 PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by writs directed to the Returning Officers for the election of Members of the Provincial Council of the Province of Auckland, the time limited for the return of such writs was the sixth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine: And whereas by the thirty-second section of an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Regulation of Elections Act, 1858," after reciting that unforeseen difficulties and delays may arise in carrying into effect the several provisions in the said Act contained, it is enacted that within the period of forty days before or after the day appointed for the holding of any election, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to extend the time allowed for the holding of any election or for the return of the writ issued for the same, notwithstanding the day may have passed on which such writ shall be returnable, and to adopt or cause to be adopted such measures as may be necessary to remove any obstacle of a technical or formal nature by which the due course of any such election may be impeded, and to supply any deficiency that may otherwise affect the same: And whereas by "The Provincial Elections Act, 1858," it is enacted that all the provisions of "The Regulation of Elections Act, 1858," shall apply to the elections of Superintendents and Members of Provincial Councils: And whereas it is expedient that the time for the holding of the said elections and for the return of the said writs should be extended:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth hereby extend the time allowed for the holding of the said elections until the eighteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and with the like advice and consent doth hereby extend the time allowed for the return of the writs issued for such elections until the eighteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

WHEREAS by the one hundred and thirty-third section of an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk of every borough, as soon as conveniently may be after every election of a Mayor for such borough, to give notice to the Colonial Secretary for the time being of such election, and of the person elected; and it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit, and if such person shall not then be a Justice of the Peace, by warrant under his hand published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to appoint such person to be a Justice of the Peace for the Colony; and it is also thereby enacted that in every such appointment it shall be expressed that it is made under the one hundred and thirty-third section of the said Act; and it is further declared that such appointment shall continue in force only during the Mayoralty of such person, and the person so appointed shall not, by virtue of such appointment, be authorized to sit or act as a Justice of the Peace elsewhere than within the borough:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in

pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority in me vested in this behalf, do hereby appoint

the person elected to be the Mayor of the Borough of Hokitika, to be a Justice of the Peace under the one hundred and thirty-third section of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867."

IN consequence of further information which the Government have received from His Honor the Superintendent of the Province of Nelson, and the Commissioner of Crown Lands at Nelson, on the subject of the sale of certain sections of land, supposed to be auriferous, at Wangapeka, in that Province, the Government do not consider it, under all the circumstances, conducive to the public interests to enforce the right of the Crown to the Gold in such lands, and have accordingly cancelled the letter written to the Superintendent of Nelson on the 1st instant in respect of the same.

THE following Despatches, with Enclosures, from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, are published for general information.

Downing Street, 21st August, 1869.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch No. 63, of the 28th of May, transmitting a Memorandum from Mr. Stafford in which he maintains the correctness of a statement made in your Despatch No. 100, of the 8th October, 1868, to the effect that the Government and Legislature of New Zealand had signified their acceptance of the conditions on which Lord Carnarvon offered to leave a regiment in New Zealand.

On the nature of those conditions there is no misunderstanding or controversy. They may be taken with sufficient accuracy for the present purpose as being included in the one stipulation that the grant of £50,000 per annum for Native purposes should be continued. These conditions, when offered by Lord Carnarvon, were refused by the Government of New Zealand.

The reasons given for the refusal were,\* that under those conditions the Troops "were not to be useful to the Colony;" that the Colony would not consent "to agree to conditions or to impose on itself obligations in connection with a force which would occupy the position of the force of a foreign power, rather than that of one having interests to guard and duties to perform common to the Empire of which New Zealand is a part;" that Lord Carnarvon had withdrawn from the Governor "all control over the disposition and movements of the Imperial Troops;" and that it was not "consistent with constitutional practice, or for the interests of either race of Her Majesty's subjects in New Zealand, that the determination of questions of peace or war, and the power of fulfilling engagements with the Native race, should thus virtually be withdrawn and given to an irresponsible officer having no constitutional authority with respect to such questions, and necessarily unacquainted with the ever varying disposition of that portion of the Native race so lately in arms against Her Majesty's authority."

The terms which it is alleged constitute the subsequent acceptance of Lord Carnarvon's offer are as follows:—

"Resolved, That the removal of the 18th Regiment in the present condition of the Northern Settlements would tend to increase the excitement

and confidence of the rebellious Maoris, and to discourage those friendly to Her Majesty's Government.

"That the Colony has for many years past constantly fulfilled, and is virtually fulfilling, the condition on which the retention of an Imperial regiment in New Zealand was sanctioned in the Despatch of Lord Carnarvon of 1st December, 1866; that this House therefore respectfully prays His Excellency the Governor to take steps for delaying the departure of the 18th Regiment, until the subject shall be referred to the Imperial Government."

This Resolution contains the expression of an opinion, the statement of a fact, and a specific request.

The Legislature state their opinion that the removal of the 18th Regiment "in the present condition of the Northern Settlements"—i.e., so long as the present condition of the Northern Settlements remains what it is—would be mischievous.

This statement must be considered as suggesting that the regiment should remain in the Colony for some unspecified period, with reference to the state of the Northern Island.

The Legislature then allege a fact, namely, that they have hitherto virtually performed, and are performing, the condition imposed by Lord Carnarvon. They however omit any pledge to perform the same condition, either virtually or literally, for the future; and I observe, by the way, that there is a difference between a virtual and a literal performance.

Lastly, the Legislature prefers a request, that the regiment may "therefore" be detained in the Colony, not for any definite period, not on any specified terms, but simply "until the subject shall be referred to the Imperial Government."

The subject so to be referred to the Imperial Government, so far as it can be collected from the terms of the Resolution, is the question on what terms Her Majesty's Government will consent to retain a regiment in New Zealand until the present condition of the Northern Island is improved. And the fact that the New Zealand Government has hitherto virtually performed the terms required by Lord Carnarvon is alleged, not as indicative of what the New Zealand Government is prepared to do, but as a reason why the removal of the regiment should be delayed (as I may observe it has in point of fact been delayed) while the subject is under consideration in England.

You will see, therefore, that the statements made by the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos and myself are correct, and that the New Zealand Legislature have not proposed that the 18th Regiment should be retained in the Colony on the conditions offered by Lord Carnarvon.

I have thought it more respectful to your Advisers to state the grounds on which I came to a conclusion the accuracy of which has been questioned by them. I should otherwise have preferred dropping a controversy which has no longer any practical significance, particularly at a time when I learn from you the energy and prudence with which the Colony is dealing with the present emergency.

The determination of Her Majesty's Government to adhere to the policy adopted by them does not in any degree lessen the warm interest and sympathy with which they observe the course of affairs at this critical period of the history of New Zealand.

SIR,—I have received a copy of a letter purporting to be addressed, on behalf of a Committee appointed

by a meeting of influential Colonists, to the Colonial Secretaries or Governments of the Colonies named in the margin.\*

This letter appears to be prompted by a dissatisfaction with the policy of the Home Government, and with the present mode of administering Colonial affairs; and as a means of effecting such changes as may appear desirable, it suggests a Conference in London of Colonial Representatives duly authorized by their respective Governments.

It is not necessary for me to point out to you in what respects the description given in this letter of the present policy of Her Majesty's Government is inaccurate.

With regard to the practical suggestion which it conveys, Her Majesty's Government, while reserving its own right to consider from an Imperial point of view matters affecting Imperial interests, will always be most anxious to ascertain and ready to consider, the wishes and interests of the Colonies of the British Empire. They have no jealousy of the collective action of any of the Colonies in furtherance of their wishes and interests. On the contrary they have every desire to encourage such combined action. Nor should I have thought it necessary to make any observation on the present proposal, had it not been officially communicated to myself as Secretary of State, and to the various Governments concerned.

With the exception of the three gentlemen who signed the letter, I do not know who were present at the meeting held in the Rooms of the Royal Colonial Society, or the names of the Committee who have issued this Circular. I am unable, therefore, to estimate the weight which your Ministers will attach to their recommendations. Independently, however, of the consideration that the project assumes at its outset an attitude of antagonism to Her Majesty's Government, my opinion is that it is not in itself calculated to answer its purpose.

In the first place, the attempt to cover by one arrangement all the principal Colonies enjoying Representative Governments, appears to me injudicious. The questions which most seriously affect individual Colonies in relation to the Mother Country have often in their nature and treatment little connection with those which arise in others, nor, as far as I am aware, is there anything in the mode of transacting business between the British and Colonial Governments which, under their generally cordial relations, obstructs negotiation, or calls for any practical improvement in their means of communication.

As a general rule, it appears to me that the wishes of the Colonists are likely to be more faithfully and effectually brought before the Home Government by the local Ministers, who are in immediate contact with the communities which they represent, and through the Governor, who is responsible to Her Majesty for furnishing all requisite information, than by a body of gentlemen resident in London, acting in pursuance of their own views, or of mere written instructions; under influences not always identical with those which are paramount in the Colony, and without the guarantee which their recommendations may derive from having passed through the Governor's hands.

It will be obvious to you that these objections to a standing representation of the Colonial Empire in London have no relation to the appointment of several or collective agencies on the system now in force, which, I believe, completely answers its purpose.

SIR,—At the request of Her Majesty's Commissioners for the International Exhibition of 1851, I transmit to you, for your information, a copy of a communication (10th August, 1869) which I have received from them, enclosing a copy of an announcement of the first of a series of International Exhibitions of selected Specimens of Art and Industry which it is intended shall be held in London in the year 1871; and I have to request that you will take such measures as may be necessary for giving publicity to that announcement within the Colony under your Government.

SIR,—I am directed by Her Majesty's Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851, to transmit, for the information of the several British Colonies, copies of the announcement of the first of the series of International Exhibitions of selected Specimens of Art and Industry, which it is intended shall be held in London in 1871, and to request that you will move the Earl Granville to cause them to be forwarded to each Colony as early as convenient.

Her Majesty's Commissioners desire me to point out that these Exhibitions will be on a comparatively limited scale, that the objects sent from each Colony will not be arranged together as heretofore, but in their proper classes, and that it is desired that Manufacturers should exhibit only a single specimen of each object.

Her Majesty's Commissioners will be prepared to receive Colonial objects for exhibition under the following special regulations, viz. :—

(1.) Every object which can be exhibited on a vertical surface, or wall space, will be accepted, if accompanied by a certificate from the Government of the Colony where it was produced that such object is considered worthy of exhibition.

(2.) Every producer desiring to exhibit an object which will require for its exhibition superficial or floor space, must forward to Her Majesty's Commissioners, before a date to be hereafter appointed, a working drawing or photograph of such object, with accurate dimensions and descriptive particulars, on receipt of which Her Majesty's Commissioners will, if the object be considered worthy of exhibition, transmit direct to the producer a certificate of the acceptance of such object, thereby guaranteeing its admission.

(3.) Any Producer may, at his option, instead of conforming with either of the foregoing regulations, send any object direct to the Exhibition Building, for the inspection and approval of the judges selected for the other British Exhibitors, and under the same regulations as shall be prescribed with reference to other British goods so submitted for inspection.

Further particulars having reference to the specialities of each Colony will hereafter be sent.

A.

Her Majesty's Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851 announce that the first of a series of Annual International Exhibitions of selected Works of Fine and Industrial Art and Scientific Inventions, will be opened at South Kensington, London, on Monday, the 1st May, 1871, and be closed on Saturday, the 30th September, 1871.

B.

The Exhibitions will take place in permanent buildings, about to be erected, adjoining the arcades of the Royal Horticultural Gardens.

C.

The productions of all Nations will be admitted, subject to obtaining the certificate of competent judges that they are of sufficient excellence to be worthy of exhibition.

D.

The objects in the first Exhibition will consist of the following Classes, for each of which will be appointed a Reporter and a separate Committee.

I. FINE ARTS APPLIED OR NOT APPLIED TO WORKS OF UTILITY.

1. Painting of all kinds, in Oil, Water Colours, Distemper, Wax, Enamel, Glass, Porcelain, Mosaics, &c.

2. Sculpture in Marble, Stone, Wood, Terra-Cotta, Metal, Ivory, and other materials.

3. Engravings, Lithography, Photography, &c.

4. Architectural Designs and Models.

5. Tapestries, Carpets, Embroideries, Shawls, Lace, &c., shown not as manufactures but for the Fine Art of their design or colour.

6. Designs for all kinds of decorative Manufactures.

7. Copies of ancient Pictures, Mosaics, Enamels, Reproductions in Plaster, Electrotypes of fine ancient Works of Art, &c.

II. SCIENTIFIC INVENTIONS AND NEW DISCOVERIES of all kinds.

III. MANUFACTURES.

(a.) Pottery of all kinds, viz., Earthenware, Stoneware, Porcelain, Parian, &c., including Pottery used in building, with any new raw materials, new

machinery, and processes for the preparation of such manufactures.

(b.) *Woollen and Worsted Fabrics*—With any Raw Produce from new sources or newly prepared, and new machinery for Woollen and Worsted Manufactures.

(c.) *Educational*—

1. School Buildings, Fittings, Furniture, &c.

2. Books, Maps, Globes, Instruments, &c.

3. Appliances for Physical Training, including Toys and Games.

4. Specimens and Illustrations of modes of teaching Fine Art, Natural History, and Physical Science.

Detailed rules applicable to each of the above Classes and list of the separate trades engaged in the production of objects of manufacture will be issued.

IV. HORTICULTURE.

International Exhibitions of new and rare Plants, and of Fruits, Vegetables, Flowers and Plants showing specialities of cultivation, will be held by the Royal Horticultural Society in conjunction with the above Exhibitions.

Special Rules for Horticultural Exhibitions will be issued by the Royal Horticultural Society.

E.

In Classes II. and III. producers will be permitted to send one specimen of every kind of object they manufacture, such object being distinguished for novelty or excellence.

F.

The arrangement of the objects will be according to Classes and not Nationalities as in former International Exhibitions.

G.

One third portion of the whole available space will be assigned absolutely to Foreign Exhibitors who must obtain certificates for the admission of their objects from their respective Governments. Foreign countries will appoint their own judges. The remaining two thirds of the space will be filled by objects produced either in the United Kingdom or, if produced abroad, sent direct to the building for inspection and approval of Judges selected for the British Exhibitors. Objects not accepted for exhibition must be removed according to the notices given; but no objects exhibited can be removed until the close of the Exhibition.

H.

All Exhibitors or their agents must deliver at the building into the charge of the proper officers the objects unpacked and ready for immediate exhibition, and free of all charges for carriage, &c.

I.

Her Majesty's Commissioners will find large glass cases, stands, and fittings, free of cost to the Exhibitors, and except in the case of Machinery carry out the arrangement of the objects by their own officers.

J.

Her Majesty's Commissioners will take the greatest possible care of all objects, but they will not hold themselves responsible for loss or damage of any kind.

K.

Prices may be attached to the objects, and Exhibitors will be encouraged to state their prices. Agents will be appointed to attend to the interests of Exhibitors.

L.

Every object must be accompanied with a descriptive label, stating the special reason, whether of excellence, novelty, or cheapness, &c., why it is offered for exhibition.

M.

Due notice will be given of the days for receiving each class of objects; and to enable the arrangements

to be carried into effect, strict punctuality will be required from all Exhibitors, both Foreign and British. Objects sent or brought after the days appointed for their reception cannot be received.

N.

Reports of each class of objects will be prepared immediately after the opening, and will be published before the 1st June, 1871.

O.
