Fixing Site for a Town, Province of Westland.

### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the thirty-second section of "The Westland Waste Lands Act, 1870," it is enacted that the sites of towns shall from time to time be determined by the Governor upon the recommendation of the Provincial Council, and shall be notified by Proclamațion in the Province of Westland *Gazette*: And whereas the said Provincial Council has recommended that the land described in the Schedule hereto should be a site for a town within the meaning of the said section of the Act:

Now therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, do hereby determine and fix the land described in the Schedule hereto to be a site for a town within the meaning of the thirtysecond section of the said Act.

## SCHEDULE.

DUNGANVILLE.

FORTY-FIVE (45) acres one (1) rood and twenty-six (26) perches, more or less: commencing at a point on the west side of the Maori Creek five chains south from the crossing of the said creek by track to German Gully; thence westerly on a bearing of 248° 30' magnetic for nine chains, and south-westerly at a bearing of 226° magnetic for ten chains fifty links; thence north-westerly at a right angle for twenty chains fifty links; thence north-easterly at a right angle for fourteen chains eighty links; thence easterly at a bearing of 68° 30' magnetic to Maori Creek, and thence southerly down the west bank of the said creek to the commencing point.

Given under the hand of His Excellency the Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies; and Vice-Admiral of the same; and issued under the Seal of the said Colony, at the Government House at Wellington, this twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At Wellington, this twenty-third day of June, 1875. Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the nineteenth section of "The VV Public Health Act, 1872," it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make orders from time to time directing that the provisions thereinafter in that part of the said Act contained, or any of them, be put in force in New Zealand, or in such parts thereof or in such places therein as in such orders respectively may be expressed, and may in like manner revoke or renew any such order; and, subject to revocation or renewal as aforesaid, every such order shall be in force for six calendar months from the publication of such order, or for such shorter period as in such order shall be expressed, and no longer; and every such order shall be published in the General Government Gazette, and such publication shall be conclusive evidence of such order to all intents and purposes; and none of the said provisions shall be in force in any part of New Zealand until an order directing the same to be put in force shall have been made and published as aforesaid :

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with

the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority in this behalf in him vested, doth hereby direct that the provisions contained in the sections of the said Act numbered from twenty-one to forty-five, both inclusive, shall be put in force in the Province of Canterbury.

#### HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOE IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Waste Lands Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, at any time and from time to time, to except from sale, and either reserve to Her Majesty or dispose of in such other manner as for the public interest may seem best, such of the waste lands of the Crown in any of the provinces of the colony as may be required for the purposes of military defence, or for the construction of trunk lines of road, or as sites for public buildings for the use of the General Government, or for other purposes of public utility or convenience :

Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the colony, in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority in that behalf vested in him, doth hereby except from sale and reserve to Her Majesty the parcel of the waste lands of the Crown particularly specified and described in the Schedule hereunder written, for the purpose in the said Schedule mentioned, and set opposite the description of the said parcel of land.

#### [CIRCULAR.]

#### Downing Street, 27th October, 1874.

SIB,-I have the honor to enclose, for your information, the copy of an Act passed during the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act respecting Colonial and certain other Clergy."

2. Under various Acts of Parliament, and especially under the Acts 59 Geo. III. c. 60, and 3 and 4 Vict. c. 33, various disqualifications are imposed on persons ordained by Bishops not being Bishops of the Established Church (as it then was) of England and Ireland.

3. The Act of 59 Geo. III., in particular, declared (section 4) that a clergyman ordained by a colonial Bishop, not having a diocesan jurisdiction, or not residing within the limits of that jurisdiction, should be absolutely disqualified from holding English preferment, or from officiating as a minister of the Established Church.

4. But the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council have recently declared that by erecting in any colony a Representative Legislature, Her Majesty deprives herself of the power of giving episcopal jurisdiction, or of creating or subdividing bishoprics. The consequence is, that a large number of dioceses, created or supposed to have been created in Canada, Australia, and elsewhere since the establishment of representative institutions, are badly created, and the Bishops of those dioceses without legal jurisdiction. Persons ordained by them are consequently subject to the absolute dis-qualification for English employment imposed by the ct of 59 Geo. III.

5. And this disqualification would have been extended still further by the determination of Her Majesty's late Government, which I apprehend to have been taken in consequence of the decision to which I have referred, to discontinue the practice of appointing Bishops by Letters Patent.

6. The great and ever increasing hardship thus imposed on the colonial clergy was so obvious, that I had much pleasure in supporting a Bill introduced for the purpose of removing it, which, after some alterations, has been enacted by Parliament in the shape in which I now transmit it to you.

7. You may not improbably be aware that this Act was prepared and conducted through the House of Lords by Lord Blachford, to whose great acquaintance with the subject to which it relates, and acknowledged ability in dealing with it, I need not further refer.

8. The Act does not touch the Irish or the Scottish Episcopalian Churches. But, subject to this exception (and, of course, to the distinction between priest and deacon), it places on the same footing, with regard to English employment, all valid episcopal ordinations, whether colonial or foreign.

9. A priest, or deacon, who has not received his ordination from a diocesan Bishop of the English, Irish, or Scottish Episcopalian Church, cannot exercise his functions in a church or chapel of the Church of England, except under the following limitations :

- (1.) He cannot receive preferment, or act as curate in the English Church, without the written consent of the Diocesan, who is not required by the Act to give any reason for giving or withholding such consent.
- (2.) He cannot officiate in an English church or chapel without obtaining permission from the Archbishop of the province, and making a declaration of conformity, unless he holds, or has held, preferment or a curacy.

(3.) After he has held preferment, or acted as | curate for two years, he may apply to the Archbishop of the province in which he is employed for a general authority to exercise his office in England.

10. If this is given, he will become, to all intents and purposes, a priest, or deacon, as the case may be, of the Church of England.

11. These are the leading provisions of the Act, and the remaining enactments, with one exception, are merely necessary to bring under its operation all colonial and foreign ordinations, and to exclude those which, though effected formally by a colonial or foreign Bishop, are practically the ordinations of

an English Diocesan. 12. The exception is the 12th clause, which enables an English Archbishop, in consecrating a colonial Bishop, to dispense, at his discretion, with the oath of obedience to himself which the English rubric requires. The reason of this clause is, that in the larger colonies the obedience of a suffragan Bishop is now due to a local Metropolitan in a degree which may be from time to time defined by local regulations, and which may become, if it is not already, inconsistent with an oath of obedience to an English authority.

13. I enclose copies of the Act and of this Despatch, which I request you to communicate to the Anglican Bishops within your Government.

#### CHAPTER 77.

AN ACT respecting Colonial and certain other Clergy. [7th August, 1874.]

WHEREAS by divers Acts of Parliament certain disabilities are imposed on persons ordained by bishops not being bishops of the United Church of England and Ireland:

And whereas by an Act passed in the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her present Majesty, chapter forty-two, it is enacted that the union created by Act of Parliament between the Churches of England and Ireland shall be dissolved, and that enactments relating to the said United Church shall be read distributively in respect of the Church of England and the Church of Ireland :

And whereas it is desirable to amend the law respecting persons having been ordained by bishops, not being bishops of either of the said separate Churches or of the said United Church, hereinafter collectively called "the Churches aforesaid."

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Ex-cellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the

1. This Act may be cited as "The Colonial Clergy Act, 1874."

2. The enactments enumerated in Schedule A annexed to this Act are repealed, but not so as to render invalid anything lawfully done in conformity with any of them.

3. Except as hereinafter mentioned, no person who has been or shall be ordained priest or deacon, as the case may be, by any bishop other than a bishop of a diocese in one of the churches aforesaid, shall, unless diocese in one of the churches aloresaid, shall, unless he shall hold or have previously held preferment or a curacy in England, officiate as such priest or deacon in any church or chapel in England, without written permission from the archbishop of the province in which he proposes to officiate, and without also making and subscribing so much of the declaration

contained in "The Clerical Subscription Act, 1865," as follows, that is to say,— "I assent to the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion,

and to the Book of Common Prayer, and of the ordering of bishops, priests, and deacons. I believe the doctrine of the Church of England as therein set forth to be agreeable to the Word of God; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I, whilst ministering in England, will use the form in the said book prescribed and none other, except so far as shall be ordered by lawful authority.

4. Except as hereinafter mentioned, no person who has been or shall be ordained priest or deacon, as the case may be, by any bishop other than a bishop of a diocese in one of the Churches aforesaid, shall be entitled as such priest or deacon to be admitted or instituted to any benefice or other ecclesiastical preferment in England, or to act as curate therein, without the previous consent in writing of the bishop of the diocese in which such preferment or curacy may be situate.

5. Any person holding ecclesiastical preferment, or acting as curate in any diocese in England under the provisions of this Act, may, with the written consent of the bishop of such diocese, request the archbishop of the province to give him a license in writing under his hand and seal in the following form, that is to say,-

"To the Rev. A.B.,

"We, C., by Divine Providence Archbishop of D., to the provisions of an Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her present Majesty, inti-uled 'An Act respecting Colonial and certain other Clergy.

"Given under our hand and seal on the day of

"C. (L.S.) D."

And if the archbishop shall think fit to issue such license, the same shall be registered in the registry of the province, and the person receiving the license shall thenceforth possess all such rights and advantages, and be subject to all such duties and liabilities as he would have possessed and been subject to if he had been ordained by the bishop of a diocese in England: Provided that no such license shall be issued to any person who has not held ecclesiastical preferment or acted as curate for a period or periods exceeding in the aggregate two years.

6. All appointments, admissions, institutions, or inductions to ecclesiastical preferment in England, and all appointments to act as curate therein, which shall hereafter be made contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall be null and void.

7. If any person shall officiate as priest or deacon in any church or chapel in England contrary to the provisions of this Act, or if any bishop not being bishop of a diocese in England shall perform episcopal functions in any such church or chapel without the consent in writing of the bishop of the diocese in which such church or chapel is situate, he shall for every such offence forfeit and pay the sum of  $\pounds 10$ to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, to be recovered by action brought within six months after the commission of such offence by the Treasurer of the said Bounty in one of Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Common Law; and the incumbent or curate of any church or chapel who shall knowingly

tioned in an Act of the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter fifty-two, shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to have been so ordained by the bishop of a diocese in England, and it shall not be necessary that the bishop to whom such commission shall have been given should have exercised his office within Her Majesty's dominions, or by virtue of Her Majesty's Royal Letters Patent, provided that such bishop be a bishop in communion with the Church of England; and such commission shall not become void by the death of the grantor until after seven days: Provided always, that any such act of ordination by any such bishop as aforesaid shall be subject to the same laws and provisions as to the titles and as to the oaths and subscriptions of the persons to be ordained, and as to the registra-tion of such act, as if it had been performed by the bishop of the diocese; and that the letters of orders of any persons so ordained by any such bishop shall be issued in the name of, and be subscribed with the signature of such bishop as commissary of the bishop of the diocese, and shall be sealed with the seal of the bishop of such diocese.

9. Any person ordained a deacon or priest under the provisions of an Act of the second session of the twenty-fourth year of King George the Third, chapter thirty-five, or under the first section of an Act of the fifty-ninth year of King George the Third, chapter sixty, shall be subject to the provisions contained in this Act.

10. No admission, institution, induction, or appointment to any benefice or other ecclesiastical preferment within Her Majesty's dominions, nor any appointment to act as curate therein, nor any ministerial act performed by any person as priest or deacon of any of the churches aforesaid, shall be or be deemed to have been invalid at law by reason of its contrariety to any of the enactments set forth in Schedule B to this Act annexed, unless its validity shall be inconsistent with the validity of some act, matter, or thing lawfully done before the passing of this Act.

11. Nothing in this Act contained shall alter or affect any of the provisions of an Act of the twentyseventh and twenty-eighth years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-four, intituled "An Act to remove Disabilities affecting the Bishops and Clergy of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Scotland."

12. It shall be lawful for the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Archbishop of York for the time being, in consecrating any person to the office of bishop for the purpose of exercising episcopal functions elsewhere than in England, to dispense, if he think fit, with the oath of due obedience to the archbishop.

13. Nothing contained in an Act of the fifty-third year of King George the Third, chapter one hundred and fifty-five, or in an Act of the third and fourth years of King William the Fourth, chapter eightyfive, or in any letters patent issued as mentioned in the said Acts, or either of them, shall prevent any person who shall be or shall have been bishop of any diocese in India from performing episcopal functions, not extending to the exercise of jurisdiction, in any diocese or reputed diocese at the request of the bishop thereof.

14. In this Act the word "bishop" shall, when not inconsistent with the context, include archbishop; the words "bishop" and "archbishop," in the matters of "permission" and "consent," and of "consent and license," shall include the lawful commissary of a bishop or an archbishop; the word "England" shall include the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands; and the term "church or chapel" shall mean church or chapel subject to the ecclesiastical law of the Church of England.

DEATHS of both Sexes from different Causes, registered in each Borough of the Colony, during the Year 1874, specifying Classes, Orders, and Diseases—continued.

In Auckland, Welkington, and Hokitika the deaths of children under 5 were more numerous than the deaths of persons at 5 and over. In Nelson, Christchurch, and Dunedin the deaths of children under 5 were less numerous. In Hokitika they were equalized. The following was the birth rate per 1,000 of population in each borough :---

The deaths of children under 1 year amounted to 24 per cent. of the total deaths in the boroughs. The total death rate varied considerably, having been highest in Christchurch, viz. 25°81 per 1,000; in Wellington it was 24°96 per 1,000, and in Dunedin 21°99 per 1,000; in Auckland it was 16'18 per 1,000 (but the deaths in the hospitals at Auckland and Hokitika are not included in the borough deaths for 1874, those hospitals being outside the borough boundaries). The Thames was lowest on the list, with a death rate of 12'28 per 1,000. While the largest number of deaths from Zymotic diseases occurred in Dunedin, the largest proportionate number occurred in Wellington. The increase in the latter borough was chiefly attributable to the large number of deaths (57) from diarrhœa. Typhoid fever was most fatal in Christchurch (25 deaths), and next so in Wellington (12 deaths); 9 deaths from that cause occurred in Dunedin, and 5 in each of the boroughs of Auckland and the Thames. Diphtheria was most fatal in Christchurch, causing 21 deaths; 16 occurred from the same cause in Dunedin; the numbers elsewhere were small, the Thames being third on the list, with 4 deaths. Measles was the cause of 33 deaths in Dunedin in 1874; no deaths from Constitutional diseases occurred in Dunedin, but the bishest proportion af each form that cause occurred in Dunedin burdet.

The greatest number of deaths from Constitutional diseases occurred in Dunedin, but the highest proportion of such deaths occurred in Wellington. Of this class, tubercular diseases caused 50 deaths in Dunedin, 42 in Wellington, 28 in Christchurch, and 22 in Auckland.

Of Local diseases, those of the nervous system were most prevalent in Dunedin, next so in Wellington, and next in Christchurch. Diseases of the organs of circulation (heart disease, &c.) were by far most prevalent in Dunedin, and next proportionately in Christchurch. Diseases of the respiratory system were most fatal in Dunedin (51 deaths), Christchurch (33 deaths), Auckland (30 deaths), and Wellington (21 deaths). Diseases of the digestive organs were most numerous in Christchurch (25 deaths); 20 such deaths occurred in Dunedin, 18 in Auckland, and 14 in Wellington. The largest number of violent deaths occurred in the Thames and Wellington boroughs, 14 in each.
