Alteration of Rates of Postage.

### NORMANBY, Governor. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled "The New Zealand Post Office Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Proclamation to be published in the New Zealand Gazette, to fix, alter, and abolish the rates of postage at any time payable within the colony for the transmission of letters and newspapers by post, either between places within New Zealand or to or from places beyond seas, and at what time the same shall be paid, and that the postage so made payable shall be charged and paid accordingly: And whereas by Proclamation duly made and issued, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the fourth day of October, in the same year, the Governor in Council did, in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, fix certain rates of postage to be paid within the colony for the transmission of all letters and newspapers and packets by post to or from the countries and places mentioned in the Schedules thereto, and the times at which the same respectively should be paid as therein mentioned: And whereas it is desirable that the said rates should be altered as hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, in exercise of the said recited power and authority, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby alter the rates of postage fixed to be paid within the colony, and doth proclaim and declare that the postage payable within the colony for the transmission of all letters, newspapers, and packets by post to the countries and places mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall be according to the rates mentioned in such Schedule, and that such postage shall in all cases be paid at the time such letters, newspapers, and packets are delivered into the post; and, with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth further proclaim and declare that this Proclamation shall take effect from and after the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

Regulations Establishing an Inland Pattern and Sample and Parcel Post; also Extending the In-land Book Post System; and also fresh Regula-tions for the Registration, and the Transmission by Post, of Newspapers and Trade Circulars.

FORSTER GORING,

#### General Post Office,

Wellington, 14th September, 1878. THE following regulations, establishing an Inland Pattern and Sample and Parcel Post; also extending the regulations of the Inland Book Post; and also providing for the registration, and transmission by post, of Newspapers and Trade Circulars, are published for general information.

The Inland Pattern and Sample and Parcel Post, and the Inland Book Post regulations, only apply to articles posted for transmission to places within the colony. The regulations governing the transmission of Book Packets and Pattern and Sample Parcels to places without the colony, are also published, so as to prevent misconception on the part of the public. These regulations have had force as from the 1st

September instant.

INLAND PATTERN AND SAMPLE AND PARCEL POST.

The regulations prohibiting any complete article having a value of its own, parcels of goods sent for sale, or in execution of an order (however small the quantity), and also articles sent by one private individual to another, which were not actually by the patterns or samples, being sent by pattern and sample post, are hereby repealed. Every article of merchandise, whether raw or manufactured,

and of a character not likely to injure the contents of the mail bags, or to do bodily harm to any officer of the Post Office, is now accepted, under the regulations of the inland pattern and sample and parcel post. The following are the rules of the inland pattern and sample

and parcel post ;---

- (1.) A pattern sample or parcel packet may contain pat-terns, samples, or articles of merchandise, goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, or any articles sent by one private individual to another; seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions may also be forwarded.
- (2.) The postage is one penny not exceeding two ounces; twopence not exceeding four ounces; and one penny for every additional two ounces or fraction of two ounces.
- (3.) No packet must exceed two feet in length or one foot in width or depth, nor must it exceed five pounds in weight; any packet exceeding that weight will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.
- (4.) There must be no writing or printing on the packet or its cover in addition to the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, except the address of the sender and the nature of the contents, a trade mark and numbers, and the prices of the articles, otherwise the packet will be charged double letter postage. The name and address of the sender of any parcel should invariably be given, so that, if for any reason the packet cannot be forwarded or delivered, it may be returned to the sender.
- forwarded or delivered, it may be returned to the sender.
  (5.) There must be no enclosure other than the articles themselves. The particulars which are allowed to be furnished under the preceding rule, as to the trade marks and numbers, and the prices of the articles, must in all cases be given, not on loose pieces of paper, but on small labels attached to the articles or the bags containing them. Should this rule be infringed, the packet will be charged double letter postage.
  (6) A pattern complete on more packet must be east in
- (6.) A pattern, sample, or parcel packet must be sent in stout and durable covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Seeds, drugs, &c., may be enclosed easy of examination. Seeds, drugs, &c., may be enclosed in tin boxes, or in bags of linen, or other material, fas-tened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in the case of seeds in bags entirely closed, provided that they are transparent, so that the officers of the department may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents. If this rule be infringed, the packet will be charged double letter postage.
- (7.) Insufficiently paid packets will be treated as described in section 10 of the Inland Book Post Regulations.
- (8.) In order to prevent any interruption to the regular transmission of letters, any packet may, when it is necessary, be kept back by any Postmaster until the following despatch.

(9.) The rule which forbids the transmission through the post of any article which might injure the contents of the mail bags or the officers of the Post Office is so far relaxed as to permit the transmission of scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like, as samples, provided that they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags and officers of the Post Office, while at the same time the samples may be easily examined. If any packet containing such articles as these be posted which is found not to be sufficiently guarded, it will be detained, and a notice of its detention will be sent to the person to whom it is addressed or to the sender, who may then obtain it upon personal application; but the packet will be charged with a fine equal in amount to the postage to which the packet was liable as a packet of pottome. patterns.

Packets or parcels containing gold, silver, jewellery, &c., cannot be forwarded under the inland pattern and sample and parcel post regulations.

Parcels containing gunpowder, glass, any perishable substance such as leeches, game, fish, fiesh, fruit, vegetables, &c., any liquid (except liquid medicine), matches, or other inflammable liquid (except liquid medicine), matches, or other inflammable or explosive substance, or compound poison, or whatever is dangerous to the mails, or offensive or injurious to the persons dealing with the mails, shall not be transmitted by the post whether as a parcel or otherwise. Postmasters must refuse to transmit by post any parcel which shall contain, or be reason-ably suspected to contain, any such articles. Liquid medicines strongly packed in tin cases, and marked "Liquid Medicine," may, however, be posted.

#### INLAND BOOK POST.

- The following are the regulations of the inland book post :-(1.) The postage is one penny not exceeding two ounces; twopence not exceeding four ounces; and one penny for every additional two ounces or fraction of two ounces. Book packets which may be insufficiently prepaid will be charged with double the deficiency.(2.) An inland book packet must be sent either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened, whether by
  - means of gum, wafer, scaling-wax, postage stamp, or otherwise), or in a cover entirely open at both ends or sides, so as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination. For the greater security of the contents, the packet may be tied at the ends with string, but in such case Postmasters are authorized to cut the string, although if they do so they must again tie up the packet
  - (3.) A book packet may contain any number of separate books or other publications (including printed or litho-graphed letters intended for transmission in identical terms to several persons), photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass or such like substance), downing engreging when a substance). drawings, engravings, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum; and the books or other of paper, parchment, or vellum; and the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c., may be either printed, written, engraved, lithographed, or plain, or any mixture of these. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, &c., or of a portion thereof, is allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached; as also rollers in the case of prints or maps; markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books; pens or pencils in the case of pocket-books, &c.; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of such articles, or usually appertains thereto. (4.) A book packet may also comprise bills of lading, printed catalogues, manuscript of books or pamphlets
  - a) A book packet may also comprise bins of lading, printed catalogues, manuscript of books or pamphlets (if plainly superscribed as such, together with the name of the sender), music (written or printed, and, in the case of proof sheets, manuscript corrections), paintings, pass-books, printed placards, printers' proofs (indorsed as such on the covers), scrip, deeds, policies of assurance, insurance policies, filled in forms of insurance and provide the printed charment of the printed documents are proposed. insurance poincies, infect-in forms of insurance and assurance proposals (and other printed documents con-nected therewith), plans, powers of attorney, specifica-tions, prospectuses, returns (if filled in in accordance with the printed headings, and without note or any comment whatever), invoices, legal documents, recog-nizances, drafts, and, in fact, any written or printed communication not of the character of an actual and communication not of the character of an actual and personal correspondence, may pass as articles within the meaning of the Inland Book Post Regulations. (5.) Press manuscript intended for publication is not
  - regarded as actual and personal correspondence, provided the packet bears the words "Press Manuscript," and is addressed to the office of any newspaper published within the colony. If posted in accordance with the foregoing directions, press manuscript will be permitted to pass at book-packet rates of postage.

- (6.) No book packet may contain anything which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection; nor must sealed or otherwise closed against inspection; nor must there be any letter, nor any communication of the nature of a letter, whether separate or otherwise. Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, &c., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter. Indeed, as respects the name and address of the sender, not only is the writing permitted, but it is even recom-mended; so that if the cover come off, or for any other reason the packet cannot be forwarded, it may be returned. A book may also contain a manuscript dedication, or a complimentary inscription from the author. Passages complimentary inscription from the author. Passages in the text to which it is desired to call attention may be marked with a simple stroke. Passages
- be marked with a simple stroke.
  (7.) No book packet must exceed two feet in length, or one foot in width or depth,—nor must it exceed five pounds in weight; and if any such packet be presented at a Post Office it will not be received.
  (8.) Any packet which shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall have any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter written in it, or upon its cover, will be observed double lattar postage.
- will be charged double letter postage.
- (9.) If a packet be found to contain any letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other unauthorized enclosure, the packet will be charged double letter postage, and forwarded to its address.
- (10.) If a book packet be not sufficiently prepaid with stamps, but nevertheless bear stamps of the value of one rate, it will be forwarded charged with double the deficiency. Book packets posted wholly unpaid will not be forwarded.
- (11.) All bond fide printed or lithographed matter enclosed in envelopes slit or partially open at the ends, and having the fly turned inside, instead of being gummed over in the usual manner, is permitted to pass through the post at book-post rates. Legal documents include acts or deeds of all kinds drawn

up by public functionaries, copies or extracts of deeds under private seal, and in general all manuscript papers and documents which have not the character of an actual and personal cor-

respondence. It is the duty of Postmasters, whenever they have ground for suspecting an infringement of any of the above conditions, and occasionally even where there is no ground for suspicion, to open and examine book packets posted at or passing through their offices.

To prevent obstacles to the regular transmission of letters, a Postmaster may, when necessary, delay forwarding any book packet until the following despatch. The main business of the Post Office being the transmission of

letters, the forwarding of books and newspapers (which no one is compelled to send through the Post Office), though an im-portant, is only a secondary object, for which no arrangement can be made which would interfere with the quick and regular con-veyance and delivery of letters. Books, therefore, which would be injured by being thrust into a bag and hurriedly pressed down like a bundle of letters, should not be sent through the post.

#### NEWSPAPERS.

1. All newspapers published in the colony, and registered at the General Post Office for transmission by post, may either be forwarded like other printed matter under the regulations of the book post, or may be transmitted within the colony on payment of a postage rate of one halfpenny each in postage stamps, and to places beyond the colony at the rates set forth in the Postal Guide.

The conditions of registration are as follows, viz. :-

- (1.) The publication must consist wholly or in great part of political or other news, or of articles relating thereto or to other current topics, with or without advertisements.
- (2.) It must be printed and published in the Colony of New Zealand, and must be published in numbers at
- (3.) The full title and date of publication must be printed at the top of the first page, and the whole or part of the title and the date of publication at the top of every subsequent page; and this regulation extends to "Tables of Contents" and "Indices."
- (4.) A supplement must consist wholly or in great part of atter like that of a newspaper, or of advertisements, printed on a sheet or sheets or on a piece or pieces of paper, unstitched; or wholly or in part of engravings, prints, or lithographs illustrative of articles in the newspaper. The supplement must in every case be published with the newspaper, and must have the title and date of publication of the newspaper printed at the top of every page, or, if it consists of engravings, prints, or lithographs, at the top of every sheet or side. The added matter

must be a genuine supplement, that is, matter supplied in order to complete that to which it is added or supple-mented, but left out of the regular issue for want of space, time, or greater convenience. As used in relation

in order to complete that to which it is added or supplemented, but left out of the regular issue for want of space, time, or greater convenience. As used in relation to newspapers, a supplement is held to be matter proper to be inserted in the newspaper to which it is supplied, but has not been for want of space, or want of time, or because it is more convenient regarding space or time, or either, that it should be printed on a separate sheet.
2. A newspaper must not contain any enclosures other than the supplement or supplements proper to the newspaper, nor any writing or other mark thereon, beyond the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, nor anything on the cover but the name and address, the printed title of the newspaper, and the printed name and address of the publisher or vendor who sends it. Insets, advertising sheets, or handbills placed between the pages of newspapers, but having no connection with such publications as properly parts thereof, will subject the entire packages to letter rates of postage.
3. If a newspaper addressed to any place within the colony be found to contain writing or any enclosure, it must be forwarded to its destination charged according to its weight, with the full rate of letter postage from the country where it originated; but if such newspaper be addressed to any place beyond the colony, it must be detained, and in due course sent to the Dead Letter Office.
4. If more then one newspaper he enclosed in a packet ad-

If more than one newspaper be enclosed in a packet ad-dressed to any place within the colony, and for which the full amount of postage has not been paid, a charge of one penny must be made for each extra newspaper enclosed. Packets of newspapers posted for places beyond the colony not fully pre-reid must be defined paid must be detained.

5. Newspapers posted in pillur boxes, which are intended for the receipt of letters only, must, if addressed to places within the colony, be sent on charged a single rate of one halfpenny; but if for places beyond the colony, they must be detained for one month in case of inquiry, and then destroyed.
6. Newspapers, if posted in single numbers, addressed to the Manager, Keeper, Clerk, Secretary, Librarian, or other person having the charge of any Athenaeum, Mechanics' Institute, Hospital, Public Library, or Lunatic Asylum in the colony, are permitted to pass through the post, and to be delivered free of postage.

7. Newspapers, whether originating in the colony or beyond the colony, re-directed from one Post Office to another within the colony may be transmitted accordingly, but are chargeable with a fresh newspaper rate of one halfpenny each, which may

with a fresh newspaper rate of one halfpenny each, which may be paid either on re-direction or delivery. 8. "Newspaper exchanges" (*i.e.*, newspapers exchanged between newspaper offices) are permitted to pass through the post free of postage, if posted in single numbers, from any news-paper office within the colony and addressed to the Editor, Proprietor, Publisher, or Manager of any newspaper published in the colony, and are properly franked. The title of the news-paper, and the words "Newspaper Exchange only," must be written or printed on each cover above the address; and the frank or certificate of exchange must be signed by the authorized person, either by affixing his signature, or a *fac-simile* thereof by means of an autograph stamp. Newspaper exchanges not posted in accordance with the foregoing rules will be charged full letter rates. full letter rates.

#### TRADE CIRCULARS AND PRICES CURRENT.

Trade Circulars and Prices Current, published in the colony and registered for transmission by post, may be forwarded to any place within the colony, to Australia, Tasmania, India, the United Kingdom (unless sent viá Brindisi), for one penny each. Trade circulars and prices current embrace printed or lithographed stock and share lists and market reports, and, if desired, the prices may be added in manuscript or otherwise. No trade circular or prices current must exceed one ounce in weight.

#### FOREIGN BOOK POST.

- The following are the regulations of the foreign book post:-(1.) The postage to the United Kingdom, Australian Colonies, the Dominion of Canada, and the United States of America is one penny not exceeding two ounces; twopence not exceeding four ounces; and one penny for every additional two ounces or fraction of two ounces. The postage to all other foreign places may be ascer-tained on reference to the table of rates of postage pub-lished from time to time in the New Zealand Postal
  - Guide. Book packets which may be insufficiently prepaid will be treated as described in section 8.
    (2.) Every packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides, so as to admit of the enclosures being examined. For the greater security of its contents, the packet may be tied at the ends with

string, but in such case the Postmaster is authorized to out the string, although if he do so he must again tie up the packet.

  (5.) No book packet must exceed two feet in length, or one foot in width or depth, nor must it exceed five pounds in weight. The limit of weight on a book packet addressed to any of the countries comprised within the General Postal Union, a list of which appears at the end of the table of rates of postage published from time to time in the New Zealand Postal Guide, is two pounds. Packets exceeding the foregoing weights and dimensions
- Packets exceeding the foregoing weights and dimensions will not be received at any Post Office. .) Any packet which shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall have any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter written in it, or upon its cover, (6.)
- will be charged with double letter postage, less the value of postage stamps affixed, and forwarded to its address. (7.) If a packet be found to contain any letter not wholly printed, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other un-authorized enclosure, the packet will be charged with double letter postage, less the value of postage stamps affixed, and forwarded to its address.
- (8.) If a book packet or pattern parcel be not sufficiently prepaid with stamps, but nevertheless bear stamps of the value of one rate, it is forwarded charged with the deficient postage, together with an additional rate of four-pence in all cases, except for parcels marked for trans-mission vid Brindisi, and when marked vid Brindisi, sixpence.
- (9.) All bond fide printed matter enclosed in envelopes slit or partially open at the ends, and having the fly turned inside, so that the contents may be examined without

instate, so that the contents may be examined without cutting or tearing the envelope, instead of being gummed over in the usual manner, is to be permitted to pass through the post at book-post rates.
It is the duty of Postmasters, whenever they have ground for suspecting an infringement of any of the above conditions, and occasionally even where there is no ground for suspicion, to one and examine hock packets packed at or parsing therein. open and examine book packets posted at or passing through their offices.

#### FOREIGN PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

The following are the rules of the foreign pattern and

 sample post :-- (1.) A pattern parcel is a bond fide pattern or sample of merchandise. Goods sent for sale or in execution of an order (however small the quantity may be), or any arti-cles sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually patterns or samples, are not admissible.

- (2.) The rates of postage are the same as for book packets. (See clause 1 of the Foreign Book Post Regulations.)
  (3.) No packet of patterns or samples must exceed twenty-
- four ounces in weight; and to countries comprised within the General Postal Union the limit of weight for patterns and samples is eight ounces. Packets ex-ceeding these weights will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.
- (4.) There must be no writing or printing on the packet or its cover in addition to the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, except the address of the
- whom the packet is intended, except the address of the sender, a trade mark and numbers, and the prices of the articles, otherwise the packet will be treated as a letter. (5.) There must be no enclosure other than the samples themselves. The particulars, which are allowed to be furnished under the preceding rule, must in all cases be given, not on loose pieces of paper, but on small labels attached to the samples or the bags containing them.
- (6.) The patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., may be enclosed in boxes, or in bags of linen, or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in the case of samples of seeds in bags entirely closed, provided that they are transparent, so that the officers of the depart-ment may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents. If this rule be infringed, the packet will be treated as a letter.
- (7.) Insufficiently paid packets of patterns or samples will be treated as described in section 10 of the Inland Book Post Regulations.
- Post Kegulations.
  (8.) In order to prevent any interruption to the regular transmission of letters, a packet of patterns or samples may, when it is necessary, be kept back by any Postmaster until the following despatch.
  (9.) The rule which forbids the transmission through the post of any article which might injure the contents of the mail bags or the officers of the Post Office is so far releved as to pare the transmission of seasors.
- relaxed as to permit the transmission of scistors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like, as samples, provided that they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags and the officers of the Post Office while at the same time the samples may be easily Office, while at the same time the samples may be easily examined. If any packet containing such articles as these be posted which is found not to be sufficiently guarded it will be detained, and a notice of its detention will be sent to the person to whom it is addressed or to the sender, who may then obtain it upon personal appli-cation; but the packet will be charged with a fine equal in amount to the postage to which the packet was liable as a packet of patterns. (10.) A packet of patterns or samples sent vid the United
- Kingdom to Portugal, Madeira, the Azores, Cape de Verds, France, or to Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, by French packet, must not exceed eighteen inches in length, width, or depth; a packet to any other place alroad must not exceed twenty-four inches in length or twelve inches in breadth or depth.
- (11.) Bags entirely closed, even though they be trans-parent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to any foreign country except the United States of America, Holland and its possessions, Belgium, Den-mark, Greece, Portugal and its possessions, and Switzerland; and samples of intrinsic value must not be sent to foreign countries.
- (12.) No letter or other packet (whether registered or otherwise) containing either gold or silver money, jewels, or precious articles, or any other article whatever, liable to Customs duties, can pass through the post to any of the countries comprised within the General Postal Union—a list of which appears at the end of the table of rates of postage published from time to time in the New Zealand Postal Guide.
