Notice under Section 12 of "The Public Revenues Act, 1872."

Treasury,
Wellington, 10th May, 1875.

OFFICERS holding advances of Public Money are hereby required to pay to the Public Account, at the nearest branch of the Bank of New Zealand, the total unexpended balances in their hands on or before Saturday, the 26th day of June proximo, so as to close absolutely all Advance Accounts on that date, and forthwith to transmit the Bank Receipt for such repayments to the Treasury at Wellington.

As respects disbursements which officers may require to make between the date of refund of their balances and the 30th June, *special* requisitions for the amount required are to be made by telegram, but such requisitions are not to include provision for expenditure of the financial year 1875-76. Sums required for the service of that year are to be applied for by post in the usual form.

Extract from Harbour Regulations.

Customs Department (Marine Branch),
Wellington, 5th May, 1875.

THE following extract from the Harbour Regulations made under "The Marine Act, 1867," is republished for general information.

WILLIAM H. REYNOLDS.

VII.—GUNPOWDER.

87. All vessels arriving at any port or harbour of the colony, having gunpowder on board exceeding fifty pounds weight, shall hoist a red flag at the main, and remain at the regular "gunpowder anchorage," until such gunpowder be taken out of the vessel.

88. No gunpowder shall be landed or shipped at any port except at such places as may be from time

to time appointed, and then only under the supervision of the Harbour Master or other duly authorized officer of the port.

89. No gunpowder shall be received on board of any vessel in excess of any quantity necessary to make up her store to fifty pounds, except at the usual gunpowder anchorage.

90. No gunpowder is to be either received or issued by the keeper of the magazine, except between the hours of seven in the morning and five in the afternoon.

91. The master of every vessel from which gunpowder has been landed shall cause the same to be conveyed to the magazine immediately after its being landed.

92. All gunpowder so landed must be packed in barrels, containing not more than one hundredweight, closely jointed and hooped, without any iron about the packages, and so secured that no portion of the gunpowder be in danger of being scattered in carriage.

93. All boats used for the conveyance of gunpowder to or from vessels from or to the shore or other vessels are to be provided with tarpaulins, and to be properly housed over, and to have a red flag flying when powder is on board.

94. *No fire or light is to be burning on board of any vessel or boat during the time gunpowder is being discharged from or taken on board of such vessel or boat.*

95. Any person offending against any provision of any of the foregoing regulations respecting vessels or boats having gunpowder on board, and the landing and shipment of the same, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every such offence.

BY-LAWS.

1. The term "gunpowder" in the said By-laws and Regulations shall mean gunpowder in bulk, or made up in canisters or cases, or in the form of cartridges, and also shall include and mean fireworks, gun-cotton, nitro-glycerine, nitro-leum, or any similar preparation or compound which is used or may be used for blasting purposes, or which, when struck or

ignited, is capable of producing a dangerous explosion; and the whole of the Regulations aforesaid shall apply to gunpowder as so defined, provided the total quantity (in however small packages) shall exceed fifty pounds.

2. The regular gunpowder anchorage referred to in the 87th clause of the said Regulations shall mean that part of any harbour or anchorage which has been or shall have been regularly set apart by the Superintendent, under Proclamation in the *Gazette* of the province of which he is Superintendent, or, in the case of such harbour or anchorage not being in any province, in the *New Zealand Gazette*, as a gunpowder anchorage; and the "magazine" referred to in the 90th and 91st clauses of the said Regulations, shall mean any magazine or magazines which have or shall have been proclaimed public magazines in manner aforesaid.

3. The limitations of regulations and definition of terms which form the first section of the above recited Harbour and Quarantine Regulations, shall apply to these additional regulations.

* The stations marked with an asterisk are open from 8 a.m. till 8 p.m.; all others from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m., except Onehunga, which opens at 8 a.m. and closes at 5 p.m.; and Government Buildings, which opens at 10 a.m. and closes at 4.30 p.m., except on Saturdays, when it closes at 2 p.m. This station is also closed on Sundays.

In addition to the ordinary hours, the stations at Oamaru, Timaru, and Wanganui are open from 7 p.m. till 8 p.m. daily, Sundays and Holidays excepted.

N.B.—Although the Auckland and Hokitika Hospitals are situated outside the boundaries of the respective boroughs, yet the deaths in them have, for the sake of uniformity, been included in this Report.

The population has been estimated by adding the excess of births over deaths since the 1st March, 1874, to the then census population. It is impossible to estimate the increase from immigration.

The births were 27 more than in March.

The deaths were 81 fewer in number than the deaths in March.

Of the deaths, males contributed 95; females, 75: 98 of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 57.64 per cent. of the whole number; 53 of these were of children under 1 year of age.

The deaths of children under 1 year of age were 25 fewer than in March; the deaths of all under 5 were 56 fewer than in March.

There were 5 deaths of persons of 65 and upwards,—2 males of 75 in Auckland; 1 male of 69 and 1 female of 80 in Nelson; and 1 female of 69 in Wellington.

THE following Table shows the Causes of the Deaths of Persons of both Sexes under 5 years of age and 5 years and upwards, and the proportions per cent. of Deaths from each cause in the Boroughs named, and that were registered, during the month of April, 1875.

The deaths from Zymotic Diseases were 80 in April, against 135 in March. The decrease chiefly occurred in the deaths from Measles in Auckland, which were only 18 in April against 45 in March; and in the number of deaths from bowel complaints,—Dysentery, Diarrhoea, and Cholera having caused 23 deaths in April against 46 in March.

The deaths from Measles have been almost limited to Auckland (18) and Thames (4). Two deaths only from that cause have occurred in the other boroughs—*i.e.*, 1 in Wellington and 1 in Dunedin.

The deaths from Typhoid Fever were by 2 less numerous than in the previous month; but the proportion of deaths has varied in the respective boroughs. While the deaths from that cause in Wellington were 2 in March and 6 in April, the deaths in Christchurch fell from 11 in March to 5 in April.

Constitutional Diseases were less fatal in April than in March. The deaths from Phthisis were 8 in April to 13 in March.

The deaths from Local Diseases were 45 in April to 57 in March—the deaths from Diseases of the Nervous System having been 11 in April against 21 in March; and the deaths from Diseases of the Digestive Organs having been 8 in April against 13 in March.
