Lands proclaimed Waste Lands of the Crown.

JAMES FERGUSSON, Governor.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS under the provisions of "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870," the Governor was empowered, from time to time, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, to purchase or in any way acquire any land in the North Island of New Zealand, or any interests therein, which the owners might be willing to sell, convey, or surrender, as therein mentioned: And whereas by "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1873," it is enacted that whenever the Governor is satisfied that any lands purchased out of the sums of two hundred thousand (200,000) pounds and five hundred thousand (500,000) pounds therein mentioned, are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, he shall, by Proclamation, declare such lands to be waste lands of the Crown, subject, except as hereafter provided, to be sold and dealt with according to the provisions of the laws for the time being in force in the Province in which such land is, regulating the sale and disposal of waste lands of the Crown within such Province, and thereupon such lands so proclaimed shall become subject to such provisions: And whereas the lands described in the Schedule hereto have been purchased out of the sum of two hundred thousand (200,000) pounds, declared to be applicable for the purchase of lands in the North Island under the provisions of Part Four (IV.) of "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870:" And whereas it is expedient that the said lands should be declared to be waste lands, as hereinafter set forth:

Now therefore, I, Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, being satisfied that the lands described in the Schedule hereto are free from Native claims and all difficulties in connection therewith, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1873," do hereby proclaim and declare the said lands to be waste lands of the Crown, subject (except as by the being in force in the Province of Auckland, regulating the sale and disposal of waste lands of the Crown within such Province.

Given under the hand of His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same; and issued under the Seal of the said Colony, at Wellington, this twenty-fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventyfour.

KAITATA.

WHEREAS by "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870," it is enacted that the railways to be constructed under the said Act shall be only such railways as shall from time to time be determined by the General Assembly: And it is also thereby enacted that, subject to the provisions contained therein, the Governor may construct, or cause to be constructed, any lines of railway which shall be prescribed by the General Assembly as railways to be constructed under the said Act, or any part or parts thereof, and acquire the necessary engines, plant, and machinery for working and using the same, or any of them: And it is also thereby enacted that,

whenever the Governor shall determine to construct any such railway, or any part thereof, it shall be lawful for him, by Proclamation published in the New Zealand Gazette, to declare and define the limits and description and line thereof, and the lands proposed to be taken for the purpose of such railway, subject to the provisions of any Act defining such limits and descriptions; and any such Proclamation may refer to maps, plans, or drawings to be deposited in the office of the Registrar or Deputy Registrar of the Supreme Court in the Province in which such railway or part thereof is proposed to be constructed, and any maps, plans, or drawings so referred to shall be deemed to form part of such Proclamation; and upon the publication of such Proclamation, the provisions and regulations contained in the Seventh Part of the said Act shall be applicable to the railway, and to the lands to which the Proclamation shall relate: And it is also thereby enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to make, construct, and maintain any such railway as aforesaid, with proper works, approaches, and conveniences connected therewith, commencing at the place delineated on, and extending along the lines set forth in, and terminating at a point described in, the Act or Proclamation proclaiming and defining such railway, or shown in the maps, plans, or drawings referred to in such Act or Proclamation: And it is also thereby enacted that the Governor may direct that any part of such line of railway may be constructed on and along any part of any public highway, and that any part of any such line of railway may be constructed on or through any public reserves: And it is also thereby enacted that, subject to the provisions of that Part of the said Act and of the Acts incorporated therewith, the Governor may exercise all or any of the powers by that Part of the said Act or the said incorporated Acts conferred upon him for the construction of any such railway, and may enter upon, and cause to be entered upon, all lands within the Colony for the purpose of making such surveys as may be necessary, and may take and hold all the lands required for the railway along the line set forth and described as aforesaid, or within the limits of deviation described in the Proclamation relating thereto, and may temporarily occupy and use such lands as may be necessary on either side of the railway, during the construction thereof:

And whereas by "The Railways Act, 1870,"
"The Railways Act, 1871," and "The Railways Act, 1872," it is enacted that the Governor may, under the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly recited Act and of the now reciting Acts, construct and maintain, or cause to be constructed and maintained, the several lines of railway specified therein: And it is also thereby enacted that the line of the railways thereby authorized to be constructed shall be fixed by the Governor, and shall commence and terminate at points to be fixed by the Governor: And whereas by "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1872," it is enacted that as to any railway which the Governor has been authorized to construct, and to fix the commencing and termination points and line thereof, it shall be competent for him, if he thinks fit, instead of fixing and proclaiming such points and the whole line at one time, to fix and proclaim portions of such line from time to time, and the commencing and termination points of any such portion or portions, and the limits and description of any such portion or portions, and the lands proposed to be taken for the purpose of any such portion or portions, and to construct any portion or portions so fixed, and to take the lands for the same; and any such portion so proclaimed shall be deemed to be a railway within the meaning of the said Act and the

said amending Act and this Act:

after the expiration of twenty-one days from the publication in the New Zealand Gazette, and in a newspaper ordinarily circulating in the district, of a Proclamation under the thirteenth section of the said Act, whether of the whole or a portion or portions of a line of railway, the Governor, on behalf of Her Majesty, may enter upon, take possession of, use and hold, or cause to be entered upon, taken possession of, used and held, so much of the lands defined in such Proclamation as proposed to be taken as shall be required to be taken, purchased, or permanently used for the purposes of such railway, notwithstanding that an agreement shall not have been come to or an award made for the purchase or compensation money to be paid in respect of such lands:

And whereas by the said last-mentioned Act it is also enacted that in any case in which a road or right of road has been or hereafter may be reserved in any Crown grant, and in any case in which, under "The Native Lands Act, 1865," or any law for the time being in force relating to the sale of waste lands of the Crown, or any law whatever, there is a right to take a public road through any lands, it shall be lawful, after such road shall have been surveyed, to construct under the said Acts any railway, or any part of any railway, on the road so surveyed, notwithstanding

that such road may not have been made:

And whereas the Governor has determined to construct and maintain portions of the railway from Wanganui to Manawatu, authorized to be constructed by "The Railways Act, 1871," and "The Railways Act, 1872," which said portions are hereinafter described:

Now therefore, I, the Right Honorable Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities conferred on me by the hereinbefore in part recited Acts, and in exercise of every other power enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim, declare, and define the limits, descriptions, and lines of the said portions of the said railway to be those set forth in the First Schedule hereto; and that the lands specified and described in the Second Schedule hereto are proposed to be taken for the purposes of the said portions of the said railway; and that the limits of deviation shall be those set forth in the said First Schedule hereto; and in pursuance and exercise of all powers and authorities conferred on me in that behalf, I do hereby fix the point of commencement of one portion of the said railway to be at or near a point which is situated in Section numbered 21 in the Wanganui District, in the Province of Wellington; and the point of termination of the same to be at or on that part of the East Bank of the Wanganui River which adjoins the western portion of Rural Section numbered 89 in the Wanganui Highway District, in the same Province; and the point of commencement of the other portion of the said railway to be at or near a point which is situated in Rural Section numbered 248 in the Wangaehu Highway District, in the Province of Wellington; and the point of termination of the same to be at or near a point which is situated in Section numbered 33 in the Turakina District, in the same Province.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Limits, Descriptions, Lines, and Limits of Deviation of portions of the Railway from Wanganui to Manawatu, in the Province of Wellington.

WHEREAS it is enacted by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1868," that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to appoint one Inspector of Weights and Measures for any Province, County, Borough, or District, or for each of two or more divisions of any Province, County, Borough, or District, the boundaries of which divisions shall be proclaimed from time to time in the New Zealand Gazette by the Governor; and the Governor may from time to time remove any such Inspector and appoint another in the room of any Inspector so removed, or who may die, resign, or discontinue his office: And whereas in exercise and pursuance of

the power and authority conferred on him by the said | evidence of such order to all intents and purposes; Act, the Governor has at divers times, and under and by virtue of divers Proclamations published in the New Zealand Gazette, proclaimed and declared certain districts within the Province of Auckland to be districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act, and has appointed Inspectors for the said districts: And whereas it is expedient to proclaim one district within the said Province for the purposes of the said Act, in lieu of the districts known as the Auckland, Otahuhu, Waikato, and

Raglan Districts respectively:

Now therefore, I, the Right Honorable Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority conferred upon me by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that, for the purposes of the said Act, there shall be within the said Province of Auckland a division or district which shall embrace the whole of the Province of Auckland, exclusive of the district known as "The Hauraki Weights and Measures District," proclaimed on the sixteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and published in Gazette number fourteen, of the seventeenth of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and that the several districts heretofore proclaimed and known as the Auckland, Otahuhu, Waikato, and Raglan Districts, respectively, shall cease to be districts under the said Act: Provided that nothing herein contained shall affect the district proclaimed on the sixteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and known as the Hauraki District, which said last-mentioned district shall be and remain a district under the said Act.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL. WHEREAS by the nineteenth section of "The Public Health Act, 1872," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make orders from time to time directing that the provisions thereinafter in that part of the said Act contained, or any of them, be put in force in New Zealand, or in such parts thereof, or in such places therein, as in such orders respectively may be expressed, and may in like manner revoke or renew any such order; and, subject to revocation or renewal as aforesaid, every such order shall be in force for six calendar months from the publication of such order, or for such shorter period as in such order shall be expressed, and no longer; and every such order shall be published in the General Government Gazette, and such publication shall be conclusive in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority

WHEREAS by the forty-seventh section of "The Public Trust Office Act Amendment Act, 1873," it is enacted that all moneys in the Public Trustee's Account, from whatever property arising, shall, except as regards moneys as to which special provision is made for the investment thereof by the trusts affecting the particular property, be, for the purposes of investment, one common fund, and the investments thereof shall not be made on account of or belong to any particular property, unless the Governor shall otherwise direct as to any particular property; and the interest accruing from investment of such moneys shall be divided amongst the properties from which the fund arises in such manner and at such times and in such proportions as shall be prescribed by regulations to be made for the purpose from time to time by the Governor in Council, and such regulations shall have the force of law as if included in this Act: And whereas it is expedient that Regulations should be prescribed for the purposes in the said recited section mentioned:

Now therefore, His Excellency Sir James Fergusson, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power vested in him by the said in part recited Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby order and declare that, from and after the day of the publication hereof in the New Zealand Gazette, the Regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto shall be, and the same are hereby prescribed, for the purpose of providing in what manner, at what times, and in what proportions, the interest accruing from the investment of moneys in the Public Trustee's Account shall be divided amongst the properties from which the fund arises: Provided that nothing contained in such Regulations shall affect moneys as to which special provision is made for the investment thereof by the trusts affecting the particular property.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS for Payment of Interest on Balances of Estates held in the Public Trust Office, where the Instruments under which such Estates were vested do not otherwise prescribe.

In respect of Sums to remain for a fixed Period.

1. Any sum exceeding £100, received on account of an estate, which sum is not required to be withdrawn for a period of not less than three years, shall be invested, under the direction of the Board, in one or other of the securities prescribed by section 25 of "The Public Trust Office Act, 1872."

2. All securities purchased as above shall be held for the estate for which the investment was made; and all interest received in respect of such securities shall be added to, and form part of, the balance of such

estate.

3. When the balance of any estate for which a special investment shall have been made shall be withdrawn, the securities shall be delivered to the

person entitled to receive the balance, the value of such securities being taken to be the price at which they were originally purchased.

In respect of Floating Balances.

4. All floating balances at the credit of estates shall bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, subject to the following provisions:—

(1.) Interest on the balance of each estate shall be computed and allowed as to the 30th of September, the 31st of December, the 31st of March, and the 30th of June, in each and every year, on the minimum balance that shall have been at the credit of such estate at any time during the quarter ending on each of the days above mentioned; but no interest shall be allowed on any estate in respect of which there was not a balance in the office on the first day of such quarter.

(2.) No interest shall be allowed on any estate which has not had a balance at credit amounting to £50 at some period during the quarter.

to £50 at some period during the quarter.

(3.) Interest shall only be added to the balance at credit of an estate, so as to form part of the principal, on the 30th day of June in each and every year.

(4.) When the balance at credit of an estate shall be withdrawn, such interest shall be added thereto as had accrued due up to the close of the quarter next preceding such withdrawal.

Sm.,—I transmit to you, for your information and guidance, and for insertion in the Book of Colonial Regulations in lieu of the existing Rule numbered 84, a fresh section relating to suspension from office, which has been drawn up in accordance with suggestions which I have received from the Governor of the Leeward Islands.

84. If no answer is given by the officer within the time allowed to him for that purpose by the Governor, or if the answer is not so far satisfactory as to obviate, in the Governor's opinion, the necessity of proceeding to suspension, the Governor must apprise the officer that, on a day to be named, and which shall be after such an interval as will allow the officer a reasonable time for preparing his defence, the question whether he shall be suspended or not will be brought before the Executive Council, or in British Guiana the Official Members of the Court of Policy, and that he must defend himself before the Council in writing. The Council may determine whether, in addition to such written defence, the officer shall be required also to defend himself orally.

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for amending the Law relating to the Extradition of Criminals," it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Act shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals, who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the third

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the third day of December last between Her Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, King of Bohemia, &c., &c., and Apostolic King of Hungary, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the

terms following:-

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, King of Bohemia, &c., &c., &c., and Apostolic King of Hungary, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up; Their said Majesties have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honorable Sir Andrew Buchanan, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Ma-

And His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty, the Count Julius Andrassy of Csik-Szent-Király and Kraszna Horka, His Imperial and Royal Majesty's Privy Councillor, Minister of the Imperial House and of Foreign Affairs, Grand Cross of the Order of St. Stephen, &c.;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

ARTICLE II.

The crimes for which the extradition is to be granted are the following:—

1. Murder, or attempt to murder.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Counterfeiting or altering money; uttering or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered money.

4. Forgery or counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged or counterfeited or altered; comprehending the crimes designated in the Austrian Penal Laws or in the Hungarian Penal Laws and Customs as counterfeiting or falsification of paper money, bank notes, or other securities, forgery or falsification of other public or private documents, likewise the uttering or bringing into circulation, or wilfully using such counterfeited, forged, or falsified

papers.

The definition is to be determined accordingly with the Austrian Penal Laws if the extradition shall take place from Austria, and accordingly with the Hungarian Penal Laws and Customs if the extradition

shall take place from Hungary. 5. Embezzlement or larceny.

6. Obtaining money or goods by false pretences.

7. Crimes against bankruptcy law: comprehending the crimes considered as frauds committed by the bankrupt in connection with the bankruptcy, according with the Austrian Penal Laws if the extradition shall take place from Austria, and with the Hungarian Penal Laws if the extradition shall take place from Hungary.

8. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director or member or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in

force.
9. Rape. 10. Abduction.

- 11. Child-stealing, kidnapping, and false imprisonment.
 - 12. Burglary or housebreaking.

13. Arson.

- 14. Robbery with violence or with menaces.
- 15. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort.
- 16. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting to do so.

17. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to destroy life, or to do grievous bodily harm.

18. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas, against the authority of the master.

19. Perjury or subornation of perjury. 20. Malicious injury to property, if the offence be indictable.

The extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, as accessory either before or after the fact, provided such partici-pation be punishable by the laws of both the

Contracting Parties.

In all these cases the extradition will only take place from the Austro-Hungarian States when the crimes, if committed in Austria, would, according to Austrian law, constitute a "Verbrechen," or, if committed in Hungary, would, according to the laws and customs being in force in Hungary, constitute a crime ("buntett"); the extradition from Great Britain only when the crimes, if committed in England, or within English jurisdiction, would constitute an extradition crime as described in the stitute an extradition crime, as described in the Extradition Acts of 1870 and 1873.

ARTICLE III.

In no case and on no grounds whatever shall the High Contracting Parties be held to concede the extradition of their own subjects.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Austria-Hungary, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial, in the Austro-Hungarian dominions or in the the arrest of the fugitive.

United Kingdom, respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or if the person claimed on the part of the Government of Austria-Hungary, should be under examination for any other crime in the Austro-Hungarian dominions or in the United Kingdom, respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial, and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

Should an individual whose extradition is demanded be at litigation, or be detained in the country on account of private obligations, his surrender shall nevertheless be made, the injured party retaining the right to prosecute his claims before the competent

authority.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, with respect to the crime for which it is demanded, and according to the laws of the country applied to, criminal prosecution and punishment has lapsed.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

If an individual whose extradition is demanded by either of the High Contracting Parties, in accordance with the terms of this Treaty, be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes committed on their territory, he shall be surrendered to the Government in whose territory his gravest crime was committed; and if his crimes are all of the same gravity, or a doubt exists as to which is the gravest, to the Government which first made application for his surrender.

ARTICLE VIII.

A surrendered person shall in no case be kept in arrest or subjected to examination in the State to which he has been surrendered on account of another previous crime, or any other grounds than those of his surrender, unless such person has, after his surrender, had an opportunity of returning to the country whence he was surrendered, and has not made use of this opportunity, or unless he, after having returned there, reappears in the country to which he has already been surrendered.

This stipulation does not refer to crimes committed

after surrender.

ARTICLE IX.

Requisitions for surrender shall be made by the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties.

To the requisition for the surrender of an accused person there must be attached a warrant issued by the competent authorities of the State which demands extradition, and such proofs as would, according to the laws of the place where the accused was found, justify his arrest if the crime had been committed

If the requisition refers to a person already convicted, the sentence passed by the competent Tribunal

of State demanding his surrender must be produced. No requisition for surrender can be based on a conviction in contumaciam.

ARTICLE X.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

ARTICLE XI.

A fugitive criminal may, however, in urgent cases, be arrested under a warrant of a Police Magistrate, Judge of the Peace, or of any other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, or such evidence as would, in the opinion of the person issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the prisoner convicted in the district in which the authority happens to be: Provided, however, that he shall be discharged if, within the shortest time possible, and at the utmost within fourteen days, a requisition for his surrender in accordance with the terms of Article IX. of this Treaty, is not made by the Diplomatic Agent of the State which demands his extradition.

ARTICLE XII.

The extradition shall not take place before the expiration of fifteen days from the apprehension, and then only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition.

ARTICLE XIII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents are signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State

ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized, which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place; and this delivery shall extend not only to property of the accused, and to the stolen articles, but also to everything which may serve as a proof of the crime. If the extradition cannot be carried out in consequence of the flight or death of the individual who is claimed, the delivery of the abovementioned objects shall take place nevertheless.

ARTICLE XVI.

Each of the Contracting Parties shall defray the expenses occasioned by the arrest within its territories, the detention, and the conveyance to its frontier, of the persons to be surrendered in pursuance of this Treaty.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any such colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by the Chief Consular Officer of Austria-Hungary in such colony or possession.

such colony or possession.

Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, to provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

render, or to refer the matter to his Government. Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Austro-Hungarian criminals who may take refuge within such colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties, but shall remain in force for six months after notice has been given for its termination.

The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Vienna as soon as possible.

Extracts from Report of Proceedings of H.M.S. "Blanche," dated 24th March, 1874.

"Arrived at Port Ross, 26th February. Found the stores and provisions at the depôts at Port Ross and Enderby Island correct and in good order, but the houses of refuge on Enderby Island in a very dilapidated state. I had the provisions that were exposed protected by plank and canvas. Found the provisions in the South Harbour also in good order, but the house a wreck; remained here until 5th March, when I proceeded to Campbell Island. There is not a sign of any settlement on any of the Auckland Islands, by either Dr. Monckton or others, and no one has apparently visited these islands since H.M.S. "Cossack" was there in February, 1873. As however, it could not be long before Dr. Monckton arrived, I did not think it advisable to spend the time and labour which, had Dr. Monckton not been coming, would have been necessary to restore the different houses of refuge.

"Arrived at Perseverance Harbour, Campbell Island, on the 6th March; found the depôt and provisions here in very good order."
