A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Gold Fields Act, 1866," it is amongst other things enacted, that the fifth part of the said Act, including sections thirty-three, thirty-four, thirty-five, thirty-six, thirty-seven, thirty-eight, and thirty-nine, and that section fifty-two shall have no force or effect upon any Gold Field until after the Governor shall, by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, have proclaimed and extended the operation of the said part and sections to the Province wherein such Gold Field shall be situate. And whereas by "The County of Westland Act, 1868," it is enacted that the word "Province" in any Act of the General Assembly shall include County of Westland:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power vested in me by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and extend the operation of the fifth part of the said Act, including sections thirty-three, thirty-four, thirty-five, thirty-six, thirty-seven, thirty-eight, and thirty-nine, and of section fifty-two of the said Act, to the County of Westland.

Given under the hand of His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, at the Government House, at Wellington; and issued under the Seal of the said Colony, this eighth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and eightieth section of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," it is provided that in all cases in which no provision, or no sufficient provision, is in the opinion of the Governor made by the said Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, for the purpose of facilitating or more effectually carrying into execution any of the objects thereof, to make and prescribe all such Regulations and Orders, either general or applicable to particular cases only, as he shall think fit, and such Regulations and Orders from time to time to revoke or alter, as to the Governor shall appear to be requisite:

And whereas it is expedient that a day should be appointed for holding the first election of Assessors and Auditors under the said Act in and for the Borough of Blenheim:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, G.C.M.G., the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim, make, and prescribe the following Regulation and Order, applicable only to the Borough of Blenheim, that is to say: the first election of Assessors and the first election of Auditors under "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," for the Borough of Blenheim, shall respectively be held on the thirtieth day of July instant.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this seventh day of July, 1869.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Bay of Islands Settlement Act, 1858," it is amongst other things provided, that, within the Settlement constituted under the said Act, all the Waste Lands of the Crown, and all land reserved or taken for the purposes of the said Act, shall be held and disposed of under the provisions of the said Act and not otherwise, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor within such Settlement to cause a town to be surveyed and laid out, and also suburban and rural allotments, and that all such town, suburban, and rural lands shall be let sold, occupied, and disposed of for such prices, in such manner, for such purposes, upon such terms, and subject to such regulations as the Governor in Council shall from time to time prescribe for that purpose: And whereas it is expedient that all regulations heretofore made and prescribed for the letting of lands in the said Settlement containing coal should be revoked, and that new regulations should be made in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth hereby revoke all regulations heretofore made and prescribed for the letting of lands in the said Settlement containing coal, and doth hereby make and prescribe the Regulations in the Schedule hereto, for the letting, occupation, and disposal of such of the Waste Lands of the Crown in the said Settlement as contain Coal.

SCHEDULE.

1. It shall be lawful for the Superintendent for the time being of the Province of Auckland, from time to time, by private contract or otherwise as to him may seem fit, to agree with any person or persons for the lease of any land within the said Settlement containing coal, not being land laid out as a town or in suburban allotments: Provided that the land to be comprised in any such lease shall not exceed an area of two square miles, and that no such lease shall be for a term exceeding twenty-one years in the first instance.

2. Every such lease shall be executed by the Governor in the name of Her Majesty, and a rent or royalty shall be reserved therein at a rate of not less than sixpence for every ton of coal raised during the term of the lease on the land in the said lease comprised, and shall contain clauses, to be framed to the satisfaction of the Governor, for the several purposes hereinafter mentioned; that is to say—

- (1.) For securing payment of the royalty or rent.
- (2.) For enabling the Governor, or some person authorized by him, from time to time to enter and view the demised premises, and every part thereof.
- (3.) For securing the regular, proper, and efficient winning and working of the coal and other minerals.
- (4.) For enabling the Governor, and all persons authorized by him, to have access in, through, and over the demised lands, and all mines and shafts to be driven or sunk therein, and to make roads, adits, and approaches through and over the same, without making any compensation, and

to make use of any canal, railroad, or tramway constructed or to be constructed by the lessee therein or thereupon, upon making reasonable compensation for the same.

- (5.) For securing the delivery and surrender of the demised lands at the expiration or other sooner determination of the term, with all improvements thereon in good and tenantable repair, to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors.
 - (6.) For determining and making void the lease, upon breach on the part of the lessee of any of the conditions, stipulations, or provisions therein contained or implied.
3. In every such lease there may be inserted a proviso for one renewal of the term originally granted, at the option of the lessee, for any further term not exceeding twenty-one years from the expiration of the first term, upon the same conditions as during the said first term, except as to the amount of rent; and such proviso shall contain clauses to be framed to the satisfaction of the Governor—
- (1.) For all the purposes mentioned in the second of these Regulations.
 - (2.) For securing performance of all the conditions and covenants of the lease by the lessee before he shall be entitled to demand a renewal of his term.
 - (3.) For increasing the rent and royalties reserved in the lease during the new term.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this seventh day of July, 1869.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The New Zealand Settlements Amendment Act, 1864," it is enacted that in any case in which, under "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," the Compensation Court shall have refused to award compensation, or shall have awarded less compensation than may have been claimed, or in any other case, if the Governor in Council shall be of opinion that the circumstances of the case would render it expedient that compensation, or larger compensation, should be awarded, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to award and direct that compensation, or increased compensation, shall be paid to any person or persons who, in the judgment of the Governor in Council, shall be reasonably entitled thereto:

And whereas the Compensation Court hath awarded unto one Thomas Power, of Rangiaohia, the sum of one hundred and eighteen pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, as compensation for losses sustained by the said Thomas Power: And whereas the Governor in Council is of opinion that the circumstances of the case render it expedient that larger compensation should be awarded to the said Thomas Power:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in him vested for this purpose, doth hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, award and direct that the sum of thirty-one pounds six shillings and eightpence shall be paid to the said Thomas Power, in addition to the above-mentioned sum of one hundred and eighteen pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, awarded by the Compensation Court as aforesaid; and that the said sum of thirty-one pounds six shillings and eightpence

shall be paid to the said Thomas Power, or his assigns, out of such money or moneys as may be available for the payment of compensation awarded in pursuance of the provisions of "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863."

LIGHTS IN THE FRITH OF THAMES.

1.—*Light on Graham's Town Wharf.*

A Lamp Post has been erected on the outer end of Graham's Town Wharf, in the Port of Shortland, and a *Green Light* has been exhibited therefrom since the 13th of April, 1869.

The light is a green light, of low power, and will continue to be regularly exhibited from sunset to sunrise. It will be visible between the bearings of S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. round by E. and N. to N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

The light is elevated 18 feet above high water, and will be seen in clear weather about two nautic miles. Westward of S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. the light is cut off to clear the mud flats in-shore, and it is cut off to the westward of N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to clear the mud flats, and as a guide for vessels entering Kauaeranga Creek.

2.—*Light on Tararu Point.*

A small timber Lighthouse has been erected on Tararu Point, and the light will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise on and after the 1st day of August, 1869.

The light will be a *Red Light*, of moderate power, and will be visible over about two-thirds of a circle, or from about S. round by E. and N. to about N.W.

The tower, which is octagonal, on a square base, and painted white, is 31 feet in height over all, and the light will be about 28 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather about six nautic miles.

Vessels may anchor in 7 to 8 feet at low water when Tararu Light bears N. by W., and Graham's Town Wharf Light bears S.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.

A depth of 10 to 11 feet at low water will be obtained by anchoring when Tararu Light bears N.E., Graham's Town Wharf Light bearing S.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. as before.

(NOTE.—The bearings are compass bearings towards the Lights in every case.)
