Establishment of Local District and Land Officer at Orepuki.

(L.S.) NORMANBY, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the twenty-fouth section of "The Land Act, 1877," it is enacted that the Governor, by Proclamation in the Gazette, may from time to time establish and define, abolish, alter, or reconstitute local districts for the sale or disposal of land, and in like manner may from time to time appoint Land Officers or other persons for conducting sales of land in such local districts, and for receiving applications for the sale, letting, disposal, or occupation of Crown lands, and for generally carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act:

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and declare that the district described in the First Schedule hereto is established, defined, and constituted a local district for the sale and disposal of land under the said Act; and that the Land Office the name of which is in the said Schedule set opposite the name of the said local district is appointed the Land Office for the said local district; and that the person named in the Second Schedule hereto is appointed the Land Officer for conducting sales of land in such local district, and for receiving applications for the sale, letting, disposal, or occupation of Crown land, and for generally carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act in and for the district the name of which is in the said Second Schedule set opposite the name of such person.

Setting apart Lands in Southland for Deferred Payments.

NORMANBY, Governor. (L.S.) A PROCLAMATION.

HEREAS by the fifty-fourth section of "The Mines Act, 1877," it is provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor to cause Crown lands situate within a mining district to be selected and set apart for the purpose of granting agricultural leases, or for alienation by occupation licenses on deferred payments, under any law for the time being in force in the land district in which such mining district is situate; and before such lands are opened for application the Governor may determine the size of the allotments, not exceeding the maximum which may be held by any person under any such lease or license:

And whereas the lands described in the Schedule hereto are Crown lands subject to be dealt with under the provisions of the said fifty-fourth section of "The Mines Act, 1877," and it is deemed expedient to set the same apart for the purpose of occupation

on deferred payments:

Regulations as to Admission of Stock into South Australia.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Wellington, 25th February, 1878.

THE following letter and enclosure from the Chief Secretary of South Australia, relative to the admission of stock into that colony, are published for general information.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

Chief Secretary's Office, Adelaide, 6th February, 1878.

Sir,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th December last, and in reply to enclose copy of an Order in Council, dated

the 28th November, 1877, making regulations for the admission of stock from New Zealand and elsewhere.

WHEREAS by The Public Health Act, the Governor is empowered to make such orders as may seem to be necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the introduction into the province from any country or colony, or part of a country or colony (in which respectively any disease in sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever is known to exist), of all sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, cloths, or other articles likely to propagate amongst men or animals any infectious or contagious disease whatsoever: And the Governor is also authorized to make such orders as may seem to be necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the mode and time of removal to and from such parts or places within the province as may be designated in any such order of all sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals of the same kind or any other kinds whatsoever: And whereas diseases are known to exist in sheep, cattle, and horses, in New South Wales, Victoria, New Zealand, Queens-land, Tasmania, and Western Australia: And whereas by an Order in Council bearing date the fifth day of September, 1877, regulations and orders were made and published in the Government Gazette, regulating the introduction of sheep, cattle, and horses into the said province from New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, and Western Australia: And whereas it is necessary to rescind the aforesaid regulations and to issue others in lieu thereof: Now it is hereby ordered by the Governor in Council, that from the date hereof the regulations of the fifth day of September, 1877, shall be made void, and in lieu thereof, the regulations hereinafter set forth regulating the introduction into the Province of South Australia of sheep, cattle, and horses, from New South Wales, Victoria, New Zealand, Queensland, Tasmania, and Western Australia, and also respecting the time and mode of removal of the said animals within the said province, should now be made and published: And it is further ordered that the said regulations shall forthwith be published in the Government Gazette, and from the date of such publication shall thenceforth be observed until further order herein :

REGULATIONS.

ORDERS REGULATING THE IMPORTATION OF ANIMALS BY SEA.

1. No sheep, cattle, or horses, shall be imported by sea into the province without a permit, in writing, from an inspector. Any person importing without such permit shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

2. Any owner or agent importing any sheep, cattle, or horses into the province shall produce, if required by an inspector, a certificate of a qualified veterinary surgeon that the sheep, cattle, or horses so imported

are free from disease.

3. Every sheep imported by sea shall, on being landed, be removed in such manner, and to such quarantine ground, as the inspector shall direct, and shall be there detained for a term of not less than fourteen (14) days, and be there twice dipped as directed by the inspector. The expenses of such removal, quarantine, and dressings to be paid by the owner or agent before such animals are released. such animals are not released within two days after any inspector shall have requested the owner or agent to remove the same, they may be destroyed by order of the inspector. Any person acting in contravention of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

4. All cattle or horses shall, if required, be disinfected as an inspector may direct; and may be detained in quarantine for a term of not less than fourteen (14) doze to the contract of the fourteen (14) days at the expense, in all things, of the owner or agent. Any person committing a breach of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

5. All animals arriving in any South Australian port, if found, on inspection by an inspector, to be suffering from pleuro-pneumonia, or any infectious or contagious disease, shall, if required by an order in writing of an inspector, be destroyed by the owner, agent, or person apparently in charge of such animal or animals; and if such order is not complied with within such time as an inspector in such order directs, the inspector may give an order to seize and destroy such animals, and any person or persons authorized by an inspector shall destroy such animals accordingly; and the owner, agent, or person apparently in charge shall be liable to a penalty of five pounds for every day in which any such animal is left undestroyed after the date fixed in such order.

6. No fodder, hay, straw, fittings, or articles used in connection with imported animals, shall be landed without permission from an inspector. Any such fodder, hay, straw, fittings, or articles shall be disinfected or destroyed, if so required, by order of an inspector; and any owner or agent neglecting to comply with this order within three days of the date of such order, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds for every day in which such order is not complied with.

7. Any animals hereinbefore described in these orders imported into Port Adelaide by sea for transhipment, may be landed under permit from an inspector, if clean, and placed in quarantine grounds for a period of ten days, without being dipped or disinfected, and shall be removed from such ground by order of an inspector only, under a penalty of

not less than thirty pounds.

8. Any animals, as before mentioned, imported into this province under a permit from an inspector, may be removed to such lands as the inspector shall consider necessary, and such land shall be considered and used as a quarantine for the purpose and term for which the inspector shall direct; and any person removing from, or placing on, any animals, without an order from an inspector, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

ORDERS REGULATING THE INTRODUCTION OF Animals into the Province by Land.

9. Any animals introduced across the boundary line of the province from New South Wales or Victoria, found to be suffering from pleuro-pneumonia, or any infectious or contagious disease, may be destroyed by order of an inspector.

10. All persons introducing sheep, cattle, or horses to this province overland from either of the Colonies of New South Wales and Victoria shall give not less than twenty-four hours' notice in writing to the

nearest inspector in this province, stating the brands | person who shall be authorized by the Hon. Comof such animals, the place at which such animals will cross the boundary, the date of intended crossing, the place from which they were brought, the road they are desirous of travelling, and their destination: Provided that no notice will be required for horse or bullock teams. Any person failing to show such notice has been given, to be liable to a penalty of not less than ten pounds nor more than thirty pounds.

11. Any person importing or introducing, by sea or land, any animal or animals found to be suffering from pleuro-pneumonia or any infectious or contagious disease, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds nor more than fifty pounds.

ORDERS REGULATING THE REMOVAL AND TREATMENT OF ANIMALS SUFFERING FROM ANY INFECTIOUS OR CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

12. Any animal suffering from pleuro-pneumonia or any infectious or contagious disease may be destroyed by the owner, agent, or person apparently in charge, by order of an inspector; and any owner, agent, or person apparently in charge not complying with such order shall be liable to a penalty of five pounds for every day such animal is left undestroyed after the date of such notice; and the inspector may give an order to seize and destroy such animal or animals, and any person authorized by the inspector may destroy such animals accordingly.

13. Any person or persons removing any animal or animals suffering from pleuro-pneumonia, or any infectious or contagious disease, through, across, or out of that portion of the Province of South Australia, known as the Districts of Victoria and Albert, situated between the boundary line of the province between the Colonies of Victoria and South Australia on the east side, and by the coast line from the southernmost point of the aforesaid boundary line to the mouth of the River Murray, and from thence following the River Murray to the boundary of the Colony of Victoria, into or through all that part of the Province of South Australia situated to the west and north of the River Murray, from the mouth to the boundary of New South Wales on such river, or shall remove any animal or animals so suffering through, across, or out of that part of the Province of South Australia as mentioned aforesaid, situated to the west and north of the River Murray, into or through the Districts of Victoria and Albert as hereinbefore described, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds for every animal so moved in contravention of this clause.

14. Any person or persons so driving or removing any animals suffering from pleuro-pneumonia or any infectious or contagious disease, as mentioned in the preceding order, and leaving on any road or land any animal so suffering without destroying any such animal so left, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds for every animal so left, and shall also be liable to a further penalty of not less than five pounds for every day on which any such animal shall be left undestroyed.

15. No person or persons shall remove any animal or animals from any ship or vessel to another ship or vessel, whilst any ship or vessel is within the boundaries of the port of Port Adelaide, or within the boundaries of any other port in the Province of South Australia without or and or in writing from the state of the state of the port of the province of the port in the Province of South Australia without or and or in writing from the province of the port o South Australia, without an order in writing from an inspector. Any person or persons acting in contra-vention of this clause shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five pounds nor more than fifty

pounds.
"Destroy" shall mean kill and burn or bury at least twelve inches beneath the surface of the

"Inspector" shall mean any Inspector of Sheep as appointed under Act No. 19, of 1859, and any

missioner of Crown Lands to act as an inspector.

Its north point is situated S. 34 W., 184 miles from the summit of Waia; N. 55 W., 21 miles | ward in the same direction about a cable.

from summit of Island of Malolo; S. 17 E., 17½ miles from the south point of the Kiva Reef. Immediately in a line between the Tartar Reef and the south point of the Kiva Reef there are no dangers; but coral banks exist, which have from 9 to 25 fathoms of water upon them. In shore of a meridian 5 miles east of this line, and between the parallels of Naviti and the Namanutha (Hudson's Islands), there are numerous reefs with from 2 to

5 fathoms of water, which break occasionally.

Viwa.—Viwa Island is not more than 100 feet high, and cannot be seen at night. On the south

point of the reef there is a heavy break at all times.

Barrier Reef off Malolo.—The Barrier Reef west of Malolo ends abruptly in a horn S. 81 W., 7 miles from the summit of that island.

New Reef West of Hudson Group.—Between this horn and the Tartar Reef there is a chain of coral banks with from 3 feet to 5 fathoms of water on them; there are blind rollers on these banks, but they break continuously only in strong winds. The safest passage through will be found in the following positions :-

Information furnished by Officers of H.M.S. "Nymphe."

Vate or Sandwich Island, New Hebrides.—The "Nymphe" made the island to extend 10 miles further to the eastward than marked on chart. Mr. Young, a resident of long standing in Havannah Harbour, says that traders are constantly speaking to him of Sandwich Island being so much out of position. He himself thinks the island cannot be far short of 40 miles in length.

Chart No. 1380, New Caledonia, New Hebrides, and Loyalty Islands.—Panoe Bay, in Vate Island, is quite 5 miles across, whereas in Chart No. 1380 it is only put as 1 mile wide from point to point. NOTICE is hereby given that on the 30th day of November, 1877, an Act was passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "An Act to provide for the satisfaction of certain Land Orders issued by the New Zealand Company, and theretofore exercised in the Manawatu or Horo-whenua Districts, within the aforesaid Company's settlement at Wellington."

No claim can be heard and determined until such original land order is lodged, or proof of the loss given to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.

The Commissioner will report to the Governor the name of the person found to be entitled to land under any particular land order, the particular number thereof, the fact of such land order having been lodged with him or of his having received satisfactory proof of the loss thereof, and the amount in value stated in such land order: such report is to be considered and approved by the Governor in Council and forthwith published in the New Zealand Gazette, with the date of the approval attached thereto. Notification of the Governor's approval is a sufficient one chain wide, commencing at the north-west corner

warrant to the Commissioner to issue, to the persons named in such approved report as being entitled to land, scrip for the amount of money originally paid for the land order under which any such persons have been found to be entitled, together with compensation to the amount of one pound for every one pound sterling represented by such land order added thereto; so that every person found entitled shall receive two pounds in value for every twenty shillings in value to which he shall have been found entitled, except in cases of lost land orders, in which case proceedings must be taken under "The Lost Land Orders Act, 1861."

No scrip can be delivered by the Commissioner until the land order in satisfaction of which such scrip is issued has been cancelled by him.

Upon the receipt of scrip all the right, title, interest, claim, and demand of the person to whom the same is issued, and of all other persons whatsoever, to the land in respect of which scrip shall have been issued, is extinguished. And the issue of such scrip is, both at law and in equity, a full and complete performance by the Crown, on behalf of the New Zealand Company, of the contract or obligation of the Company in respect of which such scrip shall have been issued.

All such scrip to be issued under the authority of the said Act is transferable, and is receivable as cash by the Receiver of Land Revenue in or towards the purchase of waste lands of the Crown in any part of the Provincial District of Wellington, but not elsewhere, and must be exercised within five years from the date of its issue. Claims for the exercise of scrip not made within such period of five years are barred.

The Commissioner cannot entertain or investigate any claims in which the claimant shall not have notified his intention to have his claim heard and decided under the provisions of the said Act, within the time limited for making such application. All claimants failing to avail themselves of the provisions of the said Act are barred, and their claim extinguished by reason of such default.

Hokitika.—Up to 18th very showery and unpleasant weather, the maximum rain recorded on 14th, 1·76 in.; wind chiefly westerly and strong on 1st, 13th, 14th, and 16th; thunder on 14th, and hail on 14th and 16th; fog on 1st; remainder of month much finer, though heavy rain recorded on 29th, 1·23 in.; prevailing S.W. winds throughout.

Dunedin.—Weather generally fine, except from 14th to 18th, when heavy S.W. gales occurred; snow fell on 16th and 17th, a good deal on latter date; greatest rain recorded on 10th, ·58 in.; prevailing S.W. wind.

Queenstown.—First part of month changeable; on 13th barometer fell nearly one inch, when bad weather was experienced, wind N.W., heavy fall of snow lasting to 14th; snow also on hills on 1st and 9th; on 17th barometer rose and fine weather prevailed to end of month; maximum rain recorded on 14th, ·95 in.; prevailing wind from westward; fog on 23rd and 24th; hail on 14th.

Southland.—From 1st to 18th wet, stormy, and cold, wind westerly; a gale on 14th from S.W. was followed by snow on 15th, hail on six days; thunder on 8th, finer towards end of month; maximum rain recorded on 16th, ·70 in.; prevailing S.W. and N.W. winds.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Wery small rainfall during this month as compared with that for same period in former years; the atmospheric pressure was generally higher and the temperature about the average on the whole; some strong winds were experienced from westward, but generally the weather for the time of year was fine. Earthquakes were felt at Wellington on the 15th between 8 and 9 a.m., slight; on 22nd at 4.40 p.m. two smart shocks with rumbling noise, and on 29th at 1.50 a.m. a slight movement; also at Rakaia on 16th a shock reported.

The number of births registered in these boroughs in 1877 amounted to 3,618, against 3,637 in 1876; a decrease of 19 on the number of births in 1876. The deaths in 1877 amounted to 1,329, against 1,482 in 1876; a decrease in 1877 of 153 deaths, or at the rate of 103 per cent. The death-rates were considerably lower in Auckland and in Christchurch in 1877 than in 1876, having fallen in Auckland from 2493 per 1,000 of population to 1668, and in Christchurch from 2263 to 1550. The deaths in Dunedin decreased from 1724 per 1,000 of population to 1387; but in Hokitika, in consequence of the large number of deaths from scarlet fever (numbering 40, or 46 per cent. of the total deaths in the borough), the rate rose from 1777 to 3178. In Wellington the rate varied little, but remained somewhat high, having been 1974 in 1876, and 1950 in 1877.

The deaths in the boroughs of children under 1 year amounted in 1877 to 407, or 11.25 per cent. of the births, against 13.77 per cent. in 1876, and 18 per cent. in 1875. The deaths under 1 year amounted to 30.62 per cent. of the total deaths, against 33.8 in 1876, and 30.8 in 1875.
