# G. F. Bowen, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

THEREAS by the seventeenth section of an VV Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The County of Westland Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, as he may think fit, by Proclamation published in the New Zealand Gazette, to make regulations for the sale, letting, disposal, occupation, and management of any Waste Lands of the Crown, and to alter the laws in force within the said County of Westland at the time of the coming into operation of the said Act, regulating the sale, letting, disposal, occupation, and management of such lands within the said County of Westland, and to sell, let, and dispose thereof at such prices, and in such allotments, and generally in such manner as he shall deem expedient; and in like manner to alter, vary, or annul any such regulations, and to make others: Provided that it shall not be lawful by any such regulations to authorize the sale of land classified under such regulations as rural land at a less price than ten shillings per acre: Provided also that nothing in the said seventeenth section of the said Act contained shall affect or authorize the making of regulations to affect any promise, contract, or engagement made by or on behalf of Her Majesty previously to the coming into operation of the said Act, and then incomplete or unfulfilled:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated the 20th day of March, 1868, and approved in Council, certain regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Proclamation for the sale, letting, disposal, occupation and management of the Waste Lands of the Crown within the County of Westland were made and proclaimed, and amongst other regulations there was contained in the said Schedule a regulation in the words following: "The sites of towns shall from time to time be determined by the Governor, upon the recommendation of the County Council, and shall be notified by Proclamation in the County of Westland Gazette, and all sites for towns determined to be such sites before the coming into operation of these regulations shall continue to be sites for towns as if determined hereunder;" and whereas it is expedient to alter and vary the said regulation by adding a proviso thereto in manner herein appearing:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pur-

suance of the powers and authority conferred on me by the said in part recited Act, do hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, alter and vary the said recited regulation, and do hereby proclaim and declare that there shall be added to the said regulation a proviso in the words following, that is to say: "Provided always, that upon the recommendation of the County Council approved by the Waste Lands Board, the Governor may withdraw any of such lands as sites for towns, or make such alterations in their boundaries as may be recommended as aforesaid."

# G. F. Bowen, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, the Governor did declare the length of the voyage for a passenger ship proceeding from any part of the Islands of New Zealand to the respective places therein mentioned, and did declare what should be the scale of diet, and the medicines, medical comforts and medical instruments for the use of passengers: And whereas it is desirable that the same should be amended:

Now, therefore, in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, do hereby revoke the hereinbefore recited Proclamation, and do proclaim and declare that, for the purposes of the said Act, the length of the voyage for a "Passenger ship" between any part of New Zealand

and the under-mentioned places respectively shall be determined by the following scale, that is to say:—

And I do lastly proclaim and declare, that the medicines, medical comforts, medical instruments, and other matters deemed necessary for the medical treatment of the passengers during the said several voyages, shall be such as are prescribed by the forty-third and forty-fourth sections of the said Act.

# G. F. Bowen, Governor.A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date the tenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the letters N.Z. were temporarily appointed as the badge of New Zealand: And whereas it is expedient to adopt a permanent device:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby appoint that the seal or badge in future to be worn, in accordance with the Queen's Regulations, as the distinctive badge of the Colony, by all vessels belonging to or permanently employed in the service of the Colonial Government of New Zealand, shall be the Southern Cross, as represented in the Blue Ensign by four five-pointed red stars in the fly, with white borders to correspond to the colouring of the Jack; in the Jack by four five-pointed white stars on the red ground of the St. George's Cross; and in the

Pendant by four stars near the staff similar to those

in the Ensign.

And I do further order that the temporary badge consisting of the letters N.Z., at present in use in Colonial vessels, shall from and after this date be discontinued.

# G. F. Bowen, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The New Zealand Post Office Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, by Proclamation to be published in the New Zealand Gazette, to fix, alter, and abolish the Rates of Postage at any time within the Colony, for the transmission of Letters and Newspapers by post, either between places within New Zealand or to or from places beyond seas, and at what time the same shall be paid, and that the postage so made payable shall be charged and paid accordingly: And whereas by a Proclamation duly made and issued, bearing date the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Governor in Council did, in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, fix certain Rates of Postage, and the times at which the same respectively should be paid: And whereas it is desirable that the said rates should be altered as regards Book Packets and Pattern Parcels as hereinafter mentioned:

Now therefore, in exercise of the said recited power and authority, I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby abolish all former Rates of Postage fixed to be paid within the Colony for the transmission of Book Packets and Pattern Parcels to or from the countries and places mentioned in the Schedule hereto, and do proclaim and declare that the postage payable within the Colony for the transmission of Book Packets and Pattern Parcels by post, to or from the countries and places mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall be according to the rates mentioned therein, and that such postage shall in all cases be paid at the time such Book Packets and Pattern Parcels are delivered into the post; and that this Proclamation shall take effect from and after the first day of November, 1869, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The New Zealand Settlements Acts Amendment Act, 1866," power is given to the Governor to reserve portions of any of the land taken under "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," for the several purposes for which reserves may be made under the twelfth section of "The Waste Lands Act, 1858," and may make grants thereof under "The Public Reserves Act, 1854," or otherwise, as the case may require: And whereas the purposes for which such reserves may be made under the said twelfth section of the said "Waste Lands Act, 1858," are for the construction of trunk lines of road, or as sites for public buildings for the use of the General Government, or for other purposes of public utility or convenience: And whereas the piece of land described in the Schedule hereunder written has been taken under "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," and it is expedient that it should be reserved for the purposes herein set forth:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in me, do hereby except from sale and reserve to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, the piece of land described in the Schedule hereunder written, as a site for a school or other purposes of the General Govern-

PROVINCE OF AUCKLAND. Town of Cambridge East.

All that parcel of land, containing by admeasurement one (1) acre, more or less, being allotment numbered five hundred and seventy-five (575) of the Town of Cambridge East.

## G. F. Bowen, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Public Houses Act, 1868," it is enacted that, whenever the Colonial Forces shall be employed for the purpose of suppressing rebellion or other disturbances in any part of the Colony, and shall be stationed at any place near to or within such part, it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, by Proclamation, to declare that, from and after a day to be fixed therein, such part of the Colony as shall be defined in the Proclamation shall be a Proclaimed District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act; and thereupon it shall not be lawful for any person, whether holding a license under any Act or Ordinance regulating the sale of wine, ale, beer, or spirits, or not, to sell or supply any wine, beer, or spirituous or fermented liquors of any kind without the permission of such person as the Governor shall from time to time appoint to grant permits for the sale of such articles within such district:

And whereas the Colonial Forces are now employed in suppressing rebellion and other disturbances in the part of the Colony hereinafter described, and are

stationed in and near such part

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority for that purpose vested in me by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that all that part of the Colony situated in the Province of Hawke's Bay, lying within the following boundary—The sea coast, from the mouth of the River Esk or Waiohinganga to the mouth of the River Waikare; thence the said River Waikare to a point distant nine miles in a direct line from its mouth; thence a straight line drawn north-west, true bearing, till it intersects the northern boundary of the said Province; thence the said northern boundary to its western extremity; thence the western boundary of the said Province to its intersection with the River Mohaka; thence down the said river thence the western to the mouth of the Inangatahi, following up that stream to the southern edge of the Pohui Bush; thence to the road known as Marshall's Bridle Track; thence by that track to the River Esk, and thence by that river to its mouth—shall, from and after the fifteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, be a Proclaimed District within the meaning and for the purposes of "The Public Houses Act, 1868," aforesaid.

WHEREAS by "The Regulation of Elections Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by warrant under his hand, from time to time to appoint polling places for each Electoral District, within or without the limits thereof, and to appoint any one of such places to be the principal polling place for the district, and all or any of such polling places at any time to abolish and to appoint other polling places in lieu thereof: And

whereas, by warrant under the hand of the Governor, bearing date the seventeenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Survey Office, Popotuna, was appointed a polling place for the District of Clutha, for the election of Members of the House of Representatives: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the same:

Now know ye that I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby abolish the above-named polling place for the District of Clutha for the election of Members

of the House of Representatives.

# G. F. Bowen, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At Wellington, this sixth day of October, 1869. Present:

THE HONORABLE WILLIAM FOX, PRIME MINISTER. PRESIDING, AND MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE Council.

WHEREAS by "The Marine Act, 1867," it is among other things enacted that the Governor may fix and levy port charges as in the said Act defined; and also that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, vary, and repeal bye-laws and regulations for fixing and authorizing the levying of harbour masters' fees, not exceeding the rate specified in the Schedule to the said Act; and for fixing the fees for licenses to be paid by any water-men, masters, boatmen, and others employed in working or navigating cargo boats, ballast boats, tank boats, lighters, and all other vessels and boats whatsoever, whether decked or undecked, or whether propelled by steam or not; and for fixing the fees for licenses to be issued for or in respect of steam tugs, cargo boats, ballast boats, tank boats, lighters, watermen's and other boats; and to fix the pilotage rates payable at each port, not being greater than the rates specified in the Schedule to the said Act; and to fix the various rates of lighthouse dues, not exceeding those specified in the Schedule to the said Act, which shall be payable at any port or ports within the Colony, in respect of all vessels arriving at and of all vessels leaving such ports:

Now, therefore, His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, and in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by the said Act, doth hereby fix the port charges, harbour masters' fees, fees for licenses, pilotage rates, and lighthouse dues, stated and set forth in the Schedule hereto, to be levied and taken at the several Ports in the said Schedule mentioned, and with the like advice and consent doth order that the said dues shall be levied and taken on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, all former charges for the said purposes being from

the said date repealed.

Notes.—1. In addition to the Pilotage rates in the above Schedule there is a charge of 15s. per day for the first three days, and 10s. per day after the first three, for any period that a Pilot may be detained on board any vessel, whether by stress of weather, quarantine, or otherwise. (See "Harbour and Quarantine Regulations for the Ports of New Zealand," Clause 13, in New Zealand Gazette for 1868, p. 279.)

2. Where Municipal Corporations have been established under "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," and have adopted section 3 of Part X. of the thirteenth Schedule to the said Act (referring to boats and boatmen) the provisions of the Harbour Regulations regarding boats and boatmen, and the foregoing scale of License Fees, are by the said Act superseded.

3. There are licensed Adjusters of Compasses at Otago, Lyttelton, Wellington, Nelson, and

THE HONORABLE WILLIAM FOX, PRIME MINISTER, PRESIDING, AND MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Provincial Compulsory Land-Taking Act, 1866," it is enacted that Standing Rules and Orders shall be prepared and adopted by every Provincial Council, regulating the proceedings on bills authorizing the taking of land compulsorily, but that the same shall have no force or effect until they have been approved of by the Governor in Council, and been published in the New Zealand Gazette: And whereas the Standing Rules and Orders contained in the Schedule hereto have been prepared and adopted by the Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury, and it is expedient that effect should be given to the same:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance and in exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said Act, do hereby approve of the Rules and Orders contained in the Schedule hereto, as adopted by the said Provincial Council of Canterbury, for regulating the proceedings in the said Council on Bills authorizing the taking of land compulsorily.

The following Rules and Orders shall be the Standing Rules and Orders for regulating the proceedings on Bills for the compulsory purchase of land under "The Provincial Compulsory Land-Taking Act, 1866."

1. There shall be a Committee of the Council, to consist of the Chairman of Committees and four other Members to be nominated by the Provincial Council each Session, whose duty shall be to consider and report respecting every Bill that shall be referred to them.

2. Every Bill, after it shall have been read a first time, shall be referred to such Committee.

3. Compliance with the Standing Orders following, numbered from 4 to 11 inclusive, shall be proved before such Committee.

4. A notice shall be given of every Bill, which shall state shortly the nature of the intended work or undertaking, and the other objects (if any) of such Bill, and shall describe the land intended to be taken by every such Bill, and shall state the names of the townships or districts from, in, through, or into which the work or undertaking is intended to be made, maintained, varied, extended, or enlarged, and shall state the time and place of deposit of the plans, sections, and books of reference respectively, at the office hereafter specified.

5. Such notice shall be published once in the Government Gazette of the Province, and once a week for three consecutive weeks in one of the local newspapers circulating within the Province; and the first of such notices shall be published not less than one, and not more than two calendar months before the commencement of the Session of the Council in which such Bill shall be introduced.

6. One calendar month at least before the commencement of the Session of the Council in which any Bill shall be introduced, application must be made to the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees, and occupiers of all lands and houses so intended to be taken, or which may be taken, as being within the limits of deviation defined upon the plan, and such application shall be as nearly as may

be in the form or to the effect set forth in the Appendix marked A.

7. Such application shall be made by delivering the same personally to every such party, or by leaving the same at his usual place of abode, or, in his absence from the Province, with his agent, before the calendar month aforesaid, or by forwarding the same by post in a registered letter addressed with a sufficient direction to his usual place of abode, and posted before the time aforesaid at some Post Office in the Province, at such hours and according to such regulations as may from time to time be in force for the posting and registration of registered letters. Provided always, that if the place of abode of any such party cannot, after reasonable inquiry, be found, and if it cannot, after reasonable inquiry, be found that any such party has any agent within the Province, such application may be made by leaving the same on some conspicuous part of the land proposed to be taken before the one calendar month aforesaid.

8. In all cases the written acknowledgment of the party applied to shall, in the absence of other proof, be sufficient evidence of an application having been made; and in case of an application or notice having been forwarded by post in a registered letter, the production of the Post Office receipt for such letter, duly stamped, shall be sufficient evidence of the due delivery of such letter, provided it shall appear that the same was properly and sufficiently directed, and that the same was not returned by the Post Office as undelivered.

9. Separate lists shall be made of the names of such owners, lessees, and occupiers, distinguishing those who have assented, dissented, or are neuter in respect to such application, or who have returned no answer thereto; and where no written acknowledgment has been returned to an application forwarded by post, or where such application has been returned as undelivered at any time before the making up of such lists, the direction of the letter in which the same was so forwarded shall be inserted therein.

10. No notice served or application made on a Sunday, Good Friday, or Christmas Day, or before eight o'clock in the forenoon or after eight o'clock in the afternoon of any day, shall be deemed valid, except in the case of delivery of letters by post.

11. Plans, books of reference, and sections relating to the work or undertaking, and to the land proposed to be taken, shall be deposited for public inspection at the office of the Provincial Secretary one calendar month at least before the commencement of the Session in which any Bill shall be introduced. Such plans, books of reference, and sections, shall be, as nearly as may be, of the same nature and description as would be required in similar cases by the Standing Orders of the General Assembly of New Zealand relative to Private Bills.

12. All petitions for or against any such Bill shall be referred to the said Committee.

13. No Bill shall be read a second time until the Committee have reported in writing, under the hand of their Chairman, that the preceding Standing Orders, numbered 1 to 11 inclusive, have been complied with

14. The word "Bill" in the foregoing Standing Orders shall mean a Bill for the compulsory purchase of land under "The Compulsory Land-Taking Act, 1866."

15. Every Bill for the compulsory purchase of land, except as otherwise provided by these Standing Orders, shall be proceeded with as a Public Bill.

WHEREAS by "The Public Houses Act, 1868," it is enacted that whenever the Colonial Forces shall be employed for the purpose of suppressing rebellion or other disturbances in any part of the Colony, and shall be stationed at any place near to or within such part, it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time by Proclamation to declare that, from and after a day to be fixed therein, such part of the Colony as shall be defined in the Proclamation shall be a proclaimed district within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act, and thereupon it shall not be lawful for any person, whether holding a license under any Act or Ordinance regulating the sale of wine, ale, beer, or spirits, or not, to sell or supply any wine, beer, or spirituous or fermented liquors of any kind, without the permission of such person as the Governor shall from time to time appoint to grant permits for the sale of such articles within such district:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority for that purpose vested in me, do hereby appoint

Downing Street, 14th July, 1869. SIR,—I desire to call your attention to the following passages in the Paper respecting Colonial Hospitals which accompanied the Duke of Newcastle's Circular Despatch of 6th April, 1864:—

"With proper provisions for sufficient space, area, and ventilation, contagious and infectious diseases, with the exception of small-pox, may be received in limited numbers in general wards appointed to adult patients." (Page 20.)

"The rules with reference to . . . of cases of contagious and infectious diseases in general wards have been submitted to the Royal College of Physicians, and have received the sanction of its approval and concurrence."

I am advised that, whatever may have been the views of this subject taken by some eminent authorities in 1864, there is now reason to suppose that a large body of professional opinion would be found to be opposed to the doctrine thus laid down. I am informed that, according to concurrent opinions of much weight, the limitation expressed in the text should be extended certainly to plague, typhus, and scarlatina, and perhaps to some other diseases of the

In Hospitals with the most perfect sanitary arrangements and administration, it is considered that only a very small proportion of such diseases could, with any chance of safety to the patients suffering from other diseases, be distributed throughout the general wards—a proportion so small, indeed, as to make it impossible for the Hospital to perform any important function in providing for the wants of the community during an epidemic. But in such Hospitals as are generally to be found in the Colonies, it is stated that a single case of one of these infectious fevers might not unreasonably be regarded as involving serious probabilities of extension.

As to the means of meeting epidemics, I have resorted to Mr. Simon for advice, and he is of opinion that, looking at the way in which, at irregular times, the diseases in question become extensively prevalent, the best way of dealing with them would be to select a site in a healthy locality apart from any buildings except such as could, as required, be made use of for the administrative part of the Hospital, to prepare this site by drainage, so as to be ready for the erection of temporary buildings upon it, and, when occasion required, to erect on it Hospital Huts or Tents, into which might be received patients suffering from any of the infectious diseases above named,care being taken that, if at any one time two or more of these diseases should be prevailing together, the hut or tent for patients suffering under one of such diseases, should be separate from that for patients suffering under another such disease.

SOUTH PACIFIC OCEAN-WESTERN PART.

Neptune Reef .- Additional information to that given in Hydrographic Notice No. 25 of 1868, has been received from Lieut. G. P. Heath, R.N., the Port Master at Brisbane, regarding the Neptune Reef, which lies to the Southward of the Solomon Islands. The "Neptune," in about latitude 12° 54′ S., longitude 161° 45′ W., struck near the middle of the eastern edge of the reef, which is described as being sixteen to eighteen miles long by about

seven wide, forming a deep lagoon. The only raised portion of the reef visible from the ship's topmast head was a rock about six feet high near the centre of the eastern side.

Miller Reef.—Information has also been received from the same authority, of the existence of a reef in the Coral Sea, supposed to be hitherto unknown, westward of the Bampton and Bellona Reefs, on which the barque "Henry Miller" struck in December, 1868. From observations obtained on the reef it was found to be in latitude 20° 51' S., longitude 158° 02' E., and appeared to extend about two miles in a north-west and south-east direction, and to be about one cable in width. A rise and fall of eighteen inches at neaps was observed, as also a slight set to the north-west.

La Brilliante Shoal.—This dangerous reef, discovered in the French corvette "La Brilliante" in 1847, and which had been removed from the charts in consequence of an unsuccessful search for it made in 1853 by Captain Denham, of H.M.S. "Herald," having been subsequently seen from the British merchant ship "Creole," nearly in the same position assigned to it by M. Le Comte Dubouzet, Commander of "La Brilliante," has been again inserted in latitude 23° 14' S., longitude 169° 55' E., as originally placed.

The shoal is described as a round patch of coral, about one quarter of a cable in diameter, with one or one and a half fathom water over it. Two soundings, in twenty and twenty-three fathoms, were obtained in its vicinity.

## Notes.

Mongonui.—Stormy weather at this station from S.W. during the month, especially on the 9th, 17th, 19th, and 28th. The rainfall was much below the average. Thunder and fog on 1st, and hail and thunder on 19th. Fourteen days of S.W. wind, Auckland.—Showery and squally weather generally, though there were some very fine bright days. The temperature was rather lower than usual at this time of the year. Hail fell on 9th and 30th. The prevailing wind from S.W. Wellington.—Severe storm from S.E. on 19th instant, with rain, which abated on morning of 20th; also wet stormy weather on 27th, commencing from N.W. and changing to S.E.; hail storms on 10th and 12th. Although the weather was very pleasant at times, yet the rainfall and wind were above the average. Earthquakes occurred on the 4th, three shocks, between 12:30 and 2:25 a.m.,—the last was sharp, lasting ten seconds; also slight shock on 26th, at 7:15 a.m. Prevailing wind N.W. wind N.W.

Nelson.—Dull, heavy, wet weather during the month; unusually heavy rainfall. A hail storm on 6th, wind N. At 2:30 a.m., on 4th, smart shock of earthquake. Prevailing wind N.E.

Christchurch.—Very fine weather at this station. Slight rainfall and light winds. Fog on 21st. Prevailing wind from S.W.

Hokitika.—Gale from N.E. on 24th, with rain, also strong wind on 26th, from same quarter, and rain; severe thunder and lightning during night of 4th. Fog on 8th. The rainfall for the month was heavy, yet the weather was at times very pleasant. Prevailing wind S.E.

Reales—Occasionally fine clear weather with light winds, though on the whole it was dull and showery. There was thunder

pleasant. Prevailing wind S.E.

Bealey.—Occasionally fine, clear weather, with light winds, though on the whole it was dull and showery. There was thunder on 26th; snow on 11th, 18th, and 19th; and hail on 16th. Prevailing wind from N.W.

Dunedin.—Very fine pleasant weather, rainfall and wind below the average. Snow storm on 12th, from S.W.; foggy on 1st. Prevailing wind from W.

Southland.—The Observer remarks—A remarkably fine, mild month. On 27th, thermometer rose to 69° in shade, the highest ever recorded at this station in August. Small rainfall; light winds. Stormy on 10th and 11th, from W. and N.W., with hail, rain, snow, and thunder. Fog on 4th. Prevailing wind N.W.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

Unusually fine steady weather during this month on the East and South of the Colony. On the West Coast and in the North, stormy, with prevalent westerly winds. The average rainfall for the whole Colony is that usual for this month; but the distribution was very unequal, being excessive on the West Coast.
