNEDIN DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by the Waihero Creek, Blueskin Bay, and the ocean; on the East and South by Port Chalmers District, and by the ocean; and on the West by Kaikorai and

Abbott's Creeks; thence by the watershed of the Kaikorai Flagstaff and Swampy Hill Ranges to the source of the Waihero Creek.

PORT CHALMERS DISTRICT.

All that area comprising the town of Port Chalmers, the Lower Harbour, West Survey District, the Sawyer's Bay Survey District, sections numbered 88 to 115 inclusive, North-east Valley Survey District, and Blocks 4, 5, 6, and part of 7, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District, bounded from the North-west corner of Block 4, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District, in a southerly direction, by the Western boundary line of the said Block 4, to the Northern boundary line of Block 6, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District; thence by the said Northern boundary line of the said Block 6, and the Northern boundary line of Block 7, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District, to the Main North Road; thence by the Main North Road to the Northern boundary line of the North-east Valley Survey District; thence in a westerly direction by the said Northern boundary line of the North-east Valley District to a road line between Sections 87 and 89 of the said district; thence by the said road line continued between Sections 86 and 88, North-east Valley District, to the Northern boundary line of Block 9, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District; thence in an easterly direction by the said Northern boundary line of the said Block 9, to the north-west corner of Section 33, Sawyer's Bay Survey District; thence in a south-easterly direction by the boundary line of the said Sawyer's Bay Survey District to Otago Harbour; and thence by high-water mark to the starting point.

ARROW DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North and East by the Wanaka District, and by the Dunstan Districts; towards the South by the Kawarau River; and on the West by the watershed of the Shotover and Arrow Rivers.

OAMARU DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by

the Province of Canterbury; on the East by the ocean; on the South by the Horse, Kakanui, Hawken Ranges; and on the West by Mount St. Bathans and the continuation of the Dunstan Mountains to the Province of Canterbury.

EAST TAIERI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by Waikouaiti District; on the East by Dunedin District; on the South by the ocean; and on the West by the Taieri River.

WAIKOUAITI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the East from Shag Point by the ocean to the Dunedin Registration District; thence towards the South by the Dunedin Registration District to Silver Peak Hills; by Silver Peak Hills to a point due east of Allen's Creek; thence to Allan's Creek, and by the said creek to the Taieri River; thence towards the West by the Taieri River to Fillyburn; thence towards the North by a line due east to the Oamaru Registration District; and thence by the said district to the starting point.

WAKATIPU DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Province of Canterbury; towards the East by the Wanaka, Arrow, Dunstan, and Nokomai Registration Districts; towards the South by the Province of Southland and the ocean; and towards the West by the ocean.

WAREPA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Nokomai Registration District; towards the East by the Manuherikia, Mount Bengel, and Gabriel's Registration Districts, and by the Clutha River, Koau Branch; towards the South by the ocean; and towards the West by the Province of Southland.

WEST TAIERI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Lammermoor Ranges and Sutton's Stream; towards the East by Waikouaiti and East Taieri Districts; and towards the South and West by Tokomairiro and Gabriel's Districts.

MOUNT BENGER DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from the north-west corner of Gabriel's Registration District in a northerly direction, and parallel to the Clutha River, to Spylaw Burn at its source; thence by Spylaw to the Pomahaka River; thence to Wart Hill; thence to White Coomb; thence by the Umbrella Mountains to a point due west of Jordan Creek; thence of Jordan Creek at its junction with the Clutha River; thence to South Roughridge Hill; thence along the western boundary of Hamilton Registration District to the Lammerlaw; and thence in a south-westerly direction by the boundary line of Gabriel's Registration District to the starting point.

MANUHERIKIA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding in a westerly direction from White Coomb to the Wakaia River; thence by the Wakaia River to the White Coomb Creek; thence by the Ranges to Rocky Mount; thence to the Obelisk; thence in a northerly direction to a point due west of Earnsclough Burn; thence to Earnsclough Burn at its junction with the Clutha River; thence parallel to the Manuherikia River to Spottis Burn; thence in a southerly direction to the Raggedy Range; and by the watershed of Manor Burn to South Roughridge Hill; thence in a westerly direction by the boundary of Mount Bengel Registration District.

GABRIEL'S DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding in a northerly direction twenty chains distant from and parallel to the Clutha River, from a point opposite Crookburn to a point opposite Beaumont Burn; thence to and along Beaumont Burn to its source; thence to the Lammerlaw; thence along the Ranges to Maungatua Hill; thence by the boundary of the West Taieri Hundred to a point south-east of Waitahuna Hill; thence over Waitahuna Hill to the watershed between the Waitahuna and Tuapeka Rivers; thence to Crookburn at its source; and thence along Crookburn and across the Clutha River to the starting point.

NOKOMAI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from Lorn Peak to Rocky Mount; thence by the Ranges over the Steeple and East Dome to the boundary of the Province of Southland; thence by the boundary of the Province of Southland to a point two miles above Allenburn; and thence in a north-easterly direction to Lorn Peak, the starting point.

DUNSTAN DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from the northern corner of Manuherikia Registration District to the Dunstan Creek at its junction with the Manuherikia River; thence by the said creek to the Dunstan Mountains; thence to Park Burn at its junction with the Clutha River; thence by Park Burn to its source; thence to Kirtleburn at the junction of its first feeder; thence by Kirtleburn to the Kawaurau River; thence by the Kawarau River to a point due north of Ben Nevis; thence by the Ranges to Lorn Peak; thence by the Nokomai and Manuherikia Registration Districts to the starting point.

BLACKSTONE DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by a line proceeding from the northern corner of the Dunstan Registration District to Mount St. Bathans; towards the East by the Oamaru Registration District; towards the South by the Hamilton Registration District; and towards the West by the Manuherikia and Dunstan Registration Districts.

HAMILTON DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from Lammerlaw along the watershed of the Upper Taieri River to South Roughridge Hill; thence to North Roughridge Hill; thence to Mount Ida; thence by the Oamaru, Waikouaiti, and West Taieri Registration Districts to the starting point.

WAITAHUNA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North and East by Gabriel's Registration District; towards the South by the Tokomairiro Registration District and towards the West by the Clutha River.

NORTH MOLYNEUX DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by Deucher Burn; thence to Stoney Creek; thence by Stoney Creek to the Tuakitoto Lake; thence towards the East by the eastern shore of the Tuakitoto Lake to Two Stone Creek; thence by Two Stone Creek to the leading ridge direct to Wangaloa Creek; thence by Wangaloa Creek to the ocean; thence towards the South by the ocean to the Clutha River; and thence towards the West by the Clutha River and its Koau branch to the junction of Deucher Burn, the starting point.

TOKOMAIRO DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded from the Clutha River by the northern boundary of the North Tokomairiro and West Taieri Hundreds to the Waipori River; thence by the Waipori River and Lake and

the Taieri River to the ocean; thence by the ocean to the Wangaloa Creek; thence by the North Molyneux Registration District to the Clutha River; and by the Clutha River to the starting point.

WANAKA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Province of Canterbury; towards the East by the Oamaru District; towards the South by the Blackstone and Dunstan Registration Districts; and towards the West by the Arrow and Wakatip Registration Districts.

And I do declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

DUNEDIN DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by the Waihemo Creek, Blueskin Bay, and the ocean; on the East and South by Port Chalmers District and by the ocean; and on the West by Kaikorai and Abbott's Creeks; thence by the watershed of the Kaikorai Flagstaff and Swampy Hill Ranges to the source of the Waihemo Creek.

PORT CHALMERS DISTRICT.

All that area comprising the Town of Port Chalmers, the Lower Harbour, West Survey District, the Sawyer's Bay Survey District, Sections numbered 88 to 115 inclusive, North-east Valley Survey District, and Blocks 4, 5, 6, and part of 7 North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District—Bounded from the north-west corner of Block 4, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District, in a southerly direction, by the western boundary line of the said Block 4 to the northern boundary line of Block 6, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District; thence by the said northern boundary line of the said Block 6, and the northern boundary line of Block 7, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District, to the Main North Road; thence by the Main North Road to the northern boundary line of the North-east Valley Survey District; thence in a westerly direction by the said northern boundary line of the North-east Valley District to a road line between Sections 87 and 89 of the said district; thence by the said road line continued between Sections 86 and 88, North-east Valley District to the northern boundary line of Block 9, North Harbour and Blueskin Survey District; thence in an easterly direction by the said northern boundary line of the said Block 9 to the north-west corner of Section 33, Sawyer's Bay Survey District; thence in a south-easterly direction by the boundary line of the said Sawyer's Bay Survey District to Otago Harbour; and thence by high-water mark to the starting-point.

ARROW DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North and East by the Wanaka District, and by the Dunstan Districts; towards the South by the Kawarau River; and on the West by the watershed of the Shotover and Arrow Rivers.

OAMARU DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by the Province of Canterbury; on the East by the ocean; on the South by the Horse, Kakanui Hawkden Ranges; and on the West by Mount St. Bathans, and the continuation of the Dunstan Mountains to the Province of Canterbury.

EAST TAIERI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded on the North by Waikouaiti District, on the East by Dunedin District, on the South by the ocean, and on the West by the Taieri River.

WAIKOUAITI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the East from Shag Point by the ocean to the Dunedin Registration District; thence towards the South by the Dunedin Registration District to Silver Peak Hills; by Silver Peak Hills to a point due east of Allen's Creek; thence to Allen's Creek, and by the said creek to the Taieri River; thence towards the West by the Taieri River to Fillyburn; thence towards the North by a line due east to the Oamaru Registration District; and thence by the said district to the starting point.

WAKATIP DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Province of Canterbury; towards the East by the Wanaka, Arrow, Dunstan, and Nokomai Registration Districts; towards the South by the Province of Southland and the Ocean; and towards the West by the ocean.

WAREPA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Nokomai Registration District; towards the East by the Manuhierikia, Mount Benger, and Gabriel's Registration Districts, and by the Clutha

River, Koan branch; towards the South by the ocean; and towards the West by the Province of Southland.

WEST TAIERI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Lammermoor Ranges and Sutton's Stream; towards the East by Waikouaiti and East Taieri Districts; and towards the South and West by Tokomairiro and Gabriel's Districts.

MOUNT BENDER DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from the north-west corner of Gabriel's Registration District in a northerly direction, and parallel to the Clutha River to Spylaw Burn at its source; thence by Spylaw Burn to the Pomahaka River; thence to Wart Hill; thence to White Coomb; thence by the Umbrella Mountains to a point due west of Jordan Creek; thence of Jordan Creek at its junction with the Clutha River; thence to South Roughridge Hill; thence along the western boundary of Hamilton Registration District to the Lammerlaw; and thence in a south-westerly direction by the boundary line of Gabriel's Registration District to the starting point.

MANUHERIKIA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding in a westerly direction from White Coomb to the Wakaia River; thence by the Wakaia River to the White Coomb Creek; thence by the ranges to Rocky Mount; thence to the Obelisk; thence in a northerly direction to a point due west of Earnsclough Burn; thence to Earnsclough Burn at its junction with the Clutha River; thence parallel to the Manuherikia River to Spottis Burn; thence in a southerly direction to the Raggedy Range; and by the watershed of Manor Burn to South Roughridge Hill; thence in a westerly direction by the boundary of Mount Benger Registration District.

GABRIEL'S DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding in a northerly direction, twenty chains distant from and parallel to the Clutha River, from a point opposite Crookburn to a point opposite Beaumont Burn; thence to and along Beaumont Burn to its source; thence to the Lammerlaw; thence along the ranges to Maungatua Hill; thence by the boundary of the West Taieri Hundred to a point south-east of Waitahuna Hill; thence over Waitahuna Hill to the watershed between the Waitahuna and Tuaepeka Rivers; thence to Crookburn at its source, and thence along Crookburn, and across the Clutha River to the starting point.

NOKOMAI DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from Lorn Peak to Rocky Mount; thence by the ranges over the Steeple and East Dome to the boundary of the Province of Southland; thence by the boundary of the Province of Southland to a point two miles above Allanburn; and thence in a north-easterly direction to Lorn Peak, the starting point.

DUNSTAN DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from the northern corner of Manuherikia Registration District to the Dunstan Creek at its junction with the Manuherikia River; thence by the said creek to the Dunstan Mountains; thence to Park Burn at its junction with the Clutha River; thence by Park Burn to its source; thence to Kirtle Burn, at the junction of its first feeder; thence by Kirtle Burn to the Kawarau River; thence by the Kawarau River to a point due north of Ben Nevis; thence by the ranges to Lorn Peak; thence by the Nokomai and Manuherikia Registration Districts to the starting point.

BLACKSTONE DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by a line proceeding from the northern corner of the Dunstan Registration District to Mount St. Bathans; towards the East by the Oamaru Registration District; towards the South by the Hamilton Registration District; and towards the West by the Manuherikia and Dunstan Registration Districts.

HAMILTON DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded by a line proceeding from Lammerlaw, along the watershed of the Upper Taieri River to South Roughridge Hill; thence to North Roughridge Hill; thence to Mount Ida; thence by the Oamaru, Waikouaiti and West Taieri Registration Districts to the starting point.

WAITAHUNA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North and East by Gabriel's Registration District; towards the South by the Tokomairiro Registration District; and towards the West by the Clutha River.

NORTH MOLYNEUX DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by Deucher Burn; thence to Stoney Creek; thence by Stoney Creek to the Tuakitoto Lake; thence towards the East by the eastern shore of the Tuakitoto Lake to Two Stone Creek; thence by Two Stone Creek to the leading ridge direct to Wangaloa Creek; thence by Wangaloa Creek to the ocean; thence towards the South by the ocean to the Clutha River; and thence towards the West by the Clutha River and its Koau branch to the junction of Deucher Burn, the starting point.

TOKOMAIRIRO DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded from the Clutha River by the northern boundary of the North Tokomairiro and West Taieri Hundreds to the Waipori River; thence by the Waipori River and Lake, and the Taieri River to the ocean; thence by the ocean to the Wangaloa Creek; thence by the North Molyneux Registration District to the Clutha River; and by the Clutha River to the starting point.

WANAKA DISTRICT,

comprises all that area bounded towards the North by the Province of Canterbury; towards the East by the Oamaru District; towards the South by the Blackstone and Dunstan Registration Districts; and towards the West by the Arrow and Wakatip Registration Districts.

And I do declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of February, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

A PROCLAMATION

For the Naturalization of certain Persons.

WHEREAS by "The Naturalization Act, 1865," it is enacted that every person, who shall be declared to come within the operation of that Act by

any Proclamation to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor, shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken, until the termination of the next session of the General Assembly, to be, and to have been, from such specified time, a natural-born subject of Her Majesty, within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule to that Act annexed: Provided always that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation, or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation:

Now therefore I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the persons hereinafter mentioned shall come within the operation of the said Act from the dates hereinafter specified, viz. :—

DOMINIC GALOSI,

from the fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, native of Marches, Italy, Roman Catholic priest; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

JOSEPH GREGORI,

from the fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, native of Marches, Italy, Roman Catholic priest; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

NIVARD JOURDAN,

from the fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, Native of Piedmont, Italy, Roman Catholic priest; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

FRANCIS DEL MONTE,

from the fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, native of Bologna, Italy, Roman Catholic priest; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

STEPHEN PASSINETTI,

from the fourteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, native of Lombardy, Italy, Roman Catholic priest; residence, Auckland, in the Province of Auckland.

BENDIX HALLENSTEIN,

from the fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, native of Brunswick, Germany, merchant; residence, Queenstown, in the Province of Otago.

EDWARD DOW,

from the thirteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, native of Maine, U.S. America, farmer; residence, Collingwood, in the Province of Nelson.

A PROCLAMATION

Relieving the Waikato Militia from actual service when placed on their Land.

WHEREAS by certain conditions upon which land in the Waikato country, in the Province

of Auckland, was granted to Volunteer Militiamen, it was declared that when such Volunteer Militia should be authorized by the Government to take possession of their land they would be relieved from "actual service." And whereas it appears that various Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Privates, who were enrolled or appointed under those conditions, have now been authorized to take possession of their land in the Waikato country:

Now therefore I, Sir George Grey, the Governor as aforesaid, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by "The Militia Act, 1858," do hereby dismiss from "actual service" the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Privates, who have been authorized to take possession of their land; and do hereby further dismiss from "actual service" all Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates, so enrolled or appointed, who may from time to time be authorized to take possession of their land from the time or respective times of such authorization.

A PROCLAMATION

Relieving First and Second Class Auckland Militia from actual service.

WHEREAS in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in me vested by "The Militia Act, 1858," I, Sir George Grey, K.C.B., Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, did by warrants bearing date the eighth and eighteenth days of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three respectively, direct Colonel Thomas Rawlings Mould, C.B., then the officer commanding the Militia of the Auckland District, with all convenient speed to call out for actual service the men of the first and second classes of the Auckland Regiment of Militia; and whereas, in pursuance of such orders, the men of the first and second classes of the said Militia were called out for and do now remain upon actual service; and whereas it appears to me to be no longer necessary that such portions of the said Militia should continue upon actual service:

Now therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor as aforesaid, in pursuance of the powers vested in me under the said recited Act, do hereby dismiss from actual service the men of the first and second classes of the Auckland Regiment of Militia.

ORDER IN COUNCIL

Revoking an Order in Council of 18th September last, and otherwise Regulating the exercise of the Miners' Rights Franchise.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is expedient that, in pursuance of the Acts of the General Assembly respectively entitled "The Miners' Representation Act, 1862," and "The Miners' Representation Act Amendment Act, 1863," and "The Miners' Representation Act Amendment Act, 1865," an appointment should be made by the Governor in Council of a distinguishing mark or stamp, to be impressed upon every Miner's Right in respect of which the Miner's franchise shall be exercised, and that a regulation should be made for the use thereof:

And whereas it is expedient that the Order in Council made on the eighteenth day of September last for the above purpose should be revoked:

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby revoke the said Order in Council, and doth hereby appoint, order, and direct, that from and after the first day of December next, the Stamp to be impressed by the Returning Officer, or person appointed by him for that purpose, at each Polling Place, upon Miners' Rights and Business Licenses, in accordance with the provisions contained in the said Acts, shall be a Stamp bearing the words "Miners' Franchise Exercised," and the date of such exercise.

THE following Report by the Master of the Steamer "Southland" of the recent trip of that vessel to the Auckland Islands in search of persons supposed to have been shipwrecked there, is published for general information.

E. W. STAFFORD.

Invercargill, 11th November, 1865.

SIR,—I have the honor to report the safe arrival of the Steamer "Southland," after having made search in the Auckland Islands for shipwrecked persons, and found none. An outline of the incidents of the voyage is as follows:

The "Southland" under my command, left New River on the 14th ultimo, having on board seventeen souls, including Dr. Moncton, Mr. Baker, (Chief Surveyor,) and Mr. G. Fred. Richardson, as reporter for the Press. After getting into Foveaux Strait a fresh gale sprung up from south-west, bringing with it a considerable swell, which caused the vessel to roll her sponsons under water and threaten to wash away the wing-houses placed on them, which had not been very securely fastened. As the gale appeared to be increasing I put into Port Adventure partly to obtain shelter and partly to get the wing-houses and paddle-boxes better secured.

This last having been accomplished as far as was practicable, and the gale having eased, we left Port Adventure at six o'clock p.m., on the 18th, passed the south cape of Stewart's Island at 10:30 p.m., and on the morning of the 19th at 9:30, passed within three miles of the Snares. The weather being clear at the time we would have seen any ordinary signal made on these islands by shipwrecked persons, had any been there.

Next day (20th October) the wind freshened from west-north-west, with a high sea, thick haze, and rain. The density of the haze prevented our seeing the land until four in the afternoon, and before we got inshore the weather thickened again, and as night was coming on, I preferred to keep clear of the shore and keep under canvas till morning.

At daylight on the 21st we steamed slowly round Enderby Island, and into Laurie Cove at the head of Port Ross, closely scanning the shore with our glasses as we went along. This anchorage is easy of access and perfectly safe, being entirely land-locked; but with westerly winds it is subject to violent gusts of wind which come through a deep gully at the head of it. We remained in this place till the morning of the 26th, and during the time visited all the shores and bays in the neighbourhood without meeting in with any traces to show that shipwrecked persons had recently been there. The weather very much prevented our explorations, for it blew hard the whole time with snow and hail squalls. The body found by the crew of the "Flying Scud" we disinterred, and putting it in a wooden box, buried it near to the mounds of four graves which we discovered a little distance off, and placed over it an inscription painted on wood, stating who had originally found the body and by whom it had been buried there. The opinion of Dr. Moncton on examining the skeleton, was, that it must have been dead at least a twelvemonth. The only indications of castaway persons having been there were on Ocean Point, and these must have been some twelvemonths old: they were the remains of a hut composed of small branches and grass. Near to the hut lay a large heap of limpet shells giving evidence of the nature of the food the unfortunates must have principally subsisted on. A little to the westward on an eminence commanding an extensive view of the ocean to the northward lay prostrate a rude representation of a cross, probably put up originally for a signal staff. On the beach a short distance from the point was the wreck of a small boat which had been made of small sticks interlacing each other like wickerwork and fastened with narrow strips of seal hide, and this last-mentioned material had probably been used for covering the outside of it with.

From Ocean Point all along the shore to the place which had been the head quarters of the settlement there were evidences of former occupation, such as remnants of huts and patches of ground which had been cleared and cultivated but now all overgrown with luxuriant vegetation.

About two miles down the bay, on the south side, we found an old ship's boat, square sterned, about eighteen feet long, entirely weather bleached and overgrown with moss inside. There was no name on it. I should have mentioned that on our first landing we saw a large trunk of a tree which had been smoothed to admit of the following inscription being cut on it:

H M C S Victoria
Norman

in search of shipwrecked people
October 13, 1865

and placed in a hollow of the tree was a bottle enclosing a letter, of which the following is a copy:

"H.M.C.S. 'Victoria,' 17th October, 1865.

"The above ship arrived in this harbour on the 13th October, having searched every bay from Adams' Island to the Sandy Bay on Enderby's Island, for traces of shipwrecked people. She will leave here to-morrow to continue the search round the western shores of this island to Carnley's Harbour and from thence to Antipodes Island and Bounty Island. On Enderley's Island have been landed some goats and

rabbits for the purpose of increasing their number, to relieve shipwrecked people. Some goats have also been landed here and vegetables and trees planted near the marked tree for the same purpose; and this humane service having been performed by order of the Governments of Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland, it is requested any visitors to these shores will give every aid in their power to secure this benevolent object, and not allow the animals and plants to be exterminated or destroyed.

Before leaving this place we planted about a cwt. of potatoes and sowed some carrot and turnip seed in ground which we dug up for that purpose, and at another point landed a dozen of domestic fowls.

We left a memorandum of our visit cut out on a board which we nailed to a tree near to the “Victoria’s,” and deposited a bottle enclosing a letter stating the object of our visit, by whom it had been ordered, and the manner we intended to prosecute further our search. Wherever any of our party went the grass was set fire to, and the smoke of these fires might occasionally be seen rising from the tops of the adjacent hills, and on one occasion from the top of Mount Eden, 1325 feet above the sea level, so that before leaving we dispelled any remaining doubt we previously had that living persons might still be existing there.

Feeling that nothing of service could be effected by remaining longer at that place, we got under weigh on the morning of the 26th. The wind at the time had just shifted round to north-west with rain, barometer 29.40 falling. We passed between Rose Island and the main, examining the shore as we went along, the whale-boat leading the way about a quarter of a mile ahead with the mate sounding. In this way we passed inside of Briscoe Reef, or rather through a passage about a mile and a half from the shore and about a quarter of a mile wide, a long ground swell from the south-east breaking high on the reef on either side of us. The tide being against us we were obliged to keep considerable way on the vessel, and could only use ten fathoms of line in sounding, but at that depth found no bottom.

We went into the first bay we came to which was about six miles from Briscoe Reef. It forms three bays which induced us to name it Triple Bay. Seeing nothing there we went into the next inlet, about three miles further on. The entrance to it is about three-quarters of a mile wide and the inlet runs up about three miles. Finding at the head of it safe anchorage I chose to remain there all night, as I apprehended a gale coming from the south-east. After anchoring the barometer fell to 28.90, and at 9 p.m., the wind suddenly chopped into south-east and blew a hurricane. The vessel was however well moored with two anchors out towards the middle of the inlet, and two hausers from the bow to the shore, and rode safely in smooth water.

The following day (Friday, the 27th,) we examined all the shores of this bay without meeting with anything we searched for. On the morning of the 28th, the barometer having risen to 29.40, the wind having veered round to west-south-west and the swell outside being considerably down, we got under weigh. This day we did not land with the boat, but stood into all the bays on the East Coast till we came to Carnley’s Harbour. Each bay we came to we stood up to the head of, and so near to the land that we could have easily discerned so small an object as an oar lying on the beach. These bays or inlets we named in the following order as we entered them, beginning from Long Inlet, where we got under way: Long Inlet, Saddle-hill Bay, Seal Inlet, Cascade Inlet, Open Inlet, Basin Bay, and Smoke Bay. At the head of Cascade Inlet and Saddle-hill Bay, a

vessel could safely anchor in from twelve to six fathoms and be entirely land-locked. The place we named Smoke Bay was close to the place where the crew of the “Flying Scud,” thought they saw smoke rise from. I was therefore more particular in examining the shores of it, and this I did with such minuteness that I could discern by the aid of my glass the individual pebbles on the beach, but saw not even a broken branch or any trace giving evidence that human life had ever existed there. On reaching Carnley’s Harbour, we anchored in the place named by Captain Musgrave, Camp Cove. We remained in this snug spot safely moored head and stern until the morning of the 6th instant, and during the time visited with the whale-boat all the shores we were able to reach on either side of us, but our operations were very much limited by the state of the weather, which was one continued gales from the westward, with snow, hail, and rain squalls. On one occasion we were two days absent from the vessel, the gale having increased so as to render impracticable our return. On our visit to the hut constructed by the crew of the “Grafton,” we again discovered a bottle containing a letter left by the “Victoria.” I wrote on the back of the letter a notice of the “Southland’s” visit to that part, and also that we (which we did) had planted potatoes there and on Musgrave’s Peninsula, had sowed carrot and turnip seed and landed goats, and also, at Camp Cove, landed domestic fowls. Replacing the letter in the bottle, I left it as I found it.

In this place we adopted our former plan of making fires wherever any of our party went. On some occasions these could have been seen from a distance of many miles like bush fires.

On Monday, the 6th instant, we got under weigh at daylight, and during the day steamed up to the head of all the arms of the harbour, and, as formerly, fired guns to attract attention; but without any practicable result. Being therefore satisfied that nothing further could be done there, we anchored again at Camp Cove for the night.

Tuesday, the 7th, we got under weigh again at daylight, and proceeded to sea through the passage we came in by (the eastern one), and went closely round the south side of Adams’ Island, and along the west side of the Auckland Group. In going along shore I was unable to keep so close in as I would have wished. There was a heavy swell rolling in upon the shore, accompanied by a fresh breeze, and I therefore kept at between three and four miles distance all the way along. The tops of the hills were obscured by the haze; but the lower part of the shore was distinctly visible, unless during an occasional squall, which would only last from five to ten minutes. At 4 p.m. we got to the north end, and shortly afterwards passed Enderby Island. The wind then moderated, but the swell retarded our progress, so that we did not get up to the Snares before 4 p.m. the following day. I may here remark that I found no current setting to the eastward as mentioned by Captain Musgrave on his first landing here, for the vessel (the “Southland”) came in upon the spot she was steered for, both going and coming.

At daylight, on the 9th instant, we were off Stewart Island, and came up to the wharf here the same afternoon.
