(L.S.) NORMANBY, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the tenth section of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," (hereinafter called "the said Act,") provision is made, subject to certain conditions therein referred to, for constituting, by Proclamations, boroughs in districts not comprised within the limits of any of the cities, towns, or places therein particularly mentioned: And whereas by the twenty-fifth section of "The Municipal Corporations Act Amendment Act, 1875," certain modifications of the conditions imposed by the tenth section of the said Act are made in the case of the Town of Akaroa, in the Province of Canterbury: And whereas the modified conditions have been complied with:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the said Acts, do hereby constitute and proclaim the district defined in the Schedule hereto, and comprising the Town of Akaroa, to be a borough under "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1867," as aforesaid: And in further pursuance of the said powers vested in me, I do hereby proclaim that the name of the said borough shall be "Akaroa."

Regulations under "The Armed Constabulary Act Amendment Act, 1869.'

NORMANBY, Governor.

WHEREAS by the fifth section of "The Armed VV Constabulary Act Amendment Act, 1869," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may from time to time make and alter Regulations hereunder written, for the purpose in the said Schedule | respecting the clothing, equipment, and pay of the Armed Constabulary; and all such Regulations shall have the same force as though they formed a part of the now reciting Act: And whereas it is expedient to revoke certain of the existing Regulations, bearing date the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and to make others in lieu of those so revoked:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority vested in me by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, do hereby revoke such of the Regulations dated the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, as are numbered seventy-three, seventy-four, seventy-five, seventy-six, and two hundred and eighty-two, and in lieu thereof do hereby make the Regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto, and do direct that they shall be read with and as part of the existing Regulations.

73. The uniform of constables is to consist of blue cloth cap with peak and band of black braid, 1-inch wide, blue tweed patrol jacket with the A.C. metal buttons, blue tweed trousers, strong laced-up watertight boots, and brown leather gaiters, great coat, waterproof sheet.

74. Mounted constables will wear the same uniform in every respect as the foot, with the exception that of a cavalry cloak instead of the great coat, and in addition to the above each mounted man is to have one pair of Bedford-cord breeches and hunting spurs; also, to supply himself with the cleaning gear necessary for his horse and saddlery.

75. The uniform of non-commissioned officers, whether mounted or foot, is to be precisely the same as that of the constables, with the addition of chevrons on the right arm, according to the grade of the wearer; in the case of sergeants-major, surmounted by a crown.

76. Officers of all ranks are to be similarly dressed; their uniform will be as follows:—Blue cloth forage cap with staff peak, and silver oak leaf band 1½-inch wide, with silver button and tracing lace on top; blue cloth patrol jacket with standing collar braided with hussar braid and silver shoulder cords; blue cloth single-breasted waistcoat hooking to the throat, with silver beading and silver lace round edges and pockets; blue cloth trousers with black oak leaf mohair braid down the side 1¾-inch wide.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you, for your information, and for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of the Queen in Council, dated the 17th March, 1875, extending to Swedish vessels the advantages held out by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1862," to ships of foreign countries adopting the rules for the measurement of tonnage which obtain in this country.

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the roles concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships for the time being in force under the principal Act have been adopted by the Government of any foreign country and are in force in that country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that the ships of such foreign country shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, and thereupon it shall no longer be necessary for such

ships to be remeasured in any port or place in Her Majesty's dominions, but such ships shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificates of registry of British ships is to be deemed the tonnage of such ships:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships now in force under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have been adopted in Sweden by the Government of His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, and are to come into force in Sweden on the 1st day of April,

Her Majesty is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the ships of Sweden, the certificates of Swedish nationality and registry, or the certificates of measurement of which are dated on or after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in the said certificates of Swedish nationality and registry, or certificates of measurement.

3. A statement of the manner of rearing and managing the plants, of the cost of operation, and the prospects of the paper manufacture from the different substances.

4. Models and drawings illustrating the process of manufacture.

5. A collection of samples of vegetable substances employed from the remotest period to the present time for writing purposes, forming collectively a complete series, from which an historical and ethnographical view of paper industry can be obtained.

7. A complete catalogue of such; also of such as occur in periodicals.

8. A statistical review of the paper manufacture, with observations and deductions of its prospects.

9. Coloured drawings of the plants yielding substances for paper making.
