And whereas the Colonial Forces are now employed in suppressing rebellion and other disturbances in the part of the Colony hereinafter described, and are stationed in and near such part:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority for that purpose vested in me by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that all that part of the Colony situated in the Province of Auckland, and bounded as follows—The sea coast, from the North Head of the Ohiwa Harbour to Cape Runaway; thence a straight line to the summit of Maungapohetu; thence a straight line to the summit of Peke Peke; thence a straight line to the commencing point at the North Head of the Ohiwa Harbour—shall, from and after the tenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, be a Proclaimed District within the meaning and for the purposes of "The Public Houses Act, 1868," aforesaid.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At Wellington, this twenty-fifth day of November, 1869.

Present:

THE HONORABLE THE PREMIER, PRESIDING, AND MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Native Reserves Amendment Act, 1862," it is amongst other things provided that where, under the provisions of "The Native Reserves Act, 1856," the assent of the Aboriginal Inhabitants is required to bringing land under the operation of the said "Native Reserves Act, 1856," the Governor may, by Order in Council,

declare such assent to have been ascertained, and thereupon the title of the Aboriginal Inhabitants in the land to which the same shall relate shall be deemed to be extinguished, and the lands shall, from the date of such Order in Council, vest in Her Majesty for the purposes, and subject to the provisions, of the said "Native Reserves Act, 1856," as attested by the recited Act, and that as effectually as if the same had been ceded and conveyed by such Aboriginal Inhabitants to Her Majesty:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby declare that the assent of the Aboriginal Inhabitants to the bringing the pieces of land described in the Schedules A. B. C. hereunder written, under the operation of "The Native Reserves Act, 1856," has been ascertained.

SCHEDULE A.

All that piece of land situate at the Pelorus, in the Province of Marlborough, and known as a Native Reserve, numbered 19 on the plan of the said district, containing by admeasurement 46 acres, more or less; bounded towards the North by a road along the banks of the River Pelorus; towards the East by the said river; towards the South by a road; and towards the West, 23 chains, by a road bounding section 20 on the plan of the said district.

SCHEDULE B.

All that piece of land situate at the Pelorus, in the Province of Marlborough, and known as a Native Reserve, numbered 32 on the plan of the said district, containing by admeasurement 230 acres, more or less; bounded towards the North partly by a road along the banks of the River Pelorus, partly by a road along the Makainui Stream, and partly by the said stream; towards the East by the River Wakamarina; towards the South, 49 chains, by Crown land; and towards the West, 63 chains, partly by Crown land and partly by a road bounding section 40 on the plan of the said district.

THE following Analytical Reports on Poisoned Sugars at Waikouaiti and Wellington are published for general information.

TWO SAMPLES OF SUGAR—FOR ARSENIC.

Results of Analysis of Specimen No. 623-L. (See 613-L.) Forwarded by Dr. Harding. Locality—Waikouaiti, Otago. Received, 1st October, 1869. Reported on, 1st October, 1869.

(a.) From top of bag.—Contains arsenic (as 0.5) in quantity; compares in colour with former sample (No. 613); this, however, being a very pale yellow, streaked with a darker yellow. Its reaction is also alkaline.

(b.) From bottom of bag.—Arsenic absent. Colour,

very pale yellow; homogeneous; reaction acid, like sugars generally.

These results show that the poison has only been locally introduced, and that it follows the line of discolouration noticed by Dr. Harding. The alkaline arseniates are so little used that it would seem the arsenic here was originally introduced as an alkaline arseniate (Fowler's solution, for instance), and has oxidized to this particular form. This view receives countenance from the results of experiments now in progress to elucidate this point. The change, however, seems very slow, and should this view of the origin of the poison in this form be correct, it will tend to prove that the arsenic has been admixed with the sugar a long time since.

SUGAR.

Results of analysis of Specimen No. 613-L. Forwarded by Dr. Harding. Locality—Waikouaiti, Otago. Received, 23rd September, 1869. Reported on, 23rd September, 1869.

Contains arsenic in quantity sufficient to account for the symptoms of poisoning described by Dr. Harding in his letter.

It is present mainly, or altogether, in the form of arsenic acid (not the common arsenic of commerce), united with some alkali, the nature of which it does not seem necessary to determine, but it is probably potash.

The tests I used were Reinsch's—the silver and the magnesian tests, also the sulphuretted hydrogen test.

SUGAR THOUGHT TO CONTAIN SOME POISONOUS SUBSTANCE.

Laboratory No., 734. Received from Dr. Grace, Wellington.

Description.—The crystallized sugar of commerce consists of coarse crystalline granules, generally loose and non-adherent, but sometimes aggregated in small lumps of varying degrees of hardness.

Colour.—In bulk, pale brown; not homogeneous, however, throughout, as is usual with these sugars, but in parts comparatively white,—in others decidedly brown. This difference in colour is most conspicuous in the lumpy portion of the sample, the softer lumps being uniformly the coloured ones.

Each of these different coloured sugars was separately examined for deleterious substances, and the following are the results:—

Light Coloured Sugar.

A saturated solution in cold water is nearly or quite transparent and colourless; its reaction is faintly acid. No indications of the presence of arsenic were found in this solution.

Dark Coloured Sugar.

A saturated solution of this in cold water has a persistent and great turbidity, which repeated filtration but partially removes. The predominant colour of the suspended matter is white; its reaction is distinctly alkaline to test paper. In this solution the presence of arsenic was manifested to a variety of chemical tests. The proportion in which it exists relatively to the sugar has not been ascertained, but it would certainly be very large for a substance so poisonous.

A great portion of the arsenic exists in the sugar as a constituent of arsenic acid, not of arsenious acid, the common arsenic of commerce; it is in combination with an alkali.

It will be noticed that the arsenic in this sample of sugar is in the same chemical state, and its presence is accompanied and denoted by the same kind

of discolouration, as that in the arsenical sugar from Waikouaiti, Otago, tested here some time ago. (See Reports on No. 614, 623, 676.) The respective departments of these two kinds of sugars with water have been described in this Report, as it is conceived to be of some value as a ready guide for the detection of arsenical sugars.

ARSENICAL SUGAR.—FURTHER REPORT.

Laboratory No., 734-69. Forwarded for examination by Dr. Grace.

Contains .09 per cent. of metallic arsenic in combination with oxygen, partly as arsenious acid, partly as arsenic acid. In one pound weight, therefore, of the sugar, there would be 6.3 grains of metallic arsenic, equivalent to 8.3 grains of arsenious acid, the common arsenic of commerce.
