WHEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted, that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent, as in the said Act provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him, to declare by Proclamation his disallowance of such Bill; and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same from and after the day of the date of such Proclamation, or any subsequent day to be named therein:

And whereas the Act hereinafter specified has been enacted by the Superintendent of Wellington, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, and the said Act was received by the Governor on the eighth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Act should be disallowed:

Now therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Act passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Wellington, namely:

The Wanganui Freemasons Grant Act, 1871."

SCHEDULE.

Opotiki and Otara Road.

SCHEDULE.

Takapau to Manawatu Gorge.

The road commences at Takapau, in the Province of Hawke's Bay, at a point marked A on the plan referred to in the body of this Proclamation, and bearing 11° 15′ to Trigonometrical Station Henton, and 51° 25′ to Trigonometrical Station Grant; and it runs thence in a general south-westerly direction through Native lands to the Manawatu River; thence across that river in a general south-westerly direction through the Tuatua Block or Manawatu Block No. 6, and the Rakaiatai Block or Manawatu Block No. 7, and the Te Ohu Block or Manawatu Block No. 3, to the clearing known as Te Whakaroatapu; thence over that clearing in the same general south-westerly direction through the Piri Piri or Manawatu Block No. 2, across the clearing Piri Piri, and through the Umutaoroa Block or Manawatu Block No. 1, to the clearing known as Tahoraite, being portion of the Native Crown Grant Block, Tahoraite, No. 2. The road then crosses that clearing in a general southwesterly direction, and runs thence through the belt of bush dividing Tahoraite from the clearing known as Oringi, and across that clearing in the same general

direction through the belt of bush dividing it from the clearing known as Matahiwi, forming part of the Native Crown Grant Block of the same name, and across that clearing in a south-westerly direction to the Ahuaturanga Block No. 2 at Pukerangi; thence through that block in a general south-south-westerly direction to the Pukenui-ote Stream; it crosses that stream, and runs thence in a general south-southwesterly direction to the stream Mangamanaia, crosses that stream and runs thence in a general south-southwesterly direction to the junction of the River Mangatua with the Manawatu at the eastern end of the Manawatu Gorge, and thence down the north side of the Manawatu Gorge to the site selected for a bridge over the Manawatu, at the end of the line from Foxton towards Napier, as proclaimed on the twenty-fifth of April, 1871.

The whole of the road line, from the commencement to the termination, is delineated by a red line on the plan referred to in the body of the Proclamation, and marked No. 1; the breadth of the line of road being 1 chain, and the estimated length being about 42 miles.

William Gisborne, the Minister for Public Works; thence through and bounded on both sides by Native Reserve No. 3, Nukumaru; thence through and bounded on both sides by section 45, being the property or supposed to be the property of one Moore Hunter, one Francis Williamson, and one Alexander Peyman, which portion of the road passing through the said section No. 45 is shown upon a certain plan marked No. 3, and thereon coloured yellow, and deposited in the Office of the Public Works Department, Wellington, and which plan Works Department, Wellington, and which plan marked No. 3 is authenticated for the purpose of this Proclamation, in the manner aforesaid; thence through and bounded on both sides by a Township Reserve and Native Reserve No. 8, Kaipo to the Waitotara River; thence crossing the said river and proceeding in about the same direction, bounded on the North by Ferry Reserve and by an allotment at present in the occupation of one William Henry Shepard; thence through and bounded on both sides by the Railway Reserve (crossing a public roadway leading into the Ihupuku Road) to the Weraroa Road, crossing said road and deviating slightly through and bounded on both sides by a portion of the land awarded by the Native Lands Court to Haata Rio and others, intersecting the said Weraroa Road at or near the south-east corner of section 44, Okotuku District; thence along the said Weraroa Road, bounded on the North by section 44 by Okotuku Road, by sections 46 and 47 by Waiau Road, by section 48 by Herengawe Road, by sections 89 and 88, by Wairoa Town Belt Reserve, by sections 144, 143, 142, 141, by Bear Street, by sections 140, 139, 138, 137, by Gloag Street, by sections 136, 135, 134, 133, by Wilson Street, by sections 132, 131, 130, 129, by Suther Street, by sections 128 and 127, in the Wairoa Township;

REGULATIONS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF ASSISTED IMMIGRANTS INTO THE PROVINCE OF WELLING-

ANY person residing in Europe desirous of obtaining an assisted passage to the Province of Wellington in vessels under contract to proceed to that Province, may receive assistance as follows:—

1. The Government will grant passages on payment to the Agent-General in London, before embarkation, of the sum of five pounds for each adult of twelve years old and upwards; but where the intending immigrant is unable to pay the five pounds above mentioned, the Agent-General will have power to commute the cash payment into the giving a promissory note for seven pounds per adult; preference will, however, always be given to those who can pay the largest portion in cash. The promissory notes will be made payable on demand in the form neinted below. but upless the immigrant is printed below; but unless the immigrant dispute the debt or shall attempt to leave the Province, payment will only be required by such instalments as may be requisite to pay off the whole amount within twelve months after arrival.

8. In certain other cases, with a view to the introduction of skilled labour in connection with capital for the establishment of woollen, linen, paper, or other manufactories, free passages will be given, of the conditions of which the Agent-General in Eng-

land will from time to time be advised.

Southland.—Very fine calm weather throughout, with slight rainfall. Maximum on 5th, 0·39. Sharp frosts. Prevailing wind from E. Solar halo on 12th. Fine Aurora on 18th. Maximum temperature, 63.

GENERAL REMARKS.
