#### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Prisons Act, it is provided that the Governor may from time to time, as to him shall seem meet, by Proclamation published in the New Zealand Gazette, declare any house, building, enclosure, or place to be a public prison, and from and after the publication of any such Proclamation in the New Zealand Gazette, or from any latter time specified in the Proclamation, such house, building, enclosure, or place shall be

deemed to be a public prison:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine,
Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony
of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and declare the
following houses or buildings to be public prisons in
lieu of the old wooden buildings hitherto used for that purpose:-

The New Prisons built of stone and concrete, and situated on the Police Reserves at Arrow, Clyde, and Naseby, respectively.

Proclamation under Native Lands Acts Revoked.

(L.S.) NORMANBY, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation duly made and issued, bearing date the twenty-sixth July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, the Governor did proclaim and declare that the provisions of "The Native Lands Act, 1865," and "The Native Lands Act, 1867," should be suspended within the district described in the Schedule hereunto: And whereas in consequence of the repeal of such lastmentioned Acts, it is doubtful whether such Proclamation is still in force: And whereas it is expedient to revoke such Proclamation:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Governor of New Zealand, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation of the twentysixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

Altering Boundaries of Resident Magistrates' Districts of Papakura and Waikato.

#### NORMANBY, Governor. (L.s.) A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by "The Resident Magistrates Act, 1867," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, by Proclamation in the New Zealand Gazette, to constitute throughout the colony, or in any part thereof, districts to be called Resident Magistrates' Districts, and such districts from time to time to abolish, and the boundaries to define and alter, and in any such Proclamation to fix a time on and from which any such district shall be constituted or abolished, as the case may be: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities so vested in him, did proclaim and constitute the Districts of Papakura and Waikato, as described in the Schedule to the said Proclamation, to be, on and from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, Resident Magistrates' Districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the said Districts of Papakura and Waikato so

constituted as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities so vested in me as aforesaid, do hereby alter the boundaries of the said Districts of Papakura and Waikato, as described in the Schedule hereto, as and from the first day of October next.

# SCHEDULE.

PAPAKURA DISTRICT. Bounded towards the North by the Onehunga District, as described in New Zealand Gazette, 1867, page 491, and by the Tamaki Strait to Oreri Point; thence towards the East by a line to the Wairoa Range, and along that range and by a line due south to the utmost northerly source of the Maungatawhiri Stream; thence towards the South by that stream to

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL. WHEREAS under the provisions of "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1870," and the several Acts amending the same, and other Acts, certain lines of railway have been constructed by the Governor: And whereas by "The Immigration and Public Works Act, 1875," the Governor in Council is authorized to make regulations and bye-laws applicable to all railways constructed by him under the authority of the said hereinbefore mentioned Acts,

and actually open for traffic, whether the whole of such railway shall have been completed or not; and whenever it shall be necessary to extend the operation of such regulations and bye-laws to any particular railway, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by a notification published in the New Zealand Gazette, to extend the operation of such bye-laws to the railway or railways named therein, and that, from and after a day to be fixed in such notification, the regulations and bye-laws so made as aforesaid shall for all purposes be, and be deemed to be, the regulations and bye-laws in force for the railway or railways named therein:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, doth hereby extend the operation of the Bye-laws, Rules and Regulations published in the New Zealand Gazette, Nos. 8 and 27, of 10th February and 11th May, 1876, respectively, to the portion of the line of railway mentioned in the Schedule hereto; said Bye-laws, Rules and Regulations to be from that date deemed to be the Regulations and Bye-laws in force for the portion of the line of railway mentioned in the Schedule aforesaid.

The entrance to the river is shown on the Admiralty Chart, and lies south-west from False Cape. In the channel over the bar there is 9 feet at low water, with a rise of 12 feet at springs.

To enter, bring the eastern head of the river mouth | to bear S. by W. 1 W., and steer that course. When within about one mile of the heads the water will deepen to 4 fathoms, which depth will be carried into the river.

The deaths of persons not residents of the boroughs, occurring at hospitals, have been excluded in all cases.

The population has been estimated by adding the excess of births over deaths since the 1st March, 1874, to the then census population. It is impossible to estimate the increase from immigration.

The births were 10 fewer than in July.

The deaths were 20 fewer in number than the deaths in July.

Of the deaths, males contributed 48; females, 49: 39 of the deaths were of children under 5 years of age, being 40:21 per cent. of the whole number; 27 of these were of children under 1 year of age.

There were 5 deaths of persons of 65 years of age and over: 3 of these persons were males and 2 females: of these, 1 male aged 67, and 2 females aged 68 each, died at Wellington; 1 male of 81 years at Dunedin; and 1 male of 72 years at Hokitika.

The total of deaths in August was 97, being a decrease in the number for July of 20. The number of deaths from Zymotic disease was the same as in July. Of these, Scarlatina caused 11 deaths, against 11 in July; Dysentery and Diarrhœa 3 deaths, against 3 in July; and Typhoid Fever 2 deaths, against 4 in July. The mortality from Scarlatina was in Christchurch (4 cases), and in Dunedin (7 cases).

Deaths from diseases of the Respiratory System increased from 8 in July to 12 in August. Of the 12 deaths from this order of disease, 5 took place at Auckland, 3 at Wellington, 2 at Dunedin, 1 at Christchurch, and 1 at Hokitika.

Four violent deaths out of a total of 6 in August were accidental; 1 was caused by a fall from a horse, 2 were deaths of young children, one severely burnt, the other drowned, and one death was undescribed as to cause. There was one case of suicide effected by poisoning during temporary insanity. A woman, aged 31, was "found drowned" at Dunedin; whether this case was one of accidental death or self-destruction is not known.

In August, 1875, there were 128 deaths in the 7 towns, or 31 more than during last month. Zymotic diseases were nevertheless more fatal in August, 1876, than in August, 1875, the deaths being 25 in the former against 19 in the latter month. Constitutional complaints were 16 in number in August, 1876, against 27 in August, 1875. The numbers include 14 cases of Phthisis for 1875, against 7 for last month. The chief cause of the decrease on the total numbers is to be found in the reduced number of deaths from diseases of the Respiratory System, the numbers being as follow:—Laryngitis, Bronchitis, Pneumonia, and Congestion of the Lungs: August, 1876, 12 deaths; August, 1875, 33 deaths.

Mongonui.—Unsettled weather, rain over the average; the maximum fall recorded on 8th, 307 in.; strong wind prevailed from westward; thunder on 8th, 9th, and 11th; fog on 17th. Maximum temperature in shade, 71°; minimum, 33°.

Auckland.—Showery; strong wind on 9th from E., and on 16th from W.; on 23rd and 24th, strong N.E. gale of short duration, with rain; hail on night of 11th, also thunder; prevailing westerly winds; maximum rain recorded on 23rd, 880 in. Maximum temperature in shade, 66°; minimum, 39'4°.

Taranaki.—Wet weather generally; very heavy fall recorded on 18th, 3'75 in.; very strong westerly gale on 23rd and 24th, with rain; thunder on 23rd; prevailing westerly winds. Maximum temperature in shade, 64°; minimum, 32°.

Napier.—Changeable weather, with some fine days and frosty nights; maximum rain recorded on 10th, '76 in.; prevailing winds W. and S.W., and moderate on the whole. Maximum temperature in shade, 69°; minimum, 35°.

Wellington.—Cold unpleasant showery weather generally; prevailing N.W. wind and stormy on 14th, 15th, and 23rd; frequent squalls; a few fine pleasant days at commencement and end of month; on 22nd, barometer, which stood at 29'845, commenced falling, heavy rain and strong N.W. wind at night; on morning of 23rd, barometer 28'982, dark heavy clouds to N.W., showers and strong wind, barometer down to 28'89 at 3 p.m., continued wet; in night changed to S.W., and barometer rose, reading 29'431 on morning of 24th, rising steadily until it reached 30'560 on 28th; '80 in rain recorded on 23rd, and 1'15 in. on 24th, the maximum fall for the month; fine pleasant bright N.W. weather from 25th to 29th, frosty nights; on 30th cold and wet from N.W., changing to S.B., with heavy rain in night; 265 in. rain recorded on 1st of following month for previous 24 hours; snow on hills; fog on 2nd. Maximum temperature in shade, 60'8'; minimum, 30°.

Wanganui.—Fine for time of year; greatest rain recorded on 19th, '70 in.; prevailing N.W. winds and generally strong; very stormy on 16th, 17th, 18th,

minimum, 30°.

Nelson.—The total rainfall very heavy, although few wet days; the maximum fall registered on 23rd, 4·13 in., strong wind from N.E.; continued to 24th, with heavy rain; stormy weather generally, wind changeable. Maximum temperature in shade,

N.E.; continued to 24th, with heavy rain; stormy weather generally, wind changeable. Maximum temperature in shade, 63°; minimum, 32°.

Cape Campbell.—Unpleasant weather, with strong westerly winds. Maximum temperature in shade, 67°; minimum, 42°.

Christchwich.—Up to 11th, dull cold wintry weather; wind, N.E. and S.W., rain with latter winds; 12th to 14th very warm, wind N.W.; variable to 22nd; on 23rd, barometer fell from 29.72 to 28.85, with rain, but storm passed over; 25th to end, fine weather, hard frosts in mornings; prevailing S.W. winds, generally moderate; strong, however, on 24th; snow on 7th; maximum rain recorded on 23rd, 60 in. Maximum temperature in shade, 68.4°; minimum, 24.6°.

Bealey.—Calm weather, sharp frosts; excessive rainfall, the maximum recorded on 18th, 2.920 in.; snow fell on eight days; thunder on 14th; six days of fog; strong westerly winds on 13th, 14th, and 20th; prevailing westerly winds. Maximum temperature in shade, 51.0°; minimum, 4.8°.
