WHEREAS by "The Jury Law Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that the term "Police Magistrate," contained in an Ordinance passed by the Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand (Session II., No. 3), intituled "An Ordinance to regulate the constitution of Juries," and in a further Ordinance passed by the Governor and the said Council (Session III., No. 2), intituled "An Ordinance to make temporary provisions for the constitution of Juries," shall mean and imply the Resident Magistrate for the time being of the principal City or Town in each Province, and also the Resident Magistrate acting in any District or Place which may be from time to time specified in any proclamation to be issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Governor in Council: Now therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, do hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, proclaim and declare the Resident Magistrate at Naseby, in the Province of Otago, to be a Police Magistrate for the purposes mentioned in the said Ordinances.

And whereas by a proclamation bearing date the eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, a district was constituted in the Province of Otago within which a District Court should be held under the said "District Courts Act, 1858," to be designated "The District Court of the Otago Gold Fields:" And whereas it is expedient that there should be sittings of the said Court within the said Province:

On the second Wednesday in March, and the second Wednesday in May;
- In the Resident Magistrate's Court at Clyde: On the Monday next after the second Wednesday in March, and the Monday next after the second Wednesday in May;
- In the Resident Magistrate's Court at Queens-town: On the Monday second after the second Wednesday in March, and the Monday second after the second Wednesday in May;

in the said Province, in every year, or as soon as conveniently may be after such days respectively.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly intituled "The Protection of Certain Animals Act, 1865," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by warrant under his hand from time to time to delegate all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or the Governor in Council by the aforesaid Act, subject to such regulations as he may think fit, and may from time to time rescind such delegation:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Gold Fields Act, 1866," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, under his hand and the Public Seal of the Colony, from time to time to delegate to the Superintendent of any Province, or to such other person as the Governor may deem fit, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or the Governor in Council by the said Act, except the powers conferred by sections twenty-two, forty, forty-eight, sixty, ninety-six, and one hundred and seven thereof, subject or not to any limitations or restrictions as he may think fit, and in like manner to alter or revoke any such powers.

And whereas it is further provided that whenever the Governor shall have delegated to the Superintendent of any Province all or any of the aforesaid powers, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to appoint and declare that all costs, charges, and expenses, incident to the management and administration of the Gold Fields within such Province shall be regulated by Acts or Ordinances to be passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of such Province.

And whereas by instruments in writing, bearing date the twelfth day of October, 1866, issued under the Seal of the Colony, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, and in exercise of the before-recited power, hath delegated to the various Superintendents of the Provinces in the said Colony all the aforesaid powers, excepting those before recited to be excepted, to hold and exercise the said powers within the Provinces aforesaid:

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority for this purpose by the said Act conferred, doth hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, appoint and declare that all the costs, charges, and expenses, incident to the management and administration of the Gold Fields, within the aforesaid Provinces, shall be regulated by Acts to be passed by the Superintendents and Provincial Councils thereof.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The New Zealand Native Reserves Act, 1856," certain powers therein specified are vested in the Commissioners under the said Act: And whereas by another Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Native Reserves Amendment Act, 1862," all the powers and authorities which by "The New Zealand Native Reserves Act, 1856," are given to or vested in or which may be exercised by Commissioners appointed or to be appointed under that Act, shall vest in and may be exercised by the Governor. And it is by the said Act further enacted that the Governor may by Order in Council from time to time delegate all or any of the powers competent to the Commissioners under the said Act unto any person or persons, for any period, and subject to any regulations or stipulations as may be specified in such Order:

Now therefore, His Excellency Sir George Grey, in exercise of the power and authority so vested in him as Governor as aforesaid, doth by this Order in Council delegate, until this Order shall be revoked, to

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by "The Customs Duties Act Amendment Act, 1861," that it shall be lawful for the Governor by any Order in Council from time to time to declare that any wine, ale, beer, or spirits may be delivered out of bond without payment of duties of Customs, for the consumption of the Officers of Her Majesty's Troops in the Colony of New Zealand, and the Officers of Her Majesty's Navy serving on board any of Her Majesty's Ships in the seas adjoining thereto, and may from time to time by any further Order in Council amend or alter any such Order:

And whereas an Order was made in Council in exercise of the said power on the fourteenth day of April, 1862, and it is expedient to make alterations in the privileges thereby granted:

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth order that wine only may be delivered out of bond without payment of duties of Customs for the consumption of any military or naval mess, upon the certificate of the President that

the wine is required for mess consumption; also to the General or other Officer commanding each station upon the certificate of a like character from an Officer of his or their staff, and to other Officers upon the presentation of a similar certificate signed by an Officer appointed by the Officer commanding the troops; the certificate in all cases to state that the wine required is for the use of the persons for whom remission of duty is applied for.

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS ARE MADE UNDER AUTHORITY OF AN ACT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, ENTITLED "THE POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK ACT, 1865."

1. Every Post Office, being a Money Order Office, at which the Postmaster-General shall permit deposits to be received, will be open for that purpose, and for the repayment of moneys withdrawn, during the hours appointed for the transaction of Money Order business at the said Post Office.

Any Post Office, not being a Money Order Office at which the Postmaster-General shall permit deposits to be received or repaid, shall be open for that purpose during such hours and on such days as the Postmaster-General shall determine.

2. Deposits of One Shilling, or of any number of Shillings, or of Pounds and Shillings, will be received from any Depositor at the Post Office Savings Banks.

3. Every Depositor on making a first deposit shall be required to specify his Christian name and Surname, occupation, and residence to the Officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive the deposit, and make and sign the following Declaration, to be witnessed by the Officer of the Postmaster-General appointed to receive deposits, or by some person known to him, or by a Justice of the Peace:—

4. On making the Declaration, and in all cases in which the signature of the Depositor is required, if the Depositor cannot write, his mark must be affixed in the presence of a witness, and attested by the signature of that witness.

5. Every deposit received by any Officer of the Postmaster-General, appointed for that purpose, shall be entered by him at the time in a numbered book, and the entry shall be attested by him, and by the dated stamp of his office, and the said book, with the entry so attested, shall be given to the Depositor and retained by him as primary evidence of the receipt of the deposit. The Depositor shall sign his name in a place to be provided for his signature in the Depositor's Book. As soon as possible after the commencement of each month, the amount placed to the credit of each Depositor in the books of the Postmaster-General during the preceding month shall be acknowledged in the following form by the Officer whom the Postmaster-General shall appoint for the purpose, and the acknowledgment shall be forthwith transmitted by post to the Depositor.

Interest, calculated yearly, at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum on sums less than Two hundred pounds, and at the rate of 4 per cent. on sums over Two hundred pounds, and in the same proportions for any shorter time will be allowed on every complete pound deposited: Provided that no interest be allowed on more than Five hundred pounds.

Interest shall be computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which a complete Pound shall have been deposited, or on which deposits of a less amount shall have made up a complete Pound, up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are with drawn.

The interest will be calculated to the 31st December in every year, and will then be added to, and become part of the principal money.

7. Deposits may be made by a Trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of such Trustee, and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but repayment of the same, or any part thereof, shall not be made without the receipt and receipts of both the said parties, or the survivor or survivors, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, whose receipt and receipts either personally or by agent appointed by Power of Attorney, which Power of Attorney may be executed by an infant of or exceeding the age of 14 years, shall alone be a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster-General may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow repayment to be made to the Trustee alone.

8. Deposits may be made by, or for the benefit of, any person under 21 years of age, and repayment shall be made to such minor after the age of 7 years in the same manner as if he were of full age. In case of minors under the age of 7 years, the Declaration must be made by one of the parents, or a friend on behalf of the minor.

9. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman, unless her husband shall give notice in writing of such marriage to the Postmaster-General, and shall require payment to be made to him.

Every Depositor shall, once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which he made his first deposit, forward his Book to the principal office in the Province in a cover to be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank, in order that the entries in the said Book may be examined, and that the interest due to the Depositor may be inserted in his Book.

The Postmaster will endeavour to prevent fraud, and to identify every Depositor transacting business with the Post Office Savings Bank ; but if any person shall fraudulently represent himself to be a Depositor, and by forwarding the proper notice of withdrawal, and by presentation of the Depositor's Book, and compliance with the Rules of the Department, shall obtain any sum of money belonging to that Depositor, the Postmaster will not be responsible for the loss thereof.

A Depositor who is about to remove from one Province to another, should give a written authority to the Chief Postmaster to transfer the balance of deposits standing to his credit to the office of the Chief Postmaster of the Province to which he is about to remove. The Postmaster will thereupon transmit a Certificate to the Post Office Savings Bank to which the balance of deposits is to be transferred, and will at once close the Depositor's account. The transaction will be indorsed on the back of the Monthly Account, and the Depositor's written authority for the transfer forwarded in support thereof.

14. Repayments shall be made only to the Depositor in person, or to the bearer of an order under his hand, signed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace, or, in case of sickness, of the Medical Attendant. If the Depositor be resident abroad, his signature must be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides. Printed form of order can be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank.

15. Applications to withdraw money deposited by any Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society, or Savings Bank, must be signed by two of the Trustees of any such Society or Savings Bank, or when there is no Trustee, then by the Treasurer and the names of the Trustee or Treasurer or other Officer of the Society authorized to receive the amount to be withdrawn, shall be stated in the notice of withdrawal, and the Warrant for payment of the amount shall be made out in the name of such Trustee, Treasurer, or Officer, and the receipt of such person apparently authorized shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

16. In case any Depositor shall die leaving any sum of money not exceeding £20, inclusive of interest, deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, and Probate of his Will, or Letters of Administration, be not produced to the Chief Postmaster of the Province, or if notice in writing of the

existence of a Will, and intention to prove the same, or to take out Letters of Administration, be not given to the Chief Postmaster of the Province, at his Chief Office, within the period of one month from the death of the Depositor; or if such notice be given, but such Will be not proved, or Letters of Administration be not taken out, and the Probate or Letters of Administration (as the case may be) produced to the Chief Postmaster of the Province within the period of two months from the death of the Depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, after such period of one or two months, as the case may be, to pay all just debts due or owing by such deceased Depositor, and to defray the expenses of his funeral, so far as the said sum of money shall extend, and divide the surplus, if any, at his discretion to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased Depositor, or any one or more of them; or if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

17. In case any Depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Post Office Savings Bank which (inclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of Twenty Pounds, the same shall only be paid to the Executor or Administrator on the production of the Probate of the Will, or Letters of Administration of the estate or effects of the deceased Depositor, to the Chief Postmaster of the Province.

18. If any Depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons who, but for the illegitimacy of such Depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased Depositor, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, with the authority in writing of the Attorney-General or Law Adviser of the Crown, to pay the money of such deceased Depositor to any one or more of the persons who in his opinion would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions, if the said Depositor and such person or persons had been legitimate.

19. If any Depositor shall become insane, or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, and if the Postmaster-General shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may authorize payment, from time to time, out of the funds of such Depositor, to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for the same.

20. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any individual Depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor or assignee of a Depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred to arbitration, as provided in "Savings Bank Act, 1858," one arbitrator to be chosen and appointed by the Postmaster-General and the other by the party with whom the dispute arose.

21. When a Depositor applies for payment of the balance of money deposited, and of

interest, and desires the account to be closed, the Deposit Book must be given up. Should a new account be afterwards opened, it will be necessary that a new Deposit Book be issued and that the other regulations should be strictly conformed to.

22. The Officers of the Postmaster-General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits shall not disclose the name of any Depositor, nor the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster-General, or to such of his Officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Post Office Savings Banks Act.

23. In the construction of these Regulations, unless there is something in the subject or context repugnant thereto, every word importing the singular number only shall mean and include several persons or things, as well as one person or thing and the converse; and every word importing the masculine gender only shall mean and include a female as well as a male; and the word month shall refer to a calendar and not a lunar month.
