A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Deeds Registration Act, 1868," it is enacted that the County of Westland and every Province of the Colony shall each respectively be a Registration District for the purposes of the said Act, provided that the Governor in Council may from time to time define and alter the limits of any Registration District and may create new Registration Districts:

And whereas by another Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled "The Otago and Southland Union Act, 1870," the two Provinces of Otago and Southland were united into one Province under the name of "the Province of Otago;" and by the said Act it was declared that until the Governor should, under the powers conferred upon him by "The Deeds Registration Act, 1868," otherwise declare, the parts of the Colony respectively included in the Province of Southland and the late Province of Otago should be, respectively, separate Deeds Registration Districts:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the said Districts:

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said recited Acts, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth hereby order that, from and after the twenty-eighth day of February next, the Registration District for the purposes of "The Deeds Registration Act, 1868," comprising that part of the Colony which was included in the late Province of Southland, shall be altered in manner following, that is to say, the said Registration District shall, from and after the day aforesaid, comprise that portion of the Province of Otago (as constituted by "The Otago and Southland Union Act, 1870,") the boundaries of which are set forth in the First Schedule hereto.

And in further exercise and pursuance of the said powers and authorities, and with the like advice and consent aforesaid, His Excellency the Governor doth

hereby order that, from and after the said twenty-eighth day of February next, the Registration District, for the purposes of "The Deeds Registration Act, 1868," which now comprises so much of the Colony as was included within the Province of Otago as constituted immediately before the passing of "The Otago and Southland Union Act, 1870," shall be altered in manner following, that is to say, the said last-mentioned Registration District shall comprise only that portion of the Province of Otago (as constituted by "The Otago and Southland Union Act, 1870,") the boundaries whereof are set forth in the Second Schedule hereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Bounded towards the East by a line commencing at a point on the sea coast east of the Waikawa River, known as Chasland's Mistake, and running north-westerly to Black Horn Hill; thence by the watershed line to the Forest Range, and by the watershed of that range and the east boundary of Run No. 162 to Catlin's Cone; thence by the south-west and south boundaries of Run No. 258 to Cairn Peak; thence by the eastern boundary of Run No. 132 and the Kaiwera and Waipahi Streams to the boundary between Runs Nos. 131 and 167A; thence by the south and west boundaries of Run No. 167A; thence by part of the Waikoikoi Stream, and by the north-west boundary of Run No. 167B to the east branch of the Waikaka River; thence by the east boundary of Run No. 175B; thence by the north boundary of Run No. 175B to the Waikaka River; thence on the East by the Waikaka River to its source near the Black Umbrella; thence by the watershed of the Umbrella Mountains to the head of Timber Gully; thence on the North-east by Timber Gully and Rocky Creek to its source near Rocky Mount; thence by the north-east boundary of Run No. 359 to the Nokomai Stream; thence by a line running through Lorn Peak to Lake Wakatipu; thence by the west shore of Lake Wakatipu to Round Peak; thence by a straight line running due West to Moffat Peak; thence by a line due West to a point north-

west of Barrier Peaks; thence by a line running due South to the Ocean at Rowallan Burn; and thence following the coast Easterly to the point of commencement.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

The said Province of Otago as constituted as aforesaid, excepting the part thereof hereinbefore described as forming the Deeds Registration District of Southland.

THE Regulations for the Examination of Candidates for employment in the Civil Service, dated 29th December, 1868, and published in *Gazette* No. 73, 1868, are rescinded, and the following amended Regulations are published for general information.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING EXAMINATIONS UNDER "THE CIVIL SERVICE ACT, 1866."

1. No person can enter the Civil Service as a probationer, or as a subordinate of the fifth class, unless he shall be of the full age of seventeen years, and not more than twenty-two years. The Board of Examiners may, however, examine candidates for employment who are not younger than fifteen years.

2. Every candidate for examination must apply to be examined in a form to be prescribed by the Board, such application to be addressed to the Secretary and to be accompanied by the following certificates:—

Age.

Certificate from Registrar of Birth. Any person unable to produce such certificate to account for its non-production, and to prove his age by satisfactory evidence.

Health.

A certificate of health signed by some legally qualified Medical Practitioner.

Character.

A certificate of general good conduct from some Clergyman or Schoolmaster.

3. Every candidate must pass the Junior Examination (see Regulations) before he shall be eligible for any appointment in the Civil Service.

4. The Board shall have power, subject to the Governor's approval, to vary the optional subjects, and to frame such further Rules for the conduct of examinations as they may deem fit, due notice of which shall be published in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

5. Every candidate must pass a certain standard of proficiency to be fixed by the Board of Examiners. The Board, in publishing the result of examinations, shall classify the successful candidates according to merit; but the examination is not competitive for

office, the Government being entitled to select any successful candidate for appointment at its discretion.

6. Examinations shall be held at such times and places, and before such persons, as the Board may from time to time appoint.

7. The examination shall be divided into two branches,—the one qualifying for appointment, the other qualifying for promotion to any class above the fourth.

8. JUNIOR EXAMINATION.—Every candidate for employment in the Civil Service must pass in the following:—

English.—Including dictation, reading, spelling, grammar, and composition.

Arithmetic.—Including vulgar and decimal fractions.

The outlines of English History and Political Geography.

9. The SENIOR EXAMINATIONS shall be in the following:—

English, and any number of the following subjects, but the candidates must pass in at least three: *Latin, Greek, French, German, Maori, Arithmetic, Algebra, Euclid, Book-keeping, Natural Science, Geography, History, Political Economy*.

10. It shall be optional for any candidate for examination to pass the Junior and Senior Examinations at the same time; but no candidate shall be eligible for the Senior Examination who is above the age of twenty-three years.

11. Every candidate who has passed shall receive a certificate to that effect, signed by two members of the Board and the Secretary, on payment of a fee of one guinea.

12. A register of candidates who have been examined shall be kept by the Board, and a list of those who have passed published from time to time in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

RULES PRESCRIBED BY THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS, WITH THE APPROVAL OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

[Under Regulation 4 of "Regulations respecting Examinations under 'The Civil Service Act, 1866.'"]

I.—SUBJECTS OF EXAMINATION.

JUNIOR EXAMINATION.

Compulsory Subjects.

English.—Dictation, reading, spelling, grammar, and composition.

Arithmetic.—(Including vulgar and decimal fractions.)

History.—Outlines of the History of England from the Norman Conquest to the close of the Crimean War.

Geography.—Outlines of Political Geography.

SENIOR EXAMINATION.

Compulsory Subject.

English.—Dictation, reading, spelling, grammar, and composition (including abstract and précis writing).

Optional Subjects.

Any three or more of the following subjects, at the option of the candidate:—

Latin.—Any one of the following:—

Sallust.—Cataline and Jugurtha.

Virgil.—Any four books of the *Æneid*; the

Board to be informed which books are chosen.

Horace.—1. Odes and Epodes; or, 2. Satires and Epistles; the Board to be informed of the selection.

Cæsar.—De Bello Gallico.

Cicero.—Orations.

Greek.—Any one of the following:—

Xenophon.—Anabasis.

Homer.—Any one book of the Iliad.

Sophocles or Euripides.—Any one play.

Passages for translation will be set from these authors (Latin or Greek), and candidates will be required to answer easy grammatical and historical questions arising out of the passages so set.

French.—Easy translations from French into English, and *vice versâ*.

German.—Easy translations from German into English, and *vice versâ*.

Maori.—

Arithmetic.—(Including vulgar and decimal fractions, averages, and percentages.)

Algebra.—So far as to include the solution of simple equations.

Euclid.—The first four books.

Book-keeping.—

Natural Science.—Outlines of Natural Philosophy, Zoology, Botany, or Geology.

Geography.—Outlines of Political and Physical Geography.

History.—Outlines of the History of England, from the Norman Conquest to the close of the Crimean War; Colonial History, especially History of New Zealand.

Political Economy.—Elementary principles of.

N.B.—No candidate will be eligible for promotion in the Treasury or Customs Department unless he passes in Arithmetic.

II.—CLASSIFICATION.

The names of successful candidates will be published in the order of comparative proficiency, and certificates will be issued, classifying them on the following principle:—

First-class certificates will be granted to those who attain two-thirds, or above two-thirds, the maximum number of marks in all subjects in which they are examined.

Second-class certificates will be granted to those who attain one-half, and under two-thirds, the maximum number of marks in all subjects in which they pass.

Third-class certificates will be granted to those who attain under one-half the maximum number of marks in all subjects in which they pass.

III.—CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS.

On application being received, notice will be given to the candidate by the Secretary to the Board, of the time and place of examination. Further instructions will also be forwarded at the same time.

N.B.—No particular Text Books are prescribed: the following are suggested as useful, but the Board of Examiners do not bind themselves to their use exclusively:—

English Grammar and Analysis—Morell's.

Greek and Latin authors—Any good text.

Arithmetic—Colenso's or Barnard Smith's.

Algebra—Colenso's or Bonycastle's.

Euclid—Potts', Cambridge.

Natural Science—Text Books.

English History—Dr. Smith's smaller.

Geography—Hughes'.

Political Economy—J. S. Mill's.

WITH reference to the Notification published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, of the 12th March, 1870, offering rewards for the discovery of offences against the Arms Acts, the under-mentioned Notice, increasing the rewards, is substituted in lieu thereof, to take effect from this date:—

A Reward of £300 will be paid to any one giving such information as will lead to the conviction of any person guilty of the capital offence of supplying Arms and Ammunition to Rebels, under the thirty-third section of "The Arms Act Amendment Act, 1869."

A Reward of £100 will be paid to any one giving such information as will lead to the conviction of any person guilty of a felony or misdemeanour under any of the following sections of "The Arms Act, 1860," that is to say, sections twenty-six, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine, thirty, thirty-six, thirty-eight, or any amendment or alteration thereof.

The above rewards will be paid only after conviction. The informant's name will not be divulged without his own consent, except where it is necessary that he should give evidence in Court.

In the case of accomplices giving information leading to conviction, a free pardon will be granted in addition to the reward.

THE following Standing Orders in regard to Private Bills were adopted by the House of Representatives on the 5th September, 1870. The proceedings in the Legislative Council are still governed by the Standing Orders published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, No. 1, of 8th January, 1868.

I.—INTENTION TO APPLY FOR PRIVATE BILL TO BE ADVERTISED.
Subject of Notices.

1. In all cases where application is intended to be made for leave to bring in a Private Bill, notices shall be given, stating the objects of such intended application, and the time at which copies of the Bill will be deposited in the Colonial Secretary's Office, and at the office of the Commissioner of Crown Lands in the principal town of the Province in which any lands or houses are situate to which the Bill shall refer.

Notice to contain name of township.

2. In cases of Bills whereby it is intended to apply for power for the compulsory taking of lands or houses, such notices shall contain a description of the land proposed to be taken, together with the name of the Province, Township, or other territorial division in which the land is situate, and the names of the owners and occupiers of such lands or houses, and shall state the time and place of deposit of the Plans of the proposed work, and of the copies of the *New Zealand Gazette* notice, respectively.

Cemeteries, gasworks, &c.

3. In cases of Bills respecting any burial-ground, cemetery, or gasworks, the notices shall set forth and specify the limits within which such burial-ground, cemetery, or gasworks are intended to be erected or made.

Notice of intention to divert water.

4. In all cases where it is proposed to divert into any intended cut, canal, reservoir, aqueduct, or navigation, or into any intended variation, extension, or enlargement thereof respectively, any water from any existing cut, canal, reservoir, aqueduct, or navigation, whether directly or derivatively, and whether under any agreement with the proprietor thereof or otherwise, the notices shall contain the name of every such existing cut, canal, reservoir, aqueduct, or navigation, the water supplying which will either directly or derivatively flow or proceed into any such intended cut, canal, reservoir, aqueduct, or navigation; or into any intended variation, extension, or enlargement thereof.

Publication of Notices.

5. Not less than thirty days before the commencement of the Session in which it is proposed to make application for a Bill, such notices shall be published once at least in the *Government Gazette* of the Colony; and for two successive weeks in some newspaper published in the Province, County, or District in which any land is situate to which any such Bill shall refer; the first publication to be not less than thirty days before the commencement of the Session.

II.—INITIATION AND PROGRESS OF BILL THROUGH THE HOUSE.

Initiation of Private Bill.

6. No Private Bill shall be initiated in this House but upon a Petition first presented and received, with a printed copy of the proposed Bill annexed, and such Petition shall be signed by one or more of the parties applying for the same.

Petition for Private Bill to set forth that due notice has been published.

7. Every Petition for a Private Bill shall commence by setting forth that not less than thirty days before the commencement of that Session, the public notice required by section 5 has been duly given of the general objects of and the intention to apply for such Bill, and shall conclude with a true statement of the general objects of the Bill, and a prayer for leave to introduce it: and the production of the numbers of the *Gazette* and newspaper or newspapers containing such notice shall be sufficient proof of such notice.

When Petition has been received.

8. When the House shall be satisfied that the required conditions have been complied with, the Bill will be ordered to be brought in.

When leave to bring in has been obtained.

9. Before a Private Bill shall be read a first time, it shall be printed at the expense of the parties applying for it, in the same form as Public Bills, and a sufficient number of copies of it shall be delivered to the Clerk for the use of the House.

When read a first time.

10. When a Private Bill shall have been read a first time, it shall be referred to a Select Committee, to be appointed on motion upon notice, and such Committee shall require proof of the allegations contained in the preamble.

Petitions against Private Bills.

11. Every Petition in opposition to a Private Bill shall distinctly specify the grounds of such opposition; and, if received, shall be referred to the Select Committee on the Bill.

A Select Committee on Private Bill may hear Counsel, &c.

12. Every Select Committee on a Private Bill may, in its discretion, hear Counsel if it be desired, and may also take such oral or other evidence as it may think requisite; and may decide on matters in issue between the persons conducting and opposing the Bill: after which, the question shall be put from the Chair, "That the Preamble has been proved." And if the question pass in the negative, it shall be fatal to the Bill, and the Committee shall report accordingly; but if the question pass in the affirmative, the several clauses of the Bill shall next be proceeded with, and the amendments, if any, carefully noted for report to the House, care being taken that no clause be inserted or amendment made in the Bill which shall be foreign to the import of the notices required to be given by the party or parties applying for it.

When Select Committee have reported in favour of Private Bill.

13. When a Select Committee shall have reported in favour of a Private Bill, such Bill shall be proceeded with as in the case of Public Bills, and a future day, subsequent to the distribution of the printed report and evidence, shall be appointed for the second reading.

Private Bills coming from Legislative Council.

14. Private Bills coming to this House from the Legislative Council, if accompanied by printed copies of the reports and proceedings of the Select Committees to which they may have been referred, shall be proceeded with in all respects as Public Bills transmitted to this House for its concurrence.

Fees.

15. The scale of fees to be paid by parties promoting Private Bills shall be as follows:—

On the first reading	5
On the second reading	10
On the third reading and passing	10

And any Bill shall be stopped by Mr. Speaker, in any stage of its progress, if any fee then due is unpaid: Provided that it shall be competent for the Select Committee, if they think proper, to reduce the scale of fees on any particular Bill.

Fees to be paid to credit of Consolidated Revenue.

16. All fees payable under these Standing Orders shall be paid to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue of the Colony; and a certificate of

such payment shall be produced by the Member having charge of the Bill on the stages of the Bill specified in the preceding Standing Order.

Bills promoted by the General or Provincial Governments to be exempt from fees.

17. Any Private Bills promoted by the General or Provincial Governments, or by the Government of the County of Westland, shall be subject to the foregoing Standing Orders, with the exception of that imposing fees, from which they shall be exempt.
