A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Resident Magistrates Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to constitute throughout the Colony, or in any part thereof, districts to be called Resident Magistrates' Districts, and such districts from time to time to abolish, and the boundaries to define and alter, and in any such Proclamation to fix a time on and from which any such district shall be constituted or abolished, as the case may be: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authorities so vested in him, did proclaim and constitute the District of Otaki, as described in the Schedule to the now reciting Proclamation, to be, on and from the seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, a Resident Magistrate's District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act:

And whereas it is expedient to abolish the District of Otaki as described in the Schedule to the said Proclamation, and to constitute the districts described in the Schedule hereto in lieu thereof:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and in exercise of the power and authority so vested in me as aforesaid, do hereby, as from the first day of July next, abolish the said District of Otaki so constituted as aforesaid, and do hereby proclaim and constitute the Districts of Otaki and Manawatu, as the same respectively are described in the Schedule hereto, to be, on and from the said first day of July next, Resident Magistrates' Districts, within the meaning and for the purposes of "The Resident Magistrates Act, 1867."

SCHEDULE.

Otaki.

This district is bounded towards the North by the southern boundary of the Manawatu District hereinafter defined, from the sea to the summit of the Tararua Mountains; thence towards the South-west by the summit of the said Tararua Mountains to the northern extremity of the Wellington District, as described in the Schedule to the said Proclamation of the third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight; thence again towards the South-west and towards the South by the north-western and northern boundaries of the said Wellington District to the Ferry at Porirua; and thence towards the West by the sea to the commencing point. Including the adjacent Islands.

Manawatu.

This district is bounded towards the North by a straight line from a point on the West Coast five miles north of the mouth of the Rangitikei River to the Manawatu Gorge; thence towards the South-east by the summit of the Tararua Mountains to a point due East of the most easterly source of the Ohau River; thence towards the South by a straight line due West to the most easterly source of the said Ohau River, and by the south bank of the said Ohau River to the sea; and thence towards the West by the sea to the commencing point.

the Deputy Superintendent of the said Province, but only during the absence of the Superintendent of the said Province therefrom, and during any vacancy in the office of the Superintendent of the said Province arising by death or resignation, and only so long as the said Hugh Percy Murray-Aynsley, Esquire, shall hold the office of Deputy Superintendent of the said Province.

WHEREAS by the one hundred and thirty-third section of an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk of every borough, as soon as conveniently may be after every election of a Mayor for such borough, to give notice to the Colonial Secretary for the time being of such election, and of the person elected; and it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit, and if such person shall not then be a Justice of the Peace, by warrant under his hand published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to appoint such person to be a Justice of the Peace for the Colony; and it is also thereby enacted that in every such appointment it shall be expressed that it is made under the one hundred and thirty-third section of the said Act; and it is further declared that such appointment shall continue in force only during the Mayoralty of such person, and the person so appointed shall not, by virtue of such appointment, be authorized to sit or act as a Justice of the Peace elsewhere than within the borough:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority in me vested in this behalf, do hereby appoint

the person elected to be the Mayor of the Borough of Hokitika, to be a Justice of the Peace under the one hundred and thirty-third section of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867."

SAILING DIRECTIONS, ENDEAVOUR STRAITS, INVESTIGATOR ROADS, AND GULF OF CARPENTARIA.

The following directions for the navigation of Endeavour Straits and the Gulf of Carpentaria, and for Investigator Roads, have been supplied by Captain Chas. Edwards, of the "Melanie," and are published for general information.

Sailing Directions for Endeavour Straits and the Gulf of Carpentaria.

Small vessels from the east coast of Australia, bound down the Gulf of Carpentaria, generally go through Endeavour Straits, and pass to the southward of Woody Wallis Island into the Gulf.

Of the several passages into Endeavour Straits, the best is that between Possession and Meddler Islands, as there are no mid-channel dangers, the islands on either side being high, and the tides, although strong, setting straight through.

A vessel in mid-channel, between Possession and Meddler Islands, should steer S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. three and a half miles, when she will be about a mile to the westward of Dayman Islands; from thence eight miles on a S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. course will take her about three miles to the westward of Barn Island, with Red Island open to the southward of it. Be careful to keep to the eastward of the Heroine Rock, which may be ensured by keeping Meddler Island open to the eastward of Quoin Islet. When Red Island is open to the southward of Barn Island, steer W. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. for Woody Wallis Island, about fourteen miles distant. On nearing Woody Wallis Island steer so as to pass about half a mile to the south-west of it—a midway course between it and the rock awash at low water, on the one fathom bank, to the southward of Woody Wallis Island. Then steer about W. by S., keeping on the Woody Wallis side of the channel for about three miles until that island bears N.E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and Red Wallis N.N.E.; from thence steer S.W., crossing over sundry banks with four fathoms on them, and eight fathoms between, with hard sand, until the soft bottom of the Gulf is reached; but until then keep a good look-out for shoal water, and heave the lead constantly, as unknown knolls of sand may exist, the ground on the west side of Inskip Banks not having been surveyed.

Large ships should take the Prince of Wales Channel, and round Booby Island.

In sailing down the Gulf, the east coast should be kept on board at all times of the year, except when the north-west monsoon is blowing strongly. In the early part of the year, from March until the middle of September, the trade-wind on the east side veers and hauls into land and sea breezes, whilst in the middle of the Gulf trades blow constantly, and with a considerable set to the north-west.

At this time of the year it is advisable to follow the coast round, until well to the windward of Sweer's Island (the port of entry of the Gulf), as just before the full and change of the moon strong gales from the south-east blow, with a heavy chopping sea, and a vessel would be driven to leeward, unless under the shelter of the land.

After the middle of September, vessels bound down the Gulf to Caernarvon, Sweer's Island, or back to the east coast *via* Torres Straits, should still keep near the east coast of the Gulf, say from twenty to forty miles, as they will find there a moderate or

fresh breeze from the northward, inclining to the eastward and westward, as land and sea breezes, but mostly blowing from the westward, whilst in the middle of the Gulf the wind will be light and south-easterly.

Investigator Roads: Sweer's Island.

SWEER'S ISLAND shelters Investigator Roads to the eastward; it is about five miles long by a mile broad; it has rocks and foul ground extending off it to the eastward for about one and a half mile; cross-bearings of Locust Rock, and the north-east point of Sweer's Island, are the best guide for keeping outside of it; the south and south-west sides, also, have shoal water and rocky patches running off shore for about three-quarters of a mile.

INSPECTION HILL, at the south-east point of Sweer's Island, is 104 feet in height, and being the only hill in the neighbourhood, forms a good landmark.

LOCUST ROCK is a small rocky islet, about one and a half mile S.E. by S. from Inspection Hill; it has a small reef (dry at low water) about one mile E.N.E. of it; both rock and reef are connected with Inspection Hill by foul ground. Locust Rock has also a bank of small gravel running off it to the S.S.E. about one mile; the least water on it is one fathom.

MACDONALD'S POINT is the south-west point of Sweer's Island; it has rocks and foul ground running off it for about three-quarters of a mile, and extending along the south side of Sweer's Island to Locust Rock; to keep outside the shoal water, do not bring Locust Rock to the southward of E. by S., nor Raft Point to the westward of N. by W.

INSCRIPTION POINT, the west point of Sweer's Island, is of white sand, and on it the township of Caernarvon is situated.

RED CLIFFS form the point projecting into the bay between North and Inscription Points.

NORTH POINT of Sweer's Island is rocky and wooded.

RAFT POINT, the east point of Bentinck Island, is wooded, and easily made out; to vessels coming from the southward, it appears as the point of the land projecting from the west side of Investigator Roads.

FOWLER'S ISLAND is a small island S.W. by S., two miles from Raft Point; it is one and a quarter mile long, N.N.E. and S.S.W., and has a clump of trees near the south point; it is fronted towards Investigator Roads by rocks and shoal water, to clear which Raft Point should not be brought to the eastward of N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

INVESTIGATOR ROADS, the anchorage of the port of Sweer's Island, is sheltered to the eastward of Sweer's Island, to the westward by Fowler's Island and the south part of Bentinck Island, and to the northward by the reefs running off Bentinck Island, and the shoal water between Bentinck and Sweer's Islands; it is well sheltered from the prevailing winds, spacious and easy of access, having a broad and clear passage to it, with four to five fathoms water in every part.

ANCHORAGE.—Vessels trading to Caernarvon, the township of Sweer's Island, should anchor to the westward of Inscription Point, at a distance from it of about three cables, in five fathoms water, mud bottom: a favourite anchorage is with the Red Cliffs in sight over Inscription Point, about two cables' lengths from the shore.

DIRECTIONS.—To gain the anchorage in Investigator Roads, all but very small vessels must enter by the southern passage; vessels running in with a south-east wind should keep about three miles off the land until the centre of Sweer's Island bears north, when an opening will be seen between Raft and Inscription Points; a course N.N.W. should

then be steered for the north point of Fowler's Island, until the north point of Sweer's Island is seen over Inscription Point; then steer for Inscription Point, and anchor about two cables' lengths off, with the Red Cliffs just in sight over it.

Should the wind be from the northward, and the vessel have to beat in, care must be taken, in approaching Locust Rock from seaward, to clear the reef to E.N.E. of it—the north-east point of Sweer's Island, bearing N. by W., just leads clear of this;—to avoid the covered bank running off it to the S.S.E., Locust Rock should not be approached nearer than one and a half mile; the clump of trees on the south end of Fowler's Island bearing N.W. by W., will lead clear of the bank, but this will be difficult for a stranger to make out, as Bentinck and Fowler's Islands are low and in one—a surer guide is the lead;—in rounding Locust Rock closely, if you have less than ten fathoms water, keep to the southward, until Locust Rock is well open to the eastward of Sweer's Island, when the bank will be passed.

When standing along the south side of Sweer's Island, keep Locust Rock to the northward of E. by S., to clear the foul ground running off. In working up the Roads, you may stand into Fowler's Island until Raft Point bears N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., and into Sweer's Island until Raft Point bears N. by W., until so much to the northward has been gained as to shut in the S.E. point of Sweer's Island with the next point to the westward; then in standing in to Sweer's Island, the north point must be kept in sight over Inscription Point.

When fairly in the channel between Sweer's and Fowler's Islands, the lead will be of great assistance; standing into Fowler's Island, tack when the water you have carried across shoals a fathom; in standing into Sweer's Island, tack when the water deepens half a fathom.

WINDS.—From the end of May to the middle of September, the wind blows more or less strongly from south-east, freshening into a gale just before full and change; after the middle of September the wind hangs mostly from the northward, blowing a fresh breeze from the north-east in the morning, moderating and drawing round to north-west in the afternoon, falling light at night, and freshening again about 4 a.m.; these winds last till about the latter part of December, when unsettled cloudy weather, with rains and north-west winds in the day-time, and heavy squalls from the mainland at night, set in; these winds last until about the end of February, when till the end of May the winds blow mostly from E.N.E. This description of the winds applies to the head of the Gulf of Carpentaria as far east as the Norman River.

TIDES.—Flood tide sets to the southward, and ebbs to the northward, from one to two knots at springs; the strength of the stream, and length of time of setting, depend on the strength of the prevailing winds, the tide going mostly with the wind.
