Defining Limits of Land under "The Wanganui River Foreshore Grant Act, 1873."

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourth day of March, 1874.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Wanganui River Foreshore Grant Act, 1873," it is, among other things, enacted that, within six months after the passing of the said Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to define the limits of the land to be included and set apart as the site of the Customs Examination Shed on Taupo Quay in the said Act mentioned; but the area to be so set apart shall not exceed one quarter of an acre, and shall extend to the water frontage to such depth as the Governor shall prescribe, not exceeding the limits by the said Act defined, and may extend in depth so as to have a frontage on Taupo Quay aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Excellency Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in performance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby define the limits of the land to be included and set apart as the site of the said Customs Examination Shed to be those set forth in the Schedule hereto: And in further pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, and by and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth

hereby order and prescribe that the said land so defined shall extend to the water frontage to the depth in the said Schedule mentioned.

SCHEDULE.

A PIECE of land situate in the Town of Wanganui, in the Province of Wellington, being part of the foreshore of the Wanganui River, containing one rood, or a little less. Bounded by a line commencing at a point (125) one hundred and twenty-five links east-south-east from the south-west angle of Nixon Place and Taupo Quay; thence running in a north-north-easterly direction along the south-east side of Taupo Quay, (90) ninety links; thence in an east-south-easterly direction to a point in the river having a depth of (3) three feet of water at low water spring tides, (277\frac{3}{4}) two hundred and seventy-seven and three-quarter links; thence in a south-south-westerly direction to another point in the river having a depth of (3) three feet of water at low water spring tides, (90) ninety links, thence in a north-north-westerly direction, (277\frac{3}{4}) two hundred and seventy-seven and three-quarter links, to the place of commencing.

Sittings of District Court at Napier and the East Coast District appointed.

WHEREAS by "The District Courts Act, 1858," it is provided that there shall be within the

Colony Courts of Record, to be called District Courts, and the Governor is empowered from time to time, by notification in the New Zealand Gazette, to fix the times and places within the district at which every such Court shall be held: And whereas by "The District Courts Act Amendment Act, 1865," it is provided that as to the times of the holding of such Courts it shall be sufficient for the Governor, if he shall so think fit, to fix the interval only within which such Courts shall be held at each place; and it shall in such case be lawful for the Judge of such Court to fix the particular times and days for the holding of such Courts in the manner and subject to the provisions therein contained:

And whereas by Warrant bearing date the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, certain intervals were fixed for Sessions of the East Coast District Court at Napier, Waipawa, and Gisborne, and it is expedient to make

other arrangements in lieu thereof:

Now therefore, I, Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, fix that Sessions of the East Coast District Court for civil business only shall be held in every year in the Provincial Government Buildings at Napier, and at the Court Houses at Waipawa and Gisborne, in the East Coast District, at the intervals mentioned in the said Warrant of the seventeenth day of November last; and from and after the seventeenth day of March instant, for criminal business only, in the Provincial Buildings at Napier aforesaid, once in every two calendar months in every year, the first of such Sessions for criminal business being held on the sixteenth day of May now next ensuing.

Rules and Regulations under which Rakaia Bridge will be open for Ordinary Traffic.

IN pursuance of all powers and authorities vested in me for that purpose, I, Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby make the following Regulations authorizing traffic on, along, or across the Rakaia Bridge, on the Great Southern Railway, in the Province of Canterbury, and fixing the times or occasions during or on which such traffic shall be allowed, and generally regulating such traffic, that is to say,—

1. All horses crossing the bridge should be driven in harness, or led by bridle or halter; and cattle and sheep, &c., must have a man behind and before them.

- 2. Horses or light-wheeled vehicles will not be allowed to enter upon the bridge within fifteen minutes, drays within thirty minutes, and cattle and sheep or pigs within one hour, of the advertised time of arrival and departure of any train from the Rakaia Railway Station.
- 3. Horsemen or wheeled vehicles will not be allowed to travel at a greater rate than six miles an hour across the bridge.
- 4. Traction engines, or engines employed in agriculture, flax-dressing, or any other purpose, will not

be permitted on the bridge otherwise than on the goods waggons in use on the Provincial Government Railways.

- 5. No greater weight than two tons gross on any one pair of wheels with tires less than five inches wide will be permitted to cross the bridge.
- 6. In the event of a special train, the Provincial Government shall have the power to put in force the same restrictions as described in clause 2 for advertised trains.
- 7. Any damage done to any part of the bridge by the contravention of any of the foregoing rules may be recovered by a summary process; and any person or persons entering upon the bridge within the prohibited hours, or resisting the gatekeepers in the execution of their duties, will be subject to a penalty hereinafter mentioned.
- 8. Any person in a state of intoxication will not be permitted to enter upon the bridge whilst in such condition.
- 9. Any person offending against any of these regulations will be liable to a penalty not exceeding tenpounds.

to be the Resident Magistrate for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act within the Districts of Matakohe, Mangawai, Port Albert, Mahurangi, Tokatoka, and Kaipara, vico John Rogan, Esq.

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1873.—REGISTRY. SIR,—I am directed by the Board of Trade to transmit a copy of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1873," and to request that you will call the attention of the Earl of Kimberley to the 3rd section, by which every British ship is required to be marked to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade with certain particulars, including a scale of feet denoting her draft

of water. An offence against this section is punishable by a

penalty of £100.

I am also to call attention to sections 16 and 17, relating to the duties of Masters in cases of collision, and to state that the Board of Trade, being strongly impressed with the importance of carrying into effect these provisions as far as possible at home and abroad, direct me to request that you will move his Lordship to bring them to the notice of the Governors or Administrators of the various British Possessions, with instructions to take such steps as may be practicable for their general publication, and for the detection and punishment of offences against them.

With regard to the 12th and 13th sections, re-

lating to the survey of unseaworthy ships, I am to request you to suggest to his Lordship that it is very advisable that Acts or Ordinances should be passed in the various Colonies giving similar power to the Governors, Administrators, or other authorities, to that which is by these sections given to the Board of

Trade.

A draft Circular to Registrars and other officers in the British Possessions abroad is enclosed for the approval of Earl Kimberley, and the Board of Trade would be glad to know the number which will be required for distribution.

INSTRUCTIONS TO REGISTRARS AND OTHER OFFICERS IN BRITISH INDIA AND THE BRITISH POSSESSIONS POSSESSIONS ABROAD.

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1873.

A copy of this Act is annexed.

Registry.

The officer should report at once to the Board of Trade any case in which there is reason to suppose that a British ship which has sailed from a port in the United Kingdom since the passing of this Act is insufficiently or inaccurately marked, with informa-tion as to the destination of the vessel, and her next

probable arrival at a port in the United Kingdom.

Foreign ships which become British ships, and have not at any previous time been registered as British ships, should not be registered by any other name than that which they bore as foreign ships immediately before becoming British ships, without the written permission of the Board of Trade.

No ship which has ceased to be registered as a British ship by reason of having been wrecked or

until she has been surveyed and certified as seaworthy by a Surveyor appointed in accordance with the law of the possession, or, in the absence of any such law, by the Governor or Administrator of the possession; and in all cases of re-registry under such circumstances the officer should write at the top of the transcript of the register to be forwarded to the Registrar-General of Shipping and Seamen the words 'Certificate of Seaworthiness granted.'

Masters and Seamen.

The attention of the officer is called to the 9th section, which gives a Court power to award compensation to seamen who are detained on a charge of desertion, or a kindred offence, where the ship is proved by a survey under section 7 of the Act of 1871 to be unfit to proceed to sea, or to have insufficient accommodation.

Unseaworthy Ships.

By "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1871," any person who knowingly sends a ship to sea in an unseaworthy state is guilty of a misdemeanour.

By the 13th section of the present Act the Board of Trade may order a survey of any British ship which they have reason to believe to be unseaworthy. In order that the Board of Trade may carry this clause into effect, the officer should report to the Board of Trade at once any case in which he has reason to believe that a British ship is unseaworthy, with particulars of the voyage on which she is engaged, and her probable return to the United Kingdom.

Collisions.

The officer should report at once to the Board of Trade any case in which he has reason to believe that the master of a ship which has been in collision with another (one of the ships being British) has neglected to stay by her until he has ascertained that she has no need of assistance, or has failed to render proper assistance, or to give to the master of the other vessel the names of his own vessel, and of her port of registry, or of the port or place to which she belongs, and also the names of the ports or places from which and to which she is bound

The report should be accompanied by all the information which the officer is able to obtain, and should be forwarded as soon as possible, whether or not the case is to be investigated by a Court of

Inquiry or other tribunal.

Signals.

The officer should take every opportunity of giving information of the signals of distress and for pilots, now sanctioned by the British Parliament, to Masters

who may be ignorant of them.

Placards describing them accompany this circular, and should be exhibited in the shipping office.

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1873.

CHAPTER 85.

An Acr to amend the Merchant Shipping Acts.

[5th August, 1873.

BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

Preliminary.

1. This Act may be cited as "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1873."
2. This Act shall be construed as one with "The

abandoned, or for any other reason than those men- | Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the Acts amend-

ing the same; and the said Acts and this Act may be cited collectively as "The Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873."

Registry (Part II. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854).

3. Every British ship registered after the passing of this Act shall, before registry, and every British ship registered before the passing of this Act shall, on or before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, be permanently and conspicuously marked to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade as follows :-

Her name shall be marked on each of her bows, and her name and the name of her port of registry shall be marked on her stern, on a dark ground in white or yellow letters, or on a light ground in black letters, such letters to be of a length not less than four inches, and of proportionate breadth:

Her official number and the number denoting her registered tonnage shall be cut in on her

main beam:

A scale of feet denoting her draught of water shall be marked on each side of her stem and of her stern post, in Roman capital letters or in figures not less than six inches in length, the lower line of such letters or figures to coincide with the draught line denoted thereby. Such letters or figures shall be marked by being cut in and painted white or yellow on a dark ground, or in such other way as the Board

of Trade may from time to time approve.

The Board of Trade may, however, exempt any class of ships from the requirements of this section,

or any of them.

If the scale of feet showing the ship's draught of water is in any respect inaccurate, so as to be likely to mislead, the owner of the ship shall incur a

penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

The marks required by this section shall be permanently continued, and no alteration shall be made therein, except in the event of any of the particulars thereby denoted being altered in the manner provided by "The Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873."

Any owner or master of a British ship who neglects to cause his ship to be marked as aforesaid, or to keep her so marked, and any person who conceals, removes, alters, defaces, or obliterates, or suffers any person under his control to conceal, remove, alter, deface, or obliterate, any of the said marks, except in the event aforesaid, or except for the purpose of escaping capture by an enemy, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds; and any officer of Customs, on receipt of a certificate from a surveyor or inspector of the Board of Trade that a ship is insufficiently or inaccurately marked, may detain the same until the insufficiency or inaccuracy has been remedied:

Provided that no fishing vessel duly registered, lettered, and numbered, in pursuance of "The Sea Fisheries Act, 1868," shall be required to have her name and port of registry marked under this section:

Provided also, that if any registered British ship is not within a port of the United Kingdom at any time before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, she shall be marked, as by this section required, within one month after her next return to a British port of registry subsequent to that date.

4. The record of the draught of water of any seagoing ship required under section five of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1871," shall, in addition to the particulars thereby required, specify the extent

of her clear side in feet and inches.

The term "clear side" means the height from the water to the upper side of the plank of the deck

from which the depth of hold as stated in the register is measured, and the measurement of the clear side is to be taken at the lowest part of the side.

Every master of a sea-going ship shall, upon the request of any person appointed to record the ship's draught of water, permit such person to enter the ship, and to make such inspections and take such measurements as may be requisite for the purpose of such record, and any master who fails so to do, or impedes, or suffers any one under his control to impede, any person so appointed in the execution of his duty, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

5. Where a foreign ship, not having at any previous time been registered as a British ship, becomes a British ship, no person shall apply to register, and no Registrar shall knowingly register such ship, except by the name which she bore as a foreign ship immediately before becoming a British ship, unless with the permission of the Board of Trade granted in manner directed by section six of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1871."

Any person who acts or suffers any person under his control to act in contravention of this section, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding

one hundred pounds.

6. Where a ship has ceased to be registered as a British ship by reason of having been wrecked or abandoned, or for any reason other than capture by the enemy or transfer to a person not qualified to own a British ship, such ship shall not be re-registered until she has, at the expense of the applicant for registration, been surveyed by one of the surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade and certified by him to be sea-worthy.

Masters and Seamen (Part III. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854).

7. Any agreement with a seaman made under section one hundred and forty-nine of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,' may, instead of stating the nature and duration of the intended voyage or engagement as by that section required, state the maximum period of the voyage or engagement, and the places or parts of the world (if any) to which the

voyage or engagement is not to extend.
8. The owner or master of any British vessel engaged in fishing off the coast of the United Kingdom may enter into an agreement with any person employed on such vessel that such person shall be remunerated wholly by a share in the profit of the

fishing adventure.

Every such agreement shall be in writing or in print, or partly in writing and partly in print, and shall be signed by the contracting parties in the presence of a superintendent or deputy superintendent of a mercantile marine office.

The superintendent or deputy superintendent shall, before such agreement is signed, read and (if necessary) explain the same to the contracting parties, and shall attest the signature of the agreement, and certify that it has been read to and agreed to by the

contracting parties.

Any such agreement, if made in the manner by this section required, shall be valid and binding on all the contracting parties, notwithstanding anything contained in section one hundred and eighty-two of

"The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854."

9. If a seaman or apprentice belonging to any ship is detained on a charge of desertion or any kindred offence, and if upon a survey of the ship being made under section seven of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1871," it is proved that she is not in a fit condition to proceed to sea, or that her accommodation is insufficient, the owner or master of the ship shall be liable to pay to such seaman or apprentice

such compensation for his detention as the Court having cognizance of the proceedings may award.

10. In any case where the business of a mercantile

marine office is conducted otherwise than under a local Marine Board, the Board of Trade may, if they think fit, instead of conducting such business at a Custom House or otherwise, establish a mercantile marine office, and for that purpose procure the requisite buildings and property, and from time to time appoint and remove all the requisite superintendents, deputies, clerks, and servants. They may also, in the like case, make all such provisions and exercise all such powers with respect to the holding of examinations for the purpose of granting certificates of competency as masters, mates, or engineers, to persons desirous of obtaining the same, as might have been made or exercised by a local Marine Board.

11. Whenever it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign State is desirous that any of the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873, relating to the engagement and discharge of seamen, shall apply to the ships of such State, Her Majesty may by Order in Council declare that such of the said provisions as are in such order specified shall, subject to the limitations, if any, contained in the order, apply, and thereupon, so long as the order remains in force, such provisions shall apply, subject to the said limitations, to the ships of such State, and to the owners, masters, officers, and crews of such ships, when not within the jurisdiction of such State, in the same manner in all respects as if such ships were British ships.

It shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to add to, alter, or repeal

any order made under this section.

Safety and Prevention of Accidents (Part IV. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854). 12. Where the Board of Trade have received a complaint, or have reason to believe that any British ship is, by reason of the defective condition of her hull, equipments, or machinery, or by reason of overloading or improper loading, unfit to proceed to sea without serious danger to human life, they may, if they think fit, appoint some competent person or persons to survey such ship, and the equipments, machinery, and cargo thereof, and to report thereon to the Board.

Any person so appointed may, for the purposes of such survey, require the unloading or removal of any cargo, ballast, or tackle, and shall have all the powers of an Inspector appointed under "The Merchant

Shipping Act, 1854.

Any person who (having notice of the intention to hold such survey) wilfully does or causes to be done any act by which the person appointed to make such survey is prevented from or obstructed in ascertaining the condition of the ship, her equipments, machinery, and cargo, shall be liable to a penalty not

exceeding fifty pounds.

The Board of Trade may, if they think fit, order that any ship be detained for the purpose of being surveyed under this section, and thereupon any officer of Customs may detain such ship until her release be ordered either by the Board of Trade or by any Court

to which an appeal is given under this Act.

Upon the receipt of the report of the person making any such survey, the Board may, if in their opinion the ship cannot proceed to sea without serious danger to human life, make such further order as they may think requisite as to the detention of the ship or as to her release, either absolutely or upon the performance of such conditions with respect to the execution of repairs or alterations, or the unloading or reloading of cargo, as the Board may impose. They may also from time to time vary or add to such order.

A copy of any such order, and of the report upon which it was founded, and also of any variation of or addition to such order, shall be delivered as soon as possible to the owner or master of the ship to which it relates.

When a ship has been detained under this section, she shall not be released by reason of her British

register having been closed.

13. If upon the survey of a ship under this Act she is reported to have been at the time of the survey, having regard to the nature of the service for which she was then intended, unfit to proceed to sea without serious danger to human life, the expenses incurred by the Board of Trade in respect of the survey shall be paid by the owner of the ship to the Board of Trade, and shall, without prejudice to any other remedy, be recoverable by them in the same manner as salvage is recoverable.

If upon such survey the ship is not reported to have been unfit to proceed to sea, having regard to the nature of the service for which she was intended, the Board of Trade shall be liable to pay compensation to any person for any loss or damage which he may have sustained by reason of the detention of the ship for the purpose of survey, or otherwise in

respect of such survey.

Where a complaint has been made to the Board of Trade that a ship is not fit to proceed to sea, they may, if they think fit, before ordering a survey of the ship, require the complainant to give or provide such security as they may think sufficient for the payment of the costs and expenses which they may incur in respect of the survey of the ship, and of the compensation which they may be rendered liable to pay for loss or damage caused by her detention for the purpose of such survey, or otherwise in respect of such survey.

Where a ship has been surveyed under this Act in consequence of a complaint made to the Board of Trade, if, upon such survey being made, it appear that such complaint was made without reasonable cause, the expenses incurred by the Board in respect of the survey of the ship, and the amount, if any, which the Board may have been rendered liable to pay in respect of any loss or damage caused by her detention, shall be recoverable by the Board from such com-

All moneys payable by the Board of Trade in respect or by reason of the survey or detention of a ship under this Act shall, subject to the right by this section provided of recovering such moneys from the complainant, be paid out of moneys to be provided by Parliament.

14. If the owner of any ship surveyed under this Act is dissatisfied with any order of the Board of Trade made upon such survey, he may apply to any of the following Courts having jurisdiction in the place where such ship was surveyed, that is to

In England, to any Court having Admiralty jurisdiction:

In Ireland, to any Court having jurisdiction under "The Court of Admiralty (Ireland) Act, 1867:

In Scotland, to the Court of the Sheriff of the

County.

The Court may, upon such application, if they think fit, appoint one or more competent persons to survey the ship anew, and any surveyor so appointed shall have all the powers of the person by whom the original survey was made. Such survey anew shall, if so required by the Board of Trade or the shipowner, be made in the presence of any person or persons appointed by them respectively to attend at the

The Court to which such application is made may

make such order as to the detention or release of the ship, as to the payment of any costs and damages which may have been occasioned by her detention, as to the payment of the expenses of the original survey, and of the survey anew, and otherwise as to the payment of any costs of and incident to the application, as to the Court may seem just.

Where an application is made under this section to a County Court, or in Ireland to a local Court, the matter of the application shall be deemed to be an Admiralty cause within the meaning of "The County Courts Admiralty Jurisdiction Act, 1868," and "The Court of Admiralty Jurisdiction Act, 1867."

15. In the case of any ship surveyed under the Fourth Part of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," the Board of Trade may at the request of the owner authorize the reduction of the number and the variation of the dimensions of the boats required for the ship by section two hundred and ninety-two of that Act, and also the substitution of rafts or other appliances for saving life for any such boats, so nevertheless that the boats so reduced or varied, and the rafts or other appliances so substituted, be sufficient for the persons carried on board the ship.

Section two hundred and ninety-three of the said Act shall extend to any such rafts or appliances in

the same manner as if they were boats.

16. In every case of collision between two vessels it shall be the duty of the master or person in charge of each vessel, if and so far as he can do so without danger to his own vessel, crew, and passengers (if any), to stay by the other vessel until he has ascertained that she has no need of further assistance, and to render to the other vessel, her master, crew, and passengers (if any), such assistance as may be practicable and as may be necessary in order to save them from any danger caused by the collision; and also to give to the master or person in charge of the other vessel the name of his own vessel, and of her port of registry, or of the port or place to which she belongs, and also the names of the ports and places from which and to which she is bound.

If he fails so to do, and no reasonable cause for such failure is shown, the collision shall, in the absence of proof to the contrary, be deemed to have been caused by his wrongful act, neglect, or default.

Every master or person in charge of a British vessel who fails, without reasonable cause, to render such assistance or give such information as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour; and if he is a certificated officer, an inquiry into his conduct may be held, and his certificate may be cancelled or

suspended.

17. If in any case of collision it is proved to the Court before which the case is tried that any of the regulations for preventing collision contained in or made under "The Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873," has been infringed, the ship by which such regulation has been infringed shall be deemed to be in fault, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that the circumstances of the case made departure from the regulation necessary.

18. The signals specified in the First Schedule to this Act shall be deemed to be signals of distress.

Any master of a vessel who uses or displays, or causes or permits any person under his authority to use or display, any of the said signals, except in the case of a vessel being in distress, shall be liable to pay compensation for any labour undertaken, risk incurred, or loss sustained in consequence of such signal having been supposed to be a signal of distress; and such compensation may, without prejudice to any other remedy, be recovered in the same manner in which salvage is recoverable.

19. If a vessel requires the services of a pilot, the signals to be used and displayed shall be those specified in the Second Schedule to this Act.

Any master of a vessel who uses or displays, or causes or permits any person under his authority to use or display, any of the said signals for any other purpose than that of summoning a pilot, or uses, or causes or permits any person under his authority to use, any other signal for a pilot, shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

20. Her Majesty may from time to time, by Order in Council, repeal or alter the rules as to signals contained in the Schedules to this Act, or make new rules in addition thereto or in substitution therefor; and any alterations in or additions to such rules made in manner aforesaid shall be of the same force as the rules in the said Schedules.

21. Any shipowner who is desirous of using, for the purposes of a private code, any rockets, lights, or other similar signals, may register such signals with the Board of Trade, and the Board shall give public notice of the signals so registered in such manner as

they may think requisite for preventing such signals from being mistaken for signals of distress or signals for pilots.

The Board may refuse to register any signals which in their opinion cannot easily be distinguished from signals of distress or signals for pilots.

When any signal has been so registered, the use or display thereof by any person acting under the authority of the shipowner in whose name it is registered shall not subject any person to any of the penalties or liabilities by this Act imposed upon persons using

or displaying signals improperly.

22. If the managing owner, or, in the event of there being no managing owner, the ship's husband of any British ship have reason, owing to the non-appearance of such ship, or to any other circumstance, to apprehend that such ship has been wholly lost, he shalf, as soon as conveniently may be, send to the Board of Trade notice in writing of such loss and of the probable occasion thereof, stating the name of the ship and her official number (if any), and the port to which she belongs; and if he neglect to do so within a reasonable time, he shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

23. If any person sends or attempts to send by, or, not being the master or owner of the vessel, carries or attempts to carry in any vessel, British or foreign, any dangerous goods—that is to say, aquafortis, vitriol, naphtha, benzine, gunpowder, lucifer matches, nitro-glycerine, petroleum, or any other goods of a dangerous nature—without distinctly marking their nature on the outside of the package containing the same, and giving written notice of the nature of such goods and of the name and address of the sender or carrier thereof to the master or owner of the vessel at or before the time of sending the same to be shipped or taking the same on board the vessel, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds: Provided that if such person show that he was merely an agent in the shipment of any such goods as aforesaid, and was not aware and did not suspect, and had no reason to suspect, that the goods shipped by him were of a dangerous nature, the penalty which he incurs shall not exceed ten pounds.

24. If any person knowingly sends or attempts to send by, or carries or attempts to carry in any vessel, British or foreign, any dangerous goods or goods of a dangerous nature, under a false description, or falsely describes the sender or carrier thereof, he shall incur a penalty not exceeding five hundred pounds.

25. The master or owner of any vessel, British or foreign, may refuse to take on board any package or parcel which he suspects to contain goods of a dangerous nature, and may require it to be opened to ascertain the fact.

26. Where any dangerous goods as defined in this Act, or any goods which in the judgment of the master or owner of the vessel are of a dangerous nature, have been sent or brought aboard any vessel, British or foreign, without being marked as aforesaid or without such notice having been given as aforesaid, the master or owner of the vessel may cause such goods to be thrown overboard, together with any package or receptacle in which they are contained and neither the master nor the owner of the vessel shall, in respect of such throwing overboard, be subject to any liability, civil or criminal, in any Court.

27. Where any dangerous goods have been sent or carried, or attempted to be sent or carried, on board any vessel, British or foreign, without being marked as aforesaid, or without such notice having been given as aforesaid, and where any such goods have been sent or carried, or attempted to be sent or carried, under a false description, or the sender or carrier thereof has been falsely described, it shall be lawful for any Court having Admiralty jurisdiction to declare such goods, and any package or receptacle in which they are contained, to be and they shall thereupon be forfeited, and when forfeited shall be

disposed of as the Court directs.

The Court shall have and may exercise the aforesaid powers of forfeiture and disposal, notwithstanding that the owner of the goods have not committed any offence under the provisions of this Act relating to dangerous goods, and be not before the Court, and have not notice of the proceedings, and notwithstanding that there be no evidence to show to whom the goods belong; nevertheless the Court may, in its discretion, require such notice as it may direct to be given to the owner or shipper of the goods before the same are forfeited.

28. The provisions of this Act relating to the carriage of dangerous goods shall be deemed to be in addition to and not in substitution for or in restraint of any other enactment for the like object, so nevertheless that nothing in the said provisions shall be deemed to authorize that any person be sued or prosecuted twice in the same matter.

Miscellaneous, and Repeal.

29. Where, in accordance with the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, Her Majesty exercises jurisdiction within any port out of Her Majesty's dominions, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to declare such port a port of registry (in this Act referred to as a foreign port of registry), and by the same or any subsequent Order in Council to declare the description of persons who are to be the Registrars of British ships at such foreign port of registry, and to make regulations with respect to the registry of British ships thereat.

Upon such order coming into operation it shall have effect as if it were enacted in the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873, and shall, subject to any exceptions and regulations contained in the order, apply in the same manner, as near as may be, as if the port mentioned in the order were an ordi-

nary port of registry.

30. There shall be paid in respect of the several measurements, inspections, and surveys mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto, such fees, not exceeding those specified in that behalf in the said Schedule, as the Board of Trade may from time to time determine.

31. In any legal proceedings under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873, the Board of Trade may take proceedings in the name of any of their

32. The following sections of this Act—that is to say, sections sixteen, eighteen, nineteen, twenty, twenty-one, twenty-two, twenty-three, twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, twenty-eight-

shall not come into operation until the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventythree.

33. gonui.—Tolerably fine on the whole, but at times heavy rain; maximum fall on 9th, 182 inch; prevailing easterly wind, and at times strong; thunder on 14th, 16th, 21st, and 22nd; fog on 11th; generally very oppressive. Maximum tempera-

ture, 88°; minimum, 54°.

Auckland.—Hot and sultry, with little rain; the maximum fall recorded on 2nd, 51 inch; very pleasant at times, with light showers; stiff S.W. breeze on 23rd; winds prevailed from N.E. and N.W., and moderate. Maximum temperature, 80.6°;

minimum, 51.9°. Taranaki.—Fine month; maximum rainfall recorded on 23rd, 1.27 inch, otherwise little rain; prevailing westerly winds and

moderate. Maximum temperature, 80°; minimum, 44°.

**Mapier.—Fine weather, but very hot; very slight rainfall, the maximum on 22nd, '08 inch'; prevailing wind N.E., strong on 22nd. Maximum temperature, 86°; minimum, 50°.

Stormy weather commenced on the 16th from N.W., and the barometer fell; threatening rain and very stormy all day of 17th; at night heavy rain and very severe gale; 83 inch recorded on 18th, and 845 miles of wind, the maximum force being 60 miles per hour, oppressive, and barometer down to 29.4; stormy on 18th, but abated during the day, still raining; in afternoon wind shifted to S.E., and heavy squall of wind and rain, barometer rose slightly, but fell again; rain ceased during night and wind fell, changing to N.W. and fine. Nelson.—Exceedingly fine, light westerly winds; pleasant showers of rain during latter part, 1.52 inch on the 18th, being the maximum; very hot at times. Maximum temperature, 86°; minimum, 43°.

Christchurch.—Fine weather, very hot at times; prevailing N.E. winds and light; on 21st strong N.W. wind; thunder on 14th; maximum rainfall recorded on 11th, '31 inch. Maximum temperature, 83°; minimum, 43°.
