G. F. Bowen, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL. At the Government House, at Auckland, this third day of November, 1870.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL. THEREAS by "The Payments to Provinces Act, 1870," it is enacted that in each year during the seven years ending on the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, there shall be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue of the Colony the sum of fifty thousand pounds, which shall be divided among and paid to the several Provinces and the County of Westland in proportion to their respective populations, and that all sums so paid shall be paid into the Bank at which the Pro-vincial Account or the County of Westland Account, as the case may be, is for the time being kept, and shall there be placed to the credit of a special account, to be called "The Road District Funds Account" of the Province or County: And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted that the said moneys shall be available only for division among the Road Boards of the Province or County in accordance with a scheme to be proposed, for each year, by the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent of the Province, or the Chairman of the County Council of the County, for his Province or County, and approved by the Governor in Council, for the first year, and by Resolution of both Houses of the General Assembly for the remaining years; and further, that the Governor in Council may amend any proposed scheme before approving of it, and the scheme when amended and approved shall have the same force and effect as if originally proposed and approved in its amended form :

And whereas there is available for division amongst the Road Boards of the Province of Otago for the year ending the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, the sum of fourteen thousand pounds: And whereas the Superintendent

of the Province of Otago has proposed a scheme for the division of the said sum, and such scheme has been amended and then approved by the Governor in Council:

Now it is hereby ordered that the said sum of fourteen thousand pounds shall be divided amongst the Road Boards of the Province of Otago in the same proportion as any sum appropriated by an Act or Ordinance of the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, for division amongst the Road Boards of the said Province shall be divided.

## Notice No. 3. ROTTNEST ISLAND.

**THE** following information on the navigation of the approaches to the Swan River, Western Australia, is from the Remark Book of Staff Commander William H. Bradley, of H.M.S. "Galatea," 1869.

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 5° 30 Westerly in 1870.] The Pilots report Roe Reef, with a depth of 24

feet, to extend farther to the westward than shown on the charts.\*

A 15-feet patch is also reported to exist on the northern extreme of the bank outside the Transit Rocks; Bare hill well open northward of Ropeyarn Rock (the rock westward of Duck Rock), W. by S. \$ S., is the mark given to clear it.

A 19-feet rock is said to have been found on the tail of the bank that extends E.S.E. from Phillip Point. A vessel coming in from the southward may pass between it and the Pilot Reef by keeping the knob of Parker Point touching the south end of Direction Island until the Pilot House on Bathurst Point is open northward of Phillip Beacon, when she may haul to the north-east until the Winding Sheet (a bare sand-patch on the mainland) bears E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. and then steer in for it. These directions lead over the bank in not less than 5 fathoms, and clear some patches of 21 feet which lie to the eastward of the 19-feet rock.

Another bank, with 15 feet water extending north and south one third of a mile long, is reported to lie W. by N., about  $1\frac{3}{4}$  mile distant from the Winding Sheet sand-patch.

The Challenger Pass, between Garden and Carnac Islands, is not recommended for any class of vessels. The Success Beacon has been removed from the

BAY OF BENGAL. Sand-banks off Mullaittivu on the North-east Coast of Ceylon.

As there is reason to believe that the Sand-banks off Mullaittivu, on the North-east Coast of Ceylon, have extended further seaward than they are marked in the Admiralty Chart of the East Coast of Ceylon. Mariners are hereby cautioned, when in the vicinity of that part of the Ceylon Coast, to be careful and not come under 20 fathoms water until they are certain of having passed the danger, as the water shoals rapidly from 20 fathoms a few miles outside of the sand ridges to 15, 12, and 9 fathoms close on their outer edge. On some of these ridges there are not more than 12 feet of water.

BY-LAWS FOR STANDING ORDERS OF THE MINING BOARD OF AUCKLAND, THAMES GOLD FIELDS.

1. On the assembling of the Board after every election, the Returning Officer's intimation, setting forth the names of the persons who have been elected as Members of the Board, shall be read. 2. The sittings of the Board shall be open to the

public.

3. On a quorum being present, the business of the Board shall commence at the time fixed; but should there be no quorum within thirty (30) minutes after that time, the Board shall stand adjourned until the

next regular day and hour of meeting, and the names of the Members present shall be recorded. 4. A quorum shall consist of three Members, and

in the absence of the Chairman, a chairman pro. tem. shall be appointed from amongst the Members present.

5. The regular days of meeting of the Board shall be the second Monday in each month, unless otherwise ordered.

6. At each meeting of the Board the business shall be proceeded with in the following order :-

(1.) The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read over, and corrected if necessary, after which the said minutes shall be confirmed, signed and dated by the Chairman.

(2.) Correspondence.
(3.) Reports of Committees received.

(4.) Orders of the Day.

7. The Orders of the Day shall include all business of which due notice has been given.

8. All motions shall be considered in the order in which notice thereof has been given in writing to the Chairman, signed by the mover.

9. It shall be competent for any Member to propose an original motion, or any amendment of a motion, without previous notice, provided that it be not of a legislative character, or the effect of which would be to rescind or amend any previous resolution of the Board.

10. Any motion or amendment, not seconded, shall not be debated, but shall lapse; and no discussion shall be allowed on a motion for adjournment.

11. No notice of motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless by the Member giving such notice, or by some Member duly authorized by him.

12. Any motion duly seconded shall not be withdrawn, unless by the sanction of the Board.

13. A call of the Board for special purposes shall be made by the Chairman on the written requisition of three of the Members; and no order for a call of the Board shall be made for any day earlier than four days from the date of any day earlier than four days from the date of such order, inclusive of the date of the same; a copy of such order to be forwarded to each Member, signed by the Chairman or Clerk.

14. The Chairman shall have a deliberative as well as a casting vote.

15. When any motion has been duly proposed and seconded, the question shall thereon be put by the Chairman, when each Member respectively and successively shall signify his assent or dissent by the words "Aye" or "No." The Chairman shall then state whether the "Ayes" or the "Noes" have it.

16. The decision of the Chairman shall be final on

all questions of "order" or "practice." 17. If more than one Member rise at the same time, the Chairman shall decide the pre-audience.

18. Any Member, upon proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking to any question, must rise and address the Chairman; and no Member shall be interrupted, unless by a call to order, when he shall resume his seat, and the question of order be decided by the Chairman, before the discussion is resumed, or any other business entered upon.

19. No Member shall speak twice to a question, except in explanation, or the mover of a resolution in

reply. 20. When the mover of any resolution has exerquestion forthwith.

21. When the Chairman rises to address the Board, any Member then speaking shall sit down.

22. Committee meetings shall be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays weekly, unless otherwise ordered.

23. No Committee Report shall be adopted, unless it shall have been brought up, read, and received at a previous meeting of the Board.

24. All Committees shall be appointed by a resolution of the Board.

25. All preceding Rules for the regulation of the Board shall apply to Committees, except clause 19.

26. Any Member of the Board may be appointed Chairman of Committee.

27. Committees shall consider only such matters as have been referred to them by the Board.

28. Every resolution passed in Committee shall be brought up by the Chairman of Committee at the next succeeding meeting of the Board, without question and in its due order.

29. It shall be lawful for any Member of the Board to protest against the passing of Standing Orders, By-laws, or Amendments thereof; and such protest shall be fairly written and signed by the Member or Members protesting, and shall be duly entered at the end of the minutes of that meeting, and signed by the Chairman.

30. Any proposed By-law or Amendment of any By-law, or Standing Order, shall be read a first time without discussion. On a second reading a discussion may take place, and it may then be referred to a Committee of the Board, or read over a third time and passed, amended, or be disallowed; and no Bylaw disallowed shall be again proposed in the Board during that year.

31. Seven o'clock p.m. shall be deemed the regular hour of all meetings.

32. The Chairman of the Board may give notice or move any resolution, providing that, previous to proposing such resolution, he leave the Chair, and another Member be appointed pro. tem., until such resolution or resolutions shall have been disposed of, when he shall again resume the Chair.

Taranaki.—Stormy on 11th from N.E.; on 12th and 13th strong N.W. winds, with rain, and thunder, and lightning on 13th. The weather was generally very fine; small rainfall; winds moderate, prevailed from S.E. Earthquake on 29th.
Napier.—Fine during early part of month; strong S.W. wind on 1st; from 10th to 21st generally wet; and on 22nd and 23rd stormy from S.E., but no rain; pleasant weather for remainder of month; thick fog on 10th. Prevailing wind from S.E.
Wellington.—Dull and squally, with rain and hail on 1st from S.E.; fine bright dry N.W. weather from 2nd to evening of 5th, when wind changed to S.E. and came on heavy rain and strong wind, which continued to morning of 7th, when wind shifted to N. and brought fine weather, lasting until the 9th; from 10th to 14th wet and unpleasant, wind changing constantly from N.W. to S.E.; from 15th to 17th bright warm weather and light wind from N.W.; 18th to 23rd, pleasant but cold, and rather dull, only slight rain, wind S.E. and moderate; from 24th to 28th the weather was remarkably fine, bright clear warm days with light N.W. breezes and fine nights; 29th and 30th dull, with strong wind at times, rain on morning of 29th.
Nelson.—Stormy from S. on 5th, with heavy rain; on 13th strong S.W. wind; also on 30th stormy from S.W.; thunder on

quake shocks early on morning of 30th.
Nelson.—Stormy from S. on 5th, with heavy rain; on 13th strong S.W. wind; also on 30th stormy from S.W.; thunder on 29th; otherwise weather fine, with slight rainfall. Prevailing wind S.W.
Christchurch.—Dull weather generally, with frequent rain; the total fall is below the average. Winds moderate, except on 26th, when it was stormy from S.E. and 30th from N.W.; sleet or hail on 1st. Prevailing wind from E.
Bealey.—Fine clear weather generally, with slight rainfall and moderate winds; on 4th storm from N.W. with rain; and on 29th gale with heavy rain; also heavy rain on 30th from S.W. Prevailing wind from N.W.
Hokitika.—Strong winds from S.E. on 2nd and 3rd, but fine; also stormy on 15th and 16th from N. and N.W.; weather fine and clear; strong wind from N.W. and heavy showers on 29th; also wet on 30th, and thunder, though calm. Very pleasant clear weather during the month; slight rainfall; earthquake on 1st at 6.20 p.m. Prevailing wind S.E.
Dunedin.—Very fine bright clear weather during this month, except on 1st, when it was stormy from S.W., with hail and rain; also hail on 11th and 12th; strong wind from N.E. on 25th. Prevailing wind from N.E.
