WHEREAS by the third section of "The Anatomy Act, 1875," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorize the establishment of Schools of Anatomy where the study and practice of anatomy may be carried on in connection with any University, in such place or places as the Governor in Council shall think fit: And whereas it is desired to establish a think fit: And whereas it is desired to establish a School of Anatomy in connection with the University of Otago:

Now, therefore, His Excellency, in pursuance and exercise of the above-recited power and authority, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby authorize the establishment of a School of Anatomy at Dunedin, in connection with the University of

Otago.

Lands reserved under the New Zealand Settlements Act.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twelfth day of June, 1876.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL. HEREAS by "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," it is provided that, after setting apart sufficient land for all persons who shall be entitled thereto under the contracts therein referred to, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to cause towns to be surveyed and laid out, and also

suburban and rural allotments; and that all such town, suburban, and rural land shall be sold, occupied, and disposed of for such prices, in such manner, and for such purposes, upon such terms and subject to such regulations, as the Governor in Council shall

from time to time prescribe for that purpose:

And whereas by "The New Zealand Settlements
Amendment and Continuance Act, 1865," it is enacted that the order and manner in which land taken under the authority of "The New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," and "The New Zealand Settlements Amendment and Continuance Act, 1865, should be laid out for sale and sold should be at the discretion of the Governor, who shall have power to cause such land or any part thereof to be laid out for sale and sold from time to time in such manner, for such consideration, and in such allotments as he shall think fit, and subject to such regulations as he shall, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time prescribe: And whereas by "The New Zealand Settlements Amendment Act, 1866," it is provided that the said lands shall be sold for such consideration, or at such price, and whether for cash or otherwise, as the Governor shall from time to time prescribe, and that all lands taken under the authority of the said "New Zealand Settlements Act, 1863," and "The New Zealand Settlements Amendment and Continuance Act, 1865," or either of them, and sold or disposed of under the authority of the said first-recited Act, shall be sold or disposed of under regulations to be made by the Governor in Council, which regulations shall be published in the New Zealand Gazette: And whereas under the hereinbefore in part recited powers, the Governor in Council did, on the eleventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, make and issue certain regulations for the sale and disposal of conference of the sale and disposal of the sale fiscated lands as therein provided: And whereas the said regulations provide for the making of reserves of such lands for the purposes therein specified, and it is provided that the purposes for which any reserves have been made may be changed, or the reservation of the same withdrawn by the Government, but so that no change or withdrawal shall be made except after notice of three months in

the New Zealand Gazette, and by special order of Executive Council of the Colony, doth hereby signify the Governor in Council: And whereas the said his approval of the said rules. parcels of land hereinafter particularly mentioned have been reserved and set apart under regulations made under the authority of the said in part recited Acts, and it is expedient that they should cease to be reserves: And whereas in accordance with the said Regulations of the eleventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, three months' notice of the intention of the Government to withdraw the same has been duly given in the New Zealand Gazette:

Now, therefore, His Excellency, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him in that behalf, doth hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony of New Zealand, order and declare that the several parcels of land mentioned and described in the Schedule hereto shall be and the same are hereby withdrawn from reservation as aforesaid, and the same have ceased to be reserves for the purpose in the said Schedule mentioned, or for any other purpose whatsoever.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly V of New Zealand, intituled "The Supreme Court Amendment Act, 1862," it is provided that the Judges of the Supreme Court from time to time, with the approval of the Governor in Council, may revoke or alter any rules for the time being in force touching the administration of the effects and estates of persons deceased, and with such approval as aforesaid, may make new and other rules in that behalf, and also touching the practice and procedure of the Supreme Court in respect of any matter or thing for the time being or which shall at any time be within the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, and such new or other rules with such approval as aforesaid may from time to time alter and revoke: And whereas their Honors the Judges of the Supreme Court of the Colony have, in pursuance of the power so vested in them as aforesaid, made the following general rules touching the practice and procedure of the said Court: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the

#### REGULÆ GENERALES.

Rule Supreme Court.

WHEREAS by "The Real Estate Descent Act, 1874," it is enacted that the Supreme Court, or any two or more of the Judges thereof, whereof the Chief Justice shall be one, shall have power from time to time to make all such rules of practice and procedure, and all other rules and regulations, for carrying the provisions of the said Act into effect as to the said Court or Judges shall appear expedient: And whereas by "The Supreme Court Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that the Judges of the Supreme Court may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, alter the rules of the Supreme Court touching the administration of the effects and estate of deceased persons: Now, therefore, by virtue of the powers so vested in us, we, Judges of the said Court, do, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make the following Rules, and with the like approval do order that the said Rules shall come into and be in force on and after the first day of July, 1876.
(1.) It shall not be necessary to make a separate

application for probate or administration in respect of undevised real estate, and the forms of probate or letters of administration used for personal estate

shall be used for undevised real estate.

(2.) The form of probate now in use is abolished, and the following form shall be used, that is to say,-

## PROBATE.

BE it known to all men, that on this in the year 18, the last will and testament of deceased, a copy of which is hereunto annexed, hath been deceased, a copy of which is hereunto annexed, hath been exhibited, read, and proved before , and administration of the estate, effects, and credits of the deceased hath been and is hereby granted to , the executor in the said will and testament named, being first sworn faithfully to execute the said will by paying the debts and legacies of the deceased, as far as the property will extend and the law binds; reserving, nevertheless, to this Court full power and authority to grant like probate and administration to , the other executors named in will whenever they shall annear before this Court named in will, whenever they shall appear before this Court and sue for the same.

3. The value of the estate sworn to before grant of administration, with will annexed or without a will, shall include the value of any real estate to be administered under such grant.

4. In the administration bond to be given by any administrator, the word "personal" shall be omitted throughout, and the penalty in such bond shall be twice the amount of the value of the property to be administered as sworn to, subject to moderation by a

Judge of the Supreme Court, as in other cases.

5. Personal representatives applying to the Supreme Court under sections 13 and 14 of "The Real Estate Descent Act, 1874," shall give such notices as any Judge of the Court may prescribe in each case.

Civil Service Examination Regulations.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Wellington, 15th June, 1876.

THE Regulations for the Examination of Candidates for employment dates for employment in the Civil Service, dated 11th November, 1874, and published in *Gazette*, No. 59, of 12th November, 1874, shall, from the 1st January, 1877, be rescinded, and the following amended Regulations, approved by His Excellency the Governor, shall then be in force, and are now published for general information. published for general information.

# REGULATIONS RESPECTING EXAMINATIONS UNDER "THE CIVIL SERVICE ACT, 1866."

1. Every candidate for examination must apply to be examined in a form to be prescribed by the Board, such application to be addressed to the Secretary, and, in the case of persons not now in the Civil Service or candidates for employment therein, to be accompanied by a fee of two guineas.

2. The examination shall be divided into two branches,-the one qualifying for appointment, the other qualifying for promotion to any class above the fourth. One branch shall be called the Junior EXAMINATION and the other branch shall be called the SENIOR EXAMINATION.

3. Every candidate must pass the Junior Examination (see section 8) before he shall be eligible for any appointment in the Civil Service. Exceptions:—

(1.) Any candidate who shall have passed the annual examinations by the New Zealand University shall be considered as eligible for appointment in the Civil Sevice: Provided that the Civil Service Examination Board is satisfied that the candidate has passed in all the subjects required by the Civil Service Regulations, and that a certificate to that effect is given in each case.

(2.) A degree in any University cited in Statutes VII., VIII., and IX., of the New Zealand University (viz. Oxford, Cambridge, Glasgow, Aberdeen, St. Andrew's, Edinburgh, Dublin, Durham, London, Queen's University of Ireland, Sydney, or Melbourne) shall enable the recipient to enter the Civil Service of New Zealand without further examination Zealand without further examination.

5. The Board shall have power, subject to the Governor's approval, to vary the optional subjects, and to frame such further rules for the conduct of examinations as they may deem fit, due notice of which shall be published in the New Zealand Gazette.

6. Every candidate must pass a certain standard of proficiency, to be fixed by the Board of Examiners. The Board, in publishing the result of examinations, shall classify the successful candidates according to merit; but the examination is not competitive for office, the Government being entitled to select any successful candidate for appointment at its discretion.

7. Examinations shall be held at such times and places, and before such persons, as the Board may from time to time appoint.

8. JUNIOR EXAMINATION.

English.—Including dictation, reading, spelling, grammar, and composition.

Arithmetic.—Including vulgar and decimal fractions.

History.

Geography.

9. SENIOR EXAMINATION.

Compulsory Subjects.

English, Latin, Arithmetic, and Geography.

Optional Subjects.

Greek, French, German, Maori, Plane Trigonometry, Algebra, Geometry, Physical Science, History, Book-keeping, Shorthand. The candidate must pass in at least two of the optional subjects in addition to the compulsory subjects. But in respect of Cadets in the Engineer's branch of the Public Works Department, Plane Trigonometry may be substituted for Latin as a compulsory subject; but any candidate availing himself of the exception will not be considered as having passed the Senior Examination in respect of the other branches of the service.

10. Any candidate may undergo the Junior and Senior Examinations at the same time; but no candidate shall be eligible for the Senior Examination unless he has passed the Junior Examination.

11. Every passed candidate may receive a certificate, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the

Board, on payment of a fee of one pound.

12. A register of candidates who have been examined shall be kept by the Board, and lists of those who pass shall be published from time to time in the New Zealand Gazette.

RULES PRESCRIBED BY THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS, WITH THE APPROVAL OF HIS EX-AMINERS, WITH THE APPR CELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

[Under Regulation 6 of "Regulations respecting Examinations under 'The Civil Service Act, 1866.'"]

#### -Conduct of Examinations.

Examinations will be held in June and December. All candidates for examination must make application to the Secretary according to Form A in the Schedule.

Applications must be lodged not later than the 1st of May for the June examination, and not later than the 1st of November for the December examination.

Notice will be given to candidates by the Secretary to the Board, or by the Local Supervisor, of the exact time and place of examination. Further instructions will also be forwarded at the same time.

# II.—Subjects of Examination.

Virgil.—Any two books of the Æneid; the Board to be informed which books are chosen.

Horace.—1. Odes; or, 2. Satires and Epistles; the Board to be informed of the selection.

Cæsar.-De Bello Gallico-any two books; the Board to be informed which books are chosen.

Cicero.—Oratio in Verrem, or two other orations; the Board to be informed of the selection.

Ovid .- Fasti.

Passages for translation will be set from these authors, and candidates will be required to answer grammatical and historical questions arising out of the passages so set.

Arithmetic.

Geography.—Political and Physical.

# Optional Subjects.

Any two or more of the following subjects, at the option of the candidate:

Greek .- Any one of the following :-

Xenophon.—Anabasis.

Homer.—Any one book of the Iliad.

### III .- REGISTER AND CERTIFICATES.

The Register of Candidates shall be kept according to Form B in the Schedule.

Certificates will be issued in the Form C in the Schedule to candidates who pass the Junior Examination.

Certificates will be issued in the Form D in the Schedule to candidates who pass the Senior Examination.

## IV.—CLASSIFICATION. Senior Examination.

The names of successful candidates in the Senior Examination will be published in the order of comparative proficiency, ascertained by the total number of marks received by each candidate in all the subjects in which he has passed. No marks will be allowed for any subject in which the candidate has not received the minimum number of marks required for passing.

Certificates will be issued to passed candidates on the following principle:

First Class. For each subject in which a candidate shall obtain not less than two-thirds of the maximum number of marks allotted thereto.

Second Class.—For each subject in which a candidate shall obtain less than two-thirds, but not less than one-half, of the maximum number of marks allotted thereto.

Third Class.—For each subject in which a candidate shall obtain less than one-half of the maximum number of marks allotted thereto.

#### REGULÆ GENERALES.

## May, 1876.

WHEREAS by "The Public Trust Office Act Amendment Act, 1873," it is enacted that the Judges of the Supreme Court, or any two of them, of whom the Chief Justice shall be one, may from time to time make such general rules and orders touching and concerning applications to be made to the Court or Judge thereof under the said Act, and the conduct and despatch of all business matters and things to be done in relation to such applications, as to the said Court shall seem expedient:

Now, therefore, by virtue of the powers so vested in us, it is ordered by us, the Judges of the said Court, that the following Rules shall come and be in force on and after the first day of July, 1876:—

- (1.) Applications under sections 16, 18, and 25 of the said Act shall be by motion in Chambers, after due notice to the Public Trustee.
- (2.) Proceedings under section 20, for establishing the right or title of any heir at law or devisee shall be by petition setting forth specifically the grounds on which such heir at law or devisee claims to be entitled to possession of the estate, which petition shall be verified by affidavit. A copy of such petition shall be served on the Public Trustee at least seven days before the day appointed for hearing thereof, together with notice of the day so appointed.
- (3.) Upon the hearing of such petition, the Supreme Court, or a Judge thereof, shall take such evidence orally or by affidavit as it or he shall think fit, and, on being satisfied of the right of the petitioner, may, for the purposes of the said Act, issue an order declaratory of the right and title of such heir at law or devisee to the possession of the estate claimed.

The deaths of persons not residents of the boroughs, occurring at hospitals, have been excluded in all cases.

The population has been estimated by adding the excess of births over deaths since the 1st March, 1874, to the then census population. It is impossible to estimate the increase from immigration.

The births were 14 more than in April.

The deaths were 6 more in number than the deaths in April.

Of the deaths, males contributed 61; females, 51: 48 of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 43:24 per cent. of the whole number; 35 of these were of children under 1 year of age.

There were 7 deaths of persons of 65 years of age and over: 5 of these persons were males and 2 females: of these, 3 males, aged respectively 70, 76 and 78, died at Auckland; 2 males of 67 and 70 at Nelson; and 2 females of 67 and 76 at Auckland.

The deaths in May were 111, against 105 in April. Diarrhæa, from which 18 deaths resulted in April, was only fatal in one case last month. From Typhoid Fever there were 4 deaths, against three in April. Scarlatina caused 7 deaths: 1 at Thames, 1 at Christchurch, and 5 at Dunedin, against a total of 2 for April.

The deaths from diseases of the Respiratory System show a very trifling decrease.

Of violent deaths, one case was that of a child accidentally scalded; another case was accidental, caused by administration of

chloroform; and the third was a manslaughter by stabbing.

A comparison with May, 1875, shows a more satisfactory state of health this year, as there were no less than 211 deaths for the seven towns under consideration at that time, or 100 more than in May, 1876. The number in 1875 includes 26 cases of Measles, from which there were no deaths last month.

There were in May, 1875, 27 cases of Typhoid Fever, against 4 in 1876; 13 of Dysentery or Diarrhea, against 1 in May, 1876; and 30 of Inflammatory Diseases of the Lungs, against 8 in May, 1876.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

Fine weather was experienced throughout during this period; rainfall below and temperature above the average; no gales of any note occurred. Earthquakes reported by Meteorological Observers are,—at Queenstown on 25th, at 3.20 a.m., and on 26th, at 8.40 a.m.; also at Dunedin, on 26th, shocks felt.
